The Man Who Believes Higginson Would Shoot Smith if it Came Handy.

New York, Dec. 6.—The Herald has the following special from Boston: The steamer Columbia, on which Mrs. Francis L. Higginson and James Woodland Smith are supposed to have supposed to have sailed on November 23, is reported to have arrived yesterday at Naples, but whether they landed there or not is not known.

"If Higginson should meet Smith in Boston, or anywhere in this country, I have no doubt he would shoot him," said a prominent bank president today. "He will not go to Europe to do it, however. I do not think he will disturb them if they do not cross his path. The story that he has \$100,000, I do not for a moment believe."

The implication that Higginson knew facts about his wife that made her depart from his house the only way to avoid disgrace within a month is also repeatedly denounced and pronounced inconsistent with what has occurred since her departure.

Had sisters in Canada.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Dec. 6.—A letter received in this city from the U. S. Naval Home in Philadelphia, which relates beyond a doubt the identity of the unfortunate man who threw himself from the Goat Island bridge about four weeks ago and was swept over the falls before the eyes of a score or more of horrified spectators. He was John Huff, not Buelle or Hoffman, as at first supposed, and had served 12 years in the United States Navy. He has sisters in Canada, whose whereabouts are unknown.

Stage Robbed Again.

Ashland, Ore., Dec. 6.—The Ager-Kiamath Falls stage was robbed yesterday for the eighth time within eight months. The stage was halted by a mounted highwayman, who ordered the driver to throw over the rail bags. After rifling these he relieved the sole passenger, a lady, of her purse and watch.

N.Y.C. Social Smoking Concert.

An Old Hermit Cremated.

Buffalo, Dec. 6.—A wretched frame built on the sea wall strip at the foot of Michigan-street, occupied by Matthew Shannon, an old hermit, was burned about 4 o'clock this morning. Shannon perished in the flames.

THE COST OF THE SCHOOLS.

The Civic Reform Committee Spends a Pleasant Hour or Two Discussing the Limits of Expenditure.

The Civic Reform Committee tackled their big task again yesterday. A subject that created considerable discussion was brought up by the following clause in the report:

"That the Mayor and City Treasurer, as representing the city, be ex-officio members of and have a voice in the preparation of the estimates of the Public and High School Boards; and the amount which both the Public and High School Boards can demand in any year be limited by statute, and not exceed a named rate on the dollar on the assessment of the municipality, as in the case of the Free Library."

It was almost the unanimous opinion that the Public and High Schools were altogether costing too much money.

T. W. Anglin said legislation should be asked for that would enable some one to represent the council of the school board, so that an effort could be made in some way to curtail the expenditure.

Ald. Joliffe's suggestion that an alderman from each ward should constitute a representation on the School Board was received with approval.

Ald. Italian said the enormous expenses for schools should be controlled in some way. He said that people should expect in a Public School an education that would fit them for the counting-house or any ordinary employment.

Dr. Goldwin Smith thought all that taxpayers should be called on to do was furnish a good sensible education. If the higher branches were required they should be paid for separately. He approved of the expenditure being limited in some way.

Ald. Sheppard spoke in the same strain, and thought the High Schools should be more self-supporting than the other schools.

Ald. McMurrich and Lamb spoke in favor of the School Board being allowed to run its own business. The question will be discussed by a sub-committee.

East Toronto.

On the decision of the School Board of East Toronto village to wait until next year before erecting a school building suitable to the wants of its growing population, a trouble arose with the architect, which has not yet been settled. His plans for a four-room section of a 12-room school were accepted by the Board, the understanding being that the cost of erection should not exceed \$8000. The lowest bidding tender received, however, was in the neighborhood of \$9000 and on the strength of the great discrepancy the Board returned the plans in question. In compensation the architect now asks for some \$400, but the Board thinks a tenth part of this sum is sufficient. The matter has been referred to arbitration.

Mr. M. P. McMaster, principal of the village public school, has been paid the \$30 balance of his account rendered for the month of November. The fall of 1894.

There was a meeting of the East Toronto council on the 16th inst., to receive the treasurer's report.

York Tolls.

County Solicitor C. C. Robinson, seen yesterday afternoon in the City and York Tolls, said that he looked for the decision of the Government within the next ten days, and that in the event of the removal of the gates it could be dealt with by the County Council at its January sitting.

Asked if he had not received warning from the City Solicitor that the market fees being levied were in violation of the ordinary law, Mr. Robinson replied that he had but that the position of the leases was terminable at any time by giving a month's notice.

The Nursing-at-home Meeting.

A nursing-at-home meeting was held yesterday afternoon in the Y.W.C.A. Mrs. Brodie, the president, in the chair. The receipts for the month of November were \$232.87, including a grant to the dispensary of \$200. Expenditures were \$182.67. Taking into account the dispensary grant, the statement shows quite a large deficit. The number of patients visited during the month was 248, and the number of visits made 382. Many cases of great destitution have been met with, and the ladies would be very much pleased to receive donations of Christmas presents, in order to cheer some of the many needy ones.

Swedish Town Burned.

Stockholm, Dec. 6.—The town of Mariestad has been virtually burned down by fire, which started yesterday evening and is still burning. The telegraph wires are all protruded and railway trains are unable to leave the town so that details are not readily obtainable and the houseless inhabitants had to take refuge in other places. The town has a population of about 3000, three-fourths of whom have already been rendered homeless.

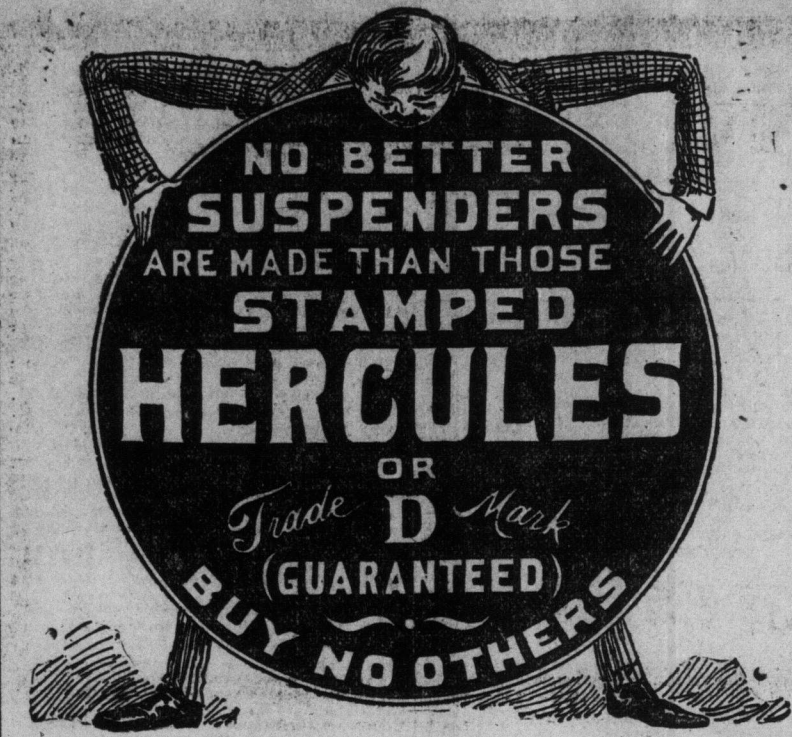

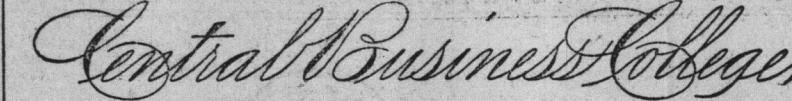

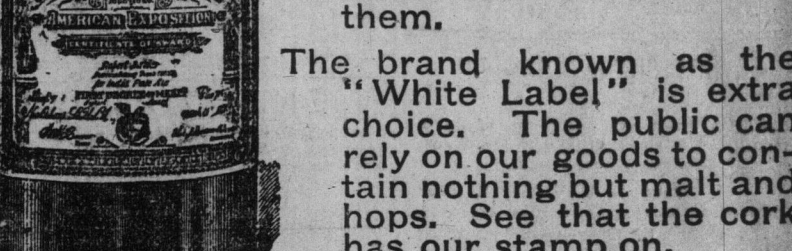
