

STARVATION IS FEARED

Therefore, Note Says, Germany Will Try To Stop British Trade.

WASHINGTON UPBRAIDED

Sending of Arms and Supplies to Allies Is Cause of Offence.

(Canadian Press.) Berlin, Feb. 18 .- Via Lon-

don .- The reply of Germany to the protest of the United States against a blockade of British waters is couched in friendly terms, but firmly maintains the position of Germany as already announced. The answer, which is a lengthy document, was converted into code at the United States embassy under the direction of Ambassador Gerard, and has been transmitted in full to Washington.

The note explains that Germany's proposed action is rendered necessary by Great Bri-Ul Ululillul tain's policy of attempting to cut off the food supply for the German civil population by a method never recognized in international law.

SAYS STAND NECESSARY.

Britain's course in ordering merchantmen to fly neutral flags, equipping them with artillery with orders to destroy submarines, the German reply contends, renders nugatory the right to search, thus giving Germany the right to attack British shipping. Germany holds that she cannot abandon that right under the stress which Britain has forced upon her. Since Germany must compel nations with which she is at war to return to the recognized principles of international law and restore the freedom of the seas, she argues that the stand she has taken is neces.

Suggests Convoy. The note recommends that the United States Government send warships to England to convoy merchant through the danger zone, as security against attack, with the understanding that vessels thus guarded shall carry no war supplies. The report from Nantes, which is in the point of a triangle drawn toward the coast, with Paris and Bordeaux as the other corners, told of the accidental death of a Hespeler man who was in one of the Western Ontario units prior to enlistment. The indication from the location of the troops at the time of his death is that the Canadians were landed at a port further south than the usual points of debarkation for the British troops, perhaps Bordeaux, or that the men may be trained in Southern France for some time before being taken to

In fact, one special writer to the Toronto Star describes the scene as the Canadians moved through a point at which he was stationed. THAT a man who has served his thenceforth receive a pension, is a proposition for which much may be said. But that a man should retire in the full vigor of manhood, and take some other position under the Government, or enter into some other occupation from which he derives as much remuneration as a younger man would receive, and should still continue to draw his pension, is something altogether different.

Americans who are striving to drive the people of the United States into active sympathy for Germany. is the formation of a national organization every member of which is pledged to upport and vote for candidates who promise to help put through legislation or projects favorable to Germany. The move is just another of the many blunders Germany and her friends have made in their attempts to get and hold American sympathy. In this case it has caused the greatest resentment with the general American public. American ideals, American training, are directly opposed to those of Germany. Nothing could be more hateful to an American than the "Kultur." Any movement aimed to sustain or spread Prussian imperialism, however indirect, is hostile to American sentiment. To the average American the special pleadings of Dr. Dernberg for the Kaiser are abhorrent. He cannot understand why one section of the community should be permitted to violate neutrality. He believes that no American of European extraction should be allowed to make a political issue of old-world grievances. The resentment and annoyance caused by these hyphenated Americans has caused many complaints to be placed before President Wilson, Perhaps the Administration at Washington will presently make an official statement that will show the rest of the world that American sentiment as a whole is hostile to attempts to arouse sympathy for Germany, or for any other belligerent.



Miss Hanson, who has been and is a most faithful and capable visiting nurse, has a very large territory to cover, and the need for a second nurse is being felt more and more strongly all the time. Since the first of the year, expenses to the amount of \$407 have been pald out by the society, quite a heavy drain when it is considered that owing to so many calls for money, the organization has made no special appeal for help this year, in any form. The fee for active membership, \$5. Quite a number of the latter fees are still unpaid, and the finances of the society would be augmented considerably if associate members bore this in mind.



PRESS OF STATES PLEASED AT REPLY

Tribune Says Sir Edward Grey Is Reasonable and Friendly.

ISSUE NOT A MAJOR ONE

Very Different From Threat Implied In Germany's "War Zone" Note.

[Canadian Press.]
New York, Feb. 18.—The Tribune this morning says editorially:
"Sir Edward Grey's reply to eur state department's protest against the inconveniences caused to American shippers by the detention of ships and the examples." by the detention of ships and the examination of cargoes destined to neutral ports is entirely reasonable and friendly in tone. The two governments, as we said when the preliminary reply was published several weeks ago, have no differences on questions of principle. The United States has itself set many precedents which Great Britain is now following in treating contraband going through a neutral territory to a belliggerent. We do not challenge a free exerent. We do not challenge a free ex-ercise of the right of search or a pretty large discretion of Great Britain's part in declaring what is and what is not contraband.

Arguments Conceded.
"It will probably be conceded by most
Americans that the German Government's action in taking control of all food supplies eliminates the normal distinction between food intended for the use of a belligerent's armed force and food intended for the civilian population. All food may thus become contraband under such conditions. Most Americans also recognize that the British prize courts will give a hearing on their merits to cases of selzure coming before them. Beyond that there is always the recourse of diplomatic intervention and arbitration.

Cut Red Tape.

"All that this Government asks is the cutting of red tape and the prevention of undue delays in the exercise of the right of search and seizure. That is a grievance which can easily be made to yield to better administrative methods, "The issue is not a major one—like that raised by the threat implied in the recent German 'war zone' proclamation. In Great Britain's case we are dealing with a power which still believes that questions affecting neutral rights can all be settled within the scope of the existing international law code."

No Effort Spared.

The World says: "The formal reply of the British Government to the American protest against interferences with neutral commerce is notably friendly in tone, and the facts recited will impress the reader with the truth of the assertion that no effort is being spared o 'avoid inflicting avoidable injury on neu-tral interests.'"

Three Times Serious Wounded -Immensely Popular With His Men.



Morley Pettit, provincial applarist and professor of agriculture at the O. A. C., gave an interesting illustrated address on bees. Mr. Pettit devoted most of his address to the way in which blossoms were fertilized. He declared that insects were necessary in transferring pollen from one blossom to another so as to give better fruit and more of it. Bees were the most reliable insects for this purpose, as they visited the blos-soms for food and nectar. He advocated the placing of bee-hives in the orchard as the bees were not satisfied when their hunger was appeased, but kept on gathering nectar and distributing pollen as long as there was any to distribute. 




