

Among other legislative mea sures that were discussed and passed upon during the week, was the Bankruptcy, Bill which was in charge of the Solicitor-General. This is intended to be a very exhaustive act, and quite lengthy, containing almost one hundred sections, which has had a great amount of consideration from all the best legal minds in all the provinces of Canada. It has been exhaustively discussed and considered from every possible point of view, and it is now held for third reading. Another matter of Dominion wide interest is the prohibition resolution, introduced by the Acting Prime Minister. This resolution is for the purpose o continuing for one year from the official declaration of the closing of the war, the prohibition re gulations enforced by order-incouncil over a year ago. The present resolution calls for some

amendments of last years order in-council. These are especially intended to meet the require ments of prohibition enactment in the respective provinces of the Dominion.
