ROYAL HOUSE NAME FOR THE KING ANNOUNCES NEW

NAME OF BRITISH ROYAL FAMILY DROP 'SAXE-COBOURG AND GOTHA

With Unanimous Consent of the Privy Council His Majesty Casts Off Family Title of German Origin.

London, July 17.-King George today, at a meeting of the Privy Council, announced the new name of the royal house and family to be "The House of Windsor."

The Privy Council, at which the King announced the change, was held at St. James' Palace. It was the most important and largest attended since the coronation. The attendance included Premier Lloyd George, Foreign Secretary Balfour and other members of the Cabinet, the Archbishop of Canterbury, former Premier Asquith and all members of the Colonial Government who are now in London. The Privy Council unanimously indorsed King George's announcement and the proclamation putting it into effect was published this afternoon.

King George is of the House of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha. It was recently decided to drop titles or names of German origin.

The King's Proclamation. King George's proclamation, changing the name of his house to that of Windsor, says: "We out of our royal will and authority, do hereby declare and announce that as from the date of our royal proclamation our house and family shall be styled and known as the house and family of Windsor, and that all descendants in the male line of our grandmother, Queen Victoria, who are subjects of these realms, other than the female descendants, who may marry or

RUSS MINISTERS RESIGN OFFICE,

Grave Cabinet Trouble Again Appears at Petrograd.

OVER UKRAINE'S RULING

Three Members of Ministry Have Handed in Their Portfolios.

Petrograd, July 16 .- Two demonstrations against the Government resulted in the firing of shots in the Nevsky Prospect at midnight, as a result of which a number of persons were killed or wounded.

The firing apparently was the re-sult of stray shots, which brought on a panic, in which the demon-strators turned rifles and machine guns on each other. Quiet was restored after a few minutes. The demonstrations were organized by the Bolsheviki, the majority faction of the Social Democratic party.

Petrograd, July 17.—Three members of the cabinet have resigned and a special session of the Council of Ministers has been convoked in an effort to avert a crisis. Their names are A. I. Shingaroff, minister of finance; Professor Manuiloff, minister of education, and Prince Shakovsky, head of the department of public aid. The resignations of these ministers followed a sharp disagreement over questions involving the these ministers followed a sharp disagreement over questions involving the Ukraine, an extensive region in Russia, embracing part of the territories of the old kingdom of Poland.

Premier Lvoff has requested the ministers to meet at his private residence, when the cause of the dispute will be considered. It is known he will attempt to prevail on them to withdraw their resignations. The split in the ministry occurred last night at a ministerial conference called to consider a report submitted by M. Tereschtenko, minister of foreign affairs, and M. Tseretella minister of posts and telegraphs, as a minister of posts and telegraphs, as a result of their negotiations concerning



GOVT. MAY SETTLE FOODSTUFF PRICES

Food Controller Hanna Says It Will Be Necessary In Order To Feed Canada and Send CROWN PRINCE TRIES Supplies To Allies.

Montreal, July 17 .- Hints that some form of compulsion and price-fixing might be necessary to conserve the food supplies of this country and the United States, so that the home populations could be fed and the necessary exportation take place to the Allies as well, were thrown out today by W. J. Hanna, Dominion food controller, in the course of an address before the Canadian Club at the Windsor Hotel.

MUST STOP WASTE. Mr. Hanna explained that waste in foodstuffs in this country must be stopped, as Canada and the United States must export an enormous amount in addition to what is normally sent if the Allies are not to go hungry, and through hunger to lose the war. With normal sources of and her allies must rely to a great extent on Canada and the United States.

The total requirements of the Allies in wheat were 1,105,000,000 bushels. The production of Europe was 645,000,000 bushels to bushels, leaving 460,000,000 bushels to be exported from North America. It was estimated that the United States and Canada would have for export 300,000, 000 bushels, so that 160,000,000 would have to be made up. The figures in beef were equally disturbing. This country is just entering upon the greatest era of "big business" it has ever known, and there will be no lull while the war lasts, and probably not for a long time afterward. From all over this broad land come the same reports-factories working night and day-orders on the books for months ahead. and new business being refused because of inability to handle it.

There is scarcely a line of industrial activity that is not profiting by present extraordinary conditions. Before this time next year the Government will have over one million men on the firing line-one million men who must be fed, clothed and equipped for fighting.

To maintain an army of one million men at the front requires an army of twelve million men at home, without taking into account the rest of our civilian population, who must live and work as usual.

Government contracts now being awarded are only the beginning—orders will be placed in increasing volume as time goes on. Profits will be all that could reasonably be asked, and they are certain. Uncle Sam is sure pay. Of the industrials traded on the Curb, which will benefit? Broadly speaking-all; specific ally, manufacturers in whole or in part, of automobiles and motor trucks, aeroplanes, munitions of all kinds, steel products, machinery, ships.

OILS .- The demand for petroleum products, particularly gasoline, continues to grow, and the independent oil companies with producing wells are adding to their earnings steadily. There are three things essential if the country's oil needs are to be met: more wells, a larger number of gathering pipe lines and increased

Efforts are being made to increase production along all these lines. Com panies are adding to their acreage, and new wells are being drilled. New pipe lines are being laid, and the capacity of old ones increased; refineries are being

The entry of the United States into the war is going to further strain our oll resources. Motor trucks and aeroplanes must have gasoline for motive power, and it is up to American oil companies to furnish it. Higher prices for all grades of oil are regarded as certain by well posted oil men, meaning larger earnings and ncreased profits for producing companies.

MINES .- Whether the country is at war or at peace, there is nothing more rital in our every-day lives than the metals. Try to think of the things you use or come in contact with every day that could not exist except for the output of the mines. No railroads, no telegraph, no telephones, no skyscrapers, no steamheated flats in winter, no electric fans in summer, no automobiles, no aeroplanes no steamships—the list could be continued almost indefinitely.

Prosperity of the mining companies in 1916 was the greatest in the history of the industry; the first six months of 1917 indicate that last year's record will be broken. Demand for metals is more than keeping pace for production, and all storage stocks are practically exhausted. Silver is selling at the highest price in years, and still higher prices are predicted; lead has broken all previous records, and copper and spelter prices are near the top.

The ratio of market prices of the majority of mining shares to company earnings is out of proportion, and when the readjustment comes, as apparently it must, higher prices for mining stocks should be in order; certainly there is nothing now o indicate a decline in earnings .- Jones & Baker Weekly News Letter.

'SAFETY FIRST," WHEN BUYING INVESTMENT SECURITIES.

TANGIBLE SECURITY .-- A bond to be truly a bond should have behind it ngible security, consisting either of physical property or valuable collateral, nd the investor should be able to know what and where this property or col-teral is. With a preferred stock this requirement may be liberally interpreted, out in so far as the stock assumes to be a genuine investment the requirement

ACTUAL EARNINGS .- A true bond must have actual present earning power rather than being issued against a property or business in course of construcion, because there is so much element of chance in a construction proposition that securities issued against it are not binding enough upon the debtor to ordinarily be called bonds. To buy such securities is usually to take a big and innecessary risk, with little or no compensation therefor.

BALANCE SHEETS .- Those who buy either bonds or preferred stocks of a npany, which has not issued a balance sheet must confess to carele ompany is so new that its first fiscal year has not yet expired, there is so 'he more reason why the investor should insist upon knowing what assets t has to give it promise of success in business.

INCOME ACCOUNTS .- To buy the bond of a company which has not pubished an income account is another form of inexcusable carelessness. It is paying the price of a pearl for the oyster shell that has not yet been opened. With preferred stocks, however, such purchases are sometimes justifiable as a specuation, provided the company is frankly in its infancy, and the return offered is large enough to compensate the investor for the speculative risk assumed. PUBLIC MARKET .- One of the surest tests of the worth of a new stock or

bond is the behavior of its price in the open market. Therefore, in the case of new and unseasoned securities some sort of a public market is so desirable as to be almost an essential; but this market may consist either of listing on a stock exchange or of frequent sales and quotations made by or through bond houses large enough so that their aggregate clientele genuinely constitutes a public market. —Moody's Investors Service.

WALL STREET CONDITIONS

The fear of drastic Government regulations has greatly unsettled holders of industrials, especially steels, which have already suffered a material recession in prices and activity. The past week has seen marked depreciation in the prices of United States and Bethlehem steel stocks, and less violent downward changes in many other kindred industrials.

This contemplated reduction in prices for steel products has, however, stimulated the demand for transportation securities which would be greatly benefited by the enforced reduction of prices, for much of the material they are now obliged to purchase for the replacement of exhausted equipment, and the rehabiliment of roadway and physical appointments, and marked advances have been made from the prices of the early part of last week—among many of the more representative railways. In view of President Wilson's widely quoted appeal "Facts are now our masters," it is not improbable that industrial prices may go much lower while railways should go higher, especially as a good crop in which corn will figure over 3,000,000,000 bushels, is now nearly assured.

The Bache Review has the following to say in part about the proposed fixing

"FACTS ARE NOW OUR MASTERS."

President Wilson, in his appeal for unselfishness in war, advocates that a just price be paid for everything the Government buys, and defines a just price as one which will sustain the industries in a high state of efficiency, provide a living for those who conduct them, enable them to pay good wages and make ssible the expansion of their enterprises.

Will Lose No Time in Mobilizing. As a belligerent Greece is expected to ose no time in mobilizing er war recources and joining effectively in the pummon allied operations in the Balans. The strength of the Venizelos army is placed at about 60,000 men, and he remnants of the former regular army, while not over 30,000 now, has at times been mobilized to a total of 200,000 men, and is capable of reaching 300,000 if munitions are provided. The regulars practically were demobilized by the Allies when former King Constantine held the organization as a threat to the Allies' rear, but can quickly be talled to the colors again.

Army of 250,000 Assured.

While it is understood here that while some pro-German, anti-war spirit remains in Greece, a great majority of the people are happy that a flat decision has at last been made that have beest the nation's attempt to be neutral are ended. It is realized that Greece has a splendid opportunity to strengthen her international position, which has suffered through her doubtful policy throughout the war. Bulgaria, her traditional section of Greek territory, and threatens to surpass Greece in her power in the Balkans, while Italy has sent troops into the northern Epirus to connect with the Allies at Saloniki and establish a shorter line of communication than the long sea route. Since Greece's entry into the war, negotiations have been under way for abandonment of part of this section by Italy.

Greece also has further territorial ambitions in the Balkans, and a so-licitation for the 300,000 Greeks in Constantine's which she claims in Asia Minor, particularly about Smyrna.


