BY BALLOON TO THE POLE

A 2,200-MILE RIDE IN THE SKY TO BEHRRING SOUND. Six Days and six Nights-Andre's Novel Airship will be operated on the New Plan Which Other Aeronauts Indorse.

S. A. Andre, the distinguished Swedish civil engineer and scientific aeronaut, will start next year on a balloon journey to the North Pole...

In a lecture before the Royal Swedish Academy recently Mr. Andre outlined his plans. He declared that the success of a balloon construction and of steering a balloon during the last four years has advanced so far as almost to solve the practicability of aerial navigation.

His plan is to establish headquarters at the Norwegian islands on the north-west coast of Spitzbergen. Here a house or shed of sufficient size to cover a balloon of 22 metres, or 72 feet, in diameter will be erected...

The greatest experts in the world on balloon construction and aerial voyages, the celebrated balloon manufacturer, the late L. Gabriel Yon, of Paris, in a letter to Mr. Andre in 1907, advised him to use a balloon of 22 metres in diameter, to be constructed of two-fold silk covers, and said that a balloon of this size and construction would float for thirty days without refilling.

An endorsement of Mr. Andre's plan is given by Alfred, Polesnikoff and Graham, who are well-known aeronauts, computed that the balloon would rise comparatively a small amount of gas in a month.

The gas used for balloons is now manufactured for sale and can be transported in 1,800 cylinders are sufficient to fill a polar balloon such as Mr. Andre will use...

The balloon under construction will be of such carrying power as to support a large, strongly built gondola. The gondola will contain a dark room for photographic purposes, a sleeping room for three persons, and will be provided with a system of sails for steering.

An interesting feature of the projected trip is that the balloon will not rise higher over the earth on an average than 850 feet. This will be accomplished by means of drag-lines, constructed of cocco fibre, thus permitting them to float on water.

The balloon will also be provided with a set of floats of free-acting ballast in lead. The object of these is that in case the balloon from some cause or other suddenly sinks to a great depth...

As soon as the ballast lines touches the ground the balloon will be relieved of its weight and the sinking will stop before the gondola touches the ground.

The journey, as now planned, will be in a direct line from Spitzbergen over the North Pole to Behring Sound, a distance of about 2,200 miles, and will, it is expected, occupy more than six days, which is a fifth part of the time the balloon can float without refilling.

Geographical and meteorological observations en route will be made by a competent scientist. Photographs will be taken of the country, as the balloon floats forward, and these will be taken in double sets. One set will be developed on board the balloon in case the travelers meet with accident and have to take to the gondola.

The total cost of the expedition will be about \$40,000, and this amount has already been subscribed. King Oscar of Sweden takes a great interest in the proposed balloon journey, and will no doubt materially aid Mr. Andre.

Baron Nordenskiold, the famous polar traveler and discoverer of the North-west Passage, has strongly recommended the expedition to the Royal Academy, and has stated the only practical way of reaching the North Pole is by means of a balloon.

From his large experience of polar and arctic meteorological conditions he is satisfied that Andre's plan will be successful. At the distance from Spitzbergen to the North Pole is only about seven hundred miles, with a south wind, the expedition should in a few hours see more of the polar regions than would be discovered in several centuries by old methods of exploration.

Dr. Vilhelm Bjerknes, one of the best informed meteorologists in Europe and one of the members of Swedish Spitzbergen expeditions in 1882-83, says that the wind currents are favorable during the summer months for a balloon voyage.

The only danger he fears is that of reaching the North Pole, or the other polar regions, a perfect calm may be found to prevail; but experience has proved that such a calm is usually surrounded by wind currents blowing outward.

Mr. Andre has a European reputation as a scientific aerial traveler. He is not an enthusiast, but a practical-headed man of science, who has made many experimental trips besides many

WHEN WOMEN GROW BALD

Partial baldness among women is painfully common although they have the advantage of being able to conceal the distressing fact better than men can. Generally the baldness comes where the hair has been worn in one way for many years, the straining of the roots and the use of many hairpins, as well as the overheating of the scalp because of the mass of hair piled upon it, being the reasons.

The motorman of an electric car doesn't need to be versed in physics to get practical illustrations of the laws that govern the workings of the subtle electric fluid. Any young student could readily explain how, why and when the motorman or conductor of an electric street car might expect to receive a sharp reminder of the fact that it was only partially curbing a great and invisible power.

The rope by means of which the conductor evades the trolley from the front to the back of the car at the end of each trip passes vertically down into the back of the car, where it can be handled with the greatest ease.

The water which runs off the trolley wheel and down the rope is heavily charged with electricity. It drips steadily on the floor of the car the work of the latter becomes gradually saturated and the electricity which is being carried by the rope to the car, standing on the wet platform the conductor himself may and often does, become slightly charged. This is illustrated in a mid way and occasionally quite strongly.

The motorman will give the passenger a little tingle and when a car has been out in the rain for some hours, the passenger's hair will be so saturated with electricity in taking the coin from the conductor, just as the student's hand is shocked when trying to remove the coin from a vessel of electrically charged water.

So charged do electric cars become that they are particularly when the wood is very dry and open, so that the water collects rapidly, that they can be drawn off and insulation restored.

There is no danger whatever in these shocks; they are slight, and will at most remind the passenger of his school days. It sometimes takes two or three days for the electricity to accumulate and a slight shock can be obtained by touching different metallic portions of the car.

The motorman may occasionally receive a more violent reminder of the fact that he is carrying a great deal of electricity. This was the case the other day during the storm, when a motorman was flung bodily back against the door of his car, and the car man called the crank with which the motorman cranks the current and obtains the power to be housed until the water on the brake. The latter is a ground wire. If the car is charged with electricity and the motorman simultaneously has received a forcible illustration of the resistance which his body offers to the passage of the electric current, he is shocked by another. It was in this way that the motorman was flung against the door.

Those who have had experience take the brake off first and then turn the controller in starting, or reverse the order of the operation in stopping.

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CRANK, BUT LIVED TO 140

An Eccentric St. Louis Doctor Nearly a Century and a Half Old Dies Suddenly. St. Louis, March 29.-Dr. W. Hotchkiss, alleged to have reached the age of 140 years, died suddenly yesterday at his home, No. 2004 Washington-avenue, of heart disease.

The deceased came to St. Louis 40 years ago and always been known as the "Color doctor." Dr. A. J. Buck says that his Masonic record has been traced back 100 years, showing conclusively that he was at least 121 years old. A letter received from his old home in Dinwiddie County, Va., over a year ago says he was born there in 1755, and lived there for a number of years, finally drifting west.

Dr. Hotchkiss possessed many striking peculiarities, among them being a natural aversion to water. He is said by those nearest to him to have not taken a bath for over 25 years.

He believed diseases were caused by the plus or minus rays of light, which the system absorbed in different quantities. In order to carry out this scheme he adorned himself with vari-colored strips of ribbon to keep himself in sympathy with his patients, each of whom he presented with a strip of cloth, of some particular color to wear while undergoing "treatment." He claimed to have discovered the ether vites.

The most notable thing about the spell of cold weather through which we have passed is its widespread intensity.
