

SPECULATIVE BUILDING.

ANOTHER CHAPTER ON THIS WELL-KNOWN AND INTERESTING SUBJECT.

A Few Observations on the Green City of the West's Realty Theorists—Is There a Remedy for the Evil? I was talking to a jobbing carpenter yesterday, and he said I had undertaken a big job when I started out to write up the speculative building. "They are a bonanza to us," he remarked, "as most of our trade comes from patching up modern houses. Do you see that house there? Well, I'm sending that up to prevent the dining room floor of a newly-erected house which speculators had put up from coming in."

There can be no question that many of the modern houses erected by speculators for the purpose of sale are of the most flimsy character and fearfully cold. The worst feature about them perhaps is their unsanitary condition. I was told by another carpenter that he was called in to take up the cellar flooring of a house to ascertain what was the cause of the fearful stench that prevailed in it. He soon discovered that although the soil pipe had been connected with the sewer, it had actually never been connected with the drain in the street. Another unsanitary condition arises from the fact that soil pipes running under cellar floors are sometimes lower than the street sewers into which they are supposed to empty, and when a rain storm floods the sewer it forces everything back up the soil pipe, and the result is a most pestilential, breeding diphtheria and malarial fevers.

I have been told that in many of the new houses erected by speculators, the builders do not employ the best of materials, but they employ the extent of preparing the plans, which are purchased from them, but they have nothing to do with the execution of the work. The speculator thus has the whole run of things and the lowest sub-tenants are accepted for everything. The more rapidly the houses go up, the better the speculator gets his money from the companies or individuals who are advancing the funds in the belief that the houses will be sold at a profit. A speculator now-a-days, as plenty is money, has only to get possession of a site and the houses will soon be put up. The houses, which are sold almost as soon as completed. Many of the purchasers get white wash on their walls, and the speculators get their bills for repairs generally amount to more than the interest on the mortgage, with which one-half the modern houses are encumbered.

COUNT MOLKE.

The Great Commander Lops Twigs, Grafts, Buries Stock and is a First-Class Farmer.

On the 23rd instant (40-day) Field Marshal Count Molke completed his 86th year, for he was born at Parchlitz in Mecklenburg, in 1800. For many years past it has been his fixed custom to avoid all public celebrations by passing the day in complete retirement at his little estate at Kremslin, in Silisia.

"During his stay at Kremslin Count Molke dons his military uniform and devotes himself to agricultural pursuits. He rises regularly every morning shortly after 6, and, after drinking a cup of coffee, takes a walk through his park to the 'Chapel Hill,' where the remains of his wife and sister rest in the vault of a small chapel in the woods. Count Molke has specially desired that his body shall also be buried there, and a large marble slab already marks the spot, of last resting place. This chapel is surrounded by arbutus trees, which are planted with his own hands, and of which he is very proud. When ever he receives visitors at Kremslin, he never leaves his morning promenade he always carries his garden shears and a small grating saw with him, and is continually busy sawing off dry branches or lopping protruding twigs.

The trees in his park include specimens from all parts of the world. He has a very rare one. It must not be supposed, however, that the great military general has any military work when taking his holidays at Kremslin. On the contrary, the time of his stay there is usually with him, the more productive of the whole year. All important work is forwarded to him from the general staff at Berlin, and comes back with copies, annotations and marginal remarks. Count Molke also passes much time in studying the latest publications of the military literature of all nations. His working hours usually extend till past noon.

After luncheon he passes the afternoon by riding about on his estate and inspecting the laborers in the fields during his presence at Kremslin he always directs all work personally, which otherwise is under the superintendence of his other nephew. He also visits to his neighbors in the afternoon or evening, and is very popular. The aged Marshal which Count Molke usually takes a carriage drive. The evenings he always passes at home with his wife. The aged Marshal also gives much attention to stock raising. He has a fine herd of cattle, a few pure Dutch breeds, besides eighteen teams of horses. He frequently visits the school in the neighboring village, listens to the instruction given and often asks questions to the children. Count Molke usually returns to Berlin in November for the winter season. Besides his position at the head of the general staff, he is also a member of the German Reichstag, and one of its most regular attendants. His seat is in the front row of the Right, just below that of Prince Bismarck.


