

Advices say that Canadian barley is too high and that Western is plentiful and low. Dealers here are not buying. The drop of 16 to 18 cents during the past month seems to have floored them and they are doing nothing. To-day No. 3 was offering at 56 on the spot. There is an enquiry for No. 1, but there seems to be little of it in the farmers' hands; the stuff being delivered is low grades. Dealers want the farmers to stop deliveres to allow the market to steady.

Wheat here, out of symnathy with the WEDNESDAY EVENING, Dec. 5.

Wheat here, out of sympathy with the Chicago market, is firmer. A bid of \$1.18 was made on 'Change to-day for No. 1 Manitoba hard, but there is none of it in the market; if it were it would hardly bring that much, Street prices are firmer as a result of the retusal of farmers to sell at \$1 and therefore atopping deliveries. There is a feeling that the bottom has been reached and that the outlook is brighter.

Flour is no better. It is a most discouraging season for dealers. There is no demand; even the local business is not active. Millers are not ordering and will not look at offers, but they must be using up their stocks. It is expected that when the street market improves these will be a natural to the street market improves there will be an enquiry.

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
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
