ANOTHER PULP MILL
NOW TALKED OF
Company Interested Have Pur-
chased Water Front and
Hold Options

The Graphic learns on good author-
ity that a large lumber company,
which owns two hundred square miles
of pulp lands on a branch of the Ma-
tapedia, is seriously considering the
building of a large pulp mill at Camp-
bellton.

This company has already purchas-
ed some river front properties and
holds options on others.
The Graphic also understands that
Dahlgren town officials are actively
engaged in an endeavor to induce the
company to erect its mill there.

If these statements are true it is
evident that our town council and Board
of Trade take up the matter, as Camp-
bellton needs such an industry and
every effort should be made to have
the mill erected here.

ITALIANS SMASH
AUSTRIAN LINES
Large Number of Prisoners Tak-
en.—British Take Front
Line Near Salley

London, Oct. 11.—The Austrian line
was smashed by the Italian on-
slaught and over six thousand prison-
ers captured.
Asquith says Allies will accept no
patched up compromise masquerading
under the name of peace.
Allied Admiral has issued ultimatum
to Greece government ordering it to
hand over entire fleet to Allies.
British take German front line near
Salley.

Berlin, Oct. 11.—German troops in a
salient projecting towards the town of
Vermandovillers on the battlefield
south of the Somme river, have been
cut off by the French forces, it was
stated in the German official statement
given out to-day.

London, Oct. 11.—Allied aviators
dropped bombs on Stuttgart yesterday
evening, according to a Reuter des-
patch from Amsterdam. The despatch
says that neither persons nor buildings
were hit.

London, Oct. 11.—"The enemy artill-
ery," says the British official statement
issued to-day, "was somewhat more
active during the night on the greater
part of the battlefield (in northern
France)."
"North of Neuville-St. Vaast the
enemy blew a camouflet early this
morning without inflicting casualties."
"A successful minor enterprise was
made by our troops against the en-
emy's trenches south of Bullich."

THE DAVE'S RECORD
The record of sub 1, no warring, as
brought to land by wireless despatches,
follows:
The steamer Stratheden, British
freighter, torpedoed and sunk off Nan-
tucket. Crew taken aboard Nantucket
Shoal Lightship, and later removed to
Newport by torpedo boat destroyers.
The vessel left New York yesterday
for Bordeaux, and was attacked at 6
a. m.
The West Point, British freighter,
torpedoed and sunk off Nantucket.
Crew abandoned the ship in small
boats, after a warning shot from the
submarine's gun. Officers and men
were taken aboard a destroyer. The
vessel was attacked at 10.45 a. m. She
was bound from London for Newport
News.

NINE VESSELS SUNK TO DATE
Newport, R. I., Oct. 9.—A total of
nine ships have been sunk by German
submarines up to an early hour this
morning, according to an officer of the
destroyer Ericsson, arriving here.
This officer said he understood more
than one submarine was surely taking
part in the attack. Information at
Nantucket was that two and possibly
three submarines had been sighted.
His information was all from Nan-
tucket and confirms to reports given
out there as to messages picked up
from wireless flashes.

THREE SUBMARINES AT WORK
Persistent reports are also in circu-
lation that more than one submarine is
surely taking part in the attacks. One
report declared there are two—the
U-53, which put in at Newport on Sat-
urday, and the U-54. Another report
mentions the U-61. There is no way
of establishing definitely how many
submarines are on the scene.

All passengers from the steamers
which were sunk have been taken off
Nantucket Lightship and have each
been landed or are en route to New-
port, aboard U. S. destroyers. Pass-
engers from the Stratheden, West
Point, Stephano, Kingston, Bloomers
dijk and Christian Knudson were taken
off during yesterday afternoon and late
last night.

IN MEN FOR KILTIES

In Two Weeks This County Has Sup-
plied 44 Soldiers for the 236th
Battalion

The first two weeks of the recruit-
ing campaign for the New Brunswick
Kilties closed Monday night and in
that space of time over 250 men have
enlisted. The County of Restigouche
leads with 44, Northumberland follows
with 40, Westmorland 36, St. John's,
York 21, Carleton 20, while the bal-
ance were obtained from other sections
of the province. This shows that three
of the platoons have been more than
half recruited in the fortnight.

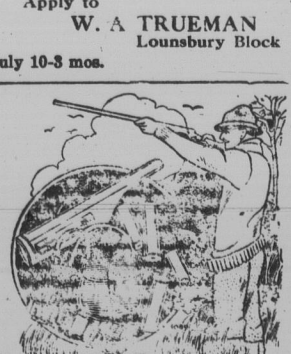

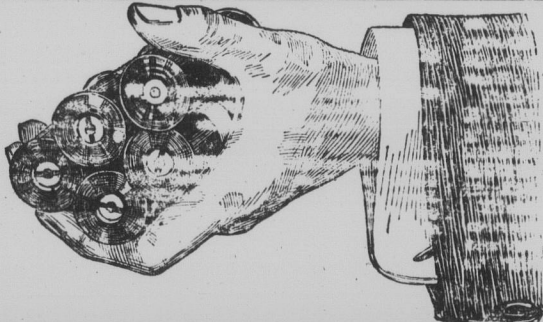
