The Vacant Jailorship. It is not very often that we dabble in politics in the columns of the Reporter, although we make bold to say that both political parties know just where we stand when an election comes on.

Our only reason for writing this article is to press the claims of the rural portion of the county to a reasonable share of the offices in the gift of the Ontario government.

As our readers are aware, a vacancy has been created by the resignation of John White as jailer at Brockville.

It is rumored that there are a score or more of applicants for the position, and, as usual, the county of Brockville are in pressing the claims of some of her citizens to the appointment.

At present the following offices in the gift of the Ontario government are held by citizens of Brockville, viz.: High Sheriff, Deputy Sheriff, Registrar, Clerk of County Court, Clerk of Surrogate Court, County Attorney, Clerk of the Peace, and member for the riding.

The only offices held by citizens of the riding, outside of Brockville, are the two license commissioners (non-paying offices) and the license inspector.

Even the chairmanship of the license commissioners had to be given to a man from Brockville who already held a good fat office from the government.

A few years ago when the High Sheriff was appointed, a man from this village was put forward for the position, but although he had done far more for the party and occupied no mean place as to ability his claim was quietly ignored.

The office of gaoler is in every respect a county one. The counties pay the salary while the town of Brockville contributes but a very small portion towards that or other expenses connected therewith, and we believe that the Rear Yonge and Escott and Athens should in all justice be given the appointment.

To the credit of the Dominion government be it said, that since John F. Wood, M. P. has been the member for the Brockville riding he has made an innovation on the old order of things by appointing Messrs. Simpson, Montgomery and Smith from the country to official positions.

A howl is said to have been raised by a few of the faithful from the town of Brockville. But what of that? It was right, and the party at large sustained from Rear Yonge and Escott and Athens who are in every way capable of filling the position.

Men who have worked early and late for the party, men who on more than one occasion have stepped aside to make way for some one of the appointees to offices named above, and we claim the office of gaoler should go to some one of them.

We do not ask it as a favor, we claim it as a right, and we firmly believe that a very large portion of the Brockville Riding will say that our claim is a just one and should be granted.



Tale of a Doe.

It is not the office of this paper to discuss the rewards and punishments of life, although daily observation confirms the fact that retribution frequently follows sin.

The article shows the origin of the dairy, the work accomplished in planning the work for this season, when the matter will commence, and a lot of matter interesting to farmers.

Taylor and Kilborn were injured during the game and were substituted by McKinley and J. Johnson. Brockville team are accused of playing three of their seniors, so that the record of 1 to 0 against an unpracticed team is probably less glory than the visitors expected.

Quarterly Services.

The fourth and last quarterly meeting for the year of the Methodist Church in this place was held on Saturday and Sabbath last.

The service on Saturday showed the finances to be in a satisfactory state. Prosperity has been experienced in all departments of church work.

The large congregation on Sabbath morning from all the appointments on the circuit is strong proof of the high esteem in which the pastor, Mr. Grenfell, is held, and if, as is said, the necessary things to a good sermon are good preaching and good hearing, we had them both morning and evening in a marked manner. The sermon in the evening on "Heroes" was a fine effort and did much to stimulate those present to become heroes in the true sense of the term. The text was in Prov. 16: 32. The Athens church is to be congratulated upon having such an able and original preacher.

Visitors' Fair.

A meeting of the Directors of the above fair was held on Wednesday last, 4th inst., nearly all the directors being present. After the reading and adoption of the minutes of previous meetings, a list of special prizes was taken up, and those not placed by the donors were offered in competition in the best interest of the givers and the good of the fair.

Mr. Kelly, one of the committee, having been present, and it being understood that he had obtained several special prizes that were not yet reported, it was decided to appoint a committee to finish the list. A committee consisting of Messrs. Saunders, Davis, Boesher, Kelly, Barry, Barclay and the secretary were appointed to meet at the secretary's office on Friday, May 13th to complete the list. On motion, the offer of the Reporter office for printing for 1892 was accepted. It was decided to proceed to move the sheep building and lengthen the horse ring to 3/4 of a mile.

OLD FELLOWS' ANNIVERSARY.

A large gathering of three-hundred men assembled at Delta on Sunday last to attend divine service, in commemoration of the 75th anniversary of Oddfellowship in America.

The contingent from Athens numbered about a score, so that when the brethren were formed in procession by W. M. Stevens, acting as Marshal, there were fully sixty in line.

The Methodist church a large congregation awaited their arrival, and as soon as they were seated the service commenced. Rev. G. S. White, of Prescott, a brother high up in the order, was to preach the sermon, and from the brethren naturally expected something specially good, and they were not disappointed. After reading and expounding the 10th chapter of Luke he selected for his text the latter part of the 37th verse, "so, and do thou likewise." He said that since becoming an Odd Fellow his view of the teaching of the parable of the good Samaritan had changed somewhat, and he regarded it as being chiefly a lesson in philanthropy. It was, then, this first principle of Oddfellowship that formed the theme of his discourse, and his definition of man's duty to man was clear, logical and convincing.

The Chief of Police of Smith's Falls has begun a crusade against corner loafers. Four young men who were caught loitering on a corner on Sunday evening were brought before a magistrate and fined \$2 and costs.

The following is the gist of the new amendment to the license law passed at the session of the Ontario Legislature, a copy of which has been issued to the license inspectors of the province: "In future all new transfers or renewals will cost the applicant the sum of \$25 in a city having less than 100,000 population. No transfer can become valid without a license. All druggists may keep liquor for medical purposes for sale in quantities of not more than six ounces, either with or without medical certificates, but shall keep a special book wherein shall be stated the date of sale, quantity, purpose, and name of residence of purchaser and medical practitioner, if any; such being open to the inspector at all times.

Jim Woods Falls is a little hamlet near Waterbury. A few weeks ago a sensation was created there by Jennie Green, Amy Green and Myrtle Snider, three young ladies of the village, taking Frank Bartlett out and giving him a good sound horse-whipping while the father of the girls looked on. The girls alleged that young Bartlett circulated scandalous stories about them. Bartlett, however, caused their arrest and the case was tried at Brownville before a justice of the peace. The girls pleaded guilty to horse-whipping the young man, and the father of the Green girls also said he was guilty of encouraging his daughters. The four were fined six cents each, and Bartlett is still smug from the lashing he received at the hands of the girls.

Cheap Excursions to Ottawa.

The Leeds Farmers' Institute are making arrangements for an excursion to Ottawa about the last of May, or as soon as the farmers get through with their spring work. The excursion will go by special train, leaving Kingston about noon; and connecting with a special train at Brockville. The exact date and the price of tickets have yet to be decided upon. But the excursion will go on some Tuesday, with tickets good to return by any regular train up to the following Thursday night. The fare from Gananoque and return will be \$2. Arrangements will also be made with the Brockville and Westport R. R. for reduced fares on that line. Full particulars will be published as soon as all the arrangements shall have been completed. This will give every one an opportunity to visit the Experimental Farm at Ottawa, the Parliament Hill, and other places of interest, and other public institutions at the Capital.—Reporter.
