One of my difficulties used to be the interference of the grown poultry with the food of the young chickens while feeding them. At least I hit upon this device, which may be of use to some others; it made a frame four feet square, three fest high at one end, four at the other; placed four roceting poles—old broom haidles—across it, and roofd it tight, teving a small door in the centre of the reof. Then I made the sides by nalling hath on them horizontally, just so far apart as would permit the entrance of the chickens, but to the exclusion of a larger growth. We call the structure our "chicken boarding-house," and it answered to a charm. Mary Watkins said—I am a friend of all the deceased. I was on a visit to the family. About half-past five, as I was arranging the suppertable in the kitchen, I heard a noise a gurgling sound, as of some one chothy—in the room adjoining, and occupied by Dr. March and wife. I went in the room and saw blood all over the ocd, and to doctor lying on the fiser with his head over a pan. I at once ran outside and cried out to M. L. The dector's head was nearly severed from his body. In all three cases the jugular vein and windpipe were cut through. Death must have taken place within ten minutes after the receipt of the wounds.

Mr. E. E. March was a dentist by profession, and had practised in Lawrence at several different times. He had long been known to be partially insane, but nothing dangerous was ever manifested during his insane spells. His father died only a short time since, and the doctor took his death very much to heart. Mrs. March, his wife, and his two children, had all been sick for some time, and the doctor had appeared much depressed in consequence of it. His son, feeling much better, had just gone out for a short wilk. His wife and child had just fallen asleep, and under the effects of temporary insanity he had first cut his little girl's throat, then his wife's, and then his own. Not a word was heard spoken by either of of the deceased. 


