EVEN INDIA IS FAST BECOMING A NETWORK OF STEAM RAILWAYS

Mileage Nearly Tripled in Less Than Twenty-Five Years.

New York Central to Establish Pension Fund for Employees.

One of the Greatest Railroad Engineering Feats in the World - Some Tunnel Returns.

There are now nearly 27,000 miles of railway lines in India. On Jan. 1, 1903, the exact mileage under operation was 26,563, with 1,190 miles under construction.

Before the great mutiny of 1857 there were few railroads in India, and the lesson taught by the experience was that the long marches, the massacres might have been prevented, and thousands of precious lives might have been saved.

In 1880 the railway system amounted to less than 10,000 miles. In 1896 it had been doubled, in 1901 it had passed the 25,000 mile mark, and now by extending lines and feeders are being built for miles.

Nearly all the railways of India have their lines under government management, or have been assisted with guarantees of the payment of from 3 to 5 per cent dividends.

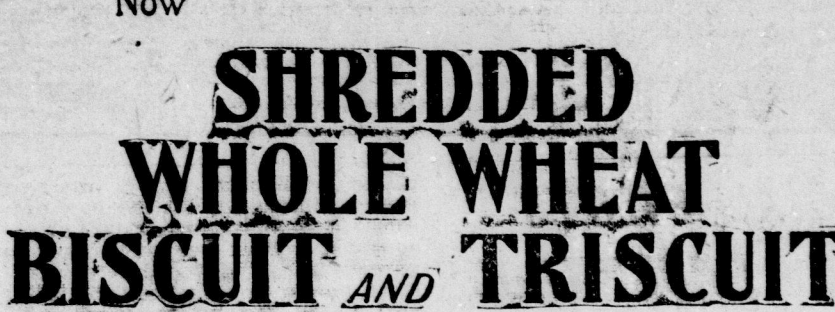

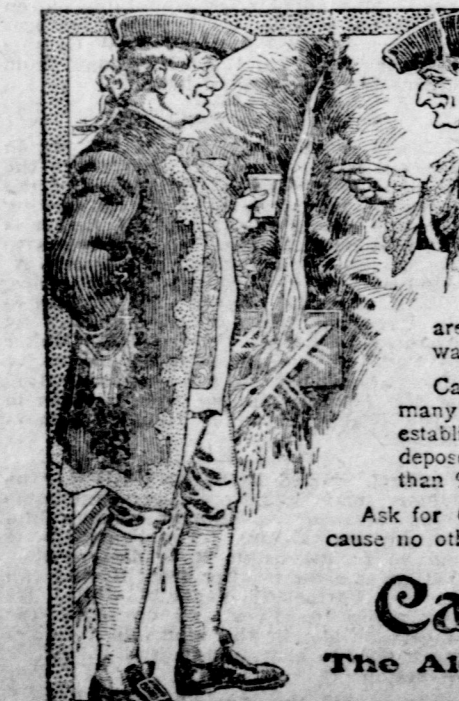

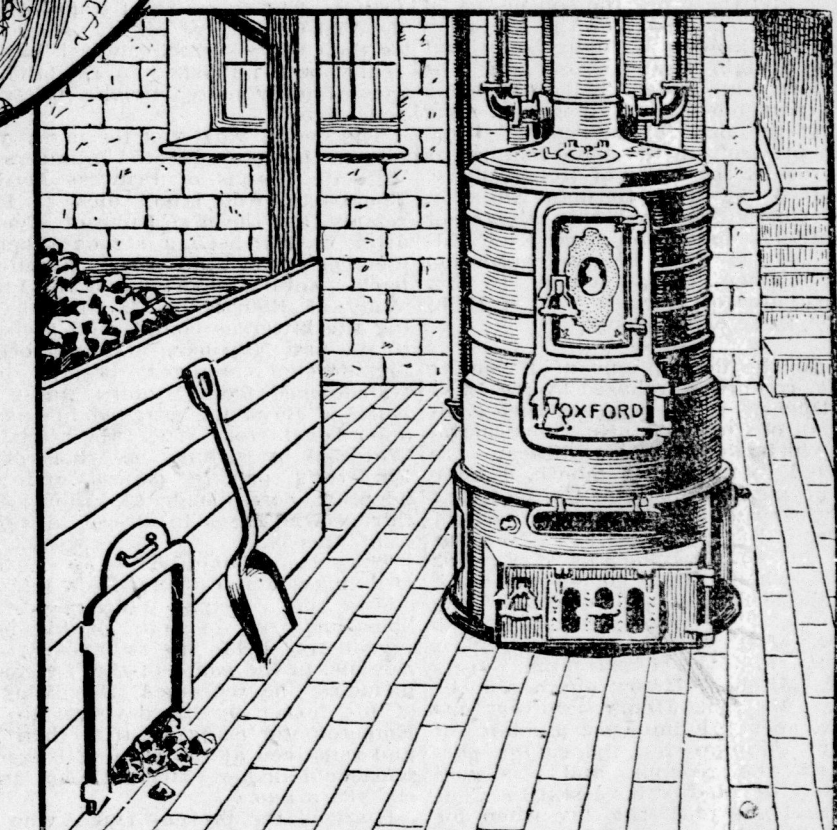

It was not ever, but within the last few years the department under Chief Thompson has assumed an efficiency that makes it as capable a body of fire fighters as can be found in the country."

THROWN FROM THE RAILS. Train Failed to Get Through on the Huron and Bruce.

Such satisfactory progress was made yesterday in the work of opening the London, Huron and Bruce branch that the Grand Trunk this morning undertook to send a train from this city to Wingham, and across to Kincardine if that portion of the road was open.

There is practically no change in the condition of affairs on the other lines to the north of London. The railway authorities no longer give any inquiring ones any idea as to when the rails are likely to be cleared, but simply say that the fight with the snow is going on as vigorously as possible, and that trains will be run at the earliest possible moment.

A LINDSAY SUICIDE. Loneliness Causes Station Agent to End His Life.

Lindsay, March 19.—C. H. Barton, the Grand Trunk station agent at Lindsay, ended his life at his home here by drinking blue vitriol. Owing to the continuous blockade and the dreadful state of the roads, particulars are only now available. It appears that Barton, who had commenced his duties only a short time ago, was seized with a feeling of loneliness, being away from his family and among strangers, and melancholy increased until driven to the rash act of ending his life. The unfortunate man was found lying on the floor in extreme agony, having drunk a quantity of battery mixture. He lingered in great pain until death ensued. His suffering, it is believed, was not to Highfield, west of Toronto, for interment, having reached Lindsay Sunday night after a difficult trip, ten days after death had occurred.

BRANTFORD MAY HAVE SENSATION. Policeman to Appear Before the Commissioners—Bears On Cole Murder.

Brantford, Ont., March 18.—A sensation of considerable importance was sprung in this city today, when it became known that P. C. Allan had been summoned to appear before the police commissioners at their next meeting. The charges are of a very extensive character, and all the more interesting because of their bearing on the recent Cole murder case.

Allan is charged with making certain statements about the police during the Kennedy trial last month. The impression created by these statements was to the effect that the police had acted in a very stupid manner in their search for the murderer of Irene Cole. It is charged that Allan stated some important clues were left altogether uninvestigated, and never seriously considered in connection with liquor prosecutions.

Other charges of hardly less interest are to the effect that Allan also made statements charging the police officials with misappropriation of fines derived from liquor prosecutions.

Since the Kennedy trial it has been an open secret that things were not being going any too smoothly in the police department. However, the police have been most reticent about the matter.

Chief Vaughan refuses to make any statement. Constable Allan admits having been served with a list of charges.

At the hearing before the commissioners it is expected Allan will make some startling statements in regard to the manner in which the police conducted the Cole murder case. The police magistrates are Judge Hardy, Police Magistrate Woodyard, and Mayor Harlan.

The minister is also reported to have received a report that the Russian horse artillery has withdrawn to the north bank of the Yalu, and says part of the cavalry has also been withdrawn, leaving only a weak post at Syon Chwon, south of Wiju.

Paris, March 18, 5:35 P.M. No reports have been received at the foreign office or elsewhere confirming a definite rumor of a great Japanese defeat which probably grew out of the unconfirmed Shanghai report of the defeat of 200 Japanese by a Russian force of 300 men.

London, March 18.—The Scotch engineer, abandoned the task of repairing the battleship Revictan ten days ago, in disgust, because he was persistently kept under surveillance in an annoying manner owing to his nationality. The Russian minister has also got to New Changung. The only British now at Port Arthur is an engineer of the name of Slonevsky. He was leaving for Shanghai on a Norwegian steamer a few days ago, when the Russians detained him.

THE INCREASE IN G. O. C.'S SALARY. Substantial Advance for Officers and Men Asked by Militia Minister.

Ottawa, March 18.—In the House this morning, Premier Laurier gave formal notice of his resolution to ratify the new agreement with the Grand Trunk Pacific.

As the Auditor-General's report was not ready the only estimates dealt with in supply were those relating to the public debt. He was asked for particulars in the permanent militia force 75 cents a day is asked, and for private in the militia 50 cents per day, which may be increased to \$1 a day on the third year of service, with an allowance of \$1 a day for each horse used by an officer on duty.

Mr. Henderson (Halton) drew attention to the statement in the public accounts that \$2,365,450 of the amount by which the public debt was reduced last arose out of the settlement of accounts between the Dominion and the Province of Ontario and Quebec. He protested against the Province of Ontario being allowed to take over the capital of the trust funds in the hands of the Dominion Government.

A SUICIDE STORY. The Petit Parisienne's St. Petersburg correspondent writes a mere rumor to the effect that Vice-Admiral Stark, who has been relieved of the command of the fleet at Port Arthur, is seriously contemplating suicide. He has attempted to commit suicide. There is no confirmation of this rumor from any other source.

The Standard's Pien Tsin correspondent says that Paul Lessor, Russian minister to China, had given his protest against the departure of Chinese forces outside the great wall, and intimated that unless they are withdrawn Russia will be compelled to draw a portion of its trust funds for the construction of public works, as Nova Scotia had done, then another Province could do the same. However, Ontario had not asked to withdraw any of the principal assets.

Mr. Fielding explained that a large amount in funded debt would be redeemed at the beginning of the next fiscal year, and the sum of \$5,000,000 was placed on the estimates to pay interest on temporary loans and renewal of the debt. The Deputy Minister of Finance was now in London arranging in regard to a debt of \$20,000,000 to be retired in May. The proposition was that a part of the maturing debt should be continued for three years, with the option to the holders to convert into a new issue of stock. It was thought better to do this than make an entirely new loan in the present state of the money market.

I do not desire very much to plead, because this is such a transparent matter of misunderstanding, for whose responsibility I do not assume. Owing to the assurances given me by the Conservative whip I felt like congratulating the Opposition on their courage and consideration they have shown us, and which we have always returned, and I should be sorry to think any member of the Opposition would fail to recognize the authority of their whip in such matters."

DR. WILLOUGHBY EXPLAINS. Dr. Willoughby said he had informed the Premier that as far as he knew there would be nothing of a contentious nature coming up, and he had not anticipated the Premier's proposal.

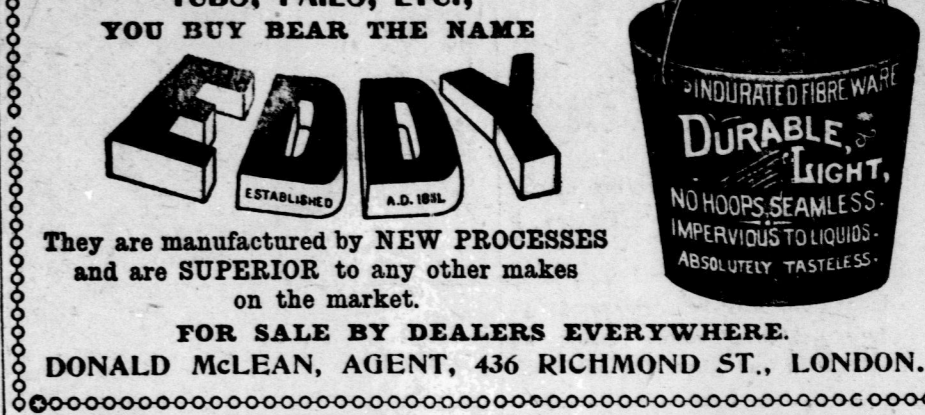

WEEKLY TRADE REVIEW

Business More Active Throughout the Dominion. Toronto, March 18.—Bradstreet's trade review weekly summary: Improvement in the transportation situation this week has brightened up trade conditions at Montreal. Country retailers are beginning to receive their spring supplies, and are sending in orders for further supplies. The outlook for business for the balance of the season is promising. Business conditions at Toronto are more encouraging. Orders have been coming to hand fairly well this week, and shipments have been made more freely. Settlers have begun to arrive from Great Britain and Europe, and the outlook for increased trade in the Northwest and with New Ontario is promising. Values of domestic staples and imported goods are better. Business conditions at Quebec are only fair, owing to the bad condition of the country roads. Collections are slow. In the city the spring millinery openings have been the means of bringing country retail buyers to town, and many orders far into May.

WILL BOXING BE COLLEGE SPORT?

The question whether or not boxing is to be a recognized feature of college athletic curricula appears to be agitating some of the eastern authorities in and out of universities, and it is interesting to note the arguments pro and con. So far the champions of the cause of boxing appear to have the better of the controversy.

THE TRIALS OF AN UMPIRE.

"Nobody who has not been through the mill can realize the tribulations of a professional baseball umpire," said a member of that long suffering class the other day. "Of all jobs on the face of the broad earth it is the most thankless and the least of them, I think, has to place the umpire has got to keep by himself a good deal during the playing season. His is a lonely and isolated existence as good part of the time. The rapid increase in the catalogue of sports organized for college rivalry seems to have been checked by the decision reached by both Yale and Harvard to drop basketball after the present season. The reasons given are interesting as showing the attitude of the institutions toward the "minor sports." Harvard takes the ground that there are too many of these intercollegiate teams, the list including rowing, baseball, track events, indoor gymnastics, tennis, hockey, golf, lacrosse, basketball, fencing and shooting, not to mention chess and debating. It is claimed that these teams seriously overlap each other in their playing seasons, some of them diverting more efficient elsewhere, and that so few of them can pay their own way in game receipts that their multiplicity has become a serious drain on the athletic treasury. Basketball has enjoyed such a national popularity that its decline at Yale and Harvard seems unexpected. One cause of this decision, however, is that organization and specialization have been carried to an extent never before seen in college sports. So soon as students become interested in the game, then it became an intercollegiate institution. This meant a training table, coaches, heavy expenses of "trying out the team" (then meant the exclusion of many young men who liked to play the game for the fun of it). The standards were too high, and the amount of time demanded for practice too much for the average student. Nor did he wish to hike up his training while the chance of being relegated to the "scrubs."

THE YESTERDAY'S WINNERS.

Wood, the matter of securing the "day" trophy for the summer for the purpose of holding netline races, was again taken up, but nothing of a decisive nature was done. A feature of that meeting will be the presentation of two trophies—one for the fastest trotting of the winter races, and the other for the fastest pacer. Klondike, owned by Mr. James McCarty, and Shiek Indrum, owned by Mr. William Robinson, were the respective winners of the trophies, which will be presented to the owners.
