
















Civic Commission

DEPRECATES PRESS REPORT OF REV. DR. JONES LECTURES ON BOBINS INCIDENT.

At the regular weekly meeting of the City Commission last night, the action of the Commission in connection with the removal of the building recently erected in defiance of the Municipal Regulations was discussed and the following statement was issued for pub-

"The Municipal Council seriously deprecates the comments made by some section of the Press in the matter of the illegal action of a man named Robins in building a house on the Old Railway Track at the Battery, without submitting plans or asking permission of the Council to build. The facts of

the issue are as follows: "It was reported in June last that Mr. Caleb "Roberts" was excavating, evidently with the intention of building, and a letter was sent on June 14th informing him that no building would be permitted in that locality. Immediately he began to build he was informed by Mr. Coaker, the East End Road Inspector, that he was breaking the law. His reply was to the effect that he was going to build in spite of the Council or the law or anybody. He was then summoned and fined, and the Court then authorized the removal of the house as the law provides. When an attempt was made to carry out the law Robins or his wife, committed a breach of the peace. Robin's did not apply for permission to build, which is a gross breach of the law, and so far as anyone knows, has no title to the land upon which he built.

"The Municipal Board about five years ago asked that no grants of Crown Lands should be made to anyone in that vicinity, as permits to build dwelling houses would not be granted sites in the neighborhood and if Robins had applied to the Council he could have obtained a site on the pro perty on Quidi Vidi Road, but he evidently from the beginning intended to defy the law and deserves no sympathy whatever, and to encourage him as the Press has done, only brings him into greater trouble.

"The problem of the Battery was one of the first matters taken up by the Municipal Board. The conditions there are most unsanitary and the whole settlement illegal. So far as the Board could ascertain no permits have been granted for buildings there, and the people who have built have no title to the land or to the houses which they have built. Some few in the firs instance, got leases from the Reid Newfoundland Company but they have refused to pay rents. The land is Impertal property, possibly held by the Reid Newfoundland Company under lease for the balance of their term. The people living on it are squatters and the houses are nuisances in the eyes of the law.

"After long consideration the Board decided to ask for powers to take ever the property from the Reid Co. or from the Government, with a view to trying to get the place under some kind of law and order. They proposed to allow such buildings to remain as were fit for occupation, to give the people some title to their houses, which they call theirs, to furnish a water supply and sewerage, to make the residents pay crown rents and taxes, and in short to remove them from the condition of outlawry in which they now exist. A section of the Charter asks for power to deal with the matter and if it had been passed four years ago, as it should have been, probably the present unsanitary and anomalous condition would have been remedied. For the Press to sympathize with a flagrant breach and deflance of the law is a public scandal."

Unequal Representation.

West Newfoundland has suffered much in the past through inproportional representation. All that stretch of country from Mosquito Hr. on the south-west coast to the Gulf of St. Lawrence thence northward through Straits of Belle Isle and south to Cape St. John's, with only three representatives, while the rest of the countryless than half of the whole-with thirty-three. Llewellyn Club.

ULSTER. The regular monthly meeting of the Llewellyn Club was held last night in the Canon Wood Hall before an extremely large and representative audience. The speaker of the evening was the Rev. Dr. Jones who delivered an address on "Ulster, Its Prosperity and

the impressions received by him when he visited Belfast recently. He spoke of the magnificent City Hall, symbolic of the pride of the people in their city. He also mentioned the Orange Society, (a meeting of which he attended) which he said was representative of the loyalty of the people of Ulster. To illustrate this loyalty, the lecturer quoted figures with reference to the large number of V.C's received by men in Ulster regiments, and to the great response to recruiting appeals during the early part of the war. The lecturer then went on to speak of the Educational Institutions, which stood for the educational vigor of the people and of the shipbuilding yards which proved the industrious nature of the people of Belfast. To illustrate the intensity of feeling in Ulster the Rev. Dr. gave an account of his visit to Shankill and the Falls Roads. On the walls of the buildings of the former placards were displayed bearing on them the legend "No Surrender." and the windows of every house had orange curtains. The speaker, however, was pleased to see green curtains in all the windows on the Falls Road. He then gave three reasons for the prosperity of Belfast, which are racial, educational and social.

The lecturer then proceeded to present to his audience Ulster's opinion of the Nationalist movement. He said that Ulster thinks that the Nationalists have made several serious mistakes from a strategically political point of view. First, in seeking independence, which would be impossible in the interest of the Empires integrity. Using Waste Lumber.

By-Products of Sawmill May Be

Only forty per cent. of our cut timber is utilized; the rest is throws away. This sounds as if we were wilfully wasteful; it means really that the unused sixty per cent. is in such shape that it would not pay to use it. The problem of utilising waste material, we are told by James D. Lacey, writing in the Lacey Tim-ber Digest, is that of making its utilisation profitable. This problem, he says, is being rapidly solved, in the case of timber wastes, by the work of chemists; for chemistry affords the chief key in this instance. The enhanced value of timber to-day is making profitable the conversion of waste into merchantable products hence the activity of those who are studying those products. Not impossibly, Mr. Lacey thinks, the by-products of the sawmill will outvalue, in the near future, the finished lumber. Alcohol, tanning extracts, turpentine, pine oils, fibre for all sorts of fabrics, "wall board," insulating materials-these are but a few of the products that may be obtained from sawmill waste formerly thrown away. "It is not altogether improbable

Lat the time may come when the by-product distillates of wood will rank in value with the product of the co-ordinate sawmill operation. No one knows just when the production of petroleum may begin to fall below the tremendous and constantly increasing demand for oil. Whenever a serious shortage sends oil prices above a certain point, however, ethyl (grain alcohol distilled from wood) will afford an efficient substitute for many purposes for which oil products are now used, including the operation of internal-combustion engines for the automobile and other automotive machinery. Grain alcohol may be produced from any wood at relatively. low cost and by a process which yields other products of value as well. Wood alcohol produced by destructive distillation, is one of the pioneer by-products is increasing rapidly, but for direct use and to serve as a denaturing agent for grain alcohol distilled for industrial use.

"Relatively few of the important chemical by-products can be produced from any one wood. Tanning extracts, for example, are obtained chiefly from the bark of oak and hemlock. Turpentine is reclaimed from those woods possessing the necessary resinous content. Pine oils as the name implies, are produced from the pines. But chemical scrutiny demonstrates that practically every wood possesses important by-product possibilities that may be greatly magnified as experts explore further the field of or

ganic chemistry. "During the war the range of byproducts was greatly increased. In Germany fabrics of many varieties were developed and manufactured from wood. Wood fabric rugs and carpets of serviceable character were produced. Bags and sacks, fibre silks, imitation leather, and many other articles of utility found market as substitutes for materials that were no longer obtainable. In the United States, too, recent years have seen remarkable development in the use of wood in manufacture of wall board an industry of great and growing size, and in the production of linoleums, heat-insulating materials, etc. thus creating important industries that are totally dependent on our forests for their primary raw materi-

"Progress is dependent upon the chemist's pioneer work plus commercial development and exploitation that create demand and find markets. Until these things began to be done. the lumber manufacturer necessarily limited his utilization to the conversion of his raw material into lumber and other prmary products which he could make and sell with profit.

"Much of this chemical pioneering has been done, but far more is coming, and as it comes it will steadily cut down the percentage of waste. Less of the tree will be left in the woods to rot. Less will be discarded as valueless at the mill. And a constnatly increasing volume of other products than lumber will develop out of the sawmill industry, with resulting increase in the profits, operation and proportionate enhancement of the value of timber.

"It is not unreasonable to suppose that eventually the value of chemical by-products may very nearly equal the value of the direct products of the sawmill."
