
Halifax, April 20-A telegram re-ceived yesterday from the head offices of the Canada Steamship company, Montreal, announces that the steamship Stadacona had been sunk steamship Stadacona had been sunk by a German submarine, that part of the crew had landed in England and that Captain C. O. Allen nad been made prisoner on board the German submarine. The telegram was received by Mrs. Allen who with her children is now residing at 66 Tower Road." Capt. C. O. Allen is well known in Halifax and thru the valley. He is a native of Kings County, where many of his relatives reside. Going to sea at an early age he

is a native of Kings County, where many of his relatives reside. Going to sea at an early age he won rapid promotion. In the days of Nova Scotia's greatness on the seas he was master of several splen-did ships. Over fifteen years ago he retired from the sea and took up orcharding in the Cornwallis valley. He organized the Niagara Spray company and was active in the organization of the United Fruit companies of Nova Scotia. For two years he looked after the ship-ping of apples and potatoes tor the co-operatives from Halifax. Shortly after the outbreak of the war, Captain Allen was offred and accepted the command of the steamer Winnona and later was transferred to the steamer Rose-dale. He was almost continuously in the war zone until November last when he paid a short visit home, selling his farm at Kentville and re-moving his farmily to Halifax.
