

Ottawa, Oct. 10-Several claims for compensation on account of the typhoid fever epidemic and alleging negligence on the part of the city, have reached the city hall. Some sent in the doctors and hospital bills, others have not. Several point out that the illness had left members of the family unable to work and that they are now nearly destitute.

There were upwards of one thousand cases of typhoid during the recent epidemic, due, it is claimed, by impure water, and if the city is held responsible for the epidemic it will be costly for Ottawa.
