Transactions on Local Stock Exchange aggregated 112 shares compared with 109 Saturday.

Imperial Bank stock was active and firm today, 10 shares selling at 105 1/2 and 1/4.

Bullion to the amount of \$300,000 was taken into Bank of England today on balance.

The first transaction in Bank of Toronto for some time was reported today. It was a sale of 8 shares at 215.

Most of the banks and some of the loan companies began paying their half-yearly dividends today.

A year ago to-day red winter wheat sold on street market at \$1.10, spring at \$1.10, 700 to 750 bushels at \$1.10, and at \$1.10 to \$1.15.

When it was in North Arthur 53,000 bushels compared with 52,500 a week ago; received during week 154,513 bushels, shipped 130,000.

One million in gold was taken in New York today for export. It is estimated that the total for the week will aggregate four or five million.

Canadian Pacific stock was easier in London today at the close, being quoted at 15 1/2 in New York. It sold in Montreal at 7 1/2, 7 3/4 and 7 1/2.

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Within the last two weeks the Bank of England has increased its gold by \$7,000,000 and the amount of its issue by \$20,000,000.

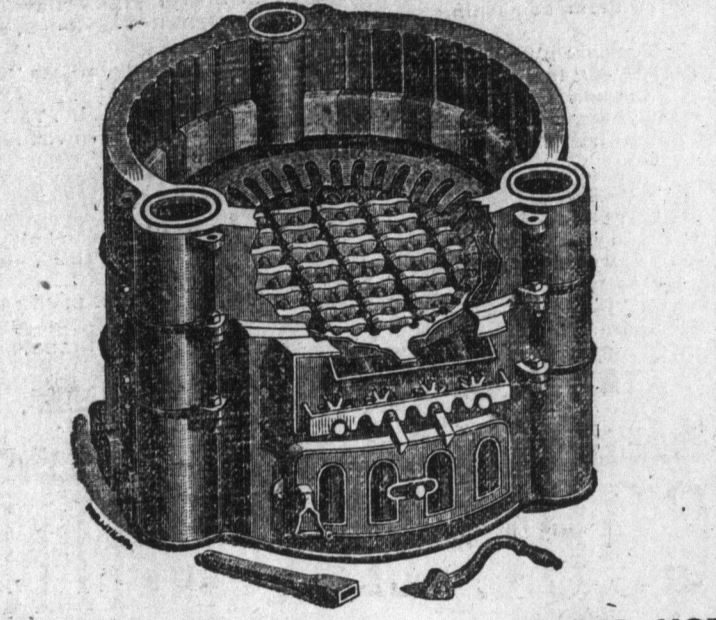
