

Verbatim Report of Premier Asquith's First Speech

The following is a complete transcript of Premier Asquith's war speech, delivered in the house of commons on August 13, taken from English papers which arrived in New York last night. They were the first English papers to reach America since war was declared. The speech was wired specially from New York to The Toronto World.

In the house of commons Mr. Asquith, in answer to a private notice question by Bonar Law, said:

"The conformity with the statement of policy which was made yesterday here by Sir Edward Grey, a telegram was sent early this morning to our ambassador in Berlin to this effect:

"The king of the Belgians has made an appeal to His Majesty's government for diplomatic intervention on behalf of Belgium. His Majesty's government has also informed that the German Government has demanded a free passage through Belgium and promising to maintain the independence and integrity of the kingdom and its possessions on the conclusion of peace, and threatening in case of refusal to treat Belgium as an enemy."

"An answer was requested within twelve hours. We also understood that Belgium has categorically refused this flagrant violation of the law of nations. (Loud cheers.)

Asked for immediate reply.

"His Majesty's government is bound to protest against this violation of a treaty to which Germany is party in common with ourselves, and must request an assurance that the demand made upon Belgium will not be proceeded with, and that their neutrality will be respected by Germany."

"We asked for an immediate reply."

"We received this morning from our minister at Brussels the following telegram:

"The German minister has this morning addressed a note to the Belgian minister, saying that, as Belgium has declined the well-intentioned proposal of the Belgian Government, he is compelled to carry out his duty by force of arms the measure considered to be indispensable in view of the French menace."

Message From the Belgians.

"Simultaneously we received from the Belgian legation in London the following telegram from the Belgian minister for foreign affairs:

"The general staff announce that Belgian territory has been entered by way of Verriers, near Aix-La-Chapelle. Subsequent information tends to show that a German force has penetrated still further into Belgian territory."

"We also received this morning from the German ambassador here, a telegram from the German foreign secretary and communicated by the German ambassador to us:

"Please dispel any mistrust that may exist on the part of the British Government with regard to our intentions by repeating more positively the formal assurance that even in case of armed conflict with Belgium, Germany will not under any pretence whatsoever, annex Belgian territory. (Cries of "oh" and laughter.)

"The sincerity of this declaration is borne out by the fact that France solemnly pledged our word to Holland strictly to respect their neutrality."

"It is obvious that we could not profitably annex Belgian territory without making at the same time territorial acquisition at the expense of Holland."

"Please impress upon Sir Edward Grey that, which was planned according to a French attack across Belgium, Germany has, in consequence, discredited Belgium neutrality to prevent what means to her a question of life and death—the French advance thru Belgium."

Not Satisfactory.

"I have to add," continued Mr. Asquith, "this on behalf of His Majesty's government: We cannot regard this as in any sense a satisfactory communication. (Cheers.) We have, in reply to it, repeated the request we made last week to the German Government, that they should give us the same assurance with regard to Belgian neutrality as was given to us and to Belgium by France last week, and we have asked that a reply to that request, and a satisfactory answer to the telegram of this morning, which I have read to the house, should be given before midnight." (Loud and prolonged cheers.)

Message From the King signed by His Majesty.

"It was read by the speaker to the effect that the present state of affairs in Europe constitutes a great emergency within the meaning of the act of parliament, and that His Majesty deems it proper to provide additional means for military service, and that, therefore, His Majesty was by proclamation about to order that the army reserve should be called out for permanent service and that such directions as may seem necessary may be given for embodying the territorial force and for making such special arrangements as may be required with regard to units and individuals, whose services may as may be required in other than a military capacity." (Loud cheers.)

WOUNDED OVERTAX SWISS HOSPITALS

Almost Incredible Losses Reported in Battle Before Muhlhausen.

Canadian Press Despatch.

LONDON, August 13.—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Basel, Switzerland, says:

"Following a terrible battle at Muhlhausen the hospital facilities proved absolutely inadequate to care for the almost incredible number of wounded. Not only all the hospitals filled, but schools, churches and hotels are occupied to their capacity. Even then it has been necessary to charter special trains to convey the wounded to Muhlheim and St. Ludwig and other towns."

The latest estimates place the German losses at from eight to ten thousand.

Sweden Mobilizes.

STOCKHOLM.—Because of the menace of German warships in the Baltic, the Swedish government has mobilized the army.

WAR IS DECLARED ON AUSTRIA

ANNOUNCEMENTS OFFICIAL

Britain's Foreign Office Issues Statement That Rupture With France Having Been Brought About by Austria Sending Troops to French Frontier, Britain Will Go to War With German Ally.

Canadian Press Despatch.

LONDON, Aug. 13.—It is officially announced that a state of war has existed between Great Britain and Austria-Hungary since midnight.

The British foreign office later issued the following statement:

"Diplomatic relations between France and Austria-Hungary being broken off, the French Government requested His Majesty's government to communicate to the Austro-Hungarian ambassador in London the following declaration:

"Having declared war on Serbia, and thus taken the initiative in hostilities in Europe, the Austro-Hungarian Government has placed herself, without any provocation from France, in a state of war with France, and after Germany had successfully declared war against Russia and France, Austria-Hungary has interfered in the conflict by declaring war on Russia, who already was fighting on the side of France. According to information which we have received from the Austro-Hungarian Government that it will take all measures permitted to it to apply to these acts and measures."

"In communicating this declaration accordingly to the Austro-Hungarian ambassador in London, His Britannic Majesty's government has declared to his excellency that the rupture with France having been brought about in this way, it feels itself obliged to announce that a state of war exists between Great Britain and Austria-Hungary as from midnight."

As soon as the declaration of war by England on Austria-Hungary became known among the public, a large number of Austrians and Hungarians resident in London, and who were liable to be called upon for military service, applied to Robert P. Skinner, the American consul-general, for enrollment. The clerks of the consulates, general at once began stamping the men's military books, and this will be regarded by the Austrian authorities as evidence that the men were ready to perform their duty."

In accordance with previous instructions received from Secretary of State Bryan, Consul-General Skinner has notified the United States consuls throughout the British Isles to take over the Austro-Hungarian consulates.

The number of Austrians and Hungarians in the British Isles is not known, but it is expected it will add considerably to the problem of the relief committee.

Recruiting is brisk for new regiment

Fine class of men enrolled at Montreal—Many Applicants Rejected.

MONTREAL, Aug. 13.—The opening of a recruiting office for the Princess Patricia Light Infantry Regiment, at 596 St. Catherine street west, was followed by a large influx of recruits, and those that were enrolled were described today by the recruiting officer as a fine class of men. Over 50 have already been passed, while as many as 100 have been turned down because of bad eyesight, etc.

Most of the men who have enlisted are ex-service men, but there are quite a number of Canadians who have been in the volunteers, and several French-Canadians.

GALLANT FRENCHMAN RECEIVES DECORATION

THE SITUATION IN THE UNITED STATES

Again we come back to our neighbors in this war. They are unable to find a policy or line of action for themselves. Listen to this from The New York American:

Not a pound of foodstuffs is leaving the United States, yet prices are being advanced abominably.

What action does the government, thru Washington and local authorities, intend to take to stop this inexcusable and barbaic robbery of the public?

The rise in the price of meat has become intolerable. There is not the slightest justification for it. If the monopolistic packers are not responsible, then the wholesalers or the retailers should be taken to task, instead of the public.

This is not a time to inflict unjust and avoidable burdens upon householders and wage-earners. The terrible catastrophe abroad will bring in its train enough inevitable inconveniences and losses to every civilized country without malicious bloodsucking by corporations or individuals saturated with greed. Rapacity should be put down with an iron hand.

As the same state of high prices may also prevail in Canada at this moment. But outside of that we wish to emphasize the fact that the American Republic, with its immense population and resources, and with its navy, is not able to market its products. It submits tamely to the orders and to the conditions imposed upon it by the Kaiser's Germany! The Americans are still bewildered. They have recognized the Kaiser's hand, but they neglect to call him good and straight. He blocks them selling and they also stand for the boost in prices for some consumption!

But even worse than this; they stand for the way he and German bankers raised Wall street, depressed the prices of their securities, and forced the Americans to buy them back! Wall street must owe German brokers at least one hundred millions in gold as a result of the panic of Tuesday, August 4. The stock exchange of New York was closed to tide over the payment of this gold! But it has to be paid. It does not the Washington Government investigate these transactions and get at the bottom of the German conspiracy that worked the biggest game on them in their history?

The United States is at this moment waiting for England, with a war on her hands, to clear the Atlantic so that Uncle Sam may market his farm products and get money to pay the accumulating adverse balances against him. The gold balance due to England from the United States today is nearly one hundred and fifty millions! We do not write these lines out of any feeling against our neighbors, but in sympathy; we do, however, urge them to get busy in finding out what the German military depot has done against them and what he is doing against all the world in order to further his insane ambition for power and domination!

Any such investigation should be conducted by the president or by a committee of the senate with power to enquire into the causes of the war and the great dislocation of business and finance of all the world, especially of the United States. A country with the enormous reserves of the United States and with its immense financial organization has surely a vital interest in finding out what has produced the conditions that exist in this country today. Americans are not in a state of mind to go out of the country. That would be to confess bankruptcy!

BELGIANS FOUGHT GERMAN CAVALRY

General Movement in and About Liege Foretells Big Engagement.

LONDON, Aug. 13, 4:15 a.m.—The admiralty and war office information bureau issues the following: An engagement is in progress north-west of Hasselt, in the Province of Limburg, between a Belgian cavalry division, supported by a brigade of infantry, and the German second cavalry division, 2500 strong, supported by a battalion of infantry and 12 pieces of artillery.

BIG FIRE BLAMED ON GERMAN SPIES

Intercolonial Grain Elevator Burned With Quantity of Wheat.

ST. JOHN, N.B., August 13.—The police began today an investigation of the fire in the I.C.R. grain elevator, which is believed to have been started by spies. The loss on the building and in grain is estimated at \$1,000,000. The elevator was worked for the first time yesterday since spring, when grain was placed on the Rappahannock, bound for England. Over 350,000 bushels of wheat were in the elevator. The elevator was supposed to be under a police guard.

GERMAN HELMETS ARE HARD TO SEE

Gray Uniforms Give Kaiser's Men Advantage Over Belgians.

KING ALBERT ACTIVE

Ruthless Destruction by German Troops Continues in Belgian Towns.

BRUSSELS, Aug. 13, via London, 4.30 a.m.—The there is a general idea that a big battle has begun the only official news that came to hand late last night gave no indication where fighting was occurring. It still seems here that the enemy is inclined to avoid aggression on a large scale at Louvain, to the north-east of Brussels.

Yesterday for the first time German prisoners were seen here. They were young officers with spiked helmets covered with brown holland cloth to render them less conspicuous. The Belgians fight at a disadvantage, as they are compelled to expose themselves in their ordinary uniforms, some of which, especially those of the cavalry, are brilliantly colored, while the Germans of all ranks wear a grey field uniform which easily melts into the grays and browns of roads and stubble fields.

The Belgian authorities are preserving well the secret of the operations of the military. A member of the chamber of deputies said yesterday that even he and his colleagues were ignorant of such matters as the whereabouts of army headquarters.

GERMANS ACCUSED OF VIOLATING WAR RULES

Canadian Press Despatch, BRUSSELS, Aug. 13.—It is stated here today that the intervention of the neutral powers is to be asked for by the Belgian foreign minister thru their diplomatic representatives in the Belgian capital in reference to alleged repeated violations by the German troops in Belgium of the Geneva and Hague conventions.

ALLIES MAINTAIN POSITION AT LIEGE

German Cavalry Falls Back and Fortification Will Be Limited.
 PARIS, Aug. 13, 2.35 a.m.—An official communication issued at Brussels, contradicts the reports that the Germans are strongly re-entrenching their positions in the vicinity of Liege. It adds that the cavalry is undoubtedly falling back and that only a part of the City of Liege is being fortified by the Germans. The bombardment of the forts was resumed yesterday, but they still hold out.

GERMANS' ATTACK WAS DRIVEN BACK

Many Killed, Wounded and Prisoners Left on Field Near Nancy.

Canadian Press Despatch, PARIS, Aug. 13.—(3.10 p.m.)—An official report of the fight between the French and Germans in the vicinity of Pont-a-Mousson, north of Nancy, issued today, says: "The fighting, which started on Aug. 11, was continued on Aug. 12, under thrilling conditions for the French. It may be summed up as follows: "The first phase was an attack on two French battalions by the German forces greatly superior in numbers. The two French battalions fell back, but being reinforced during the night, assumed the offensive, well supported by artillery. "This counter-attack caused the Germans to retreat precipitately, leaving behind them a large number of killed, wounded and prisoners. "The Germans abandoned a battery of artillery, three machine guns and several wagonloads of ammunition. 

FIRE ON TRESPASSERS ORDER GIVEN TO GUARDS

Public Disregarded Precautions on Cornwall Canal, Hence New Regulations.

Special to The Toronto World. CORNWALL, Aug. 13.—Owing to the lightness with which some people treat the guarding of the Cornwall Canal and government property, and the fact that last night firearms were discharged in Beconsfield, the western suburb of Cornwall, near lock 13, the authorities have posted the following warning:

"The public are hereby notified that this canal and government property adjacent thereto, are placed under military jurisdiction. Loitering in the vicinity of any lock, weir, dam or culvert is strictly prohibited. Patrols, and sentinels are supplied with ball ammunition, and their instructions are to fire, if necessary, on anyone who fails to answer their challenge in a satisfactory manner. All persons having business on the south bank of the canal are cautioned to come and go by the various bridges provided. Crossing by the locks is prohibited."

ANOTHER DECLINE IN WHEAT PRICE

Cancellation of Export Contracts Was Depressing Influence at Chicago.

CHICAGO, Aug. 13.—Accumulating domestic stocks and the cancelling of export contracts had a depressing influence today on the price of wheat.

The market closed heavy at 3-4c to 1-4c net decline. Corn showed a loss of 1-2c to 1-4c, compared with last night, and oats of 1-2c to 1-4c.

Provisional difficulties in regard to the financing of wheat supplies that can find no outlet to Europe, began to tell distinctly today against prices.

Notwithstanding that conservative traders doubted whether any fears at this respect were justified, the dealers in the pit were constantly made aware that seaboard exporters were trying to resell here, and when unable to do so were hedging for sales of various futures.

Rallies Didn't Last. Rallies which took place at times today in the wheat market failed to hold. The chief encouragement for the upturn was the hope that the conference between exporters and Secretary McAdoo tomorrow would bring about some beneficial result.

One thing especially looked forward to was a possible arrangement whereby American exporters would be able to collect promptly payment for shipments seized by the British Government.

Additional rains over Nebraska and other big producing states tended to lower the price of corn. The September option held relatively firm, although Illinois and Iowa country dealers showed decidedly more disposition to sell.

Oats were partly sustained by rumors of export sales. Trade in provisions today was the smallest since the outbreak of war.

Weakness of grain acted as more than an offset to the fact that hog receipts were less numerous than looked for.
