is from one seventeen-hundreth to one two-thousandth of an inch thick. Even this, however, is far surpassed in slenderness by the spider's thread which has been found in some cases to be more than one thirty-thousandth of an inch in diameter. The fibers yielded by the vegetable kingdom are also of astonishing minuteness. Every fibre of flax is found to be composed of a bundle of other fibrils, which are about one twenty-five - hundreth of an inch in thickness. Similar fibres from the pine apple plant have been ascertained to be no more than one five thousandth, or or one seven thousandth of an inch in diameter.

A German physician entertains the novel view that insanity is a boon to mankind. He contends that the loss of reason lands the sufferer from a sea of trouble into a state of comparative calm-often of decided happiness ; and attempts to restore such a person to sanity would be cruel rather than kind. Moreover, he insists that a certain amount of insanity is necessary to success in life. All eminent men are decidedly more or less mad. Many of them are dangerous monomaniacs whom it should be decided on public grounds to shut up, but who, nevertheless, achieve grand careers and are credited with doing a vast amount of good. The general prevalence of false notions of sanity he attributes to the fact that the greater mass of humanity is also insane, and quite unable to distinguish between good and evil.

In 1881 the American Association for the advancement of science will meet at Cincinnati, and at Montreal in 1882.

At the exhibition of fishing appliances which recently took place in Berlin, an electrical fishing apparatus attracted considerable attention. This consisted of a kind of small boat, worked by a screw, and capable of being directed to any required point in the water. On arriving at this point the boat anchors itself, and at the same moment a hook and line are projected. The boat contains a battery and an electro-magnetic apparatus which is set in action by the losing of the circuit, this being effected by the slightest pressure upon the hook produced by the fish in the act of taking the bait. The circuit being thus closed, the fish is instantly hauled into the boat, a bell being rung at the same moment to signify that a capture has been made. The boat is then drawn to shore by means of a cord connecting it with the bank.


