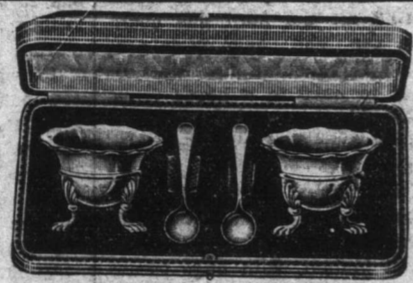

THE DIOCESAN SYNOD.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 17th.
After the reading and passing of the minutes of the last meetings the Rev. Canon Dunfield proposed that a Committee should be formed to take into consideration the personnel and standing of present committees. He moved that His Lordship should be asked to appoint 3 clergy and 2 laymen, to form such a committee, and to recommend members of the Synod to serve on committees during the biennial period. This was agreed to, and His Lordship will nominate members at a later stage.

H. W. LeMESSURIER rose to move the adoption of the report of the Church of England Men's Society. He pointed out how Mr. Bell had moved the inauguration of this Society at the last session, and he hoped that much good work might be done by the Society if taken up throughout the Island. Especially on certain occasions could the work of the church be made easier by such a Society, e.g. the years of Census.

Further this would be a Diocesan Society, men would be bound together. With an appeal to the clerical side of the House to forward this work he begged leave to move the adoption of this report.

W. W. BLACKALL seconded the motion. He said there was some amount of work done, but early growth is necessarily slow. He looked at the C.E.M.S. not as a separate corporation, but as a cement holding other bodies together—a machinery by which those interested might be called together and generally helped—as such this society is of a great encouragement in isolated districts, and especially to the clergy, and the C.E.M.S. in this way furnishes a means of union.

REV. J. O. BRITNEL as Chaplain of the largest branch in Newfoundland, felt gratified that in his parish he had a band of men to fall back upon, and the men in the parish were much helped as many were led to regular, or begin regular habits of attending and receiving Holy Communion, and this is definitely a Church Society.

REV. A. E. RUSTED said that it had been started in Upper Island Cove only last autumn, but was working well. He had had men offering to do any work that needed doing—offering their services unasked.

REV. J. J. BELL, Diocesan Secretary of the Society, said it might be of interest to the Synod to know that many other of the clergy hoped to start branches. It has been felt for some time that something of the sort was wanted, as shown by the lack of men at the Holy Communion.

It is not possible that any existing society could give more in return than what this society gives. He will be glad to give any information required.

CANON SMITH lamented the fact that there is no branch in St. John's. A band of enthusiastic laymen of St. John's would be of much support to outport clergy in addressing the people.

The report was then accepted.

W. W. BLACKALL moved the adoption of the report of Synod Committee of Education. That report had been purposely full, and states everything done by the Committee since last Synod. The sub-committee appointed for the Synod has closely followed resolutions drawn up by Synod, and done its best to carry them out. In response to its appeal for money the government granted

ages in St. John's that only one half year a week is given to this important matter. Religious instruction ought to be given every day.

REV. G. H. BOLT moved the House to Committee on the second reading of the Bill to establish a Bishopric Maintenance Fund and reviewed the history of the Bishopric Endowment fund, which was founded about thirty years ago. No increase in the endowment has taken place during that period. The Synod has been notified that a considerable reduction in the interest on this fund on the next avoidance of the Sec. To meet this loss, part of the fund will probably be transferred from the Committee in England and invested in Newfoundland Debentures at 4 per cent. A further sum will be raised by assessment on the various parishes and missions.

HON. JOHN HARVEY supported the Bill, as did Rev. E. A. Butler and Rev. F. Smart.

The Bill was passed unanimously.

STATISTICAL RETURNS.
MR. H. W. LeMESSURIER thought that the statistical reports should be sent in more regularly. If statistical reports are not worth filling in, it is better to drop them altogether. In his long experience he found great difficulty in collecting these statistics. Often the largest and most popular missions are those which give the best returns. The Clergy should wake up.

MR. SMITH seconded. Only about 10 per cent. have made returns.

MR. BLACKALL wished to know if any means exist of finding out how many times a priest celebrated Holy Communion at any particular point—there are no such means. Revs. Tulk, Smith, Rusted, Hollands, contributed to the debate.

MR. BLACKALL wishes to meet chairmen of School Boards, to confer with them, at hours to suit their convenience. There is a notice on the Notice Board to that effect.

The Committee to suggest names or standing committees for the next biennial period, to consist of Revs. Canon Dunfield and White, Rev. W. Alley, G. H. Bolt, Messrs. J. A. Gill, J. W. LeMessurier, Hon. R. Watson convenor.

REV. CANON SMITH spoke of the work done in the Deanery of Avalon with regard to Sunday Schools and read the report of the Deanery Board. The report showed what had been done in the Deanery in the way of conferences and united services. He Annual Day of Intercession for Sunday Schools has been observed each year on the third Sunday in October.

REV. R. HILL and **MR. W. W. BLACKALL** spoke on the subject of Sunday Schools.

A report was read on the work of the C. E. T. S. in St. John's. His Lordship announced that the B. E. C. prizes for athletics will be presented at the College at 11 a.m. The Executive Committee will be elected at 9 a.m. on Monday, and at 9.30 the Synod will receive a deputation from the Lord's Day Alliance. Proceedings were brought to a close with the benediction.

AT ST. MARY'S CHURCH.—Rev. J. reagent will officiate at St. Mary's church tomorrow morning. At Brookfield in the afternoon Rev. Canon Bishop will conduct the service, and at St. Mary's at night Rev. W. Fosdell, the former curate of the parish, will officiate.



Training of Teachers.

We are glad to learn that Mr. Blackall, in presenting the report of the Committee on Education to the Synod dived much into the importance of training teachers in the arts of their profession. In the past, much of the time and attention which have been professedly given to the training of teachers, have been necessarily devoted to equipment of candidates with a more or less sound education. The teacher in training joins a class in a college and goes through the class-work with the ordinary pupils. Attempts are made to give them some instruction in the art of teaching, and also to afford some opportunity to practice teaching. Unfavourable and inadequate conditions have been largely due to lack of means to provide facilities. Teaching is a difficult art. It requires much knowledge of mental, moral and physical growth, and the environment under which development of children can take place. Efficient teachers can do much in making good men and women. Too often we forget that school teachers are butchers boys and girls, and mar their mental growth and moral character for life. Mr. Blackall is doing good service in emphasizing the need of making Master Workmen of our teachers. Canon Pilott always insisted that the training school for teachers was the cornerstone of the educational system. He passed most of his life in the days before the educational awakening, when his annual reports mostly found their way to the waste paper room. Some day they will be rummaged out and their value appreciated. His labours in this direction will not be in vain. Now that the public conscience is being roused on education, now that one government vies with its predecessor in making more liberal provisions for education, Canon Pilott's successor, Mr. Blackall, with his advisers may be able to carry out like ideas on the training of teachers, which were so dear to the heart of his predecessors.

REFORM.—We are in receipt of your letter which we hope to publish on Monday.

Synod Statistical Committee.

The following report of Hon. J. Harvey's remarks was furnished too late to be incorporated with the main official report.

Mr. Harvey.—There are other statistical returns to which I would like to refer and which are of much importance to the public, I mean those of births, marriages and deaths. I understand from the registrar that nine tenths of the clergy do this work accurately and take an interest in it but unfortunately about one tenth delay returns and this very much retards the work of the Registration Department. At the instance of the commission on public health the Registering offices were all circled last year in the hope of securing greater promptitude in making returns; this would be highly appreciated by all concerned and be of much advantage to the public.

Attacked the Police.

Yesterday afternoon a drunk who often appears in Court came down on Water Street West and was advised by Const. Whalen to go home. Suddenly seizing the officer by the arms he pushed him through the glass of a small shop there. Whalen, though taken by surprise, grappled with his man and threw him to the sidewalk. Const. Martin appearing in the fray, the assailant was arrested and the man was driven in a cab to the station.

Coast Weather Report.

Fogo.—No herring or caplin, fish scarce; two traps had five and three other traps lost or torn up at Joe Butt's Arm in Thursday's storm; one schooner lost at Keppin's Cove, belonging to Bonavista Bay; crew saved. Heavy sea still raging.

La Scie.—Calm, heavy sea; several cod traps badly wrecked in yesterday's sea; little caplin, no codfish. From St. John's north heavy weather is reported for Thursday and Friday.

Bankers arriving at Harbor Buffet report good fares.

Thirty thousand pounds of halibut and 9,000 lbs. of salmon were shipped from Burgeo this week.

There is a dump on Quidi Vidi Road not far removed from several tenements there, and quite near St. Joseph's Church. Many people pass this way, especially going and coming from St. Joseph's Church and the place should be cleaned up and filled in immediately.

Good Word For Indian Government.

Commissioner Booth-Tucker who has charge of the Salvation Army work in India, has just returned from that country, and in conversation with a Daily Chronicle reporter he expressed himself enthusiastically over the way in which India is governed. "Some very wrong notions exist," he said, "about the government of India. It has more self-government than any country in the world. The 3700 superior judicial officers are all held by natives with the exception of about 100. There are 742 municipalities, and their 9800 members are almost without exception natives. There are 15,800 members of 1073 district boards, all of whom are natives. From what I hear, Lord Morley's scheme is likely to have an excellent effect on the government of India. And there is no class of whom the British Empire ought to be more proud than its Indian civil servants. A great commercial awakening is now going on in India. It seems as if the sleep of centuries was passing away. On the whole I think India is more prosperous and contented than she has ever been before. The great mass of the people accept British rule, and are thankful for it. And I am pleased to say that our own work there shows signs of growing and strengthening."

Valuable Fishing Property Lost or Destroyed.

The stormy weather of the past few days and the high sea caused thereby has been the means of destroying thousands of dollars worth of traps, trawls, boats and other fishing property around St. John's, Torbay, Outer Cove, Ponch Cove, Flatrock, Middle Cove, Logy Bay and other places. All the fishermen of the Battery and South Side were out looking after their trawls to-day and hardly a trap is left intact. Levi Burton's two traps set out in Cape Bay, worth \$300 each, are completely gone, and he only found a few legs and some fathoms of head rope belonging to them. At Ponch Cove Noseworthy's and Sullivan's traps are completely swept away and all the rest torn in pieces. Two trap boats and all the flakes and stages in the place were completely demolished. At Middle Cove Messrs. Crowe and Coody lost their traps and the damage done is incalculable and is a great blow to the trap fishery just at its commencement.

Manufacturers' Meet.

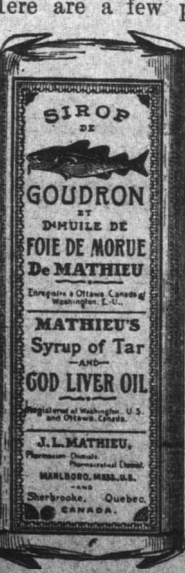

CHINESE MUTINY.

PHILADELPHIA, June 17.—A mutiny on board the British steamer Highland Monarch, bound for Auckland, New Zealand, followed by a dash for liberty by a dozen Chinese members of the crew, resulted in the drowning to-day of four and the narrow escape of three others. The men rescued are in the police station, while those who did not get away from the vessel are in irons on board. The trouble started last night. The ship had been lying at the extreme southwest part of the city for three weeks loading case oil. As the U. S. Immigration law puts a fine of \$500 on the captain of a steamer for every Chinaman who escapes, the twenty Chinamen aboard were not allowed shore leave, and the others, all Englishmen, were given liberal shore leave.

GUEST OF THE MAYOR.—Mr. M. J. O'Mara, formerly of the Trade Review, writing from Montreal to a friend in the city, just last says that he is having a very pleasant time and that he was the guest of the Mayor of Montreal during his stay there. He is now in New York.

Dead Body Found.

At 6.35 this morning as Mr. Saml. Bown of the South Side was rowing across the harbor to this side, when off Kennedy & Mullaly's wharf and near the Calypso he espied the dead body of a man floating in the water. Reaching the pier and going to the Water Street he informed Sergt. Mackey, who was doing early duty, and he in turn procured officers Nugent, Churchill and Whalen, and the body was taken ashore. A stretcher was procured from the Calypso, the remains were placed on it and Mr. Mullaly kindly lending his horse and cooper's dray, the body was brought to the morgue. The body was in an advanced stage of decomposition, the hands and feet being gone. Sergeant Mackey made inquiries so that the remains might be identified, and finding John Whalen he came to the morgue and saw that the body was that of his nephew, John Whalen, aged 22, who lived with his grandmother and uncle at 8 Buchanan Street. The boots which he wore were the principal means of identification. Whalen was missing on Monday, Saturday, April 10th, by his uncle, John, and particulars were given in the Telegram next day. He was seen that night by Miss Ducey on New Gower Street, and later by Miss Hurley at the rear of the Post Office. This was at 11.30 at night. It is thought the man left the two companions he was with, wandered down to one of the uptown wharves and went overboard. It was thought for a while that he had gone to Bell Island and later to Sydney, but it was deemed strange that no word was heard from him. Dr. Rendell saw the body to-day, pronounced death to be due to drowning, and his father then arranged with Undertaker J. T. Martin for the interment of the body. The funeral took place this afternoon. A magisterial enquiry will be held before Judge Knight on Monday.

The Cost of Living.

The "Literary Magazine" calls attention to ten important considerations which seem to have been generally overlooked in the discussion of the cost of living. They are as follows:
1. Automobile tires are now two inches larger than they were five years ago, and cost more when they burst.
2. The price of theatre seats for good attractions has gone up to 25c.
3. Whenever anyone has a nickel left down town the moving picture show gets it.
4. Railroad fares have gone down 30 per cent, which enables us to travel three times as much as we formerly did.
5. Ten years ago a piano cost \$400, and we didn't have any. Now it costs \$1 per week, and we are paying for two—the present one and the one which wore out last year.
6. Taxicabs have got so cheap that now cost 30 cents to ride home after midnight instead of 10 cents by owl car.
7. Talking machines are now a necessity, whereas 10 years ago they were a luxury.
8. Food is now put up in such handsome packages that we buy each year more than \$25 worth of labels, which are not in any way nourishing.
9. Tailor-made clothes are now so cheap that we spend \$20 for a made to order suit instead of picking out a hand-me-down for \$15.
10. Most of us have larger families than we had 10 years ago, anyway.

News From Labrador.

A wire came from Twillingate to the Reid Nfd. Co. this morning, saying that the steamer Invermore had arrived at Twillingate at 8.20 a.m. this morning and left a half hour afterwards for St. John's, Capt. Parsons' Labrador report is as follows: "Arrived at Nakovic on the 13, south west winds and fine weather all the way north. Returning south encountered strong east and north east gales with heavy sea; no ice on the coast; a sign of fish from Beauport to Bay Harbor. All the settlers have arrived at their stations on the coast."

Play the Game.

People who profess to know say that some of those who go trouting each holiday and contribute fish to be exhibited for prizes are not playing the game square. Some who go to the lakes in company pool their fish, select the big ones and put them forward for prizes, giving the name of an individual member of the company as the lucky fisherman. This is an infraction of the rules connected with the prize-giving, and those who offer them should see to it in future that only individual catches should be awarded a premium.

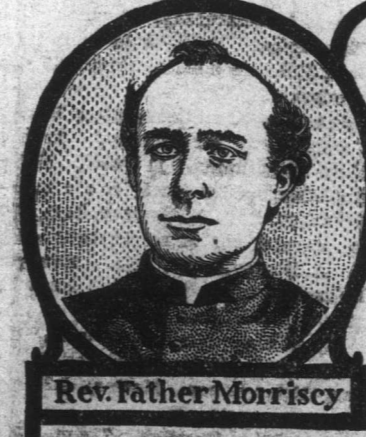

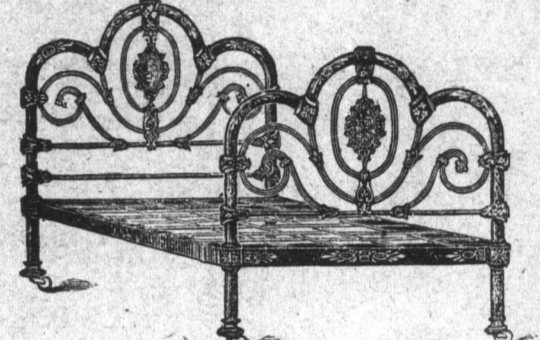
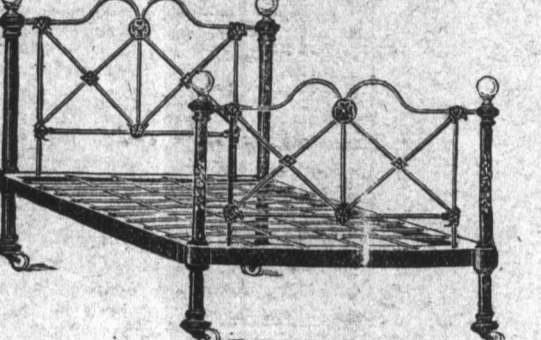

Placentia Notes.

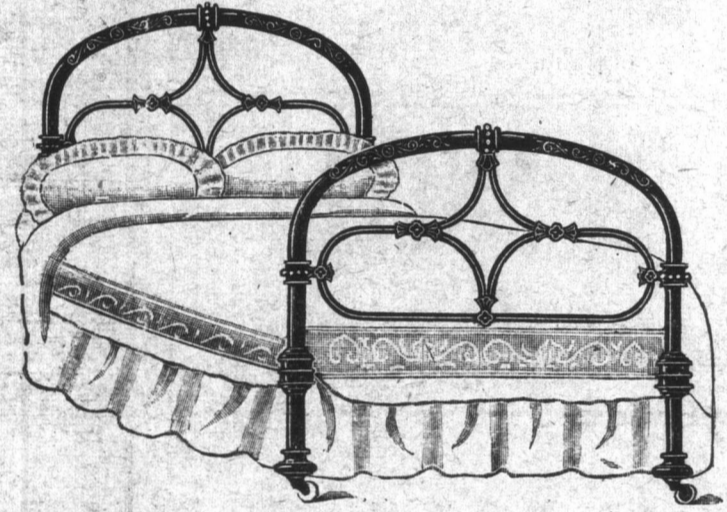

Wedding Bells.

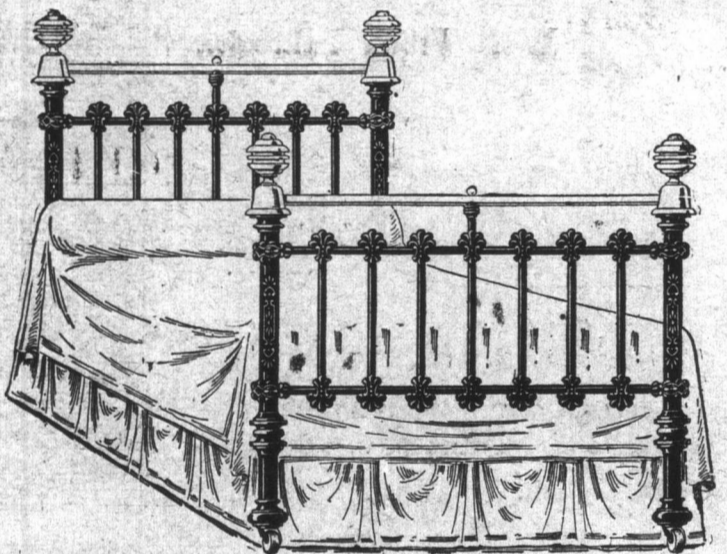

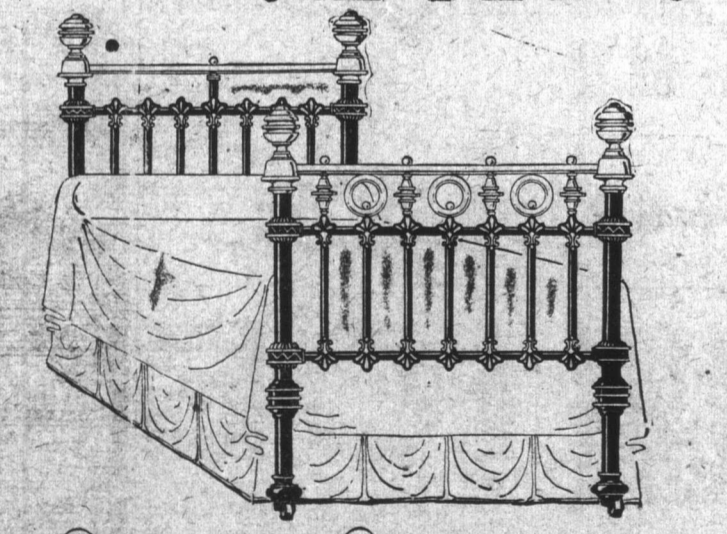

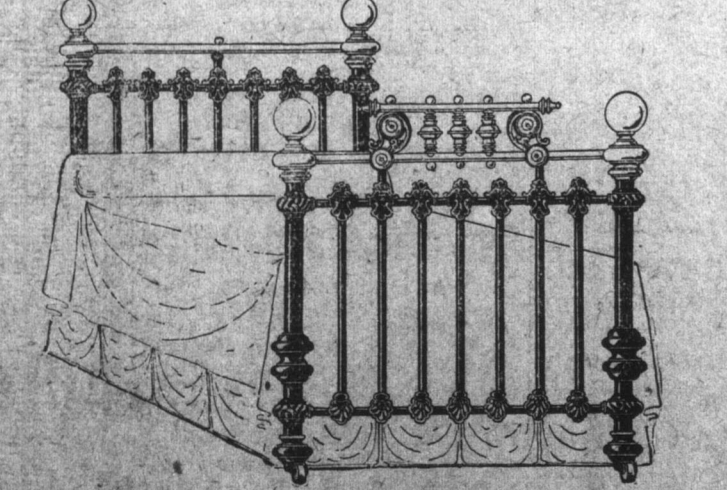

The Newfoundland Case Before the Hague.

The history of the agreement made between Great Britain and the United States in 1818, known in diplomacy as "The Convention of Ghent," is very interesting. It is well known that the war with America was brought on by the obstinacy of George III. Pitt, Fox, Burke and all the leading minds of the day were bitterly opposed to hostilities. Naturally in 1818 there was a strong desire to conciliate the young Republic. The first contention of the American negotiations was rather startling. They claimed to be put at once as regards the fisheries precisely in the same position as when they were Colonists. It was pointed out to them that they had cast off their allegiance to Great Britain and were now an independent foreign nation. It was all to no purpose; they persisted in putting forward this monstrous demand. The negotiations came to a deadlock. The Liberals in England were most anxious to please America, and the result is the Convention of Ghent.

In construing this agreement it must always be borne in mind that the business carried on by Americans and contemplated by this Convention was a ship fishery and not a shore fishery off the Newfoundland coast. All the Americans fishing off the coast of Newfoundland and the Magdalen Islands were bankers.

- The questions at issue before the great international Tribunal are five.
1. The Convention gives liberty to inhabitants of the United States only to catch fish off the Newfoundland coast. The Americans claim that they can ship men of any nation. The wording of this section is too clear to need discussion; only actual inhabitants of the United States can exercise this right.
 - 2, 3 and 4 are very clear. Under No. 2 the Americans refuse to pay light dues. 3. They claim that Newfoundland can make no laws without their consent to regulate the fishery and prevent its destruction. 4. That they are not bound to enter and clear their vessels at the local Custom Houses.
- All these four questions are ruled by the principle of sovereignty. No international jurist has any doubt about these three points. The only possible limitation to these three rules is that they must be exercised in a reasonable way and without discrimination.
5. Under the Convention the United States fishermen have a right to fish on the coasts of western and southern Newfoundland. At Labrador they have much more extended privileges on the coasts, bays, harbours, creeks, &c.

There is a clear distinction between their rights in both countries. Our contention that "coasts" of Newfoundland means the outer coasts and not the inner bays, creeks, coves, &c., is very clear. It is strengthened by the wording of the Convention, "Wood and water, shelter from storms, repairs," &c., and confirmed by the usage and practice of the period when the agreement was made. Americans at the time were all bankers, and to this fishery the Convention and its provisions applies only as regards Newfoundland. D. W. P.
