





GENERAL PETAIN'S LATEST SUCCESS.



With regard to Parcels, they should be carefully packed and bear a Customs declaration specifying contents. The outer cover should be of strong linen, calico, canvas or other textile (waterproofed), and must be securely sewn up. Packing in cardboard or paper is not sufficient.

(a) The address must be written in bold letters on the covering in ink or indelible pencil and no on a label, whether tied or pasted on. The name and address of the sender must be shown on the

(b) Wooden or metal boxes with square corners should not be sent unless well padded, as such boxes are liable to damage other parcels in transit.

(c) No perishable articles may be sent, and anything likely to become soft or sticky, such as chocolate or sweets, must be packed in tins well fastened down. Bottles, pudding basins, and the like are prohibited and will not be accepted for transmission.

(d) Cigarettes and Tobacco should be packed in tin boxes, soldered to make them airtight, and these should then be placed in wooden boxes, otherwise they are liable to be spoilt by damp.

Parcels must not exceed 11 lbs. in weight. Any further information may be had on application at the Post
