

# A Brief Historical Sketch

The Land now occupied by the City of Brantford was originally owned by the Six Nation Indians, but was on April 19th, 1830, surrendered by them to the Government. The first lot was sold October 1st, 1830. The next lot sold was No. 16 on the north side of Colborne Street to Jedediah Jackson who was a great friend of the church. It was in an unfinished frame building on the east part of the lot that the church was first organized. This part of the lot is now occupied by Messrs Grafton & Co.

For several years a schoolhouse situated where the City Hall now stands, was the only public building in the village and was used for all manner of public and religious services. Brantford in 1833 had a population of not more than four or five hundred.

Rev. Wm. Rees, the first pastor of the church arrived in Brantford in August, 1833. One reason given why he chose Brantford was that while passing over the Grand River he looked into its clear waters and exclaimed "Oh, what a grand place for a Baptist Church." Before settling here he was offered a lot and a thousand dollar chapel if he would settle in Paris. He refused the offer with the remark that "I have consecrated my licand energy both of body and soul to God on the banks of the Grand River at Brantford and there I must go."

On the 23rd of December, 1833, a church of twenty-six members was regularly constituted

whose standing in society was equal to that of any denomination in the place.

The first clerk of the church was Deacon Pilsworth. The first to be immersed were Miles Shaw and wife in the Grand River near the Lorne Bridge. It was in the winter of 1883 and the ice was required to be cut. On March 5th, 1835, the pews in the church rented for six, eight and ten dollars. If two parties wanted the same pew the highest bid der got it. The first Baptist chapel in Brantford was erected in 1834.

In 1849 the Brantford Baptist Ludies Circle was formed,

During Dr. Davidson's pastorate the "Christian Messenger" now the "Canadian Baptist' wrs first published in Brantford. Editors, Dr. Davidson and R. W. Sawtell, Proprietor, Wm Winner.

The old First church was sold for \$1,200 and a new one built on the present site, which was destroyed by fire on Sunday, January 8th, 1857, after which the present building was built which is now fifty-seven years old. The tender for the brick work in the new church was only \$2,127.

God has greatly honored the faith of the men who planted the seed of this church. From it has sprung five other Baptist Churches in our city which has an aggregate membership of over 1,800 while the mother church which began eighty years ago with a membership of twenty-six members has now a membership of five hundred and fifty and hasto-day the best church auditorium and organ in the city. This church has ever stood for an Evangelical Ministry, for missionary, enterprise at

home and abroad and for the "Old Paths." To-day every department of work in a most healthful condition.

Among the great blessings God has lavished upon the church are the men and women who at different times have found a place in the membership. When one thinks of the old First Church they will always think of our late Deacon T. S. Shenstone, in whose bome, now our parsonage, the Baptist Foreign Mission Society was founded.

The Church has had in all fifteen pastors. five of them now living, namely: Dr. W. H. Porter Dr. T. S. Johnson, Dr. Spencer, Rev. S. J. Farmer, and Rev. Llewellyn Brown. The pastor who has served the church the longest was the Rev. S. J. Farmer, now of Regina, who was pastor for nine years and five months.

During the past eighty years the church has been true to the great principles which have made Baptists a distinctive people.

The Church forgetting the past, except to thankful for it's blessings and to profit by it's lesson, has her face towards the future. It is our ambition to excell in all things that are good.



Brantford Baptist began eighty years ago with twenty-six members and church property valued at \$1,200 and received aid from a Home Missionary Board.

To-day Brantford Baptists have six ordained Pastors and six Baptist Churches with a membership of over eighteen hundred (ore ir every fifteen of the population of Brantford is a Baptist) and church property valued at about \$140.000.00.

# Historical Notes

### 1884-Pastor Tuttle

SUNDAY. FEB. 13th. Pastor Tuttle announced that the Church was \$300 in arrears and asked the Church to raise same by voluntary subscription.

WEDNESDAY. FEB. 20th The annual business meeting was to have been held this evening but was postponed for two weeks owing to the sudden death of Mr. T. D. Crawford.

SUNDAY, MARCH 2nd. The annual letter from the Rev. A. U. Tinpany, of India, was read.

SUNDAY, APRIL 6th. The Deacons, Bros. J. N. Sheustone and L. Benedict were appointed to meet with other Baptist Churches to make arrangements for Cauadian Baptist Convention Meeting here in May.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 9. That our present mode of raising funds to meet expenses of Church by weekly offering be changed to pew rent to take effect on and after May 1st.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 30th. Delegates were appointed to meet with at the Westover Church at the ordination of Bro. Geo. Chittenden.

SUNDAY, SEPT. 21. Pastor Tuttle verbally tendered his resignation to take effect three months from date.

MONDAY, SEPT. 22. Resignation accepted same to take effect last Sunday in September.

SUNDAY, NOV.2. Deacon T. S. Shenstone in the chair Report of Pulpit Committee read asking the Church to extend a call to Rev. G. M. W. Carey, of Liverpool. Salary, \$1,500 per. annum.

The Evangelical Alliance of the City requested the Church to co-operate with them to stop the playing of Military Band upon the Public Streets on Sunday. The resolution was laid upon the table for a time.

On account of misunderstanding between Pastor and Deacons the following committee was appointed to gettle the dispute, each agreed to abide by the decision of the committee. Committee consisted as follows: For Pastor, Dr. Castle, Dr. Clark. J. Thomas, Dr. Dadson, all of Toronto. For Church, Messrs George Foster and Samuel Tapscott, of Park Baptist Church, and W. J. Copp, of Hamilton. The Committee asked the Church to give the Pastor the usual letter of dismissal to be addressed to the Brockville Raptist Church.

## 1885

JANUARY 20. That the resignation of Deacons T. S. Shenstone, John Harris, T. Dengate, S. Passmore, G. S. Winter be accepted. Moved and seconded. That the Managing Cemmittee have power to accept the resignation of all Doacons who have not, as yet, tendered theirs, and that the Church sanction same.

FEBRUARY 25. That Brethren John Harris, G. S. Winter, E. James, J. N. Shenstone be a Committee to

make a selection of a New Hymn Book.

STATE OF THE PARTY OF THE PARTY

MARCH I. Selection made was the Calvary Selection. Resolved that June 1st be the date the new book comes into use.

APRIL 14th. Rev. G. M. W. Carey was asked to reconsider his decision in reference to the call.

APRIL 22nd. Rev. G. M. W. Carey accepts the call.

MAY 22nd. Bro. J. R. Stillwell received by letter from Cheapside.

MAY 25th. Church erased from Church Roll one hundred and fourteen names.

JUNE 7th. Bro. John Harris gave the hand of fellowship to Rev. G. M. W. Carey and wife.

JUNE 22nd. Ordination of Bro. J. R. Stillwell was held in the Church.

SEPTEMBER 6th. The Church decided that the Wednesday evening Prayer Meeting commence at 8 p. m. instead of 7.30 p. m.

OCTOBER 28th. Pastor Carey and Bro. T. S.

Shenstone were appointed delegates to the ordination of Rev. T. W. Avauche, to India.

## 1886

FEBRUARY 7th. The Church raised Pastor Carey's salary to \$1,800.

JULY 10th. Pastor Carrey's salary again raised to \$2,000 to commence with June 1st, 1886.

NOVEMBER 3rd. Resolved that the Church Clerk be instructed to inform Messers Harley & Sweet that the Church acknowledges no account due to Rev. J. B. Tuttle, having his receipt in full and therefore they cannot accept the order in favor of Mr. Howie, which is to be thereby returned. Carried.

A committee of twenty ladies was appointed to arrange for the Tea Meeting,

JANUARY 12th. The following invitation was sent to every member of the Church:


## **Church Membership Social**

FEBRUARY 9th. Extract from Managing Committee's report at the Annual Meeting of the Church "One of our members, Mr. A. Harris, purchased the

lot on Pearl Street for the Church, also provided new heating system. The Church also contemplated extensive alterations to the interior and exterior of the church. A canvas of the members was taken to raise the total amount before proceeding, twenty of our members giving \$5,500. Total expenditure, \$6,500. Mr. A.

Murray received the contract for the building, \$2,352. Mr. Thomas Broughton, Architect.

SUNDAY, JUNE 19th. One lady and two gentlemen baptised in the Grand River by Pastor Carey on account of improvements going on in the church.

JUNE 22nd. The following delegates were appointed to sit in Council of Ordination of Brethren Davis, Laflame and Kennedy at Bloor Street Church, Toronto, July 4th and 5th. Pastor Carey, Brethren T. S. Shenstone, Dengate, A. Harris, George Chittenden.

## 1888

JANUARY 8th. Annual Business Meeting and Members' Social to be held February 8th, 1888. Cards of Invitation to be sert to every member of the Church.

FEBRUARY 5th. Special Services to be held in the Church by Rev. Jesse Gibson, of St. George, to begin February 20th, 1888.

FEBRUARY 8th. Annual Business Meeting held. Sunday School Report was read by Lloyd Harris, announcing to the Church that Mr. T. S. Shenstone had resigned the Superintendency of the Sunday School after a constant service of twenty eight years. Mr. Shenstone was presented with an address.

FEBRUARY 12. Pastor Carey laid before the Church two calls received by him, one from Jackson, Mich. and one from Florida and asked the Church whether they wanted him to make the change. The church by a unanimous standing vote voted for the Pastor to stay.

MARCH 13th. Moved by Mr. T. S. Shenstone, seconded by T. Large — Whereas the late Hon. Wm. McMaster by his Last Will and Testament bequeathed to the Baptist Denomination of Canada a sum of about one million dollars for the e-tablishment of a Art School to be under the said denomination and whereas the locality was by him left an open question for the denomination to decide, be it therefore resolved that it is the decided opinion of the First Baptist Church, Brantford, that the greatest good will result to the denomination at large and consequently the object of donor best secured, for the contemplated Art School to be located in the city of Toronto, the educational centre of the Province. Carried.

The following delegates were appointed to the Convention: Pastor Carey. Brethren A. Harris, .T S. Shenstone, Thos. Lange, C. F. Cot, J. B. Kitchen, J. N. Shenstone, Lloyd Harris, L. Benedict.

May 2nd. In future all applications for letters to join other Baptist churches in our city will be referred to an investigating committee.

JUNE 3. Pastor Carey was requested to have his sermon preached this morning published in the Canadian Baptist.

OCTOBER 25. Church received by the will of the late Andrew Mitchell the sum of two hundred dollars.

NOVEMBER 4. Pastor Carey read a letter from Will Winter applying for a license to preach. Request granted.

The ladies of the church protested against the discussion of financial matters on the Sabbath day. The church was six hundred dollars behind in running expenses. A committee of fourteen ladies was appointed to consider the financial state of the church.

DECEMBER 31. The ladies reported after a five weeks campaign that they had collected \$543.70.

## 1889

JANUARY 30, Trustees T. S. Shenstone and L. Benedict resigned because they objected to mortgaging the church property.

FEBRUARY 2. Church accepts a loan of \$2,000.00 at six per cent. from Mr. I. Cockshutt,

JUNE 5. Pastor G. M. W. Carey resigned.

SEPTEMBER - 4. Deacons G. S. Shenstone and Large were appointed delegates to the ordination of J. G. Brown, in Toronto, as a missionary to India.

## 1890

JANUARY 5. On account of having no ordained minister preaching for the church this morning, the ordinance of the Lord's Supper was postponed for one week.

JANUARY 19. Rev. T. S. Johnson, of London, was extended a call. Salary, \$1,500.

FEBRUARY 2. Rev. T. S. Johnson accepts call.

Total amount collected for the year \$6.185.89. Membership, \$480.

APRIL 8. Rev. A. E. De St. Almas extended a call as assistant pastor to have charge of b th missions,

salary \$900. Said Pastor to report to the church every three months as the work in both missions.

## 1891

JULY 1. Rev. A. E. De St. Almas resigned.

AUGUST 5. The North Star Mission asked permission to form a regular Baptist Church on Terrace Hill.

OCTOBER 20. The mission granted permission to form a Baptist Church on the following terms, (1) The church to send two deacons to administer the communion service. (2) That the mission organize and appoint their own officers.

NOVEMBER 11. The church agreed to lease Holme dale Mission to persons appointed for a term of ten years at \$100 per year during five years time. Bro. T. S. Shenstone became responsible for interest on the mortgage.

NOVEMBER 25. Annual Tea Meeting to be he January 1st, 1892. Admission, 25 cents.

DECEMBER 27. Bro. A. Harris offered to re-seat the church provided the members raised the floor and reduce the indebtedness \$1,000 during 1892. Carried with thanks.

## 1892

FEBRUARY 1. A Missionary Treasurer was appointed to receive all missionary money. First Treas. urer, Miss M. Winter.

The Poor Fund of the church was placed in the hands of the Ladies' Aid.

The church decided to introduce free will weekly offering instead of pew rent.

FEBRUARY 17. Members' Social held. Votes of Thanks were given to the following members: to Mrs. John Harris for presenting the church with our new organ; to Mr. A. Harris for presenting the church with new seats and new windows, to others whose names are not mentioned, for painting the interior of the auditorium.

Bro. J. N. Shenstone removed to Toronto.

JUNE 27. Fifty names dropped from church roll.

July 13. The Annual Convention of Ontario and Quebec asked to meet with us in October. Request granted. On account of the organ not working satisfactorally the Convention was transferred to Park Church.

DECEMBER 21. The church recommended that instead of holding an Annual Tea Meeting on January 1st, that we hold a Social for the members of the church and congregation and that a free will offering be taken for our Sunday School work. Carried.

## 1893

APRIL 13. Deacon S. Passmore made a life Deacon.

MAY 21. Extract from church letter: "Average at Church Services, 300. Average attendance at Prayer Meeting, 75, Total amount raised by church in 1892 \$6,743.95.

SEPTEMBER 20. On motion of Bro. T. S. Shenstone and Bro. A. Chittenden a resolution was passed disaproving of the gymnastical attractions that have recently been advertised by the Southern Fair Board, the same being characterized as immoral.

## 1894

Bro. John Widdup appointed Communion Card Steward

August 25. Forty-four names dropped from the church roll.

OCTOBER 31. Instead of giving two cents per member for Convention expenses the Secretary of the Convention was asked to send Year Books to be sold and proceeds to be forwarded for Convention expenses.

## 1895

JANUARY 6. The above motion was recinded anp the amount of two cents forwarded and the Year Books given away free of charge.

JANUARY 25. Church authorized Pastor Johnson to place our church at the disposal of Rev. E. P. Ham mond forspecial meeting.

JANUARY 31. Pastor Johnson and Mrs. Johnson entertained the church instead of having the Annual Church Social.

MAY 1. Organist Chas. Passmore resigned and W. Haddlesy was appointed organist at a salary of \$150.00

SUNDAY, AUG. 4. Pastor Johnson resigned after serving the church five and a half years.

August 14. Resignation not accepted and pastor asked to re-consider his resignation.

SEPTEMBER 1 Pastor Johnson thanked the church for the resolution but he had decided not to reconsider his resignation. Resignation accepted.

#### PASTOR SPENCER

OCTOBER 20. Rev. D. Spencer, of St. Thomas. extended a call at a salary of \$1,300 per annum.

OCTOBER 27. Rev. D. Spencer accepts the call and assumed charge November 20th, 1895.

Some of our members who died in 1895: Brethren T Broughton, T. S. Shenstone, and P. Handy.

## 1896

MARCH 11. Deacons recommended that the church grant Holmedale Mission \$100.00 to help pay the expenses of a student Pastor during the summer, namely Llewellyn Brown.

APRIL 8. Pastor Spencer granted leave of absence for two months to visit British Columbia.

MAY 20. Rev. W. H. Porter, of East Ward Church was granted such old windows as he may require and to Holmedale such old pews as they require.

SEPTEMBER 2. Deacons recommended the renovation of the basement at a cost of \$75.00 provided the Ladies Aid pay all costs.

OCTOBER 25. The thanks of the church was given to Mrs. A Popplewell for her kindness in giving new windows for the basement.

## 1897

JANUARY 20. Evangelist Hermiston was invited to hold special services in the church to begin February 7th, 1897.

MARCH 31. The church decided to hold the Lord's Supper twice a month, as follows: on the first Sunday is the month, in the morning: on the third Sunday in the month, in the evening.

OCTOBER 28. Mr. Henry Varley invited to hold special services in the church early in the new year.

## i 8 9 8

AUGUST 20. Pastor Spencer given a three months' leave of absence to go to British Columbia to superintend missions and Rev. W. Corkery, of Windsor, invited to supply during the Pastor's absence.

#### PASTOR SPENCER

## 1899

JANUARY 19. The Superintendent of the Sunday School and the Choir Leader were authorized to engage he services of the Darwen Orchestra for Sunday School and Sunday evening services.

APRIL 2. Pastor Spencer asked the church to try and reduce the church debt and offered to receive one hundred a year less for the above object.

SEPTEMBER 6. Bro. J. N. Shenstone presented the church with the North Star Mission groperty. 'The church accepted the property and expressed thanks to Bro. Shensione.

Nov. 1. Church Treasurer reported having received \$2.394.00 of the \$2,400 promised for the reduction of the church debt.

Rev. W. H. Porter was invited to take charge of Holmedale and North Star Missions.

NOVEMBER 5. The Deacons recommended that the church have an old time tea meeting on January 1st and 2nd. Tickets 25 cents for January 1st and Sunday School Scholars free, others fifteen cents for January 2nd.

## 1900

FEBRUARY 21. The following motion was carried: "That the Constitution as a whole be void and that we as a church of Believers in Christ adopt the spiritual rule of electing officers to serve the church as laid down in Acts 6. qualifications, Timothy, and that the church should elect their subordinate officers and appoint a general committee on the same night."

FEBRUARY 21. Deacon Thos Large was appointed a life deacon.

JUNE 1. Pastor Spencer resigned and the pastor was asked to reconsider.

JUNE 7. Resolution asking all who could not support the pastor to withdraw from church membership.

JUNE 13. Pastor Spencer's resignation accepted to take effect July 31st.

SEPTEMBER 12. The resolution of June 7th was recinded.

OCTOBER 3. Bro. John Widdup appointed trustee in place of the late Bro. A. Murray.

OCTOBER 31. Rev. S. J. Farmer, of Petrolia, was extended a call to the pastorate of the church at a salary of \$1,200.


DECEMBER 23. Rev. S. J. Farmer accepts the call and begins his pastorate to-day, December 23rd, 1900.

## 1901

JANUARY 2. Deacon C. Cook gave the hand of fellowship to Pastor Farmer and Mrs. Farmer.

JANUARY 27. Pastor Farmer and Brethren C. Cook and J. Widdup were appointed delegates to meet with the other Baptist Churches as to the advisability of organizing Eagle Place Mission into a regular Baptist Church.

OCTOBER 23. The church decided to hold a Sacred Concert and Organ Recital on Thursday evening to be conducted by Prof. A. S. Vogt, of Toronto. Admission 25 cents.

NOVENBER 17. In view of the fact that at the present time there exists a large deficit in the Treasury of the Foreign Mission Board it was decided that the church pledge ourselves to raise by special offering at least \$150,00.

## 1902

Church decided to hold its annual congregational social on January 22nd and a committee of thirteen ladies was appointed to manage the social.

The church accepted the following tenders: Chas. Duncan for earpet for aisles, choir platform, etc., \$193.00; McAdam and Bennett, to lay hardwood floor in auditorium, \$238.00.

JANUARY 31. W. Haddlesay resigned his position as organist. Resignation accepted and a committee of fourteen was appointed to deal with the whole choir matter.

FEBRUARY 19. Church decides to re-arrange our lighting system at a cost of fifty dollars and our old electric motor.

MARCH 9. Church appointed D. L. Wright as organist and choir leader at a salary of \$400.00 per year and the priviledge of giving two musical recitals each year for his own benefit.

Oct. 1. On recommendation of Pastor Farmer a committee of three was appointed to meet with delegates from other Baptist Churches in our city to have the oversight of different Baptist Missions in the city and vicinity.

## 1903

Rev. Paul Price was invited to hold special services in the church to begin March 10th or earlier if possible

JAN. 28. Annual Business meeting of the church was held. The ladies of the church were given a vote

of thanks for the bountiful tea they had provided. On recommendation of the Deacons twenty-five names were dropped from the church roll.

MARCH 25. A committee of thirteen was appointed to investigate the merits of the new Baptist Hymnal with a view to adopt it in all our services.

JULY 28. Pastor Farmer's salary was raised to \$1,300. On motion the church decided to repair the North Star Mission and to put the building in shape. One hundred and fifty dollars was voted to repair the church ceiling

Oct. 7. In view of the fact that our 70th Anniversary of the Church came this year it was decided to hold Anniversary Services the first Sunday in November Dr. Thomas was invited to preach on the occasion and on the following Monday a social gathering of the church and congregation be held.

Oct. 28. The above anniversary date was changed to the New Year, January 1st. 1904.

The Hymn Book Committee recommended that we adopt "The Baptist Hymnal."

Nov. 1. The church decided to ask Rev. T. T. Shields to assist Pastor Farmer in a series of special services, same to commence November 15th.

## 1904

FEB. 10. The North Star Mission was leased to Messrs Frank Foster, G. S. Winter, J. Ruddy, J. W. Pierce and E. Chalcraft, for a term of five years at \$1.00 per annum on the following conditions: (1) That all teaching in said mission be Baptistic in its nature. (2) All members of the Committee must be members of

some regular Baptist Church. (3) That the Committee keep building in repair and insured for \$1,000 in favor of First Church.

MARCH 3. Mrs. T. S. Shenstone died this morning.

March 16. Church decided to purchase the Shenstone home for a parsonage for the church for the sum of \$3,000, whereas the late Nr. A. Harris left a sum of \$2,000 in hands of Dr. Elmer Harris for the church, whereas the Shenstone family contributed \$300 towards the repairs of the parsonage. It was decided to apply the above on the purchase of the home and to give a mortgage of \$1,000 at five per cent for the balance. On motion a vote of thanks was tendered to Dr. Elmore Harris and the Shenstone Family for their generosity.

JUNE 11. The name of the North Star Mission was changed to Shenstore Memorial Church.

JULY 14. Pastor Farmer sailed for England through the generosity of some of our members.

AUGUST 3. Pastor Farmer returned from his trip to England.

Oct. 8. Mrs. John Harris died to-day.

Oct. 26. A resolution from Walmer Road Church, Toronto, was read, after hearing of the death of our beloved sister, Mrs. John Harris.

Nov. 6. Church decided to re-model our Sunday School Room at a cost of \$800.

Nov. 6. The church received \$600 from the executors of the estate of the late Mrs. John Hauris and that we gratefully acknowledge receipt of the bequest of the late esteemed sister, Mrs. John Harris.

DECEMBER 14. Bro. L. Benedict resigned his position as Church Treasurer and Dr. Harris Popplewell was appointed Church Treasurer.

## 1905

Mr. C. B. Hitchon resigned the Superintendancy of Holmedale Mission. A vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Hitchon for his long and faithful work in Holmedale. Eighteen names dropped from church roll.

MARCH 13. Bro. Frank Foster, of Park Church, was appointed Superintendent of Holmedale.

APRIL 2. Church decided to unite with the other Baptist Churches of the City in a Special Union Evangelical Meetings.

MAY 31. Twenty-two members were dismissed to form the Shenstone Memorial Church.

JUNE 21. A Musical Committee of three was appointed whose duties were to co-operate with the choir-leader and have full charge of the musical part of our services.

SEPTEMBER 5. Pastor Farmer and Deacon T. Large were appointed delegates to the recognition services of Shenstone Memorial Church.

## 1906

JANUARY 24. At the Annual Business Meeting of the Church the Deacons recommended the adoption of the Individual Communion Service.

Acting on the above suggestion one of our lady members presented the church with our present individual service.

In the Sunday School report the Treasurer reported hat the total amount collected for 1905 was \$298.32. The Secretary reported that the average attendance in 1905 was one hundred and seventy.

APRIL 25. The church adopted the report of the Trustees and Finance Committee re the alterations and repairs to church building. (No records to show what the repairs were.)

JUNE 3. On eccount of the removal and resignation of Deacon R. C. Passmore. Mr. Joel Dawson was selected to fill the vacancy.

## 1907

JANUARY 13. The Annual Business meeting of the church was held. Pastor Farmer's salary increased to \$1,500. Thirty-four names were dropped from church roll.

August 7. Holmedale Mission asked the church to repair the Mission to the extent of \$250. On recommendation of the trustees of the church the above request was granted on the following terms: (1) The church to give \$100; (2) The Mission Committee to raise \$150.

## 1908

JANUARY 15. At the Annual Meeting of the Church the deacons reported that the attendance at the morning service was large, but that the attendance at the evening service was small and asked the members to attend the evening services. Membership to date, 562. Total amount given to missions by the clurch in 1907, \$1.650.

APRIL I. The church adopted the weekly offering system for mission. Offering to be divided as follows: Home Mission twenty per cent. Western Missions. thirty-two per cent; Foreign Missions twenty-seven per cent.; Grand Ligne sixteen.; Local Foreign Work five per cent.

OCTOBER 15. - Nov. 3. Union Evangelistic services were held in the church comprising the Brant Avenue Methodist. St. Andrew's Presbyterian and First Baptist Rev. O. S. Grey, Speaker. Mr. C. H. Allen. Conductor of Music.

NOVEMBER 29. The Anniversary of the Church was celebrated Rev. John McNeil, of Walmer Street, Toronto, was the preacher.

On Mouday evening. November 30th, a big rally of the Baptist Young People of the city was held. Address by Rev. Chas Emerson.

On Wednesday evening. December 2nd, 1908, the Annual Church Social was held, addressed by several old members of the church. On Friday evening. December 4th, a lecture was given by Rev. O. S. Grey. Total membership at above date. 597.

## 1909

FEBRUARY 10. The late Maud Brown having left the Bible School the sum of \$150, the interest of which to be used for buying clothing, etc., for needy scholars of our school. The church agreed to hold the \$150 in trust and to pay the School interest at the rate of five per cent, per annum. The trustees appointed by our late sister were the Pastor of the Church and the Superintendent of the School.

MARCH 3. Mr. D. L. Wright resigned his position as organist and choir leader.

APRIL 9. A violent wind storm partially destroyed Holmedale Mission. The trustees of the church were authorized to repair said misaion at a cost of \$600.

JULY 28. Mr. Herbert Gee appointed organist and choir leader.

SEPT. 22. The Church decided that the time is not ripe for the launching of a Baptist Church of Canada. but decided if practicable a Board of Foreign Mission for all Canada would be very desirable, and also the publication of Canadian Sunday School supplies,

## 1910

JANUARY 18. Annual Meeting of the Church was held. Total amount raised, \$6,169.12, Total amount granted to missions \$2,994,80. Sixty-eight names dropped from church. Membership, 536.

APRIL 10. Pastor Farmer resigned as pastor of the church.

APRIL 13. At the request of the pastor no discussion was to take place and that his resignation be accepted. Resignation accepted to take effect May 8th, 1910: Pastor Farmer has the honor of serving the church longer than any former pastor, namely: nine years and five months.

"MAY ro. A Social Gathering was held to bid Pastor Farmer and Mrs. Farmer farewell. An address and presentation from the church was read to Pastor Farmer and Mrs. Farmer.

Nov. 30, A telegram was received by the church clerk announcing the death of Justin Farmer, eldest son of Rev. S. J. Farmer: the former pastor, was read to the church. The church forwarded a letter of condolence to Rev. S. J. Farmer and Mrs. Farmer and ordered flowers to be forwarded to Toronto to Mr. Farmer.

JUNE 28. Rev. T. Richards engaged as pastor for Holmedale Mission.

MAY 21. Church transferred the property of Shenstone Memorial Church, only, to said church, on the same conditions as named in the deed when the church received it from the donors.

MAY 2I. Church recognizes Holmedale Mission as a regular Baptist Church providing the Baptist Advisory Board endorses the same.

MAY 21, Trustees given power to sell the Pearl Street Property except the land needed for the sexton's house.

JUNE 12. Thirty-six letters were granted to form Holmedale Baptist Church, now Riverdale Church.




