



RENOVATING CARPETS.

RENOVATING CARPETS.

It sometimes happens, even when a carpet has been taken away and thoroughly beaten, that its surface is soiled with grease, etc., or in the case of a light ground it is really in want of a good wash. Supposing the carpst to be tacked down after beating, the mode of procedure is as follows: Obtain a round ball of carpet soap. Take two towels—one wet, the other dry—and a pan of warm water and begin upon a section of your carpet. Damp it with a towel wrung out of the hot water, but do not make it thoroughly wet. Rub the soap dry all over the surface thus damped and then use a fairly wet cloth vigorously over the soaped part. A lather is thus produced which must be washed away in turn with the towel wrung out of the water again. Finish by drying as far as possible with the dry cloth. Each section of the carpet must be thus treated until the whole surface is thoroughly clean, and I am quite sure the result will be found equal to the treuble thus expended.—[Practical Housekeeping. to the trouble thus expended. - [Practical Housekeeping.

A few years ago Sir John Ihompson formed a Provincial Government in Nova Scotia which lasted about three months, or until the people were given an opportunity of kicking it out. History will probably repeat itself in the larger field. When he assumed the leadership of his party in Nova Scotia Kir John Thompson had almost the entire Legislaure at his back. Yet his Government only lasted a few months.







He met a man near Fifth and Mission streets who asked him for a light. Curtis found it was too late to go to the Tivoli and started for a Howard street car. He half turned around, when suddenly he was struck by some blunt weapon, and in a half alzed condition fell to the sidewalk. His assallant jumped upon him and a struggle of a minute or so ensued.
