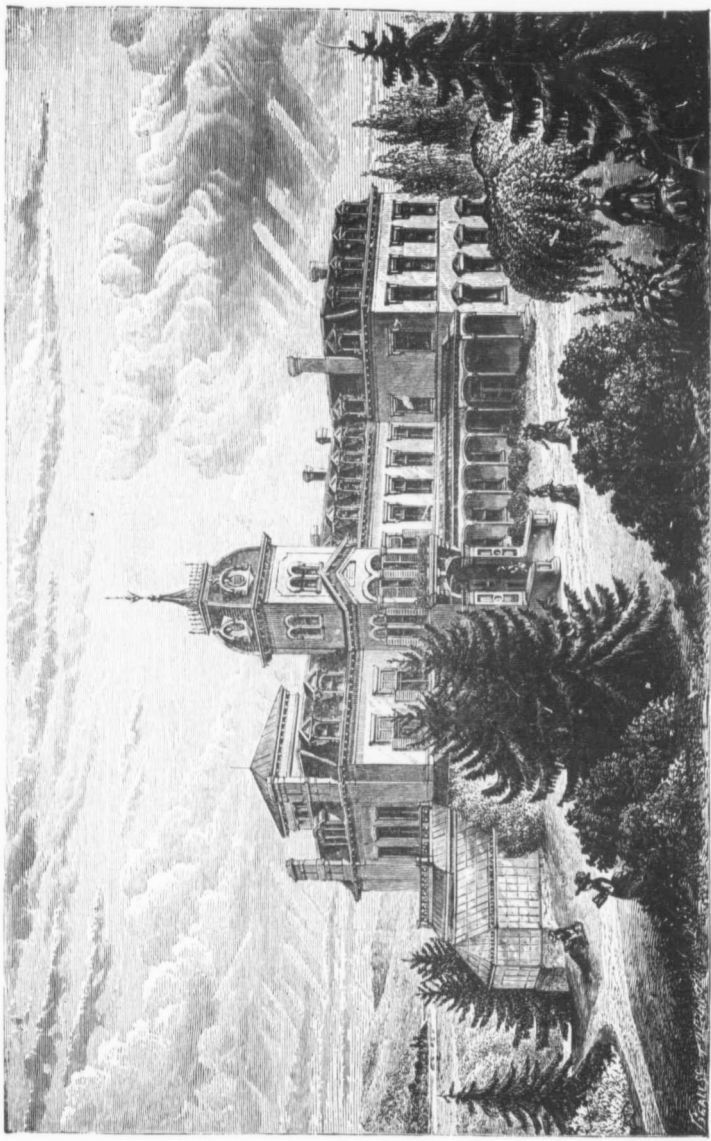

GENERAL STATEMENT.

The Brantford Young Ladies College, established in 1874, in connection with the Presbyterian Church in Canada, has met with a gratifying measure of success. Its graduates, numbering already 58, from all parts of the Dominion of Canada and the United States, indicate the high standing it has attained and the thorough character of the education imparted. The General Assembly, for a series of years past, has warmly commended the institution to the confidence and support of the church at large.

The location of the College is all that can be desired as a home for Young Ladies. While offering the most complete retirement for study, it is at the same time within easy walking distance of the principal business streets of the city, and commands a view of the surrounding country that cannot be surpassed for extent and beauty. The house has been finished with a degree of elegance but seldom seen in first-class private residences, much less in public institutions. The grounds, extending to three and a half acres, are beautifully laid out, and everything provided that can conduce to the health and comfort of the pupils.

The building, which is throughout heated with steam, lighted with gas, and provided with bath-rooms, has been suitably furnished, and no expense spared to render the College at once attractive and comfortable.

Brantford is very pleasantly situated on the Grand River, and in the midst of one of the most fertile and attractive districts of the Province of Ontario. It is a very healthy place, and for beautiful drives and picturesque surroundings, it is acknowledged to be one of the most inviting cities in Canada. Of late years it has become a leading resort for summer travel from all parts of the continent, on account of its attractions, and for the sake of its mineral springs and baths.

The city has a population of over 10,000, and is situated on the line of the Great Western and Grand Trunk Railways. It is thus easily reached from all parts of the Dominion and the United States.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

There are two departments in the Institution :

I. The Preparatory or Elementary. II. The Collegiate.

The preparatory course will usually extend over two years, and the Collegiate over three ; but students may be admitted to the Preparatory and Collegiate classes at any stage of the term, if found competent on examination.

Candidates for admission to the *Collegiate* department must be at least twelve years of age, and must pass a preliminary examination, in order that their standing may be ascertained and their places assigned them in the College classes. When a student is further advanced in some branches than in others, she will not be obliged to go over any study in which she can pass a satisfactory examination. Her studies will be arranged so as to ensure as rapid an advancement and as wide a variety of instruction as may be consistent with sound learning.

In arranging the course of study, pains will be taken to meet the diversified wants of students without sacrificing the regularity and system so essential to progress. It is mere waste of time to set young persons at advanced work without the proper intellectual preparation. This has hitherto been the bane of female education, compelling superficiality, and hazarding both mental and physical health. Parents who intrust the training of their daughters to this Institution are expected to allow sufficient time for the healthy unfolding and discipline of their minds before entering on the severer parts of the College course.

The moral and spiritual, equally with the intellectual and physical, education of the young ladies is the great object for which the College has been established. The teaching, discipline and management of the entire Institution—from the primary to the highest department—and the example and influence of every teacher and official is made as far as possible subservient to this paramount end.

It is earnestly desired that this Institution may be as distinguished for its religious influence and character as for its thorough scholarship and social culture, so that all the excellencies of a pure, noble, Christian womanhood may be diligently cultivated with all needed safeguards. Parents and guardians may therefore, with entire confidence, intrust their daughters and wards to the care of the College, during this most important and critical period of life.

SUBJECTS OF STUDY.

- I. ORDINARY ENGLISH BRANCHES.—Reading, Spelling, Elocution, Grammar, Composition, Writing, Arithmetic, History, Geography, Literature, Philology and Biblical Knowledge.
- II. SCIENCE.—Geology, Botany, Zoology, Physiology, Chemistry, Mathematics and Natural Philosophy.
- III. PHILOSOPHY.—Mental Philosophy, Moral Philosophy, Logic, Political Economy, Principles of Art, Natural Theology and Christian Evidences.
- IV. LANGUAGES.—Latin, Greek, French, Italian and German.

MUSIC.

The Directors would call special attention to the Musical department of the College. The fact that it is now under the direction of Professor Whish, Mus. Bac., formerly of Lincoln Cathedral, Eng., is a guarantee of its high order. Professor Whish brings with him a large experience, and the reputation (extending over seven years in Canada,) of a most successful teacher in every branch of musical art. His abilities as a pianist, vocalist and organist are well known, and have been frequently commented upon in the highest terms by the press of the country.

The Professor will deliver several lectures during the session, embracing all matters relating to Music, its history, growth and development; the instruments, ancient and modern; the composers, the different schools of music, and all matters auxiliary to a thorough musical education. The advanced students in music will take part in the illustrations accompanying each Lecture.

SPECIAL DEPARTMENT FOR TEACHERS.

Special Diplomas are granted to those who take a full course, and pass the necessary examinations qualifying them to become teachers of vocal and instrumental music.

DEPARTMENT OF ART.

(Under the direction of HENRY MARTIN, member of the
Canadian Society of Artists.)

Painting, in oil and water colors, crayon and pencil drawing.

Special attention is also called to the Department of Art, under the care of Professor Martin. He has the highest standing as a teacher, and the specimens of painting in oil and water colors, and crayon and pencil drawings, executed from year to year by the students, have called forth the highest encomiums by qualified judges.

PREPARATORY CLASSES.

Elementary Grammar, Arithmetic, Geography, Derivation and Meaning of Words, Reading, Dictation, Spelling, History—secular and sacred, Writing, Elementary Lessons in Science, and the Elements of Latin, French or German.

For entrance on the Collegiate course, there will be required a fair knowledge of English Grammar to the end of the second part of the grammar of the Canadian series; of Arithmetic to the end of decimals; of the Geography of North and South America, and accurate Writing from Dictation.

Admission will also be granted to any Term or Class of the Collegiate course to those who can pass an examination on the studies of the previous Terms or Classes. The High School Intermediate Examination will be accepted for the branches of study it embraces, and a certified High School course will be accepted for entrance into the Senior Class.

An Honor course will be prescribed in any of the studies of the Senior years, at the option of any student who can pass the ordinary examinations.

Select studies may be taken by any Student, in any of the Classes, at the discretion of the Principal.

Students who take a three years course in Drawing, and Oil or Water Color Painting, and have shown proficiency in the Art, will be entitled to a Certificate in Art.

Graduates and others wishing to take special studies in Literature, Languages, Art or Music, may enter as special boarders on terms to be agreed upon; and graduates taking any of the extra studies and not boarding in College, will only be charged at the ordinary rates, and may resume, without charge, any of the English studies.

The certificates and honors of the University of Queen's College, Kingston, are awarded to any student of this College who may pass the prescribed examinations in the departments of Literature, Philosophy or Science.

Special attention is devoted to young ladies who have in view the passing of the intermediate examinations, with a view to teaching.

Reports of the standing of Students will be sent to parents and guardians at the close of each Term.

Diplomas will be awarded to Students who have completed with approbation the College Curriculum.

Calisthenics of the most approved kind are taught in the College.

College Fees are payable in advance. At the end of each quarter the bill for books and stationery will be presented. The various Text Books required in the College may be had from the Principal at current retail prices, or from the booksellers in the city. The books used will, among others, comprise the Canadian series of authorized Text Books in Grammar, History, Geometry and Arithmetic.

A reduction of fifteen per cent. is made in the case of the daughters of clergymen, and ten per cent. when two or more members of one family are students in the College. A reduction of ten per cent. will also be made for Extras when three or more of them are taken in any one term.

No correspondence or visiting will be allowed, excepting with those whose names are furnished by parents and guardians. Persons inviting pupils to their homes are expected to furnish proper attendance to and from the College, and will be responsible for all the associations of the pupils during their visits. All invitations to students must be addressed to the Principal.

Weekly boarders may leave the College on Saturday morning, returning not later than five p. m. on Sabbath. No responsibility will be assumed by the Faculty of the College for the behaviour of such pupils during absence from College.

It is earnestly requested that boxes containing cakes, sweetmeats, &c., be not sent to the students by parents or guardians. They are the cause of nine-tenths of the sickness which occurs at College.

The College classes open each day, Saturday excepted, at 9 a. m., and close at 3.30 p. m. Recitation hours 9 to 12, and 1.30 to 3.30.

Due time is allowed for physical exercises consistent with the preparation of lessons. Ample grounds have been provided for this purpose.

Breakfast is served at 7.30 a. m., Dinner at 12.30, and Tea at 6 p. m. Family Worship is conducted morning and evening; all the boarders are required to be present.

All lights in the bedrooms are extinguished at 9.30 p. m., except in cases where special permission has been granted by the Principal.

The Principal, with the Head Governess, will jointly receive the students on their first arrival at the College. The head Governess will assign them their rooms and change the same whenever circumstances require, guide the formation of their personal habits and manners, and exercise a general supervision over their moral interests.

Boarders are required to keep their rooms in order, under the supervision of the Head Governess.

Respect and prompt obedience to the Teachers and Governesses are expected at all times. Continued misconduct or insubordination subjects to suspension and expulsion.

Damages to the building, apartments, furniture and grounds are charged to those who commit them.

No lending or borrowing of money, books, clothes or jewellery allowed, unless by permission of the Principal or Head Governess.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR DAY PUPILS.

Day pupils must be present five minutes before the assembling of the class. Those coming late, or who may have been absent, must bring a note of explanation from their parents or guardians.

They are not allowed to remain in the College or College grounds out of Class hours, nor are they allowed to go into any part of the premises into which their duties do not call them, unless by special permission.

They must never be the bearers of any notes, messages or packages to or from the resident students in the College.

It is very desirable that applications for admission should be received and registered at least one month before the opening of the College sessions. Rooms will be assigned according to the date of definite application.

Applications should contain information on the following points: (1st) age; (2nd) branches of study recently pursued; (3rd) special wishes of parents or guardians as to studies.

While the College is in connection with the Presbyterian Church, the teaching is thoroughly unsectarian. A Bible Class is held by the Principal every Sunday afternoon, at which all the students are required to attend. Students are expected to attend the Presbyterian Church, unless otherwise directed by their parents or guardians. Arrangements are made for those attending their own churches in the morning, under the escort of a governess.

Extract Minute from Proceedings of the Synod of Hamilton, May 6, 1874.

"BRANTFORD YOUNG LADIES' COLLEGE.

"Dr. Cochrane then addressed the Synod on the proposed Young Ladies' College in Brantford. On the motion of Mr. Wardrope, seconded by Mr. R. N. Grant, the Synod unanimously agreed to the following deliverance:

"The Synod having heard with much satisfaction the statement of Dr. Cochrane in regard to measures that have been adopted for the organization of a Presbyterian Young Ladies' College in Brantford, express their high approbation of the project, their sympathy with those engaged in it, and their sincere hope that it may be crowned with the largest success; and commend the Institution to the confidence and support of the heads of families within the bounds."

**Extract Minute from Proceedings of the General Assembly in Montreal,
July 9th, 1875.**

"Dr. Cochrane having addressed the Court on behalf of the Directors requesting the Assembly to nominate twelve of the shareholders eligible for election as Directors, in accordance with the Letters Patent, the following resolution was unanimously passed:

"It was agreed by the Assembly that the petition of the Directors of the Brantford Ladies' College be granted; that the Assembly express its satisfaction with the information that such an institution has been established, and commend it to the cordial support of the members of the Church."

The General Assemblies of 1876, 1877 and 1878 ratified the above deliverances, and appointed the Moderator as *ex officio* Honorary Director and Visitor of the College.
