



Scarcity of Trained Nurses

Enquiries at several of the princi pal institutions which supply nurses for private cases, indicate that there is not a sufficient number of trained nurses to meet the demand. During the summer months, the nursing profession passed through a very lean period, partly due to the fine weather, but more particularly owing to a general shortage of money, which impelled private patients to dispense with the services of a trained nurse during the period of convalescence. Now, however, notwithstanding the mildness of the winter, humanity is afflicted with many ills, and the demand for nurses for private cases, far exceeds the supply. The difficulties of the hospitals are of another kind. The matron of the London Hospital states that there is no shortage at present of trained nurses for dates to fill vacancies as they arise; and no doubt, other hospitals are in a like case. The London Hospital has to fill 208 vacancies every year. Last year only 156 candidates were available. The number of applicants was, of course, in excess of that figure places. 

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
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
