

London, July 29 .- The Prince of Wales loses no opportunity of announcing that he is eagerly awaiting his visit to Canada. At a dinner, after the presentation of the freedom of the Mercer's Company, one of London's city guilds,

"As you know, I am sailing for Canada in a week's time. My voyage will certainly be less perilous than those of the adventurers of the olden time. I am going in His Majesty's ship Renown, one of our latest battle cruisers, but I shall share one advantage with those adventurers. Traveling and visiting new countries opens one's mind, and I feel it is a special advantage to me to visit the great Dominion so soon after the victorious conclusion of the greatest struggle in which the British Empire has ever been engaged, and in which all the dominions have played so large and magnificent a part."

Several battalions of state troops were under arms in armories or awaiting possible call by the city. Meanwhile the entire police force was dealing with the riots.

BIG STORM WRECKS 3 BOMBING PLANES IN MINEOLA, N. Y.

Including the Transcontinental Martin Machine.

MINEOLA, N. Y., July 28.—Three bombing planes, including the Martin machine in which Capt. Roy N. Francis planned to leave next Friday on a trans-continenta! flight, were wrecked by a terrific electrical storm which, sweeping over Long Island this afternoon, struck a steel hangar at Hazelhurst Field and hurled fragments of attal for a distance of half a mile. steel for a distance of half a mile.

and passing over the spot where the
British dirigible R-34 was moored while in this country, the storm, which broke ut of a clear sky with less than five ninutes' warning, wrecked virtually everything in its path.

Mayor Gives Evidence at Preliminary Trial of Strike Leaders.

ACCUSES AN ALDERMAN

Says Alderman Queen Declared Against Constituted Authority at City Hall.

WINNIPEG, July 28 .- The city wa ractically in control of the strike committee from June 10 to 20, Mayor Charles F. Gray swore at the preliminary trial this afternoon of eight labor leaders for seditious conspiracy. The mayor occupied the witness box all forenoon, and his examination in chief had not been completed when the court adjourned for lunch.

The salient points of his evidence were that the city was in control of the strike committee at certain times during the strike; that R. B. Russell, representing the metal trades council, had admitted early in the strike that the iron masters were willing to bargain on a collective basis; that Ald. John Queen, one of the defendants, had declared against constituted authority in committee meeting at the city hall. His evidence also gave facts of conditions in Winnipeg under the strike regime. The mayor declared what led him to ask the railwaymen to appoint a conciliation board was that in an interview with W. D. Best, representing the running trades, Mr. Best had said that the railway running trades might walk out if a settlement was not reached.

"I could not guarantee police protection as I would have liked after July 10. I had had many complaints of intimidation, and had not only been threatened myself, but actually assaulted."
