

All Vessels Carry Fireworks Supply.

ROCKETS AND FLARES USED FOR SIGNALLING PURPOSES.

The skill of the maker of fireworks is not directed entirely, or even chiefly, to the manufacture of jumping crackers, golden rain and other illuminations which figure in the public fireworks displays. By far the most important and responsible part of his work consists of making various kinds of fireworks, particularly those required for use at sea.

Virtually every ship carries her supply of colored lights, which are chiefly used as a means of signalling the vessel's identity when she passes one of Lloyd's stations at night.

In addition to these lights, every lifeboat that is carried by a vessel has a canister beneath the seat, in which a supply of colored lights for signaling purposes are always kept.

Even the fishing smacks carry their fireworks. The type used is the hand-light, in which the chemicals for producing the colored flares are contained in a cartridge fitted to a wooden handle to facilitate signalling.

In the hand-light the fuse is ignited by friction, much in the same way as a match is struck, so that there is no fear of its failing to act in wet weather or a high wind.

The hand-light is commonly used by the fishing smack to signal to the collecting vessel to come and take the catch on board.

The sea fireworks with which the landsman is most familiar is probably the line-carrying rockets used to establish contact between the coast guards on shore and the vessel in distress.—London Mail.

Pig Often Associated With the Devil.

Among the ancient "geas," or taos, in Scotland none was of greater interest than the "geas" which prohibited the eating of pork.

Thousands of living Highlanders refused either to keep pigs or to eat pork in any form. They despised pork as keenly as did the Hindus, the Jews and the modern Greeks of Northern Arcadia.


The pig was often associated with the devil. Fishermen refused to put to sea if when walking toward their boats they met a pig or a hare.

One of the names which the Gaelic-speaking people of Scotland had for the devil was "the big black pig." When the devil appeared in human form he had usually a horse's hoof, but also sometimes a pig's foot. He was in the habit of visiting young people who played cards, which were, notoriously, the "devil's books."

Although the pig was generally associated with the devil, there was Highland evidence that it might as a supernatural being be, like the fairies, of assistance to mankind. It could assume a bird form. The devil-pig and the god-pig were met with on the sculptured stones of Scotland.—Edinburgh Scotsman.



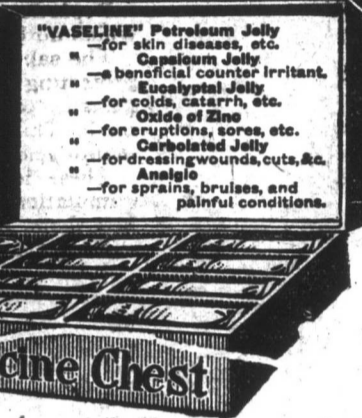

The Association has ordered a lantern from New York in order to use the same in illustrating their lectures to nearby outposts on Poultry Culture. On arrival of the lantern, arrangements will be made to hold a series of lectures. Judge Landry of the Government College at Truro, N.S., has notified the Association that he will come along with him to judge. Mr. H. W. LeMessurier, G.M. G., a former President, has generously given a cup for competition this year to be known as "The LeMessurier Cup." Another has been presented by the Bell Island Association which has been placed for the best display of Buff Orpingtons. Mr. Herbert Winter has also given a cup for White Leghorns. The St. John's Association is putting up a new cup to be won in one year only for the outpost exhibitor winning the largest number of points on his birds. The meeting appointed the contractor to arrange for the fitting up of the C.L.B. Armoury, St. John's for their tenth annual show, arranging coops, lights and stands on Nov. 30th. The Committee have completed arrangements for the disposal of a model poultry house pen of pure bred birds at the show, for advertising and illustrating up to date methods. It was decided to call a meeting next Monday night in the Board of Trade rooms of all those owners of toy pets, such as Argors, Persians, and Siamese and Tabby Cats and Pekinese, King Charles and other toy dogs in order to see if arrangements can be made to hold an exhibition of these interesting pets so that the public can have an opportunity of seeing them. The Committee hopes to have a big attendance this year as Spencer Club will serve teas every afternoon and night, and the Committee will entertain Judge Landry, and the members of the Bell Island Association on Thursday evening Nov. 30th and will show moving pictures of poultry culture every evening.

Anglo-French Accord on Mudania Conference.

Angora Govt. Must Keep Letter of Agreement -- Lausanne Conference Postponed--Rhodesia Votes Against Union--Miss MacSwiney Threatens Hunger Strike.

PARIS, Nov. 6. The French and British Governments are in full accord and will in the terms of the Mudania Convention and instructions to the High Commissioners in Constantinople. It is expected in French circles that the Angora authorities will accept the standpoint of the Allies.

LONDON, Nov. 6. As a result of the new situation in Constantinople and the demand of Russia, that Allied military operations cease, the peace conference held for Lausanne on Nov. 15, has been postponed, possibly for a fortnight. It is announced, it is stated in authoritative circles that under no circumstances will the British point of view regarding the presence of Allied troops in Constantinople be changed. The British intend to uphold the Mudania Armistice agreement and remain in the Neutral zone.

THE ANKARA GOVERNMENT desires to have administrative officers to Chanak, Gallipoli and Constantinople, there being no objection, it is declared.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 6. The Turkish Nationalist Government has handed a note to the Allied High Commissioners intimating that the High Commissioners must ask for permission to pass the Dardanelles. The High Commissioners have been informed, and they must also inform the new Government's flag.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 6. The Allied Commissioners refuse to increase the demand of the Angora Government that only one warship be allowed to enter Turkish ports and only with the consent of Turkish authorities.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6. The German Kaiser of 1914 to 1918 was not the "All Highest," but the Kaiser of the general staff and the High Command sent the German armies into Belgium was thrust into the limelight, according to Sir Basil Thompson, former head of the Criminal In-

vestigation Department of Scotland Yard, who sketched for a New York audience last night, a new picture of the German Kaiser. Sir Basil ascribes this uncommon portrait of the Kaiser to General Von Buelow, who told the British detective of the intimate scene that prefaced the Kaiser's exile. Sir Basil's story makes fear the motive that sent the Kaiser to Doorn. The story of the final order for the invasion of Belgium indicated that the Kaiser, before August 4th, 1914, desired that the armies must not invade the little country. The general staff, Sir Basil said, told the Emperor that Belgium was the only pathway to France. Then in answer to the Kaiser's reiteration that there would be no invasion, the staff departed to return with the order sending the army forward. Sign this order or the general staff will consider it its duty to take over the protection of the Fatherland, was Von Buelow's report of their ultimatum.

RHODESIA VOTES OUT. SALISBURY, Rhodesia, Nov. 6. The referendum to-day to decide whether Rhodesia should be incorporated in the South African Union, resulted in an adverse majority of 2785. The vote was 8774 to 5989.

ANOTHER MINE DISASTER. SPANGTER, Penn., Nov. 6. Thirty miners survived from the Rely Coal Company Mines lay in a double row of cots in a hospital here tonight. They are the known survivors of ninety-four miners who went into the mine this morning and a few minutes before a terrible explosion. The number of the dead is not determined, but the belief is that perhaps fifty or sixty lost their lives. Rescue men tell of bodies scattered through the workings of more than five hundred feet. There is hope that some of the missing men are alive behind a barricade of old timbers.

MARY MACSWINEY ON HUNGER STRIKE. DUBLIN, Nov. 6. A Bulletin issued by the Republic states that Miss Mary MacSwiney, who was arrested by the Free State Military on Saturday, has been hunger striking since taken into custody. A letter, said to have been found after her arrest, reads: "I'm imprisoned I will hunger strike. I don't know whether they will let me die, but if they do pray for me, that I may be as brave as those who have gone before." She is the sister of Terrence MacSwiney, who died after seventy-three days' hunger strike in London on October 25th 1920.

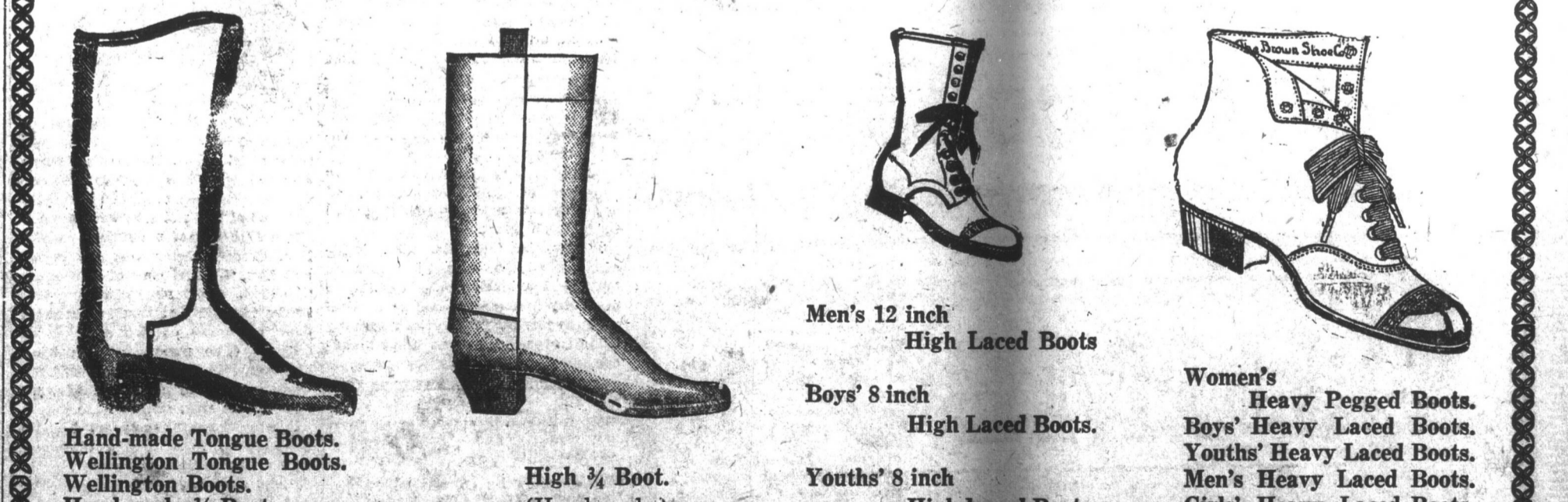

Spain and Prohibition.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—The telegraphic despatches yesterday state that one of the reasons why Newfoundland is not participating in the reciprocity treaty with Spain is because that country cannot make arrangements with regard to the sale of her wines with a country which has a Prohibition Law. I ask, Mr. Editor, why should we be handicapped in selling our fish by the absence of a law which is not enforced and cannot be under present circumstances, at least in this country. Why lose the substance for a shadow? Spain will not make a treaty with a country whose law prohibits the carrying out in full of that treaty, even though the law, in practice, would not affect the treaty. What guarantee would the Spanish authorities have that a Government would not arise and enforce the law? We know that will not happen, but how is Spain to know?

It is quite time for us to wake up and have the law put upon a basis that will allow it to be enforced. The following are the only classes of persons who will make any real objection:—(1) The dyed-in-the-wool prohibitionists, including both those whose religion or training has prejudiced them, and those who have personally suffered by abuse of alcoholic beverages on their own part, or that of others; these hang on for dear life to the Prohibition Law, hoping that the time will come when it may be enforced. (2) The drunkard and heavy drinkers, who say "let well enough alone." (3) The Controller, who very naturally fears that any change may weaken his position or curtail the wealth and influence of his department. Would you blame him? (4) The smugglers, whom the excessive duty—ranging from nearly 100% to over 1,000% in the case of spirits alone—encourages to compete with the Controller and undersell him. (5) Those lucky ones who are able to obtain all the liquor they want at very little above cost.

Why should the people of this country receive less for their fish in order that the prejudices of some and the profit of others of the above category should not be interfered with?

Struck off the Rolls.

HOW ERRING SOLICITORS ARE PUNISHED.

Many people imagine that "striking a solicitor off the rolls" is merely a figure of speech, and that there are no rolls from which his name can be struck. They are quite wrong. In the office of the Incorporated Law Society, which is the governing body of the solicitor's calling, there are several massive volumes in which are written in alphabetical order the names of all qualified solicitors. These volumes, or rolls, may be inspected by any duly authorized person.

When it becomes necessary to remove a name from the rolls a pen is drawn through it, and a marginal note is made to the effect that the name has been "struck off the rolls by order dated so and so."

This simple proceeding records the close of an erring solicitor's career, and for him is fraught with grave possibilities.

When the charge has been formally made—it is usually one of defrauding a client, or some similar form of professional misconduct—a trial is held before a committee of the Incorporated Law Society. This committee consists of not less than three and not more than seven members of the council of the society.

The trial is carried out on the lines of proceedings in the High Court, and the result is actually communicated to the High Court.

If expulsion from the society is recommended, the accused solicitor's outlook is a black one. There is no hope of reinstatement, and he is faced with the terrible prospect of beginning life all over again, most likely in uncongenial work and surroundings.

British Empire Exhibition

**Great Power House of Imperial
Trade Development -- Guar-
antee Fund Now 1,166,000
Pounds.**

Already the Guarantee Fund for the
British Empire Exhibition at Wem-
bley has reached the splendid figure
of £1,166,000 but the Executive Coun-
cil and the Gen. Committee (of which
the Prince of Wales is President) hope
to see this sum more than doubled in
order that their hands may be strength-
ened in this great enterprise for the
development of Empire Trade. Such
an enlargement of the Fund, while it
will not mean any increase in expendi-
ture, will be an additional safeguard
to all the guarantors by reducing to
a minimum the proportionate liability
of each individual in the very un-
likely event of a deficit. A guarantee,
of course, is not a cash payment. It
is merely a promise to accept respon-
sibility proportionate to a stated
amount, and in view of the vast sums
of money to be received in revenue
from gate money, concessions, rents
of exhibition space, the Stadium, roy-
alties on amusements, etc., good
profit and not a loss is anticipated.
All profits will be divided among the
British Government, the Dominions,
Colonies and Dependencies in pro-
portion to the area of space occupied
by their exhibitors, and in each case
the profits are to be devoted to some
public object. The existing guaran-
tee fund has been contributed in sums
ranging from £250 up to £150,000.
The latter is the guarantee offered by
the principal contractors, Sir Robert
McAlpine & Sons. The British Gov-
ernment and the underwriting mem-
bers of Lloyds are standing in to the
extent of £100,000 each. Among the
£10,000 guarantors are the Football
Association, several railway compan-
ies, and the "Big Five" in the banking
world. The Oldham Master Cotton
Spinners are in for £7,000.

**DOMINIONS TAKE PROMINENT
PART.**
In no other Exhibition ever held
have the Dominions and Colonies taken
so prominent a share as they in-
tend to do in this one at Wembley.
Already they have booked between
600,000 and 700,000 square feet of
space. At the White City, in 1908, our
Overseas Empire occupied only 110-
000 square feet. Australia is devot-
ing £250,000 for her share in the
project and her buildings will cover
an area of 150,000 square feet. India
will spend £167,000. She has reserved
100,000 square feet of space. On
behalf of New Zealand, the Govern-
ment has agreed to a minimum expendi-
ture of £280,000, and a building occu-
pying at least 40,000 square feet
will be erected. South Africa will
have a building of 25,000 sq. ft., the
Union Government having agreed on
provision to the extent of £30,000.
Burma is to be represented by a simi-
lar expenditure, on an area of 22,000
square feet, devoted to a splendid
pavilion and village street. Hong
Kong will also have a village street
on the Chinese plan. Canada's de-
cision is now awaited with some in-
terest. She cannot afford to be far,
if any way, behind the fine lead of the
Commonwealth Government. Her
trade interests are of primary impor-

tance. Not only her agricultural pro-
duce, but many classes of her manu-
factured goods are in urgent need of
wider and better established markets.
Large commercial houses in London
that represent Canada's interests are
looking to the Canadian Government
for a bold, business-like and patriotic
lead at an early date. The special
mission under Major Belcher is now
touring the Dominion and is holding
useful conferences with leading citi-
zens, statesmen, agriculturists, and
men of commerce. Among the Colon-
ies and Protectorates the lead is taken
by the Far Eastern Group represent-
ing the Federated and Unfederated
Malay States, and the Straits Settle-
ments. This group will spend £50,000
and their building will cover a space
of 50,000 square feet. A Committee
has been formed in Singapore. West-
ern Pacific Islands will spend £10-
000. Other groups, and the space they
will take include the following:—

every important trade and industry,
every artistic and scientific interest.
All the members of these committees
are experts in their own line, men
of business or commercial repute, or
men of high standing in the study of
their particular subject. There is not

The Arrogant Turk.

The Turkish Nationalists since their defeat of the Greeks, and the flinging of the latter out of Asia, have become exceedingly arrogant and are in the humour to defy the whole of Europe. The conference at Mudania seems to have become nothing but the word formed by the three first letters of the name of that village as the Turks (Kemalists) have torn up the agreement and peremptorily ordered the Allies to move out of Constantinople in short order. In effect they are not requested to stand upon the order of their going but to go at once. It is not conceivable that, under the circumstances, the Allies will obey the Nationalist demand. To do so would leave all the Christians and non Mohammedans in the Turkish Capital at the mercy of their hereditary enemies and the consequence of leaving these without adequate protection can be readily imagined. Left to the fury of the Turk, the tortures to be inflicted on these patient sufferers of past iniquities would be indescribable, as all the pent up rage of the Ottoman soldiery, infuriated over their short expulsion from Europe would be vented on those who were unfortunate enough to be left behind. Already Stamboul Christians are seeking shelter from the fear of a Turkish massacre, notwithstanding that the new Government has issued orders that all disturbances will be vigorously put down and those responsible rigorously dealt with. It is easy, however, to saddle the blame on the person whom it is desirable to accuse, and the Turk is not at all likely to accuse himself, should disorders break out. The old Turkish regime was bad. The new one may not be defined until it is tested or has proven itself superior and more tolerant toward Christians than its predecessor. The Near East situation is fraught with grave difficulties, all of which will necessitate careful handling, but in any case the Turk—young or old—must not be permitted to become the dictator of Europe.

Sent to the Woods.

Whether or not the Humber Project has been finalized by agreement between the Prime Minister, the Reids and Armstrong-Whitworth Company, the dispatch of a squad of laborers to the woods across country to perform some necessary railway construction, should not be taken as conclusive proof that these are but the advance guard of the thousands that will subsequently be employed immediately as per promise of the promoters of the deal on all three sides. The particulars of the new arrangement cannot be known until the return of the negotiators, and not then perhaps until the Legislature meets. It is not good business to consider a tentative proposition as accomplished without all the details thereto being made known, and should the Coligny become involved in any expenditure on account of construction work, unauthorized by the House of Assembly, the net result may be disastrous. To take the plunge hurriedly, and without due advisement, into such a

stupendous proposal as that of the guarantee suggested for the Humber Project, would assuredly be the work of madmen, but unfortunately there have been a multiplicity of incidents since the present Administration assumed power in 1919 to demonstrate their utter incapacity and absolute unfitness to be the rulers of Newfoundland.

WHAT ARE THE COMPANIES DOING!

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,—We have been told through the columns of the Press from time to time so much about the latent possibilities of this country that it seems strange to the average citizen that nothing tangible has been accomplished up to the present time. Some two or three years ago a local company was floated to develop certain of our coal areas, and at one period it was common property that there was an abundance of superior coal and we would not have much longer to wait for the real goods. Many since that time have been living in hopes that have not been realized. In winter when cheap fuel would mean much to those of limited means, the hardship of scanty fires brought about by high prices must cause considerable discomfort. Coal dealers are to-day procuring coal from England and selling it to the consumer for \$12.50 per ton; why then are we compelled to pay \$16.00 for Sydney coal? It seems strange that Sydney coal should be \$3.50 a ton dearer than English coal, when the English coal has to be carried more than three times the distance. And it is stranger still that we cannot get our own coal cheaper than either of the above, when the distance of haulage is considerably less than either the Eng-

We understand that the Bay D'Espoir Development which Mr. Henry J. Crowe has been strenuously working for some years, a brief account of which was published from one of our correspondents on the South Coast last week, is full of great possibilities because of a powerful group of financiers and producers which Mr. Crowe has behind him in this undertaking. While the name of the capitalists interested, have, we are informed, been given to some of the members of the Government, they cannot be given out for publication at this time, but from what information we have been able to obtain we believe that they have been behind some of the largest water power and industrial developments on this Continent and propose establishing, not only a good size pulp and paper plant on a part of the Island that has always been regarded more or less as a barren waste. If Mr. Crowe succeeds in this undertaking he is to be congratulated for working out a project that will result in large labor giving industries on a part of the Island that has always been regarded more or less as a barren waste. Mr. Crowe's record since coming to the Island over twenty years ago, is more as an operator, than Company promoter, for he has operated the properties, which he conveyed to the companies he organized. After closing with the Lord Northcliffe Company, the Grand Falls project, he operated and delivered to their mills, one hundred thousand cords of pulp wood, but it is in the lumbering operations that Mr. Crowe has put in most of his energies, he built settlements, also sawmills in different parts of the Island and successfully opened up a market in South America for our lumber where he shipped about one hundred million feet. To give some idea of the extent of his lumbering operations before he brought about the Grand Falls and Bishop Falls pulp and paper developments, the following are some of the properties he secured and operated, namely—Gambo, Gander Bay, Glenwood, Indian Arm, Notre Dame Junction, Norris Arm, Botwood, Point Leamington, Badger and Millertown, and in these operations he has always endeavoured to foster labor and improve the living conditions of those in his employ. With few exceptions, the properties referred to were abandoned or about to be abandoned when Mr. Crowe came along and gave them a new lease of life, expending millions in the purchase and operation of same.

The New Commander-in-Chief.

COMES OF A FAMOUS NAVAL FAMILY.

Vice-Admiral Sir Michael Culme-Seymour, who has been appointed Commander-in-Chief of the North American and West Indies Naval Station, in succession to Admiral Sir William Fakenham, was born August 29, 1867, being a son of the third Baronet of that name, who was also a naval man who entered the service in 1882, serving during the Boer War, and taking part with the Naval Brigade at the Crimea. The younger Sir Michael has been second in command in the Mediterranean since 1920, a post which the Admiral, his father, held in 1893. He was married in 1896 to Florence Agnes Louisa, youngest daughter of the late A. L. Nugent, by whom she has one son and one daughter. His Lieutenantcy in the Navy dates from 1889. In 1905 he was Captain, and promoted to Rear Admiral in 1916. He served at the Battle of Jutland in that year and was mentioned in despatches. Since the close of the war he has been Rear Admiral commanding the Black Sea and Caspian Sea Squadron.

Hats off to Nelson.

Most men making the round of the Nelson Monument yesterday took off their hats and adopted the most reverential way of approach which has become a habit at the Cenotaph lower down Whitehall. This is a change. It gave to the pause in Trafalgar Square the appearance of something more than an idle stirring of curiosity. Really for a few hours the monument shared with Cenotaph the particular purpose of honoring the dead fighters of our own generation as well as those of more than a century ago. A number of wreaths placed at its base were dedicated to the memory of men who carried on the Nelson tradition between 1914 and 1918.

Craze for Bobbed Hair.

MEXICO CITY.—Bobbed hair is now so popular in Mexico City that among young girls long tresses are considered unusual. The craze for short hair was started several months ago when a number of young women who had been attending schools in the United States returned home. The idea became popular and, overriding the old belief that only women of doubtful morals wore their hair bobbed, it was not long before the younger set of the capital adopted it unanimously.

Hats off to Nelson.

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Preparations for yesterday's decoration of the monument were begun early in the year. In February, somebody in New Zealand picked flowers and fruits and fashioned them into a wreath. The wreath was frozen into a block of ice, and that block slowly melted away at the foot of the monument yesterday afternoon, releasing the flowers in all their original beauty of form if lacking some of their original beauty of color. A representative of Newfoundland brought a model of Nelson's ship, the hull done in blue and white violets. Attached to various devices in flowers and garlands were the names of other overseas parts of the Empire, and the names of famous ships and famous regiments of Nelson's day.—Manchester Guardian.

TURKS PREPARING. CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 7. Three additional classes of Turkish soldiery have been called to the colors.

L.G. IS IRONICAL. NEWCASTLE, Nov. 7. Lloyd George made sharp references to the Near East troubles in a political speech here to-day. "The Near East is beginning to show symptoms of inflammation," he said, "but whatever happens our flag must not be let down. We had got rid of the Turk, but he has looked over the list of our new ministers and come to the conclusion that this is the time for another try. If the Government stands by the flag, I shall be wholeheartedly behind them. I entreat the Government to show the Turk that he will not be trifled with, and that the Turk must stand by the document, signed a few weeks ago at Mudania."

MINE TRAGEDY. SPANGLERS, Pa., Nov. 7. Five more bodies have been taken from the Reilly mine, bringing the total known dead at six this morning, to thirty. Thirty-three were previously taken out alive, and rescue workers express the belief that no more living are in the mine, this placing the total dead at sixty-one.

SHARP AND POSITIVE. CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 7. There is reason to believe that Kemalists will yield to pressure brought to bear by the Allied united stand against the demands of Angora Government. A meeting held yesterday was sharp and positive, when the Allies told Rafet Pasha the clear terms they intend to maintain by military authority over Constantinople, until ready to formally turn the city over to the Turks. Rafet Pasha is conferring with his government.

GIVING WAY. CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 7. According to Turkish Nationalist Headquarters, British forces are retreating from Mosul, on the Tigris in Northern Mesopotamia, and Kemalists are entering the evacuated area.

ASKING FOR AUTHORITY. PARIS, Nov. 7. Allied High Commissioners at Constantinople have asked their Governments for authorization to take all necessary measures to maintain order. It was announced this afternoon. The Commissioners will declare martial law if necessary.

EDITOR ARRESTED. CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 7. All Kemal Bey, Editor of the Constantinople Anti-Nationalist paper, Sabay, has been arrested and condemned to death by the Turkish authorities. Late last night Allied representatives gave to Rafet Pasha, the new Civil Governor, twenty four hours in which to release the Editor.

HUNTING THE BOOZE BUNNER. PROVIDENCE, Nov. 7. Fast government boats are combing Rhode Island waters and the Atlantic coast, for the British schooner Marina, alleged to have unloaded a cargo of 775 cases of liquor to smaller craft in Providence River and Narragansett Bay on Sunday night.

AMBASSADOR ATTACKED. ROME, Nov. 7. Fascisti and Nationalists clashed yesterday at Taranto over the question of local police, seven being killed and many wounded. Count Storza, Italian Ambassador to France, was the object of a hostile demonstration by Fascisti, when he arrived at Bussoleo, in Turin, on the frontier, while returning to Rome for a conference with the new premier, Mussolini. Fascisti detached from the train, the carriage in which Storza was riding, but carabinieri rushed to the rescue.

LIABLE TO ARREST. DUBLIN, Nov. 7. Free State answer to Valera's manifesto recently issued, was an order for the arrest of all important members of the Anti-Treaty Council of State. As Valera heads a definite organization, working for the overthrow of Free State government, he is now liable to arrest, having been previously ignored as powerless.

WATER ON FIRE. EL DORADO, ARKANSAS, Nov. 7. More than one hundred thousand barrels crude oil escaped from bursting underground storage reservoirs, on fire here, running down MacKover Creek, which is a roaring furnace for several miles.

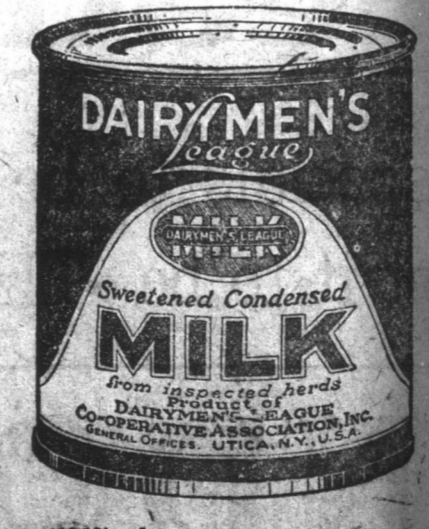
