Source of Infection.

Milk is very susceptible to foul odors, and filthy conditions have a marked detrimental effect upon its olesomeness. The very moment that it leaves the cow's teat it is subect to infection. It is in contact with the air at this moment, and the ir is very often, if not always, laden with organisms which exert a bad efect on milk. No matter how careful means are taken in milking and caring for the cows, more or less foreign naterial gains entrance to the milk. Cows' udders are always more or less dirty, and the act of milking vorks some of this into the pail. The

air should be as free from dust as pessible. Avoid milking in a dusty yard or close to a road where rigs or automobiles are passing. Never milk in a dirty barnyard. Perhaps the ideal place for summer milking is on the fresh green grass plot, free from filth and dust of all kinds; but such plots are hard to get close to the buildings. On the whole, then, the most satisfactory place to milk, summer or winter, is in a clean, bright well-ventilated stable. The stable walls, mangers, gutters and stalls must be clean. Old bedding, allowed to remain in the stalls from spring to fall, without changing, is a source of trouble, as infection lurks therein. The stable must be regularly cleaned in summer, as well as winter, and the cleaning should not be done near to milking-time. The milker should have clean hands, and each cow should be thoroughly brushed in all parts about the udder before commencing to milk. The hands should be washed and dried after each cow. These little things do not take much time, but they are large factors in keeping down the bacterial content of milk, and in all avoiding bad flavors and disease.- 'Farmers' Advocate.

The Japanese Wrestlers.

ntests Twice a Year in Tokio-

(London 'Standard.') It is no light matter to be a Japanse wrestler, Iyemasa Tokugawa, attache of the Imperial Japanese Embassey gave an outline of what wrestling meant to the Japanese, and mentioned incidentally that the art originated in Japan before the Christian

Mr. Tokugawa said that there are no fewer than forty-eight formule by which wrestlers try to bring opponents to earth-a sort of catch as catch can with forty-eight Queensberry rules added. Wrestlers are naked, except for a narrow girdle, and consequently it is not easy to get

The Japanese have at present 587 trained wrestlers in the service of the Wrestling Association, and in June nd January of every year there are great displays at the hall in Tokio. Beginning at sunrise, the matches ontinue until the evening, and it is not necessary for a fall to take place efore a victory can be claimed. On the floor of the Amphitheatre is

square heap of earth three feet high and in that square is the wrestling ring, twelve feet in circumference. Surrounded by twelve straw bags. Let a wrestler's knee touch the ground or the tip of his little finger go outside that ring and he has lost

There are rigidly observed ranks among the wrestlers. All of them go nder nicknames, which are bestowed on them by their patrons or chosen by themselves. The highest class is what may be interpreted as the 'rope' men. To be raised to this dazzling dignity is a rare event.

For 200 years there were only fifeen men who enjoyed the distinction. and the power to confer the title is held by an old Japanese family which initiated the art. Altogether there are five grades of wrestlers, all gladiators, who are trained like them-

They begin the match by first washing their mouths in a bucketful of water by the side of the ring. No suggestion is made that they bite each other; it is simply a peculiar rule. Then they sit on their haunches, hands on ground and watch each other. If they feel confident they spring at each other suddenly and hold on to gridle or body. But if one does not wish to start the match and sees his opponent ready for the spring, he may call 'Not yet,' and they both go and wash their mouths again 'There are, therefore, many not yets,' emarked Mr. Tokugawa dryly.

Falls of Soot In England.

ed every year in the British Isles in the form of soot. Various experiments in the City of Leeds have shown at least 230 tons of soot is deposited annually over each square mile of the city's area. Glass plates exposed in the centre of Leeds beame coated with about twenty-four mes as much tarry soot as in a locality nine miles away. The black deposit chokes vegetation by checking transpiration and assimilation, thins the foilage of trees and reduces the quantity and quality of garden products. The solid particles, too, diminish the sunlight. In 1907 the centre of Leeds had but 1,167 hours of sunlight. as compared with 1,402 hours at Adel, four miles distant, a loss of 17 per cent., and the actual intensity of light was reduced fully 40 per cent. The greatest sootfall yet recorded occurs in the city of London, where on each square mile of surface 650 tons are eposited annually .- Youth's Compan-




