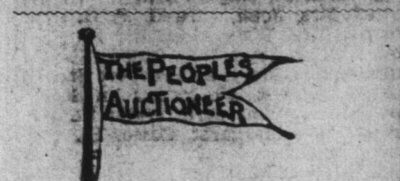

Order in Council

Made Under the War Measures Act 1914-1916.

"All stocks of Salt held by mercantile firms, or their agents in St. John's, at Battle Harbour, and at such other places as may hereafter be designated by proclamation, are hereby placed under the control of the Tonnage Committee of the Executive Council, and no such Salt shall be sold, delivered or otherwise dealt with except under the authority of the said Tonnage Committee."

The violation of this Order shall be an offense triable before any magistrate; on conviction the offender shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars, and in default of payment to imprisonment not exceeding three months.

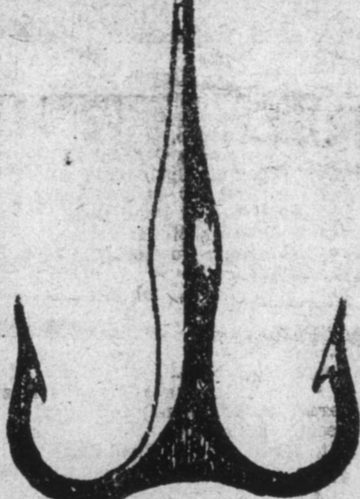

The east bound express with the following first class passengers and the remains of eighteen victims of the explosion at Cape Breton, left Port aux Basques at 10 a.m. today. The passengers are: E. Kelloway, A. Kennedy, S. King, E. Ashbourne, H. Ashbourne, B. Pippy, C. Earle, Rev. Fr. Joy, T. L. Sheppard, W. Walsh, E. Boone, L. S. Payne, T. H. Payne, W. E. Allen, Miss G. Costello, Miss A. Butt, Freshwater; Isaac Boone, Clarke's Beach. The remains of the dead miners, which were landed at Port aux Basques early this morning, were placed in a special car and on the arrival of the train at Briggs Junction to-morrow afternoon the remains will be transferred to the shore line train and from there to their former homes. Quite a number of relatives and friends of the deceased miners are accompanying the remains. At different places along the railway flags are being hoisted as a mark of respect to the dead. The scene that will be witnessed at the little settlement of Salmon Cove, B.D.V., where seven of the victims formerly resided, at Western Bay and other places to-morrow evening, can better be imagined than described. While on many occasions Mrs. H. has paid the price of admiralty, the recent mining tragedy supercedes any two of its kind in which Nfldrs. have fallen victims.

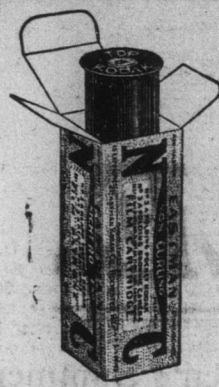

Dr. Grenfell Writes.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—One or two questions of very great importance to the health of outport Newfoundlanders are very insistent to a person with any view of the real duties of the medical profession to the people. One is tuberculosis, and the other, the dietetic inefficiencies. I've worried you with both of these before, but they are increasingly pressing, especially as one feels one can't remain here forever. One may practically say that nothing is done whatever for the very large and undue proportion of people who fall victims to tuberculosis. Again and again and again we meet with it in every form, and—while we might possibly care for the patients who come with acute attacks—there is no fund available for doing the real work of preventing a relapse which is often immediate. We have a tuberculosis shack built at the cost of \$400 granted by the St. John's Anti-Tuberculosis Society. A great many of the victims who come to us gain strength and a start on the road to recovery, but we cannot keep them long, and there are no funds for provisioning and nursing those especially sick, and no proper hospital anywhere outside of St. John's for the poor creatures. I'm not going to weary you with stating instances—such as a mother who was putting on weight and doing splendidly in the hospital, and returned to take care of a family of children thereby losing in three weeks all the gain she had made, and is now marching steadily to her death. Why couldn't that Reid money offered be used, say for a ten to twenty bed hospital in each of the big bays or for one large hospital in the North, which we could superintend if only some regular appropriation were made for its expenses. We can get the best of staffs, give the most modern treatment, and the climate is—at any rate—as good as Newfoundland has to offer. But—wherever they establish it—surely we should have an opportunity to send some of these poor creatures there. They suffer terribly and die miserably as it now.

About diet: I'm going to send along later some pamphlet that our newly-organized Emergency Committee is spreading all along our coast, on the most truly economical diet obtainable, along with suggestions for cooking it to the best advantage. I wish Newfoundland would pass a law, as Sweden has done, just for the war, to make it a criminal offence to peel a potato. Then if they would issue an authoritative pamphlet telling people to use corn meal for breakfast instead of wheat flour, and could—in addition—send a peripatetic agricultural expert to advise and suggest at all these little stations the best places and ways to get potatoes and roots to grow, and to suggest some scheme by which a central pigery could be established—say near St. John's—which could supply them with the much needed pigs. These animals could be sold to the people with a notice attached telling how to treat them best and cheapest. These pigs could be fattened in summer and kept for killing as part of the winter's food supply. Once these suggestions had been made realities would be seen well on the way to limiting the subtle undermining of people's constitutions that gives us our heavy child mortality, and has unfitted so many of our recruits for the war.

Some of the legislators in St. John's have expressed their opinion that the people should be moved from all the North Coast as the only method of remedying the poverty that we see. My twenty-five years of experience have shown me reasons for still believing that the coast provides facilities for a thriving population provided the best is made of it. The lack of any main road is a much greater handicap than is at first evident. A proper official to use the money granted for roads could have given us a main road long ago. This would open up our whole coast economically and should connect with the railroad so that a motor lorry could drive to it. The excellent legislation and efforts of the Agricultural Board and the facilities which they afford are lost to us because there is not any person, whose business it is (as in the States) to instruct individual settlers as to the best application of it to their particular problems. Advisors of this kind would be a real economy to the country through the increase in production. Heaps of gardens this year will be barren because—as usual—the people couldn't get seeds down in time. The unusual lack of the snow, and several early frosts of last winter brought destruction to the seed potatoes. We believe that a main road properly protected and with a telegraph wire—if it ran around the coast—would be a real economy of the best kind. It is absolutely indispensable if the coast is to advance, and the assistance—such as we have been obliged to give people in getting away from the coast from time to time—would be unnecessary.

Re Co-Operative Stores: That work is very much of the same nature as that of the Union Stores. As most scrupulous care has been observed always that no breach of customs regulations should be made, and that department has known very well how to manage its own business all the years of these efforts. No charitable goods of any kind whatsoever have—so far as I know—been used in unfair competition, and only on one or two occasions have mistakes been made by isolated workers which it was necessary for me to report to the customs, whose letters we have to show that they were perfectly satisfied with our bonafides and the rectification which we made. In each case the initiative has come from us, and the amounts concerned have been trifling anyhow.

That any effort which interferes with a man's profits is likely to meet with the opposition of some one we fully anticipated, and the possibility of misrepresenting those making the effort as interested for personal gains was fully foreseen. If the loan of money without the return even of the interest upon it is being objected to, the responsibility rests on those who we knew beforehand would be willing thus to misconstrue it, and for that reason only the money so loaned has been from my own private means. The Co-Operative Store at Cape Charles refused the offer of a gratuitous loan from Americans, accepting only on condition that they paid the proper percentage for the money. A really efficient inquiry into the history of these stores would be very acceptable, and possibly would lead to the spread of that movement though the efforts of the Fishermen's Union have largely forestalled any such expansion. It was at one time quite an important ques-

Municipal Council

Government Refuses to Hand Over Motor Car and Telephone Taxes But Gives the City the Dogs.

Mayor Gosling, presided at the weekly meeting of the City Council held yesterday afternoon.

Commander McDermott, H. M. S. Briton, stated in a letter to the Council that the water supply to his ship was insufficient.

The Engineer was ordered to make inquiries.

The Smith Co. again requested a motor service for their new cold storage plant.

J. J. Mullaly was given permission to repair houses 73 and 75 Queen's Road.

The plans of the proposed building for the Gorton Pew Co., South Side, were approved with the understanding that a guarantee be given that the building must not front on the thoroughfare.

The Public Health Officer submitted his report to the Governor in Council.

After the usual business had been disposed of Mayor Gosling gave out the following facts in relation to the city finances:

THE CITY'S FINANCIAL CONDITION.

As a result of various interviews with the Members for St. John's, the following financial arrangements have been made. It will be remembered that as a result of the passing of the Charter, the following additional revenue would accrue to the City:

Water and Sewerage Rates . . \$15,000
One-half Motor Car Taxes . . . 2,000
Dog Tax 1,400

In addition the Council asked that the Telephone Tax of \$3,400 should be paid to the City. In all, therefore, the sum of \$21,800 was required to pay all estimated expenditures, and to wipe out the deficit of \$13,500 which had accrued from 1915 and 1916.

After the Estimates were submitted, it became necessary to further increase the pay of the Employees of the Council; and, in order to meet this, it was proposed to add 50 per cent to the Motor Car Tax, and one cent per ticket on theatregoers, which was estimated to produce about \$9,000.

Only that portion of the financial section of the Charter has been passed which makes the owner liable for the whole of the water and sewerage rates. The section, empowering the Council to adjust the rates so that a 10 per cent. discount could be given for cash payments, was not passed.

Upon the passing of these sections, the Council depended for the prompt collection of an additional \$15,000, and it is difficult to estimate how far the passing of the first portion only will assist.

The Government refused to return to the Council 50 per cent. of the Motor Car Tax, but has agreed to pay over the Dog Tax to the City. They also refused to give the City the Telephone Tax of \$3,400, but the Council trusts that a further consideration of the matter will result in the acceptance of the Council's plea that these amounts rightly belong to the City. In fact, it is difficult to see how the Government could refuse a claim to all the moneys which in the past have been collected on account of the Telephone Tax. It appears, however, that a special road grant of 40 cents per head has been voted by the House of Assembly, the City's proportion of which, with a population of 33,750, is \$13,500. The members for St. John's have offered to pay to the City at least one-half of this amount, say \$7,000.00, which is just about the amount that the Council has recently voted to the City employees.

Under the circumstances, therefore, the Council has decided not to proceed at present with its intention to place a further tax on Motor Cars and Theatre Tickets.

Of the \$21,800.00 anticipated revenue the Council is certain only of the Dog Tax and some additional amount from Water Rates. It is feared, therefore, that it will be impossible to avoid a deficit at the end of the current year.

To return once more to the additional Road Grant, the Council trusts that the Members for St. John's will see their way to increase substantially, the amount of \$7,000 promised to the City. A very heavy extra expenditure must be shortly made for the South Side Road. This part of the City has been a heavy expense to the rest, and not much over \$1,000 in all has been contributed from that section towards the City expenses.

The Council, therefore, intends to appeal for a further share of this grant for the purpose of rebuilding the South Side Road. This also raises the question whether the whole of any per capita Road Grant should not be paid to the City Government, for the use of the City, as in the case of Local Councils throughout the Island, and the Council proposes to submit a section to be inserted in the Charter embodying this principle.

Legislation Gone Mad.

We do not need to remind our readers that we have protested against the utterly irresponsible and scandalous haste with which the House of Assembly is rushing through business of the importance. Our protest has been dictated merely by concern for the public welfare; a new reason is now added. The times give place for little diversion; amusements are frowned down upon. It would be the greatest of pities, therefore, that the Parliamentary face should end too suddenly. It becomes merrier every day. Yesterday it reached a climax. If anything can be more amusing than the ten pages of Resolutions then passed, embodying the provisions of the proposed Business Profits Tax Act, it must be the solemn manner in which our sage legislators accepted them without debate and the gravity with which the mouthpiece (our apologies) of the "National Government" publishes this morning the outlines of the preposterous scheme. Unfortunately, this form of amusement is not exactly of the harmless kind. If the genius responsible for the scheme wishes to indulge his humour in more popular manner, we advise him to try the stage—comedy or light opera—or the comic papers. He will find it also a more happy outlet for his talent.

If it had been desired to cripple the financial and industrial life of the country, a better means could not have been designed than this measure. Let us look at the matter from the proper perspective. There is hardly a dollar of superfluous capital in this colony. We need every cent we have for our trade. We are the worst possible subject of a profits or income tax. In normal times such a tax should not be attempted. In these abnormal times there is some slight justification for it, but the reasons should be kept carefully in view and the tax applied cautiously, conservatively and with the utmost deliberation. More money has flowed into the country than ever before. That is no reason for taxing it, for it should be used to improve the country's trade and industry. In addition to this influx of money there has been an extraordinary inequality of distribution, and in that, and that alone, there is a proper field for this kind of finance. The labouring classes have enjoyed greater prosperity; they should have it, for they deserve it and it is the foundation of the country's prosperity. A few capitalists (if we can use the term) and speculators have enjoyed still greater prosperity, which, so far as it has not come from outside, has been gathered from the great financial middle-class, the backbone of the country—the salaried men. Those are the profits that should be taxed, and those only. Right at the start this undeniable principle is ignored. There is not the slightest attempt to attack the profits which are due, directly or indirectly, to the irregular operations of the

GERMANS SUSTAIN BANGUINARY DEFEAT.

Grand Headquarters of the French Army in France, July 27.—The Germans in a persistent effort to recapture at least some part of the Chemin des Dames, transferred their attention today to the region of Hurbissin, on which they launched a strong attack supported by a heavy artillery concentration. The infantry assaulted again and again, but despite the heavy masses thrown into the action they were unable to secure any advantage other than the entrance into a small section of the advanced French trenches to the south of Ailette. The German storming battalions were caught in an intense barrage fire as they left their trenches and their ranks were rapidly depleted. Details of the attack on the California and Casemates Plateaux, in which the Germans suffered the most complete defeat in the first half of the week, show that some of the Prussian regiments lost fifty per cent. of their effectives. They employed more than 100 batteries during their bombardment.

MORE RACE RIOTING.

CHESTER Penn., To-Day. Two men, a white man and a negro, were killed in race riots which broke out anew here last night after a day of comparative quiet. About 20 others were injured and scores of persons were arrested. The rioting, which started on Wednesday night as the result of the killing of a young white man named McKenney by negroes last Tuesday, reached its climax last night when a mob of several hundred whites invaded the negro section. Negroes who ventured to retard their progress were beaten down with clubs and stones, and were slain in the hope of discovering one of the suspects in the McKenney case.

There is not likely to be any kick over the big concessions in the way of guaranteed subsidies to be showered upon the cold storage capitalists, as the scratching tactics are very evident among all the members of the House nowdays. However, it will be interesting to wait and see.

From T. Soper, Channel to Port aux Basques.—The catch is 755 qts. of codfish and 900 lbs. of halibut with 250 qts. for last week. Thirty dories and skiffs and 3 boats are fishing. The fishermen are all doing well and prospects are very good there being a fine supply of bait.
From J. Butt, (Blanc Sablon to Forteau)—Twenty-four traps, 85 dories and skiffs and 60 boats are fishing. The trap fishery is nearly over but there is plenty cod with the hook and Jigger. Caplin is plentiful and prospects are good. The catch is 21,000 qts. and for last week 3,000.
From F. Cox (Anchor Pt. to Eddy's Cove)—Cod is very scarce at Flower's Cove and in the immediate vicinity. Traps have done nothing this week and prospects are very poor. There is a fair supply of bait. The catch is 7,745 qts. with 195 for last week. Ten boats and 94 traps are fishing.
From P. Brown, (Upper Amherst Cove to Cape L'Argent). The traps have done well but cod is scarce with the hook and line it being gutted with caplin. The fishermen expect a good

catch later. Prospects are good for traps, 120 of which are fishing with 205 dories and skiffs. Squid is plentiful but caplin is scarce. The total catch is 30,000 qts. and for last week 4,000.
From J. F. Williams, (Bay Bulls South Head to Long Pt.)—Thirty traps, 20 dories and skiffs and 27 motor boats are fishing. The catch is 1,335 qts. with 945 for last week. A few traps did well the past week but nothing was done with trawls. There is a plentiful supply of caplin and squid.

The disaster will be the worst in the history of mining in Cape Breton. Two hundred and sixty men were at work in the pit when the explosion took place. A number of them have already been accounted for, many of them being brought from the colliery unconscious, semi-unconscious or comatose by rescue party, whose members risked their own lives; but it is believed that the number saved will not be more than 180, leaving a death toll of 80. Of the dead thirty are native, twenty-two are from Newfoundland and ten are of foreign birth. There still are a few unaccounted for. Fifteen of the men were married and most of them leave large families. Identification will be difficult as many of the bodies are charred beyond recognition.

NEW WATERFORD, July 26.—Forty-six of the bodies of the men killed in explosion at New Waterford have been recovered and brought to the surface. They are: John McKenzie, Vincent McPherson, Nelson Millie, Henry Conrad, Phillip Nicholson, Joseph Bonaker, George Fraser, John Sineclair, William Snow, Peter Coleman, Frank Barwick, Thomas Miller, Karl Pitlick, Joseph L. Butts, Paul Kuzler, Charles Curry, Arthur Gad, Joseph Steele, Michael O'Leary, Rudrick McEachern, John McLeod, Timothy Fahey, George L. Parsons, William J. Peach, Andrew McLellan, Arthur Killoway, Isaac Boone, William T. Parsons, Wilson Sheima, John R. Whigton, John D. McKay, Charles Ronalds, Rouben Penny, Richard Miller, Joseph Martin, Constanta Egan, George Butts, William Gail, Joseph Walsh, Matthew Sherry, Valis Wirschbryk, John Manning, Joseph Sclorobich. Two other bodies are unidentified; one is a stranger, a foreigner, and of the other only the trunk was recovered. Twenty bodies are still in the mine, some of which are buried under heaps of debris. The bodies of those living in New Waterford or district have been sent to their homes. Those from Newfoundland will be sent by the Bruce to Eight. The work of clearing out the mine is going on as quickly as possible but little has been added to

How L. Corp. Roost Was Killed.

Copy of Letter Received From Sergt. P. Walsh.
Brooklands Military Hospital,
Weybridge, Surrey, England.

My Dear Friend,—I received your letter yesterday enquiring of your poor son's death, which touched me very much when I read it. I am awfully sorry to have to sit down and write to you about his death, he was such a fine chap and a first class soldier, he was a great loss to our Company. You see he and I have been in the same Company since the very start, and we left Scotland together in January last, and went out to France again.

Well as to his death, we were in the trenches in March in a place called Combes, he was in my Platoon at the time. It was poor Willy's first time in after coming out. Well, Mrs. Knox, I must tell you he was killed instantly, and suffered no pain at all. He was buried that night about a dozen more, and they all have a grave to themselves.

I must close now in sympathy with you over the loss of a good son. I remain your friend,

Copy of Letter Received From Capt. B. Butler.
1st Newfoundland Regt.,
Ayr, June 4, 1917.

Dear Mrs. Knox,—Your letter of May 4th, asking particulars of your son's death reached me yesterday. He was in my Company, and was killed on the morning of March 1st. We were detailed to hold a particularly dangerous bit of the line, and my Company was given the privilege of doing so, and I am glad to say that man did his job, although we had heavy casualties.

Your son was with Lieut. Grace (who is now a prisoner of war) in the most unhealthy spot there. The Germans had attacked three times, and were successfully driven back. Everything was apparently quiet again when a bomb fell in the trench thrown by a German about 40 yards away. It burst right by your son, and he died practically instantaneous. We buried him that night just behind the lines.

Mr. Grace could give you more particulars, as he was standing near him at the time, but unfortunately that officer won't rejoin us until after the war.

It may be of some interest to you to know that I thought quite a lot of him, as he was easily one of the best chaps I had, and I did have good boys.

Please accept my deepest sympathy in your bereavement, and remember that he died doing his bit for a worthy cause.

War News.

Messages Received
Previous to 9 A. M.

FRENCH OFFICIAL.
PARIS, July 26. Intense bombardment and heavy fighting at various points on the French front were reported in an official statement. The French succeeded in regaining some of the ground lost during the night to the Germans.

RUSSIAN GOVERNMENT MEET.
PETROGRAD, July 26. The Russian Provisional Government met yesterday and discussed the increasingly grave situation. Recognizing that the safety of the Fatherland necessitated decisive measures, the Ministers resolved to accomplish the task in full accord and solidarity with all honest elements devoted to the country. They decided at the meeting to convene in Moscow soon a conference of the principal representatives of Russian social organizations and place before it the facts in the country as they actually are.

END OF AUTOCRACY.
ATHENS, July 26. The meeting of Parliament to-day was signalled by the complete resumption of popular rule and the end of autocracy in Greece. King Alexander did not take part in the function. The speech from the throne, having been abandoned on the ground that it would involve criticism of the father by the son. The chamber presented a picturesque scene with Greeks, Musselmans and Islanders, dressed in their quaint native costumes. Premier Venizelos was acclaimed by a large majority of the deputies. The new regime completely controls the situation and in full accord are co-operating with the Entente.

BLOWN TO PIECES TO AVENGE INSULTS.
LONDON, July 26. A despatch to the Post from Petrograd says that under General Korniloff's drastic order in the eleventh army, one whole division there was blown to pieces by their own artillery to avenge the insults which all loyal troops, especially the artillery, have been silently enduring the past four months from these traitorous rascals.

NO CONFUSION.
PARIS, July 26. There must be no confusion in today's Balkan Conference with that proposed by Russia for the revision of war aims, says the Journal Des Debates discussing the session which

opened yesterday. If any such question were to be under discussion the United States would not have been content to send only an Admiral to the deliberations. The newspaper adds it hopes the eventualities will not make such a conference urgent in the eyes of the Russians, to whom the enemy has spoken vaguely of peace without, however, saying a word about the future of the conquered Russian people.

THE SERBIAN GOVERNMENT.
CORFU, July 26. The Serbian Government contemplates the early establishment of the seat of the Government on Serbian soil. The first move will be to Salonika where King Peter and Crown Prince Alexander and the Serbian Ministers of Finance and Interior already have established themselves. Other members of the Government will follow soon. The latter seat will be established in one of the Serbian provinces near Monastir near which the enemy has been expelled. The change is welcomed as the first move to reconstitute new Serbia.

BRITISH SINKINGS.
LONDON, July 26. The report of the week's sinkings of British merchantmen have shown a low record except for a couple of days when the Germans had unusual luck. Even with these exceptional days the total is considered to have been about normal. The U-boats for the previous fortnight had been kept down to a minimum but for the current week an upward tendency in the curve would not have been unexpected in view of the vigorous offensive efforts which Germans are now putting forward on all fronts and which no doubt are reflected in the orders to submarine commanders to support the land offensive by continuous efforts on the submarine front. On the whole the navy may be said to be fairly well satisfied with the progress being made against the underwater enemy and the feeling is that time is all on the side of the Allies, as every week sees the anti-submarine methods developing and the co-ordination of the various parts of the anti-submarine campaign improving. In the meantime the ship-building programme is being pressed forward, while in another month weather and daylight conditions will begin to tell against the submarines.

FRENCH LOSE NO SHIPS.
PARIS, July 26. During the week ending midnight July 22nd, not a single French vessel either over or under 1,600 tons was lost according to the official statement issued yesterday. Six French merchantmen were attacked unsuccessfully during that time by submarines. Ships of all nationalities numbering 1,063 entered port and 937 departed.

ITALIAN SINKINGS.
ROME, July 26. Two Italian steamers were sunk and one small sailing vessel damaged during the week ending midnight July 22nd. Five hundred and ninety-three vessels with a gross tonnage of 389,815 arrived and 550 with a tonnage of 403,450 left port.

BRITISH TANKS.
LONDON, July 26. A despatch from Petrograd ascribes to British armoured cars a gallant part in covering the Russian retreat in Galicia. The infantry deserted them hence their stand was unavailing, but the German advance was held up some time. The Commander-in-Chief personally congratulated the British Commander Lockier Lampson, and presented 26 crosses of St. George to his men. The British casualties were only five wounded and the cars later co-operated with Rus-

sian cavalry in front of Tarnopol.
NORWEGIAN STEAMER SUNK.
LONDON, July 26. A German submarine operating near the Azores, has sunk the Norwegian steamer Hanzat. The crew were saved.

TURED.
AMSTERDAM, July 26. Two German vessels were taken to England by British destroyers, according to a correspondent at Texel, one of the Friesland Islands.
HUN VESSELS SUNK AND CAPTURED.
LONDON, July 26. Laurence Ginnell, Irish member who has often threatened to follow the example of other Sinn Fein members and abstain from attending parliament, was suspended by the speak-

er to-day for refusing to obey the ruling of the chair. He refused to resume his seat when ordered to do so, and the Speaker instructed the attendants to remove the unruly member. The House adjourned while the attendants hustled Ginnell from the chamber.

THE SITUATION IN RUSSIA.
LONDON, July 26. The situation in Russia, according to a despatch to the Times, is declared to be gravely dangerous and is attributed to indiscipline of the army and the German propaganda, the impudence of which is almost past belief. Petrograd, the writer says, is exhausted by the continuous political excitement and the people are craving a stable government, decisive and swift action, above everything else. The trial of persons proved to have connection with the German propaganda with the immediate death penalty for those guilty of the more severe offences would have an immeasurable effect. The government's declaration of itself as a committee of public safety has aroused a feeling of relief and a strong handling of the outbreak in Petrograd excited the extremists to vanish, but the cancer is unremoved, the roots are still there and a further operation is necessary. The masses are too much out of hand to be deterred by anything but an introduction of the death penalty. The correspondent concludes, they stand on the brink of a precipice. If they can hold back the country the situation is saved, if not the country will rush into the chasm of anarchy.

RUSSIAN GOVERNOR RESIGNS.
PETROGRAD, July 26. General Polvtsov, Military Governor of Petrograd, who recently was severely attacked by Minister of War Kerensky, for failing to put down rioting in the capital, has resigned. General Ereil, commander of the 11th army has been appointed his successor.

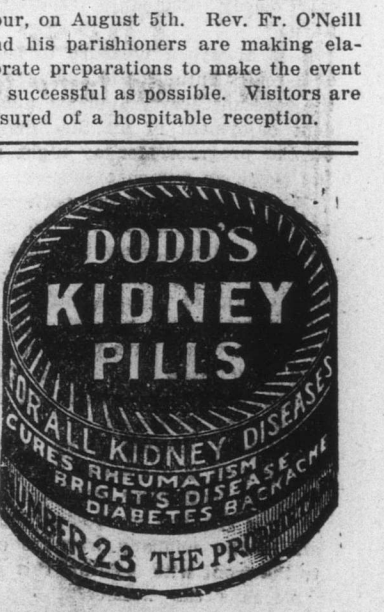

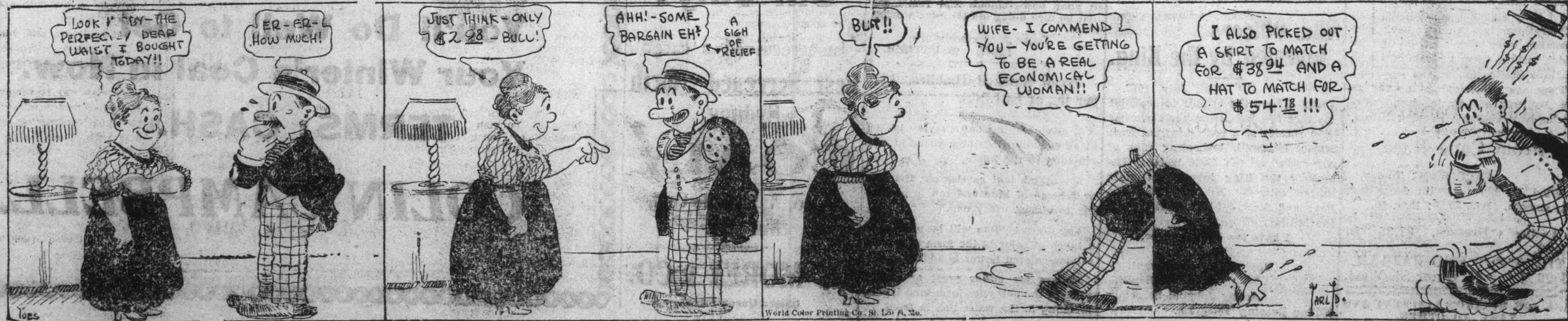

Bill Respecting Business Profits' Tax

INTRODUCED IN LEGISLATURE.

Very little business was done at the House of Assembly yesterday afternoon, the members willing away the time by reading the newspapers for the greater part of the sitting, which occupied only a half hour altogether. The Attorney General introduced Bills to amend the Judicature Act and the Consolidated Statutes. They were read a first time.

On motion of the Premier the Resolutions to give effect to a Bill and incidentally to give big concessions to a cold storage company, were deferred until the next sitting on Monday next. The nature of the concessions, it is freely stated, to be given the cold storage company is that of a guaranteed subsidy for 20 years of one million dollars. This high-handed piece of business was promoted by the late Government and it looks as if the present Government are going to put the stamp of approval on the Bill.

The House was then moved into Committee by the Finance Minister on Ways and Means to consider Resolutions in relation to the change in the tariff, also concerning the business profits tax. The Resolutions passed with slight amendments and a Bill, giving effect to the Resolutions, was introduced and read a first time and will be read a second time at the next sitting.

The Order Paper, which was exceptionally short, having been gone through, the House adjourned until Monday next, and the following day, we hear, will be prorogued.
