





ACTING TO THE LIFE .- The realistic tendencies of the modern drama have recently received a fresh and curious illustration in Philadelphia. An actor named Mordaunt, at the Walnut-st. Theatre, being cast for the part of Mr. Dickens' murderous house-breaker, Bill Sykes, argued that, as Mr. Sykes was "a drunken ruffian." it was necessary for his representative to be a drunken actor; and therefore, before paying his devotions to the hybrid goddess who presides over melodramas, and whose name is unknown to us, Mr. Mordaunt sacrificed at the shrine of Bacchus with such reckless devotion that, as his manager averred, he was quite incapable of playing a brute with propriety and discretion. Expelled from the stage, this jovial actor made an assault upon the treasury of the theatre-not a la Sykes, with a jimmy and false keys, but with a summons to the manager to show cause why he should not pay Mr. Mordaunt a full week's salary. The latter will not likely be able to show satisfactorily why he should have it.

FATAL ACCIDENT AT LYNEDOCH .- A COTrespondent of the Spectator narrates the following terrible calamity. At a roll-way on Big Creek, a pretty large stream which flows through this section of the country into Lake Erie, and which is now covered for miles with pine logs for the American market, two men, named Francis Pratt and Henry Miller, were at work rolling logs into the creek. Having asto the top of the rollway Miller cended seated himself on a large log which ap-peared to be frozen to the ground, for the purpose of resting himself, and while Fraancis Pratt, who came up a few paces behind Miller, was in the act of doing so likewise, the log started to roll down the fearful declivity. Miller fell backwards but Pratt being in front, sought to save himself beneath a small projection below him, in endeavouring to do this the log rolled over his body, crushing him so shockingly, that he died within an hour. A post mortem examination revealed a sad state of things. His ribs were broken and embedded in the liver, the diaph ram ruptured, and the lungs and other internal viscera greatly congested. He was a young man, in the prime of life, and greatly beloved by all of his many amiable qualities, and consequently his sudden death has shocked, not only his aged parents, who mourn the loss of an excellent son, but everybody who knew him.

BOILER EXPLOSION .- On Monday 30th ult. the boiler of Mr. E. H. Potter's steam mill on the Boswick Road, in the township of Middleton, County of Norfolk, exploded, killing four men--a father and a son named Little, Peter McKinley, and one named Vincent. Another was very slightly wounded. The engine house and part of the engine are completely wrecked. One portion of the boiler was thrown a distance of forty rods. The bodies of the unfortunnte men were in terred in Tilsonburg, on Wednesday, after a funeral service in the Presbyterian Church.
