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





He told of having seen groups of women out gathering weed stocks with which to cook their rice. They have no wood for heating, and none for fuel, not even bushes-just weed stocks, gathered laboriously from the countryside. He told how he saw dozens of human beings following the scrawny animals to pick up the droppings from those animals to be used for fuel. Think of a people reduced to such extremities. China


