

South Brant Election. The Tories have a happy knack of giving their candidates very large majorities—on paper. It looks well, of course, amuses them, and deceives nobody—except the unfortunate candidate, who looks very blue when the books come to be made up, and he finds himself nowhere.

We don't mean to say that this will be the case with that innocent youth yclept J. J. Hawkins, who has undertaken to wrest South Brant from the Reformers. In fact, if we are to believe the Tory organs, there is not the slightest doubt but that Mr. Hardy, the Reform candidate, will be badly—very badly—beaten. Not very long ago it was announced that Mr. Hawkins would have a majority of at least five hundred; and we learn that he is daily increasing in favor, so that we have no doubt whatever but that he will have at least 5,000 majority or so—the night before the election. This all looks very well on paper; but how matters will look at five o'clock on the night of the polling, is a very different matter, and, we very much fear that Mr. J. J. Hawkins will find this out to his cost. He has got an opponent who will be one too many for him. A brilliant speaker, a profound and consistent politician, and an able and powerful advocate, he will reflect credit upon the constituency that returns him, and it is not at all likely that South Brant will throw overboard a man like Mr. Hardy, who will soon make his mark in the political history of the Dominion, for an unknown nobody like Mr. J. J. Hawkins.

A Good Word for the Dominion.

The policy of the London Times has hitherto been to belittle Canada, and to affect to regard its connection with Britain as of very little account. We have been told by it several times that Britain did not care a straw for us, that we might set up for ourselves at any time, and that the sooner we did so, and freed the mother country of the responsibility of looking after us, she would be all the better pleased. It seems, however, that a change has lately taken place in the sentiments of the Times, if we may judge from the following extract from an article which recently appeared in its columns on the opening of the Dominion Parliament. After referring to the difficulties of the past, it goes on to say:

The contrast the present affords to the past can hardly be spoken of without the appearance of egotistical complacency. The whole prospect is resplendent with rose color, that it is impossible to use any other term in depicting it. The Dominion of Canada is firmly established. It has one of the most magnificent territories in the world, and its shores like those of the neighboring Union, are washed by either ocean. It contains not only Upper and Lower Canada, now known as the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, but Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and British Columbia, the only regions of the continent which are not separated from the rest of the Dominion by a narrow strait. The latter little settlement begins to feel it cannot pay its way so long as it remains in its un-social isolation. Annexation is now a forgotten cry. The subject of separation from Great Britain is by common consent considered as something which it is inexpedient and almost odious to mention. A philo-sophical, rational who has best to force on a discussion, but his efforts are said to excite the imitation which usually greet those who are inopportune wise and insist upon speaking out of season. Our institutions are copied with as much fidelity as is possible in a country where there is neither King nor Peers. A King, as representative, is not known in the person of the Governor-General, and it noble of younger generations surrounded him his performance of the highest acts of official life could not be attended by more State and dignity. On the 5th of the present month Lord Dufferin opened the first Session of the second Parliament of the Dominion, and those who compare the exceptional time which passed in a few hundred miles southward at Washington will be able to judge how far British influences still affect the society and public life of the Dominion. Some may draw comparisons unfavorable to Canada, and remark that while forty millions of people can conduct their public affairs without pomp and show, a fourth part of the number under conditions almost precisely similar, how low the vanities of the Old World. The sneer would be misplaced, for the Americans are becoming every year more fond of reviews and processions, bands, flags, and all the apparatus of popular pageantry. The only difference between Canada and the United States is that the former adopts the more dignified solemnities of England.

North Riding of Wellington. REFORM CONVENTION!

A DETERMINED FRONT. GREAT ENTHUSIASM.

From our Correspondent. A convention of the Reformers of the North Riding of Wellington was held at Collicott's Hall, Harriett, on Friday, 4th inst., at 1 p.m., when a large and enthusiastic gathering of over 100 of the leading Reformers, from all parts of the Riding, assembled. Mr. Yeomans occupied the chair, and stirring speeches were delivered by Messrs. Samuel Robertson, Robt. Hay, O'Callaghan, Lambert, Sheppard and others. A committee was appointed to draft resolutions, which were unanimously carried to the following effect:— 1st. That it is the duty of the Reformers of the Riding to meet the cost of and do everything in their power to resist the impudently proposed amendment of the Electoral Act of Col. Higginbotham. 2d. Urging a complete re-organization of the local Reform Associations in each village and township, and nominating Convenors to immediately call meetings. 3rd. Appointing a leading Reformer from each municipality to form together an executive Committee, to assess the proportion of necessary expense to be borne by each, and take immediate steps towards the collection of the same. The meeting throughout was entirely unanimous, and the last resolution was one of thorough confidence in Colonel Higginbotham as the representative of the Riding. Centre Wellington has done well, but we are not to sanguine, which we say that North Wellington will do better. Colonel Higginbotham can rest assured of the sympathy and assistance of his constituents, and whatever the result of the contest, the injustice he is now the victim of will only result in strengthening his strength in the Riding. As there was an unusually large gathering of Reformers, it was thought advisable to re-organize the officers of the Society, with the following result:— A. McElderry, President; B. Stevenson, Vice-President; John McLaren, Secretary; T. B. Patterson, Treasurer. The annual Meeting is to be held at Mount Forest, on the second Wednesday in January, 1873. Another meeting of the Executive Committee will be held on the call of the President, at an early day.

He was virtually born to the business of thread manufacture, his father having been engaged in that line in Paisley, Scotland. But the young inventor soon effected improvements that revolutionized the trade. He brought the process of manufacture to its present perfection and was the inventor of the process of winding it on spools for consumers. Like all inventors, Mr. Clark was a self-made man. He commenced business in a small room, but his improvements were so valuable that his business seemed only limited by the capacity to supply the demands of the consumers, and for years before his death he was at the head of the largest and most celebrated factory in the world. He was the means of converting his native Village of Paisley into a great and prosperous manufacturing centre. Mr. Clark a few years ago associated his son in the business, which is now continued under the name of J. Clark & Co., and its agencies are established all over the world—in Russia, Germany, France, and other parts of Europe, and in South America and the United States.

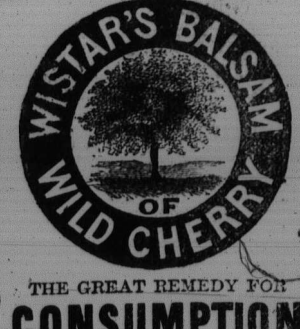
