# BE SHIPPED BY DIRECT ROUTE

Revolutionary Changes in Shipping Ordered for Western Ontario.

EMPLOY SHORTEST LINE

Indirect Routing Forbidden -Means Quicker Local Service.

Montreal, Feb. 16. - Revolutionary changes in the local freight arrangenents of the railways in Ontario wi go into effect as a result of a special eport ordered by the Canadian Rail War Board and due to be presented t an early meeting of the special com littee. These will remove the las mittee. These will remove the last vestiges of indirect routing in the only part of Canada where this condition exists. Experts are completing the new routings for freight traveling between points in Ontario. A car will then move by the shortest route irrespective of what lines it covers. It will mean the cancellation of certain tariffs. "This is one of the most delicate and tricky problems the war board has had in hand," said W. M. Neal, general secretary of the war board, who announced that the change was to be made.



### DEPARTMENT OF MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS NEEDED IN ONTARIO

Dominion Municipal Expert W onders at Laxity of Ontario Government in Matters M unicipal—Twenty-five Million Dollars Spent Year ly in Taxes in Province.

That London, Guelph and other cities interested should co-operate to obtain legislation to cover their present needs for betterment in municipal government, and that later all the cities of Southwestern Ontario should get together to bring about the establishment of a department of municipal affairs in the Provincial Government at Toronto, was the solution for London's municipal problems offered by Thomas Adams of the dominion commission of conserva-

Is Badly Needed. Such a department was badly needed n order that one city might profit by the experience and mistakes of others. If \$118,000 could be spent for the maintenance of the Government House at Toronto, surely \$100,000 could be spent for a municipal affairs department. Such a department would be in the interests of economy, but changes in that direction would need to be province-wide.

Under present methods, the men directing municipal affairs were changed too frequently, and went out of office just when they were beginning to get accustomed to their duties. Good expert officials would help solve this problem, but citizens of ability must provide the administrative ability. There was not enough supervision over the expenditures of municipalities by the Government. A uniform system of auditing, keeping accounts, and dealing with finance throughout the province should be established. This would also accirc in obtaining better rates of also assist in obtaining better rates of interest and better markets for securi-

The people did not want to interfere with the technical details of the city affairs, but to be able to control through their elected representatives the ger eral policy of the administration. In Montreal, a plan had been adopted whereby the democratic body was working side by side with the expert body. The Government of Quebec had also created a department of municipal affairs. In Montreal, besides the city council, there was a small expert com mission, the members of which were paid from \$10,000 to \$15,000 a year to carry out the executive work of the city. ### CAPTAIN AND SOME OF CREW VOLUNTEER TO STAY WITH SHIP **AND SAVE COMRADES**

British Steamer Sinks When AUTO-INTOXICATION Cargo Shifts.

NEW YORK, Feb. 15.—Ten men of the officers and crew of the British steamship Miguel De Larrinaga, of nearly 5,000 tons, perished in midocean on February 6, when the vessel foundered. A cargo of grain, bound for France, went down with the ship. A British warship rescued 27 men who had taken to small boats, and some of these survivors arrived here today from a Newfoundland port.

### **LABOR PROMISES TO CO-OPERATE IN MAN POWER INVENTORY**







Its Scope Very Limited and Ineffectual.

PATRONAGE STILL EASY

And Huge Salary List of Fuel Control Board Not Touched.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Feb. 15. -It is only a very limited measure of civil service reform which is possible under the order-inwhich is possible under the order-incouncil which the Government passed
the other day.

It has been generally understood that
some 26,000 civil servants in the outside service would be affected by the
order. Nothing of the sort is the case.
No man now in the outside service is
affected at all because of the fact that
until legislation is prepared to classify
the multitude of employees in the outside service, the civil service has nothling to do with those already employed.
The civil service commission has no
power under the order excepting in
the case of new appointees.

the case of new appointees.

Leaves Loophole.

In the case of these it will take the place of the patronage committee of old days. Where examinations are practicable candidates for positions will have to take examinations. Where not, candidates will be appointed by competition. The point is that members of Parliament are still permitted to make recommendations or references urging the appointment of individuals. Such references may, of course, be rejected, but a commission, two of whose members are politicians who were themselves rewarded for party services, is more than liable to be strongly influenced in favor of the man who is recommended by a former colleague.

Food Board Salaries.

The commission has nothing to do with the salaries paid the food control board employees. Food Controller Thomson is scheduled for a salary of \$7.000. It is not yet ascertainable what remuneration Messrs. Dunning and Gregory will get. The salary schedule for a staff of 92 is as follows: One at \$4.500, one at \$4.500, three at \$4.200, one at \$4.500, eleven at \$3.500, two at \$2.800, one at \$2.600, two at \$2.500, thirteen at \$2.000, one at \$1.600, one at \$1.000, fifteen clerks at \$900, and four messengers at \$700. Stnographers under the civil service act start at \$500 a year. In the food board they have started at \$1.200. And yet the civil service commission, even under the order of reform referred to, has no power to correct the discrimination. The same is true of the armles of temporary employees all over the city. ### NEW OFFICIAL EDIFICE WILL BE ERECTED BY THE GOVERNMENT

Nine Stories High and Will Have 700 Rooms.

OTTAWA, Feb. 15 .- Hon. F. B. Car-

ottawa, reb. is.—Hon. F. B. carvell, minister of public works, announced today that the Government has expropriated the property on O'Connor street, between Albert and Queen streets, and running back as far as the Bryson building, as the site for the new office building which the Government. streets, and running back as far as the Bryson building, as the site for the new office building which the Government is to erect. The expropriated area will include the Orange Hall. The building which will be erected will cover an area of 200 by 150 feet. It will have a large court in the centre and will be at least nine stories in height and "as many more as the city will allow." There will be 700 rooms.

To provide for the urgent needs of office accommodation it is also intended to get ready \$4 rooms by next fall in the House of Commons building, utilizing the old heating plant.

The Government has been driven to this course by the high rentals for office buildings in Ottawa. The accommodation is nowhere near the requirements. The new building will be built by contract after tendering.

### SEAFORTH MAN ASKS FOR \$500 DAMAGES; ALSO AN INJUNCTION

"The Directors have pleasure in submitting the financial statement which shows another year's satisfactory and successful operation of the Corporation, of interest to the shareholders to know that our total mortgage investments at the end of the year amounted to \$10,584,773 or \$750,000 less than Seven Millions of Ontario mortgages, about One Million of Manitoba, Two and One-Half Millions of Saskatchewan, and \$167,000 of Alberta. year practically all the past due interest had been paid in Alberta, while in the ther three provinces the arrears of interest were less than two-thirds of one

per cent of the amount invested. These Ten and a Half Millions are represented by 4,378 mortgages, making an average loan, as you will note, of less than \$2,500. Of these loans, the greater portion is secured by farm property, and the balance on productive properties (chiefly residential) in the larger cities of Ontario or in the City of Winnipeg. The values placed by our own inspectors upon the lands and premises forming our security total nearly Twenty-Five Million Dollars, so that our loans average less than 45 per cent of our inspectors' valuation.

As is always the case among so many borrowers, some have been unable to

meet their payments, but in a few cases only have we been forced to take sale or foreclosure proceedings. In every such instance we have been able to dispos of the mortgaged property, and for the tenth consecutive year we have no real estate on hand other than office premises. Speaking generally, both in Ontario and in the Western Provinces, repayments on mortgages have been extraordinarily good, better, indeed, than in any

year since the war. As the results show, we have been repaid more money than, n reality, we cared to accept. Passing to the other items of our assets, Municipal, School District and Rural Telephone Debentures have decreased by over \$200,000. Here, again, the record of payment, both of principal and interest, is highly satisfactory. The only increase in our list is shown under the heading of Government Bonds, our holdings of which have grown from \$716,000 to almost double that figure.

The Huron & Erie and The Canada Trust Company subscribed for \$2,000,000 of the Dominion Victory Loan, and have been alloted their full proportion of the same (this investment was made out of the Companies' own funds and is independent of further large amounts subscribed by our shareholders and cus-

tomers). The payments on this account and our further purchases of Government Bonds make up the increase noted above. While the profits for the past year are nearly \$10,000 in excess of those of 1916, this increase was largely absorbed by more liberal gifts for war purposes and by additional taxes which the Corporation was called upon to pay. So far, therefore, as our shareholders are concerned, the total paid to them by way of dividends or added to the Reserve Fund and to Undivided Profits, is but slightly

We were again called upon to repay a considerable proportion of our matur-We were again called upon to repay a considerable proportion of our maturing British debentures, but thanks to the continued growth of our Canadian debentures and deposits, the decrease in the total assets of the Corporation is the comparatively small sum of \$125,000. In this connection I call your attention to the marked growth in the assets of The Canada Trust Company. The Annual Report of that Company (now available for your perusal) shows a gain (cyclusive of Trust Estates) of the Canada Counter of Dellars. (exclusive of Trust Estates) of over One Million and a Quarter of Dollars. Taking the aggregate of both companies, it will be seen we still continue to

more than hold our own. After the present year, our list of debentures maturing in Great Britain becomes rapidly smaller, when we can hope for a substantial growth in the assets of the Corporation, due to the prosperity of Canada and the excellent standing of the Huron & Erie.

A more serious matter for the shareholders is the continued rise in the rate which we are called upon to pay upon our debentures. This is due to the demands of the Dominion, the Provinces, and their Municipalities; demands which, more and more, must appeal to, and depend for satisfaction upon the Canadian investor. To offset this marked increase, there has been no corresponding inrease in mortgage rates; indeed, as has been pointed out on former occasions, the demand for mortgage loans is so light that were it not for the continued offering of Government bonds at attractive prices, we would find it difficult to invest our funds profitably.



Board of Education Adjusts Salary Schedule.

No increases in salaries were voted by the board of education at a special neeting yesterday afternoon, save for male principals of schools of twelve

male principals of schools of twelverooms and over, and male assistants. The others were refused.

The salaries of male principals in twelve-room schools and over will be from \$1,400 to \$2,000. It was formerly \$1,300 to \$1,800.

The male principals of seven to twelveroom schools will be from \$1,300 to \$1,800. This is no change. The salaries of principals of from four to seven rooms will be \$1,200 to \$1,600. This was amended to make women eligible for positions as principals of these schools

schools

The minimum salary of women teachers will be \$550, an increase of \$50. All teachers engaged in 1917 will receive \$600, so that the change will make no difference. The maximum will be \$900, the same as at present. The women asked for a minimum of \$600, and a maximum of \$1,200.

The salaries of male assistants of 12-room schools and over will be from \$1,000 to \$1,400. This is an increase of \$200 in the maximum.

The male assistance in 12-room hools and over will be from \$800 to 200. This is an increase of \$200 in the maximum.

The increases will be at the rate of \$50 per annum. Manual training rooms, domestic science rooms and swimming pools will be classed as rooms.

J. A. Sullivan of Hamilton addressed the members of the Independent Labor party at the opening meeting of the association held in the trades and labor association held in the trades and labor council rooms last night. We elect men in the Government to be our servants, but if we do not watch them carefully they will become our masters," Mr. Sullivan said. "We have to rely on the younger members of this organization as the older ones have already fought for what we have how."
