BILL.

AN ACT to incorporate the members of the "Synod of the Diocese of Montreal," and to merge "The Church Society of the Diocese of Montreal" in such Synod.

WHEREAS, by virtue of the Act passed in the Session held in the 19th and 20th years of Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to enable the Members of the United Church of England and Ireland in Canada to meet in Synod," the Bishop, Clergy and Laity of the said Church, in the Diocese of Montreal, in this Province, were duly organized as a Synod, by the name of "The Synod of the Diocese of Montreal," and framed a Constitution, and made Canon Rules and Regulations, for the management and good government of the said Church in the said Diocese, and of its property and affairs, and it is expedient to incorporate the members of such Synod.

And whereas, within the said Diocese of Montreal, there exists an incorporated Society, known as "The Church Society of the Diocese of Montreal," duly incorporated as such under and by virtue of an Act passed in the Session held in the 14th and 15th years of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to provide for the establishment of a Church Society of the United Church of England and Ireland in each Diocese of that Church in Lower Canada, and for other purposes connected with the recent division of the Diocese of Quebec," and it is expedient to merge such Society in the said Synod; Her Majesty, therefore, enacts, &c.:

I. The Bishop, Clergy and Laity of the said Church, in the said Diocese, who presently are, and hereafter shall or may become members of the said Synod, shall be, and are hereby declared to be a Body Corporate and Politic, in name and in deed, by the name of "The Synod of the Diocese of Montreal," and by such name shall have a perpetual succession and a common seal, with power to change, alter, break, or make new the same, as often as they shall judge expedient, and they and their successors by the same name shall and may sue and be sued, implead and be impleaded, answer and be answered, in any Court of Record or other place of Judicature within this Province, or elsewhere; and they and their successors, by the name aforesaid, shall be able and capable in law, to purchase, take, have, hold, receive, enjoy, possess and retain, without license in Mortmain or *Lettres d'Amortissement* all messuages, lands, tenements and immovable property, money, goods, chattels and movable property, by any and every description of title, whether gift, purchase, devise, lease, or other description of title whatsoever; and the same to let, lease, mort-

gage, exchange, or otherwise alienate, subject and without prejudice to such Trusts as may be declared of and concerning the same in the title under which they are or may be held, and to do, perform and execute all and every lawful act and thing useful and necessary, for the purposes aforesaid, in as full and ample a manner, to all intents, constructions and purposes whatsoever as any other Body Politic or Corporate by law may or ought to be.

II. The said incorporated Synod shall have power from time to time to amend, repeal, or alter the present Constitution, Canons, Rules and Regulations of the aforesaid Synod, in such manner and to such extent as they may deem expedient; but, until so amended, repealed, or altered, the Constitution, Canons, Rules and Regulations of the said Synod presently subsisting and in force, shall be and continue to be the Constitutions, Canons, Rules and Regulations of the Corporation aforesaid, created by this Act.

III. From and after the passing of this Act, the aforesaid Corporation of "The Church Society of the Diocese of Montreal" shall be merged in the said Corporation of "The Synod of the Diocese of Montreal," and all messuages, lands, tenements and immovable property generally whatsoever, and all right, title and interest therein and thereto, and all money, debts, evidences of debt, goods, chattels, choses in action, and movable property generally whatsoever, and all right, title and interest therein and thereto, of every kind and description whatsoever, presently belonging to the said Church Society, or in the course of becoming so, shall, from and after the passing of this Act, be vested in, and be the absolute property of the said Synod, subject however, to the same trusts and conditions by which the same are held by the said Church Society; which trusts shall be executed by the said Synod; and from and after the passing of this Act, all the powers and privileges generally whatsoever of the said Church Society, from whatever source derived, shall be absolutely vested in the said Synod who shall thereupon be entitled to exercise the same, as fully and effectually to all intents and purposes whatsoever, as the said Church Society might or could exercise the same, if this Act had not been passed.

IV. All suits pending, or judgments rendered in the name of the said Church Society, may be continued, prosecuted and executed by and for the benefit of the said Synod, in the name of the said Church Society, as fully and effectually as if the same had originated and subsisted in the name of the said Synod itself.

V. This Act shall be a Public Act.

OPINION OF THE CHANCELLOR ON THE EFFECT OF THE
ACT OF PARLIAMENT.

MONTREAL, 5th March, 1868.

REV. AND DEAR SIR,

The following communications are submitted for the information of the Clergy:

The Amalgamation Bill, submitted to the Legislature of Quebec, by the Church Society of the Diocese of Montreal, and the Diocesan Synod, having become law, the Church Society has ceased to exist, and is now effectually merged in the Diocesan Synod.

The Synod, by the mere passing of the Act, has become vested with all the property of the Church Society, and entitled and bound to exercise all its powers and privileges, and to carry out all the trusts which the Society was bound to fulfil.

The Synod is now a Corporation, and its present Constitution, Canons, Rules, and Regulations are to continue in force until duly amended or repealed.

As the Synod is provided, under its Constitution, with Secretaries, a Treasurer, and a Registrar, it would seem that no practical difficulty can arise in carrying on the ordinary business heretofore managed by the Church Society, and specially so by its Secretary and Treasurer, until the Synod can lawfully meet and pass Regulations for the more efficient management of its affairs under the new organization.

Under the Constitution, the Synod cannot be lawfully summoned together earlier than the third Tuesday in June, except by the Bishop. The commissary has power to preside at meetings of the Synod, in the absence of the Bishop, but has no authority to summon the Synod to meet. Nothing, therefore, but business of an ordinary kind, such as the Secretary and Treasurer of the Church Society were in the habit of attending to, without special authority, can be done, until the needed regulations shall be in force. As I said before, however, I presume no practical difficulty will be encountered under such a state of things.

It will, however, be impracticable for me to discharge those duties, in consequence of my having accepted a call to another sphere of labour, which will necessitate in a short time my removal from this city. May I ask, then, that you, under these circumstances, will be so good as to perform those duties for me, so far as matters connected with the Church Society are concerned.

Prosper, O Lord, the labours of those Societies of the Church in the land of our Fathers, which Thou hast deigned to use in the promotion of this object, and which have nourished the Church in the Colonies; and bless in like manner with Thy Holy Spirit and Providential succour the Society in whose cause we are now met, and the undertaking which we have now in hand. Although the Church Society has ceased to exist, yet the following may be useful to the Synod when legislating for the incorporated Synod and is therefore printed.

CONSTITUTION

OF

The Church Society of the Diocese of Montreal.

INCORPORATED BY THE STATUTE OF CANADA, 14 AND 15 VICTORIA, CAP.
171, FOR PROMOTING THE FOLLOWING OBJECTS, VIZ:

1st.—The encouragement and support of Missionaries and Clergymen of the United Church of England and Ireland, within the Diocese of Montreal, including the creation of funds towards the augmentation of the Stipends of poor Clergymen; and towards making a provision for those who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, and for Widows and Orphans of the Clergy of the said Church in the said Diocese.

2nd.—Circulating in the said Diocese the Holy Scriptures, and such publications as have the sanction of the Church, viz.:—Prayer Books, Homilies, Catechisms, Collects, and Canons, with the addition of Books and Tracts circulated by the Society for Promoting Christian knowledge in London.

3rd.—Obtaining and granting aid towards the endowments of Parishes or Missions, according to the establishment of the said Church in the said Diocese, and the management of all matters relating to such endowments.

His Excellency the Governor-General, if a member of the Church of England, shall be requested to become the Patron of the Society.

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese of Montreal shall be the President of the Society, and shall be *ex-officio* Chairman of all meetings of the Society, and of all Committees thereof, at which he may be present. The Vice-Presidents shall consist of such Chairmen of the different District Associations of the Society as are hereinafter provided for, and such others as shall be nominated at the General Annual Meeting of the Society from among its members.

The PATRONAGE OF THE RECTORIES in this Diocese is by an Act of the Legislature (14 & 15 Vic : c. 175) and by recent act of Parliament now vested in the Synod.

At a general meeting, held on 5th October, 1852, it was resolved :—

Resolved,—That, in accordance with the terms of an Act passed, 14 & 15 Vict., c. 173, respecting the patronage of certain Rectories, established by letters patent in Canada, on a vacancy in any Rectory so established in the Diocese of Montreal, the Churchwardens of the Parish Church, having received notice of such vacancy from the Lord Bishop, shall proceed to summon a meeting of the Vestry, as constituted under the Church Temporalities Act, (notice of such intended meeting having been affixed to the door of the Church on two previous Sundays,) for the purpose of choosing two or more Clergymen, in priests' Orders, whose names shall be forthwith returned to the Bishop, in order that his Lordship may, if they shall be found otherwise canonically qualified, select one of them for institution to the said Rectory ; and no informality in the manner of choosing such Clergymen by the Vestry, shall invalidate the institution, unless notice in writing shall have been sent to the Bishop, or his Commissary, within twenty-one days from the date of the nomination. But if no such nomination shall be made by the vestry, and returned to the Bishop, or his Commissary, within three calendar months from the date of notice of the vacancy sent to the Church-wardens, then the right of presenting an Incumbent or Minister to the said vacant Rectory, shall rest absolutely with the Bishop.

No public meeting was held in January. The Metropolitan and Central Board, deeming it expedient under existing circumstances to postpone the Public meeting until June.

The annual business meeting was held in the Cathedral School Room Tuesday 21st.

CHURCH SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

The Annual Business Meeting of the Church Society of the Diocese of Montreal was held in the Cathedral School Room at noon on Tuesday last, the VERY REV. THE DEAN in the Chair. By the request of the Chairman, the Secretary, Rev. CANON BALCH, D.D., opened the meeting with prayer.

The DEAN suggested that it might be advisable, in view of the proposed amalgamation of the Church Society with the Diocesan Synod, which would probably be effected in June next, to re-elect the officers of this Society until that time.

Rev. CANON BANCROFT, D.D., moved, seconded by Rev. Mr. LONSDALE, "That the various office-bearers be requested to continue in office until that time, which was carried.

THE DEAN explained that in consequence of the absence of His Lordship the Metropolitan in England, and for other reasons, the Annual Public Meeting of the Society would not take place this year until Easter. The Annual Report, however, would now be read by the Secretary.

REV. CANON BALCH read the Report, which is as follows,—the Treasurer's Statement being read in its proper place by Mr. James Hutton:—

The Central Board of the Diocesan Church Society in presenting their Seventeenth Annual Report, do so with a devout expression of gratitude to God, for the blessings which He has graciously vouchsafed to the Society, during the year that is past.

The Officers of the Society and the Missionaries in the field, in good health, with diligence and fidelity, have discharged their respective duties.

The reports of the Diocesan Clergy are herewith submitted, giving details full of interest to every member of the Church.

Before making the analysis of those reports, or indicating the work which lies before us for the coming year, there are one or two matters of special interest which demand attention.

We are again deprived by absence of the wise counsel and hearty sympathy of our venerated and beloved Bishop. But our loss is the Church's gain, in other directions. The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, to which the Colonial Church owes a debt of gratitude lasting as time itself, has availed herself of the Metro-

politan's presence in England, to obtain his valuable aid, by sermons, public addresses, and more private efforts, to enlarge the Society's revenue, and to increase her efficiency. Our Bishop is thus paying back, part of the debt, which the Church in Canada owes to the Church at Home.

The important part he has taken in the late Council of Lambeth should also reconcile us to the loss we sustain by his absence. The real bearing and abiding effects of that great Synod of the Church, cannot, for some years to come, be duly estimated. Time must be allowed for the moral forces gathered in the Council of the 19th century to work out their legitimate effects. Of one thing we may rest assured—the unity of the Church will be strengthened, and its missionary life, be increased by that Synod.

Before long his work in England ended, we hope to welcome to his Diocese our Bishop and his amiable wife, whose grace and affability made the See House so pleasant to the Clergy—and for whose continued health and happiness they sincerely pray.

Another fact of special interest is this: We meet to-day as the Church Society of the Diocese of Montreal for the last time. The Act of Parliament incorporating the Synod of the Diocese and the Church Society into one corporation, is now, or will be soon, in force. Henceforth, with every right, immunity and privilege of each separate corporation carefully preserved in the new, but with superadded facilities for good, we shall occupy, we trust, an enlarged sphere of usefulness.

INCOME AND EXPENDITURE.

The grants in 1867 in excess of those of 1866, and the decrease of income from some Parishes and Stations, together with the ordinary expenses, leave a balance due the Treasurer of \$1140 65

All the Parishes and Stations visited by the Secretary, increased their collections, some of them, largely. This abstract is not complete, because all the returns have not been made. The Treasurer and Secretary will make a thorough analysis of the reports of both years, and in the printed report furnish the Church with all the information which may be desired.*

We come now to the question,—What shall we do for the better support of missions?

Look at the facts for a moment. Facts are said to be the foot-prints of God,—their logic is the voice of God.

If in obedience to the Divine command, the Gospel is preached to every creature, so far as the Dominion and the British Provinces in North America are concerned, the ten dioceses now erected within its borders must do the work, and the Metropolitan Diocese of Montreal must do her fair share of it. God requires this at our hands, because He put us here, and gave us the ability to do the work.—Ability and opportunity are God's command in Providence.

Without anticipating what properly belongs to, and must in time become the work of a general Missionary Society of British North America, let us confine our attention to the Diocese of Montreal, and let us try and combine the thoroughness of spade culture, with the broad furrow of the plough. After careful consideration by the late Secretary and the Treasurer, they estimate that 20,000 persons belong to the Church in this Diocese. By the Chancellor of the Diocese, after investigation made by him, the number is supposed to be still greater. On consulting the statistical work of Mr. Lowe, the Year Book, we find it stated that the Church of England in Quebec, formerly (Lower Canada,) contains 63,487 members. We have no means of ascertaining what proportion of this number belong to the Diocese of Montreal; but we are safe in assuming that the Church population is 20,000. The probability is, that it is much greater; and this, of course, would, for all the purposes of our argument, make every point taken still stronger, and the conclusion more safe and reliable.

* The publication of the Journal has been delayed in order to complete the analysis, but up to the present date, March 23rd, only a few replies to the circular have been received. If all are received in time it will be given in a supplementary report at the meeting of the Synod in June.

These 20,000 persons are, by God's command, in their several degrees and stations, entrusted with the work of maintaining the Church for themselves, and extending its blessings to those who are destitute of the means of grace.

This requires money and personal labour. By the Lord's ordinance, Himself the great missionary, missions are just, righteous, holy works. They honour God and bless man. They are not gratuitous acts of pity, but high and noble acts of duty; the highest and noblest work man can do—angels would be honoured by discharging it,—angels and archangels have been employed in some of its subordinate functions.

We show our appreciation of missions by the labour we bestow and the money we give, and the prayers we offer.

Our present income, by which we mean moneys given to the Board to distribute, is \$5,391. When a parish or station gives money to build a fence, paint the church, put up an organ, or pay their clergyman, they are all part of the duty of maintaining the Church, and are good works, but begin and terminate in themselves. What we now speak of relates to missions in their proper sense, and the amount is \$5,391. Shall we go on as we have done? doing no more, attempting no more? That is impossible. Our income from the S. P. G. is every year becoming less; soon it may cease altogether. On the other hand, the number of stations and places demanding missionary labour in the Diocese is increasing, and the faithful men now in the field are not half supported as they should be. The Board, feeling this pressure, have voted more money than they have in hand, and hence the deficit in the treasury.

What shall we do? Go backwards and retrench, stand still and struggle to keep from sinking, or go forward, and with bold and determined effort win conquests for our master? Forward is the word. The Church is aggressive, and must be if she is a living Church. To retreat and retrench, is voluntary decay. To aim only at maintaining present status, is to ensure feebleness of heart and effort, if not actual paralysis. Life, growth and success with God's blessing attach to the onward policy—(Ex. 14, 15).

The Board have no radical changes to propose. The plans now in operation are, so far as they go, good, especially those in charge of the Daughters of the Church. What we need is, more work, and more frequent work. Where one cent has been given, to see that two are hereafter given, where it has been given once a year, to see that it is given twice or four times,—better still, weekly. Frequent Ruri-decanal meetings pervaded by the missionary ele-

ment; visits of the Secretary, under the direction of the Rector or Incumbent, circulating Missionary information; over all, the watchful eye and wise counsel of the Bishop, giving unity and force to every effort, strengthening the weak, directing the powerful. These and kindred efforts, combined, determined, persevering, must, with God's blessing, train up a generation of Churchmen, who will not lean upon the S. P. G., or any external aid; but will bless God for the courage to be self-reliant, and to live and labour for Him; and joyfully to take even the spoiling of their goods for the Church's sake.

Our present income from all sources is about \$6,000, not equal to three-fourths of a cent per week for each of the 20,000 Church people. Now if one person, one family, one parish, can, by proper exertions, be brought to see the claims of the Missions in their just light, so as to feel it a privilege as well as a duty, to give an average of at least 10 cents per week, 2 persons, 2 families, 2 parishes may be induced to do the same. If the obligation and duty or privilege rest on one, they do equally on all. Why not attempt to bring the whole Church up to the same standard? It has been done and far beyond this minimum, by others,—why not by us?

Suppose it is some trouble? To do without the means of grace involves greater troubles. It is not our way,—granted,—and if our way is a poor way of doing things, the sooner we abandon it for a wiser, the better. It is impracticable, says another. This depends on the light in which we regard, and the mode in which we attempt it. Suppose a man wishes to get from the 1st to the 2nd story of a house. If he folds his arms in despair and says it is impracticable—he will not attempt it. This is a wrong way of regarding the matter. Suppose he tries with one step to go from the bottom to the top of the stairs he will find this is a wrong way of doing it, but if he take one step at a time and keep on, he lands at the top, securely and easily. So of this work. Let us take one step at a time. The first step is to satisfy ourselves what is the right thing to do—the next is to persuade others to be of the same mind, and so on until full success crown our efforts. Or suppose you go to a labouring man or a laundress, and ask for 50 cents for the Church, probably they will say, it is beyond their means. Go on Monday and ask for one cent and who will refuse, and so of each Monday, and this one cent alone given by the 20,000 weekly would yield \$10,000 per annum, instead of the \$6,000 we now receive, and no one would feel the burden. But is it our aim to give to God what costs us nothing? Do we wish for a standard so low, that the

recommendation of any plan is, that nobody feels the tax ? Surely not.

But it is a new plan, says another of these objectors—who are powerful to obstruct, but feeble to help on Missions. The allegation is not correct, the plan is not new. It is as old as Christianity itself, it is the Apostles' way, it is the Bible's plan. "Let every one of you upon the first day of the week, lay by him in store, as God hath prospered him."—(1 Cor. xvi. 2.)

We admit that novelties in religion are dangerous in proportion as they are new—and whilst the world has improved in science and art, she cannot improve the Church or the Sacraments, God has folded up in the book of creation, wonderful secrets and facts to reward the study and toil of man. The mariner's compass, the electric cable, and the steam engine, were in their elements and powers in the Garden of Eden. But thousands of years elapsed before men reaped their manifold benefits. Not so with Revelation. Its truth and facts come from God, perfect and complete. Not a principle essential to the Church, but may be found in Revelation. Its orders and ordinances, its growth and work—motives, rewards and principles of Missions, all are in the Book. Weekly offerings, systematic, habitual giving, working, praying. Neither has modern piety been able to devise a better mode of maintaining Missions, than the weekly offerings enjoined in the Scriptures. [The Romanists and the Methodists have practically found its value.] We have recognized it in previous reports, in resolutions, speeches and boxes. The late Judge McCord, several years since, urged the weekly offering and the minimum average of 5 cents. But the Church has reduced it to practice only on a limited scale, and in a partial manner. To give it a fair trial we must have living personal agency. The Secretary must be ready at all times when directed by the Bishop or requested by the clergy, to give his aid, in such a manner as they deem best. The laity must be taught that they have a share in this work, by the Lord's own appointment. The children of the Sunday School and Parochial School must, with line upon line, and precept on precept, be fed on Missionary food. The Missionary box should be a household fixture, a recognized necessity of every churchman's home. Let us avow distinctly and boldly, that we mean no half-way measures, but thorough work, growing and increasing work ; work that will honour God and bless man.

Others have done so and succeeded. We can do so and succeed. But there must be nothing indefinite. Let us propose a clear,

distinct and practicable object. We must attempt great things, if we would accomplish them. No man and no Church achieves such results by accident. They must be sharply and strongly defined. Difficulties we expect. If there were none where would be the test of our faith, or proof of our love? Difficulties are generally in proportion to the greatness of the work to be accomplished. And the danger we have to guard against, is that of believing difficulties insuperable, which only require a resolute effort to conquer. Now what we propose for the coming year of our new organisation, is to make the minimum average of contribution for each of the 20,000 persons belonging to the Church, at 10 cents weekly. What the Board asks every member of the Synod to do—what, in fact, is the great work to be accomplished for the steady, enlarged and successful working of missions, is to establish as a minimum rate of average contribution for the 20,000 Church people of this Diocese not less than 10 cents per week. This is a definite object for every clergyman to set before himself and his people. He may work it in any mode he and his vestry and people may think best; but the Board asks, as the Church's agent, with the known sanction of our Bishop, for every such earnest effort, with the solemn conviction pressing on our consciences, that we must come to some such result if we would prosper and have the Lord's blessing, with a firm belief that it is a plan wise, feasible and full of promise for good to the whole Church,—the beginning and earnest of greater things,—the Bible plan of supporting missions. The primitive Christians sold all they had and laid the price of their possessions at the apostles' feet, so that distribution of food and raiment might be made to their poorer brethren.

God asks us to give living bread to the soul, and what is our response so far as such gifts are concerned? Hardly a cent a week, although God feeds us three times a day, though His angels are ministering spirits about our paths, though He gave His son to redeem us by the sacrifice of Calvary, though His throne of grace is ever accessible to our wants, and sorrows and sins; though He gives us the consolations of the Gospel in this world and the mansions of bliss in the next,—in return for all this, as a Church, as a people highly favoured in every respect; politically, with a beneficent Government; socially, with every blessing we could reasonably ask; and spiritually, with a pure Apostolic Church; what is the measure of the proof which, of all proofs, God most esteems as the daily evidence of our devotion and grateful acknowledgment for all these blessings? Little more than three-fourths of one cent

given weekly by these 20,000 baptized children of God. Do we then ask too much? Is it a heavy burden, grievous to be borne, when we ask that our minimum average hereafter shall be at least ten cents weekly? We do not take the Law's standard and ask a tenth of the whole income. Ten cents a week is but \$5.20 per annum. Will any person be oppressed by such a measure? And yet, this would swell our income to over \$100,000. It would support decently the Missionaries now in the field, and would make the minimum stipend of a single Clergyman about \$700, and that of a married Clergymen not less than \$1,000 per annum. It would double the stations, and enable the Bishop to plant a Church wherever and whenever needed. What is more, it would far more than double the ability of the Church to obey her Lord's command, "for look," says Scripture, "what a man layeth out, it shall be paid him again, God will be no man's debtor." "There is that scattereth, and yet increaseth."

The Board will close their Report by reminding the Clergy who occupy the smaller stations, the outlying posts of the camp of Israel, how important to the safety and success of the great cause of missions it is, that those posts should be held by able and faithful men. They may appear small and comparatively unimportant. The work done may not, in the annual report, swell out in numbers or amounts; but this is no sound rule of judgment. The Redeemer had but one solitary woman as a congregation when he preached the glorious sermon of the water of life; three disciples only were present when Moses and Elias talked with Christ on the Mount; the infant Church, twelve in number, were in the barque, when He walked on the waters and calmed their fears. Mary alone was proxy for the human race to welcome the risen King on the morning of His resurrection, and the Judge of all the earth declared of the widow's gift, she hath cast in more than they all. Numbers and amounts are no necessary or infallible elements of just calculation in that kingdom which Christ says, is not of this world. But the rule is thus: "she hath done what she could"—"she hath cast in her all." The humble missionary who in the Gatineau or the Townships in winter's cold and summer's heat, faithful, loving, untiring, does and gives all he can, is equally near and dear to the Saviour, as if he ministered in the glorious Abbey or crowded Cathedral of St. Paul. In proposing a minimum limit of average contribution for the coming year, the Board are satisfied it is one quite within the power of any station, and a much larger average should be attempted by many of the parishes, and with these suggestions they beg leave to surrender their trust, and earnestly

pray that under our new organization, liberal things will be devised, and so by liberal things shall we stand.

REV. CANON BALCH explained that it was proposed to analyze the sources of revenue of the Society during the past year. Some parishes had largely increased their contributions, and yet there was a deficiency, which must come from somewhere. It was proposed to ascertain how this arose, so that an exact statement of the deficiency might be laid before the Society.

VEN. ARCHDEACON LEACH would move that the Report be adopted, and—since it seemed particularly well calculated to have a beneficial effect upon the finances of the Church—that it be printed and circulated.

REV. GEO. SLACK, Rural Dean of Bedford, seconded the motion. He was sure that they must all have listened to it with deep satisfaction, and nothing could do more good than its circulation. He felt a good deal of diffidence in differing from the Secretary in regard to the average which he had placed before the people.

REV. CANON BOND said that the suggestions contained in the report had frequently been thrown out, but had never before been demonstrated as feasible, and therefore had not been acted upon. He suggested that the part of the report which had been read should be printed apart from the details, and extensively circulated.

VEN. ARCHDEACON LEACH agreed to amend his motion in this sense, and it was then carried.

The SECRETARY explained that there was no report from the Mission Board, because all the returns had not been sent in.

On motion of the Rev. J. B. DAVIDSON, seconded by the Rev. CANON BANCROFT, it was

Resolved, "That the Secretary be respectfully requested to connect with the recommendation of 5 or 10 cents weekly contribution, a further recommendation that Auxiliary Church Aid Associations be formed in every Parish or country station with suitable officers, to carry the plan into execution, and that the Secretary thereof be requested to report progress to the Central office, and transmit contributions at least once in three months." Adopted.

After the reception and reference of the Rev. R. Lindsay's report on the "Sustentation Fund" and the transaction of some other business, the Society, on motion of the Rev. G. Slack, seconded by Major Campbell, unanimously instructed the Secretary to enter on the record of the Church Society, a suitable resolution, expressing its sense of the loss sustained by the Church in the death of the late Presiding Bishop of the Church in the U. S. and to transmit a copy of the same to the family of the deceased; and then, the meeting was closed by the Very Rev. the DEAN, who pronounced the Benediction.

DEANERY OF BEDFORD.

ABBOTSFORD, ROUGEMONT, AND MILTON.

REV. F. ROBINSON reports that, although he has not yet received full returns he is confident that a detailed financial statement would show an aggregate income, for the whole Mission, during the past year, of five hundred dollars, including interest on the Endowment Fund, and \$140, raised and expended in the erection of a Horse Shed at Abbotsford.

Much to the regret of the Incumbent and Congregation of Rougemont, the labours of the Rev. C. F. Thorndike, at that place, were discontinued in July last, and the Sunday duty there has again wholly fallen upon the hands of the Incumbent.

The Rev. Mr. Thorndike was unwearied in his labours, and especially amongst the younger members of the Congregation, who all entertain a grateful and affectionate remembrance of his faithfulness and kindness towards them.

In August last, by appointment of the Bishop, the Rev. A. O. Taylor removed from the Deanery of St. Andrews, to Milton in this Deanery, where he is labouring faithfully, as well as at St. Hyacinthe and South Roxton, in which places he holds services on alternate Sundays.

It is pleasing to state that Mr. Philip Norman of St. Simon has signified his intention of contributing one hundred dollars towards creating an Endowment Fund at St. Hyacinthe, or increasing the Fund at Abbotsford, as may be hereafter found most desirable.

Mrs. H. Robinson, (of Waterloo), has placed at the disposal of the Incumbent of this Mission the sum of one hundred dollars towards increasing the Endowment Funds of Abbotsford and Rougemont.

The Rev. E. J. FESSENDEN writes:—The Church's work in this part of the Mission of Potton and Bolton has suffered during the last two years from serious "lets and hindrances." The new Church in East Bolton remains still unconsecrated. There has been as yet no confirmation held amongst us, and, owing to your Missionary being in Deacon's orders, the Holy Communion has been administered at rare and uncertain intervals. Still, we are able, through God's blessing on work thus imperfectly done in His name, to report that our Congregations have steadily increased,

and that several heads of families have been added to the Church. A Parsonage, with a glebe of two and three-fourth acres, through the praiseworthy zeal and liberality of the people of Willard's Mills, has been purchased in their village, which is about equidistant from the Churches of East and South Bolton. In East Bolton a very fine cabinet Organ, costing \$123, has been purchased and placed in the Church. The Organ, during the past year, has been played by Miss Annis Randal, a young girl, to whom the Congregation owes many thanks; and I would also say, that the melodeon of John Hall, Esq., is now played by his son, John Hall, jun., in our services at Willard's Mills. Heretofore our services in this place have been, for the most part, without music or singing.

The basement has been made habitable, chiefly with funds which they had on hand, at an expense to them of \$110; and we have commenced to take advantage of that great accommodation by the holding of Penny Readings therein, which we hope to continue every Thursday p.m. through the winter. During the year we have commenced the nucleus of a Parish Library, which numbers nearly 200 volumes, and which places within the reach of the parishioners, at a very cheap rate, an amount of valuable reading not otherwise to be had. To Mrs. Lowe, of Montreal, we are indebted for a donation of useful books towards the Library. The young members of the Congregation have erected a new fence to the Rectory, and also paid for a book-case for the Rector's use, both at a cost of \$45.77. In material things, then, we have made considerable progress, for our church is now very church-like and respectable, and all that we need to make the facilities and conveniences which we possess honorable to God and real blessings to ourselves, is a more bounteous supply of divine grace. May it come down upon both priest and people—yea, as "rain upon the mown grass." Many thanks to the kind Collectors for their interest in the Society's work, and, not least, to the Organist and the other members of the Choir, who have given us their valuable assistance.

FRELIGHSBURG.

The Rev. J. BURROWS DAVIDSON writes :

The amounts actually paid this year surpass those of any previous one in the history of this parish, excepting, perhaps, the contributions towards the Church itself at its erection. The finest organ out of the cities, in Lower Canada, now adorns our ancient temple, and more suitably enables each worshipper worthily to render our weekly sacrifices of praise and thanksgiving, as we sing with the assistance of such lofty melody to the Lord. This, with attendant improvements in the chancel, involved an outlay of about \$1100. The fences of the Churchyard have been almost entirely renewed, at considerable cost; and God's acre, and the entire Church enclosure, present no longer a dilapidated and decaying appearance, but rather one of neatness and taste, indicative alike of life and godliness. We most thankfully record the desire thus manifested in really liberal and Christian hearted contributions to "do good" and to be "rich in good works" — showing in this practical way an appreciation of that blessing of the Lord which alone maketh rich. We trust too that these material improvements are not unaccompanied with those constant renewings of God's Holy Spirit, whereby the spiritual members of the Fold are to be continually advancing in the acquisition of the virtues and graces of our Holy Faith "to the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ." Notwithstanding these large disbursements in the Parish, it is a matter of particular gratification that the sum total of our aid to the Church Society is in excess of last year, as will be seen from the amount paid in towards the Rector's stipend. Some are slow to learn "that they who preach the Gospel live of the Gospel." Too long assistance and freedom from an imperative duty have so blunted their perceptions, that it appears almost hopeless to bring the principles of honour and justice of ordinary life to bear upon the maintenance of the spiritual labourer. So called self-sustaining Rural Parishes seem to imply the complement, at least in part, of self-existing Rectors. The Future of this Parish in this respect is somewhat brightened by the fact that in another year from next March the endowment notes will be paid, after which the investment of the same will bring in some definite quarterly income, through which support will be rendered less precarious than entire dependence upon forgetful voluntary contributors. To the credit of a few of our most noble and generous members be it said that they fully exemplify the prompt and

cheerful giver. The Rector again acknowledges many special acts of kindness. On review of the general prosperity, vouchsafed from on High, we would raise our Ebenezer and say with deep gratitude "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us." We thank God and take courage. May every successive year only add to the fair records of the past.

The Rev. E. H. JENKYNs writes:—This circular was misssent by being forwarded to Dunham instead of Mansonville, P Q, and consequently did not come to hand until Monday, December 23rd. I had spoken to the Churchwardens upon the question of making their annual collections for the Church Society, &c., but they advised me to put it off until the spring, when the collections would be greater. I was not aware then that the yearly accounts of the Society would be made up by the 21st January.

The statement, therefore, under the circumstances is, that they have subscribed \$100 towards the clergyman's salary, and \$25 have been expended in the repairs of the Church. The Church at East Bolton has also purchased a new bell, at the cost of \$225.

SOUTH STUKELY.

The works of our hands have been prospered during the past year, results have been attained that call forth devout acknowledgment to Almighty God for His blessing on our humble labours.

The church at Abercorn is completed, except the bell-turret, and was opened for divine worship on the 10th July last, upon which date two years had elapsed since the laying of the corner stone. It was a day of grateful interest to the friends of the church, who have struggled through all difficulties and succeeded in erecting an edifice creditable to their zeal and energy. The sermon was preached by the Rural Dean, Rev. G. Slack, the following clergymen also took part in the services: the Revs. Canon Street of Chicago, F. Wadleigh, Rector of Berkshire, Vermont, R. Lindsay, J. B. Davidson, T. Mussen, and your missionary. The occasion was edifying and impressive, the large congregation manifesting a deep interest in the services of our Zion. A harvest home festival was held in the month of October, the proceeds of which enabled the ladies of the congregation to make a payment of \$100 on a cabinet organ, there still is a considerable balance due, and they are exerting themselves to raise the required amount during the present winter.

On the conclusion of evening service on Christmas night, the large congregation adjourned to the adjoining school house; where a Christmas tree was freighted with numerous articles both useful and ornamental, provided for the children of the Sunday School. Your missionary was surprised and gratified to find that he with several members of his family was kindly remembered at this pleasant gathering. The kindness of Mrs. J. Hutton of Montreal, has again to be recorded, who has presented a carpet of very suitable design for the chancel; your missionary has also to thank the

Rural Dean for a chancel chair similar to the one noticed in last year's Report.

The congregation of Grace Church has to mourn the loss of three valued members, they departed in the faith of Jesus, and the communion of His church. Mrs. Squier the latest survivor, widow of Capt. Squier, was suddenly warned to set her "house in order,"—active in life in the interests of the church she remembered it in death by bequeathing of the little she had at her disposal the sum of \$50 to the endowment fund. One of the congregation has rendered himself eligible to become a member of the church society, the first ever returned for this mission. Although forming an endowment fund, and otherwise largely drawing upon the resources of the people, still it is hoped that this will not remain a solitary instance of making some *direct* return to the society, without whose fostering care the mission could not exist.

Allsopp, Esq., has placed to his memory in the chancel a stained window, containing groups in the side-lights, representing respectively the raising of Jairus' daughter and the resurrection of Lazarus. A full-length figure of our Lord, invested with the insignia of his office, as the Good Shepherd, occupies the central light. Scrolls, with suitable inscriptions, are also introduced. It would be well if this example were more generally followed. Costly monuments in the graveyard soon cease to be objects of interest, and, in time, deteriorate and perish. But a memorial which adorns the house of God insensibly encourages a greater reverence in the worshippers, and shares in the care bestowed on the Church.

A brick School-house, of two stories, is in process of erection, on land in rear of and belonging to the Church. George Whitfield, Esq., of Barbadoes, a former resident in this Mission, has very liberally contributed \$300 towards the building fund. We are in hopes that the building will be ready for occupation next spring, when a long-felt want will, I trust, be supplied, and our young people furnished with the means of acquiring a superior education, under a permanent and progressive system of management. The control of the School will be vested in the Incumbent and Vestry of the Mission.

Thomas Mussen, Esq., has presented a Bell for the School, and to Messrs. James Mavor & Co. we are indebted for an inscribed marble slab, to be inserted in the front of the building.

DEANERY OF HOHELAGA.

BERTHIER.

The REV. W. C. MERRICK writes:—In endeavouring to establish a parish of our scriptural and Catholic Church in any new place,—one of the great objects before us, after supplying the spiritual need of those now identified with us, in the present stage of Missionary work in colonies,—four foundations of a temporal nature are very necessary, a Church, Parsonage, Sustentation or Endowment fund, and a Parochial School house. Having been permitted by the good hand of God upon us, to make a goodly advancement in the first three of these objects, during the past years, as presented in former reports, our attention has been mainly directed last year to the erection of a suitable school building.

By the blessing of God upon the efforts made, I have the pleasure to announce to the Society, an onward step in this important movement. The foundation stone was laid in faith on the 30th July, and the building has so far progressed as to be covered in. It stands on land adjoining the Glebe and in a central part of the town, acquired at the suggestion, and mainly through the generosity, of the ladies of the Manor house, Lanoraie, to whose liberality the Church of Christ in the valley of the St. Lawrence is so much indebted. It is built of strong frame-work on a substantial stone foundation, will be lined with brick, has two full stories, with large attic if necessary, and while furnishing a room 36 feet by 20, for school and other public purposes, will contain ample accommodation for a teacher's family. We trust "if the Lord will," to have the building ready for full occupation after the ensuing mid-summer recess, and it is the prayer of many hearts among us, that God may accept this offering to His cause and render it a means of extended good in the community.

A second investment, on landed Security, of \$500, has been made for the endowment, and the following, as required by the By-law of the Central Board, is the present state of the fund: Mortgages on real estate \$1500; Subscription notes \$60; interest \$102.65; total \$1662.65.

It was our great privilege, during the summer to receive visits from two of the chief pastors of our Church. The Bishop of Quebec, when on his way to the portion of the extended Mission under my charge, in his Lordship's Diocese, kindly took part in a special service at Berthier, and next day was accompanied to

Riviere du Loup, by a large number of the Congregation and other friends, in a steamboat chartered for the occasion. It was a season of much interest and I trust good to all. In the following month, July, we were cheered and benefitted by the presence and ministrations, at a confirmation service here, of our own esteemed Bishop and Metropolitan.

In the earlier portion of the year a school festival was held, at which in the presence of the parents and visitors, prizes were presented to every pupil in the day school, according to their various grades of merit, and the opportunity was taken of making presentations of "Church Services" to Miss Mary Forneret and Miss Georgiana Coyle, for the purpose of marking the high estimation, in which their untiring services in the choir are held by the congregation. With regard to the Church Society, I feel it a cause for thankfulness, that, notwithstanding the pressure of many local calls, which are severely felt in a small community like this, something has been done each year, by contributing to its cause, to promote the progress of the Church in the newer Missions; and there is an incident, which I may mention, as a step of another kind in this direction, which has afforded me no little satisfaction and encouragement, the unanimous decision of our Sunday School children last autumn to forego their usual supply of books, and to devote the amount of the collections on hand to the purchase of a library for the neighbouring Sunday School of the Mission of Kildare.

May God raise up among us all, an increased missionary spirit, that co-operating together, we may prove how much may be done, even by a small community when properly alive to Christian duty; and may feel the blessedness of being permitted in any degree, to advance the kingdom of Christ and to confer religious benefits upon others.

KILDARE AND RAMSEY.

The REV. JOSEPH MERRICK writes:—The Mission of Kildare and Ramsey, upon the duties of which I entered in July last, is situated in the north eastern section of the district of Montreal. It comprises a portion of the settlements of British origin, at the rear of the French parishes, and formerly was included in the extensive Mission of Rawdon. There are about 40 families who identify themselves with the Church, 28 in the Township of Kildare and 12 at De Ramsey.

The people have always taken a warm interest in the Church of England, and though few in number have accomplished some important steps in the founding of a parish, a comfortable church has been built and furnished, around which a neat cemetery has been enclosed and laid out. It is proposed in the ensuing winter to erect a tower answering for a porch and belfry for the church, together with a shed to receive vehicles during the hours of divine service. In the year 1862, a farm of 100 acres was purchased to provide a

glebe and residence for the Missionary. The people have contributed largely towards the object, and aid was obtained from the venerable S. P. G. and kind friends in Montreal. Three-fifths of the property has been sold, thereby producing an endowment of \$84.00 a year, which proves a great help in sustaining the Mission. The most pressing want now is the repairing and finishing of the parsonage for which we hope efforts will be made (D. V.) next summer.

Divine service with Sunday School is held each Lord's day in the fore-noon at Kildare, and a Bible and singing class during the week. Ramsey and Lake Cloutie are served alternately upon the Sunday afternoons. A good day school under the Colonial Church and School Society is in operation in Kildare, and a Dissident School at Ramsey, doing a good work. A school is much needed at Lake Cloutie, in a French locality for the English speaking children and others.

I beg to acknowledge with many thanks the following gifts:—Twenty-four valuable and well chosen books, as a commencement of a library for our Sunday School, from the St. James' Church Sunday School, Berthier; two oak chairs for the chancel of our church from William Bursley Esquire; we have received also several gifts and experienced many acts of kindness from the congregation at Kildare since our arrival amongst them.

MASCOUCHE AND TERREBONNE.

The Rev. T. GODDEN reports:—The circumstances bearing on a Mission of this description convey very little matter of import for publication, when mostly we have to depend on the common temporal efforts as a source for information, for generally it is difficult to predicate with any certainty the spiritual condition or advancement of individuals, much less a congregation; for that inner life is "hid with Christ in God," which is not always foreshown as the cause for the temporal growth of any Mission. On the same principle the many scenes and occurrences which naturally come under

a Missionary's notice from time to time, are not of a character for publicity, and may be omitted, though these particulars and details, he is aware, may add an interest to his report which it rarely yields without. This Mission like many such in this province, composed of a paucity of old-country people, scattered among a large French population, has in it no tokens of increase, as in most English and Protestant communities, where a gradual growth is visible in numbers, and Church interest. If we cannot speak favourably of the former, the latter we think has in no way diminished. The services during the year have been duly maintained and appreciated, and the principal holy-days of the Church observed. The order and decorum of the congregation has been very creditable, and the responses and, singing, an index of life and feeling, no less of a character comparably laudable, and Church like. From death, and removal, which the Congregation this year has witnessed, I once feared being able to make any returns to the Society or in fact seeing the Church maintained under the conditions of the few years past; but I am thankful I can forward to the Society, larger receipts than the preceding year. Regarding the Church's support some were disposed to add to their former subscriptions, yet a deficiency, respecting the arrangement with the Church Society, exists. The death to which I allude was of the Hon. J. Pangman, deeply lamented; he was ever liberal in the matters of the Church, and mindful of the comfort of the Clergyman. The measure of his loss we trust is being filled up by his son and successor who, we hope will *continue* to follow his father's example. To him and his lady and few other members of the Congregation, we are greatly indebted for the beautiful and appropriate decorations of the Church for Christmas. I would do injustice to my feelings were I to allow this opportunity to pass, and no mention made of the great loss the Church sustained on the departure to England of Mrs. Pangman, wife of the late deceased. I will reiterate my words of last year's report that, "she was always foremost in every good word and work, exemplary both within and without the Church." To her I would record my sincere thanks, for the gift of \$20 each to myself and wife, on her bidding us farewell. I am also indebted to a lady in Montreal for a very serviceable and compact pocket communion service,—a "Christmas offering"—which I often felt the need of, and which I dearly value hoping many will follow her example, to those in want.

The number of our communicants during the year has been good—on Christmas day 35 partook of the sacred rite. Four burials—five baptisms, one marriage were registered.

NEW GLASGOW AND KILKENNY.

The Rev. A. SHAND writes :—I beg leave to say, that everything throughout this mission is in a more prosperous condition than I have ever seen it. The churches in Kilkenny have both been remarkably well attended during the past year, and the new church at Cote St. Ambroise, is always well filled and often crowded. And we have had many proofs of warm attachment from people of other denominations, who have manifested much good will and friendship towards the church of England. During this fall, I have visited and catechized in almost every house. Between fifty and sixty families have been visited and a great number of children catechized, and in discharging this duty I have travelled not much short of 180 miles. The people of Kilkenny have subscribed nearly \$17 for the Church Society and Widow's and Orphans' fund and the people of New Glasgow have subscribed about \$5, both in advance of last year, and with prospects of an increase, and they have paid their stipends honourably.

SOREL.

The REV. CANON ANDERSON reports: Baptisms, 10; Marriages, 2; Burials, 10; Communicants, Easter, 57—Christmas, 40. Total number in the parish, 113. This total exhibits an increase of fourteen on the number reported last year, notwithstanding the death of some, and the removal of other members of the Congregation. This addition to the Church membership is owing to the very gratifying fact that nearly the whole of an interesting class of Confirmation candidates, who were this year the recipients of that apostolic rite, immediately afterwards united themselves with the Church as communicants. Among the Confirmation candidates was an adult female, a convert from Romanism, being the fourth French Canadian adult and head of a family, who, on as many successive occasions in which confirmation has been administered in this parish, has seceded from the Church of Rome, and united with the Church of England, subsequently maintaining strict adherence to the Church, and Christian consistency of life and walk. The contribution to Foreign Missions amounted this year to \$116, the free-will offerings of a few willing, some of them anonymous, donors to the Lord's cause. One-third of this amount was transmitted, through the kindness of James Lindsay, Esq., London, England, brother of the Rev. R. Lindsay, Knowlton, to the well-known and excellent negro Bishop of Sierra Leone, the Right Rev. Dr. Crowther, for mission work in Africa; and the balance was paid to the Rev. Canon Bond for the Colonial and Continental Church Society, in support of their useful and important both scholastic and mission work at Sabrevois, St. Francis, and elsewhere. And in addition to these subscriptions, the further sum of \$32 was raised after special sermon in aid of the same mission. The ladies of Sorel and its vicinity also contributed liberally, both in money and material, to the very successful bazaar held in Montreal last winter in aid of a parsonage house for the missionary to the Indians at St. Francis. The Church in that interesting field of labour is now completed, and will, it is hoped, be consecrated next spring, and the Parsonage House is also finished, although some

debt still remains upon the latter building, which the Missionary trusts will shortly be discharged. The contributions to the Church Society, from subscriptions and sermons combined, amount to \$146.84, an advance on the amount raised last year, and for the collection of the subscriptions, the Society is again indebted, as for several years past, to the self-denying efforts of Mr. James Jones. The hope was expressed in the previous report that, without having recourse to bazaars or concerts, the Lord would put it into the hearts of the friends of the Church to contribute a sufficiency for the acquisition of a much needed organ. And now, the Lord's fulfilment of that hope is most thankfully recorded. With the good hand of their God upon them, some ladies of Sorel, Miss Kittson, Miss Lunan, Miss Turner, and Miss Nelson were successful in raising the handsome sum of \$419.75 from different kind friends in the parish and elsewhere. And with this amount, a very sweet-toned reed instrument, by Mason and Hamlin, was purchased from Messrs. Gould & Hill of Montreal. In grateful recognition of the efforts of Miss Kittson on this occasion, and of her gratuitous services for a lengthened period in playing the organ, an elegant gold watch and chain was recently presented to her by the Congregation. Several tokens of good-will, wholly unsolicited, and from parties not resident in the parish, have this year been presented to the Church, and which are now thankfully acknowledged, namely, \$25, (in addition to other acts of kindness) from G. Matthews, Esq., of Hudson; towards the improvement of the Burial-ground; \$20 (being \$10 for the Endowment, and \$10 for the Indian Mission), from Mr. T. Pope, formerly of Sorel, now of Montreal, and \$10 from Captain Macfarlane, H. M. 100th Regiment, for Church Society Missions. The Church in Sorel has this year sustained a great loss in the death of the late Mrs. John Anderson, one of the most liberal and unvarying supporters of the Church in every work of faith and labour of love. After long adorning the doctrine of God her Saviour by a most meek and consistent Christian life, she came to her grave full of years, like a shock of corn full ripe, followed, as for a mother in Israel, by the respect and the regrets of the whole community. It is matter of devout thankfulness to God that, in the face of a diminishing Protestant community, the parochial contributions for Church, charitable, and missionary purposes are, in the aggregate, considerably in excess of those of last year. And it is prayerfully hoped that, in this particular, the future may not only be like the past, but

that of the donors, as of some of the Corinthians of old, it may be also testified, that they "first gave their own selves to the Lord."

CLARENCEVILLE.

INCLUDING ST. GEORGE, ST. THOMAS AND HENRYVILLE.

Rev. Canon TOWNSEND and Rev. C. H. LANCASTER report:—Our report this year again shows signs of Church progress and bears with it the evidence that the hearts and energies of our people are still warm in the cause of that Church to whose service they were pledged at the baptismal font. In proof of this we may remark that an additional one hundred dollars has been raised in the two parishes of St. George and St. Thomas towards the stipend of the assistant minister, while at the same time he is pleased to be able to record many other substantial proofs of appreciation in the way of gifts and offerings, to himself and wife, of various kinds. With regard to the material fabric we are able to state that the parish Church of St. George has been much improved during the past year, chiefly by an addition to the Chancel of a handsome triplet window of stained glass, the work of J. C. Spence, Esq., of Montreal, and presented as a thank offering for the service of Almighty God by the Rev. Canon Townsend, Rector of the parish. Other additions and alterations have also been made in the Chancel which has tended much to improve the appearance of the sacred edifice and to further the fulfilment of the apostolic injunction "Let all things be done decently and in order." Amongst these additions we may name a very richly embroidered altar cloth and a beautiful and emblematic Reredos, the latter, an Easter offering from that true son of the Church, J. C. Spence, of Montreal. The ceiling of the Chancel has also been illuminated in blue and gold, and the walls of Chancel and Nave appropriately tinted, besides other improvements on the exterior of the building. A new organ for St. George's Church, built upon the Scudamore principle, is also in process of completion at the factory of Messrs. Warren, Montreal. In St. Thomas' parish all the local efforts of the parishioners have been directed to the one laudable object of freeing

their neat and substantial church edifice from the debt which still encumbers it and it, is pleasing to note that these efforts are rapidly bringing to a completion the desired achievement, and we look forward confidently to the coming year producing its happy realization. The Sunday schools of both parishes are in a flourishing condition, and the children of each are now catechised fortnightly in the presence of the Congregation at the afternoon service. A Sunday school festival and Christmas tree was held in St. George's parish in January last when prizes and gifts were distributed to the children. Our annual "Harvest Home" in connection with the two parishes, took place in September last and was held this year in the parish of St. Thomas. It was a great success, and the sum of \$150 exclusive of Offertory \$14.75 realized by the same for the purposes of the Church. The Ladies' Societies of both parishes are active as usual and foremost in every work connected with the Church. Our communicants are steadily increasing, and altogether we have much reason to be thankful to the Giver of all good for the prosperous condition of the Church in this Rectory.

It is worthy of remark that on Christmas Day, although the roads were in a bad condition for travelling, 40 communicants partook of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper in St. George's Church.

ST. JOHNS.

The Rev. H. F. DARNELL writes:—In forwarding the customary returns from this parish, the Rector, (Rev. H. F. Darnell,) would remark that the services of the Church have been conducted in

the usual quiet and orderly manner and have been upon the whole exceedingly well attended. Complete unanimity has prevailed among those who have co-operated in the work and substantial progress has been made both with respect to the spiritual and temporal condition. The annual meeting on behalf of the Church Society was well attended, and highly interesting addresses were delivered by the Rural Dean, and the Rev. R. Lindsay, who formed the deputation. Whilst it must be admitted that some of our church-members might evince a deeper interest in this Society which is now the main stay, and will soon perhaps be the sole stay of the Church in the poorer portions of this diocese, it is yet only fair to others to observe that they have come forward generously to assist in defraying the debt yet remaining upon our school building. Several sums have been paid in towards this fund during the past year, and more are in course of collection, it is therefore within bounds of reasonable expectation that in our next report we may have the pleasure of recording its total liquidation. Our high school, which has been considerably repaired and improved at the joint expense of the Church Corporation and the School Commissioners, re-opened last term under most favourable auspices. From its healthy and accessible situation, and the well known zeal and ability to the present head master, (Mr. Masten,) it bids fair to take a high place among the educational institutions of the Province.

The Church has been recently beautified by the presentation of a second elegant stained glass window by J. C. Spence of Montreal in memory of the daughter of R. Wright, Esq., M.D., of this place, erected by her grandmother, Mrs. Wright, of London, England; whilst Mr. James Macdonald exchanges the Chancel window, recently erected by him, for one of a handsome and more suitable character, now rendered a memorial of his deceased wife. —“*Dominion day*,” was observed in this town with every manifestation of loyal feeling both by the English and French residents. Divine service was held in St. James’ Church, in which the Revs. Mr. Street, of Chicago, and the Rev. J. Slack, Rural Dean of Bedford, assisted; after which a suitable address was delivered by the Rector. The attendance was very satisfactory. The remainder of the day was devoted to out-door sports, followed by a general illumination of fire-works in the evening. Large numbers of people poured into the town, but everything was conducted in the most peaceable and creditable manner.

AYLMER.

The Rev. F. Cobb writes:—In my last years report I alluded to the loss we were sustaining by the removal of several of our Church families from this locality. As the pecuniary loss which the Missionary has thus sustained is not likely to be counterbalanced by the greater liberality of our remaining numbers, it has necessitated my removal to another sphere of labour, and Aylmer has been placed by the Bishop under the charge of the minister of the adjoining mission of Eardley.

In consequence of my inability to refer to the Church books of Aylmer, my financial report includes only the half year between April 1st and October 1st. Bearing this in mind and also that the collections for the Church Society are not included in this half years report, it will appear that the deficiency as compared with former years it but a small sum.

The several special collections are all included this year under the heading *Offertory Collections*. The amount raised during the time above mentioned is as follows:

AYLWIN, UPPER GATINEAU.

Your missionary having only received charge over this Mission in July last, cannot be expected to have much to report. However, short as the time has been, something has been done towards building up the people in our most holy faith.

In sending this report, I may say, that it is one of few things that remind me of my connection with the diocese of Montreal; so far is this Mission away from the Cathedral city, and so far is its Missionary away from a brother clergyman (the nearest being about 27 miles), that he is apt, for the most part of the time, to forget that he is in the Province of Quebec, connected with the diocese of Montreal. It may be that, at no very distant date, it may become part of a new diocese, having the city of Ottawa as its centre,

Your Missionary, upon his arrival, found the Church people delighted in having once more among them one duly commissioned to preach the Word and administer the Holy Sacraments. They had nearly given up all hope of seeing their beloved Church, and the Church of their forefathers, established among them; but once they saw a priest of that Church among them, and for them, their hopes revived, and they gladly welcomed their pastor.

Thanks to the exertions of the people while under the care of their first missionary, the Rev. A. C. Nesbitt, your Missionary had a good and handsome parsonage to enter into. This parsonage is a good-sized house, in the cottage Gothic style, built of wood, and in plan cruciform. The design was one of Mr. Nesbitt's own, and reflects credit on his architectural talents, for, when properly finished, it will be one of the best parsonages in this deanery. Its full completion has been prevented by an incubus of debt. This debt, however, has within the last few weeks been greatly lessened by the sympathy, kindness, and exertions of our dearly beloved Metropolitan, who, though in England, and pressed, no doubt, with other and more urgent business, forgot us not, but sent us out the welcome sum of \$220. This sum will take away half of our debt, at the least. During the fall our people gathered and erected a neat stable on the Parsonage ground, which cost, in labour, &c., about \$80. There remains yet work to be done, to make the Parsonage complete, *e.g.*, painting interior and exterior, fencing, &c. Some, if not all, of this work will be done probably during next summer. The services of the Church are given in the Mission as follows: on two consecutive Sundays services are given in

Alleyne, and Aylwin each Sunday. In Alleyne (14 miles from Parsonage) the congregation gathers in a dwelling house; but soon we expect to enter into a proper Church building, for the people in Aylwin have this fall covered in the walls of a building originally put up for a Union meeting-house. It is intended, as soon as possible, to have this building properly finished for the use of the Church only. For what has been done for the Church in this township thanks are due chiefly to Mr. Heeney first, and to Mr. Carruthers next, for by them and their sons has the building been taken in hand, and put in its present forward state. Our congregations in this Aylwin are generally pretty large, and are made up of all classes of belief.

In Aylwin our congregation meets in the Presbyterian preaching house. Here the number of Church people is much larger than anywhere else in the Mission. The services are very regularly attended by the people. The congregations average here about 60 persons. This number is greatly increased in the summer by people who are now away from home, or who have not the means of being carried to Church, the roads thereto being exceedingly rough and rocky. The Sacraments have been duly administered—that of Baptism when required, and that of the Eucharist on the major Sundays. Our communicants are very few at present, numbering only ten persons. This number is larger, however, than at first. There are persons who would be communicants, but who are prevented, by various circumstances, from being so. A great number will not commune because they are not confirmed. As we expect His Lordship the Bishop up here next summer, for Confirmation purposes, one will naturally expect the number of communicants to be increased.

Till within the last month, the children of Aylwin were gathered on Thursdays for two hours' instruction in Catechism and singing by their pastor; but thanks to the Colonial Church and School Society, we have been enabled to open two Church Day Schools; one in Aylwin, and the other in the township of Hincks, on the other side of the Gatineau. By these Schools about 40 children are brought under secular and religious instruction, which they would not otherwise receive, for there are no other schools of any kind in the whole Mission. Every third Sunday your Missionary goes up northward to the township of Cameron, where, at the Depot farm of the "Hamilton Brothers" (distant from the Parsonage 25 miles), he holds an afternoon service, the congregation being for the most part composed of the clerks and other persons employed in this

firm, with one or two families who reside in the vicinity. One of these families are French Protestants, to whom your Missionary has paid visits and baptised some of their children, using the French version of the Prayer-book. On my way up to this last-mentioned station, I stop for the night previous in the house of a lumberer some fifteen miles below, but three miles back in the bush, where next morning a congregation gathers for prayers and sermon. To conduct our service there in the usual way is rather a task, for many of them cannot read, and by far the greater number have never heard our service or seen our ritual. Indeed, to those among them who are Church members by virtue of their baptism, the services and the ceremonies of their Church were both alike novel. There is, however, a decided improvement of late in the way the services are used, though there will be always the difficulty of making the service congregational, seeing that so very few know how to read.

Being but a short time up here, I cannot present a great list of contributions either to the Minister's stipend or any other purpose. The people seldom or never have money before the spring, when they receive it for logs made during the winter—the making of timber being the only way by which the people are able to subsist. What has been done is stated below.

During the last six months there have been, in connection with the Mission, 9 baptisms and 3 burials.

CLARENDON.

The Rev. GEO. C. ROBINSON writes:—The amount raised in this mission during the past year, exclusive of foreign aid, is in excess of that of the previous year, notwithstanding the absence of so

popular an object of liberality as the purchase of a Church bell. A call for improvements in, and about, the Parsonage, was fairly responded to, and a much needed addition built at an outlay of about 270 dollars. A debt of about 60 dollars remains upon the building, but will probably be all paid before Easter. With a little more expense the house will be a credit to the mission, and comfortable for its occupants.

The mission was visited in August last by the most reverend the Metropolitan, for the purpose of administering the rite of Confirmation. Forty persons renewed their baptismal vows before God, and in presence of a large and devout congregation. It was an occasion which called forth deep thankfulness for the past, and was a stimulous to increased exertion, in humble dependence upon the Divine blessing, for the future.

The attendance at public worship is good, and the Sunday schools are flourishing. The number of communicants is slowly, but steadily increasing. May God grant increase of grace to both minister and people, for Jesus Christ's sake.

EARDLEY.

The Rev. PERCY W. SMITH writes:—In once more reviewing the work of the Church, in this mission, notwithstanding pecuniary discouragement, I have every reason to be thankful. The congregations have shown a decided increase, more interest has been manifested in divine things, and there has been an addition to the number of communicants. The visit of the Bishop, has I think,

effected a decided change for the better. He encouraged the people, and so as a natural consequence, has strengthened the influence of their missionary.

During the past year I have baptized thirteen infants, and officiated at two funerals.

I mentioned that I had met with some "pecuniary discouragement;" and as I am bound to give a faithful report of the work done here, it would be well to particularize. The amount of the minister's stipend in this mission, is wholly inadequate. The sum total of my last years receipts was only \$425.00; house rent, and expense of keeping horse out of this, leaves but a small margin for household and personal expenses. The mission has, I *know*, been well canvassed, and all that can be ensured is \$150.00, the Church Society granting \$300.00. I shall make no suggestions as to a remedy of this, but leave the facts as they stand.

GRENVILLE.

The Rev. F. S. NEVE writes:—The state of the mission, and the occurrences within it have been so similar to those of preceding years, that the missionary has nothing of interest to report, unless it be, that a cabinet organ having been substituted for a hand one in the Church at Grenville. The musical part of the worship of God has been greatly improved. The sum total raised in the mission during the year is \$286.45.

HULL.

The Rev. J. Jounston writes:—During the past year we have lost some truly excellent members of our Congregation at St. James' Church, Hull, in consequence of their removal to Quebec and Toronto. Our Congregation is as yet necessarily fluctuating and must so continue to be until the village of Hull shall become better settled. Most of the Congregation attend from a distance, still the Church is well filled. Much earnest interest has been shewn by the Congregation generally in carrying on the work of the Church among us, as may be seen from the efforts made by them. The fourteen hundred and thirty dollars raised have been exclusively contributed by our own people.

I hope during this new year we shall be able to do more for the work throughout the Diocese, but as yet we have had so much upon our hands within the mission that we have not done much for that good cause.

Upon the whole I thank God the giver of every blessing for the manifest advancement we have been permitted to witness in this portion of his field.

ONSLOW.

The Rev. J. C. BRAITHWAITE writes :—There is but little out of the ordinary routine of work in the Mission, to notice particularly. On Passion Sunday, we had our first Service in the new Church of St. Matthew's, North Onslow, and on Palm Sunday, in the new

Church of St. Mark's, Bristol. In August, the Bishop, attended by the Rural Dean of Bedford, as Chaplain, visited the Mission, and confirmed two men, and four women and girls, at St. John's the Evangelist, Onslow; four girls at St. Matthew's, North Onslow; and one youth, and five women and girls at St. Mark's, Bristol. The Bishop preached at St. John's the Evangelist, and at St. Mark's; and the Rural Dean of Bedford, at St. Matthew's. It will be a great gain to the North Onslow part of this Mission, if a Clergyman (especially if he be in priest's orders) can be sent to reside there. Between North Onslow and part of Clarendon, Bristol, and perhaps part of Thorne, plenty of work can be found for him to do. I trust, that before long, it will be found practicable to send a Clergyman to reside in North Onslow, especially as there is now a Church there, in which he can minister. North Onslow and its neighborhood requires more work bestowed upon them, than either Mr. Robinson, of Clarendon, or I, can bestow, living as we do from eight to ten miles from these stations.

The number of Communicants at St. John's the Evangelist, for 1867 were 75 men, 189 women, = 264; at St. Matthew's North Onslow, 10 men, 16 women, = 26; at St. Mark's, Bristol, 1 man, 20 women, = 21; at Steel's School-house; 1 man, 12 women, = 13. There were also 2 men, and 8 women and girls admitted to Communion for the first time.

I may be permitted to record here my grateful acknowledgment of the handsome gift of a very fine pair of sleigh robes presented to me by my kind congregation a few days since.

Mrs. Edward Jones has very kindly furnished our Chancel with a handsome Episcopal chair.

THORNE.

The Rev. Mr. ΚΑΑΡΚΕ reports :—Being in charge of this Mission since September 22nd, 1867, I have very little to report about the Church in Thorne. I find a large field of labour, and it is my constant prayer that God would make me a faithful labourer in patient submission to his good pleasure. In many instances I can discover, I hope, a *growing* zeal for religious duties and Divine services. The attendance in Church has been pretty good in general; but *very* small is the number of communicants as yet.

Services are held twice each Sunday (besides four on Christmas, and several in German, my native language.)

Number of communicants: Leslie, 3; Thorne, 3; Clarendon, 6.

I have received several presents, though small in value, yet very welcome.

Towards my salary there has been contributed till now in hay and oats \$9; given in work for stable, \$9; Sunday collections, \$2.26½.

During the winter 1866-67, I have taken great pleasure in visiting an English settlement in Portland, in the rear of Buckingham, and to eat the Lord's Supper with them, and constantly the cry sounds in my ear:

διάβας βοήθησον ἡμῖν.

VAUDREUIL.

The Rev. J. W. PYKE, writes:—The progress of Church work in this Mission, during the past year will best appear from the accompanying statement. During the past summer two new Churches have been so far completed as to enable us to open them for Divine worship: one at Como, a neat gothic structure of stone, capable of seating from 250 to 300 people. This church has a very pretty western window of stained glass. The ceiling is boarded and stained, with open roof. The other Chapel is a small wooden building erected for the accommodation of the Church people at Cote St. Charles, an English settlement in this neighborhood. It will seat about 150 people. In the erection of these two churches \$1,800 have been expended, a large proportion of which sum has been given by the people themselves and others interested in or connected with the place. St. James' Church, Hudson, the parish church built in 1842, has also been thoroughly repaired outside, and enclosed with a neat substantial fence the past summer. The outlay on this work including the paying off of an old debt,—the only one of the Church—has been over \$350. Towards the ordinary expenses of the Church \$275 have been paid; and we have sent to the Treasurer of the Church Society for its purposes \$43.87. Thus it will, I think, be manifest that there has been neither want of will, nor lack of liberality on the part of those connected with this Mission, whether residents or temporary residents, to supply the wants of the Church, local as well as general. May this blessed spirit of liberality increase among us till the members of the Church everywhere feel it not only a duty but a sweet and blessed privilege to give to God of their substance for the service of the sanctuary, as freely as He has given them.

The decorations at St. James', at this season of sacred joy in honor of the Nativity, are beautiful and appropriate. The arches of the Chancel, the windows and pillars are all wreathed with ever-green festoons which hang in graceful folds from one window to the other. Over the altar, round the Chancel wall, is placed in raised letters the text "Glory to God on High," and on the walls of the Church appears the appropriate text "Unto you is born a Saviour which is Christ the Lord."

The Ladies of the choir, who have been always foremost in this good work, were occupied two days in beautifying the sanctuary, assisted by a few of the Congregation.

The Bishop visited the Mission in August, confirming 34 young people and consecrating the ground around the church and the burial ground adjoining.

There are three full services every Sunday; one in each of the churches during summer, and two in winter. The average attendance throughout the year upon these services is 100. At one Communion there were 41 recipients; the total number of communicants is now 120.
