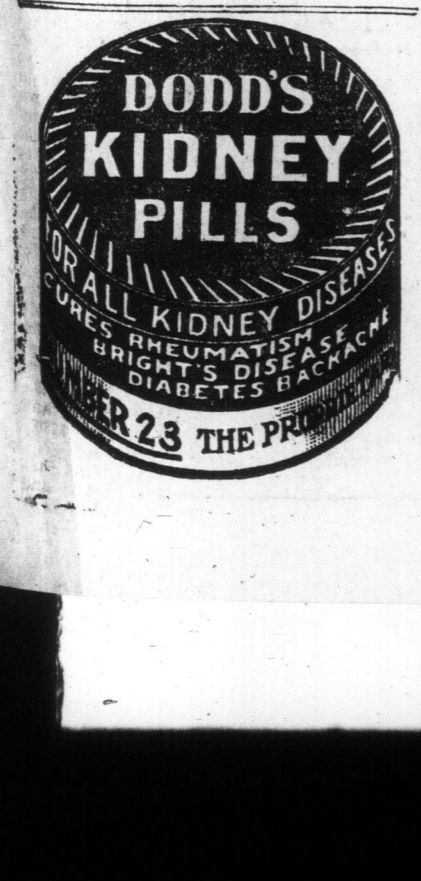

BORDEN ASSOCIATION MEMBERS INDIGNANT SIMPSON EXONERATED BY POLICE COMMISSION

Stormy Meeting of East York Federal Conservative Association. Agreement Adopted. Centrals' Refusal to Recognize Borden Club Caused Trouble.

A climax was reached in the controversy regarding the controlling powers of ward one at a meeting of the East York Federal Conservative Association in the Masonic Hall, Balsam Avenue, last night.

The agreement was taken up clause by clause and three clauses had been adopted when H. J. Lamont called attention to the fact that the Borden Association was not recognized at all and the name did not appear in the report.

The discussion continued for nearly two hours, during which time personalities were frequently indulged in and the president had difficulty in keeping order.

These statements were refuted by President Dr. Burgess and P. M. Baker who both declared that they had upheld the association in question.

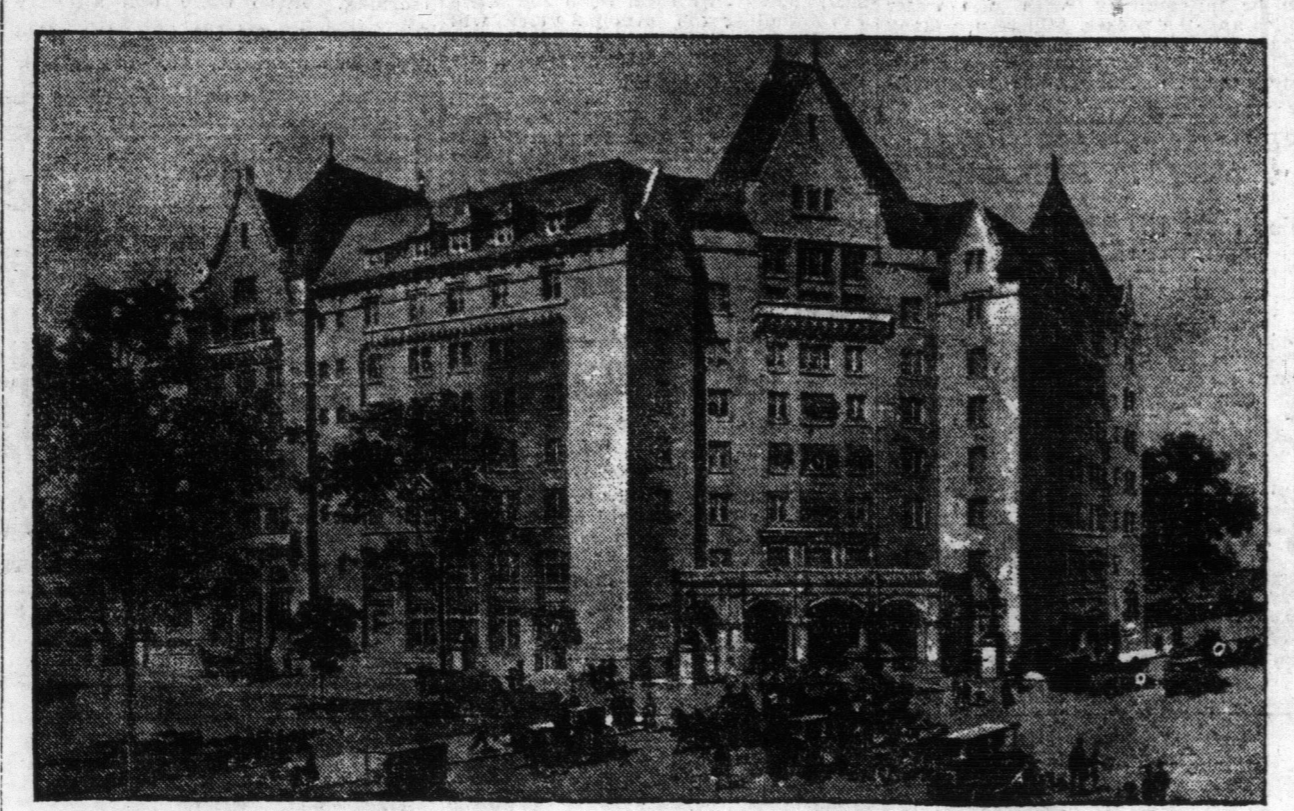

For the Baby's Carriage—Take one yard and a half of double-width fine white net and bind the edges with blue or pink satin ribbon. Cover four small flat lead shots with ribbon, and fasten to each one rosettes to match the border. Attach these to the corners of the veil. When thrown over the carriage the veil will keep flies and other insects from the baby, will protect the baby's eyes from dust, and, owing to the weights attached, the wind cannot blow it off.

An easy way to amuse a child when the mother is doing household, alone, is to let him out pictures from papers, dip them in clear water and apply them to the painted wall of the kitchen. This will afford a child infinite satisfaction and keep him employed while his mother is busy. No harm will be done the wall, for by the time he is tired of his play the pictures will have begun to curl up and drop off.

To induce children to "pick up" a disordered room try making a game out of it. Write on slips of paper the words "hoor", "chair", "table", and so forth, to indicate how the work is to be allotted, and let the children draw these from a hat. Each child attempts to be "first" to make his portion tidy, and with much racing and rivalry the room grows neat as if by magic.

A table on which to dress little children will be found a great convenience and will save many a back-ache for the mother. Get a strong kitchen table costing about a dollar and a quarter, and either stain or paint it, so that it will look neat. A shelf may be added underneath, so that toilet necessities may be kept; a curtain hung from the top will cover it, and the shelf may be raised or lowered as desired on this table, and the work will thus be made easier for the mother.

The leaves of this plant are very rich deep green, heart-shaped and borne on winged petioles, which marks the plant out from all other aquatics. The blossoms are very sweet, and quite characteristic of the aquatic being deep cream, growing in long slender, graceful racemes that droop along the rocks and trail over the smooth water, thus entitling it to the name of "trailing lizard's tail".

The bloom occurs in late spring or early summer, so that our gardeners who are also wild flower lovers may be now on the watch in their roamings by the river side for this entrancing little plant.

The pickered weed which one should be on the lookout for now, and from this on thru all the summer, is without any manner of doubt our very loveliest, most aquatic, always captivating water lily.

It is a strong vigorous plant deeply rooted, with the slushy soil, growing native and wild from Florida to Nova Scotia. As a plant blossoming or not blossoming it is impressive and as well as exceedingly beautiful.

The leaves are very erect, ovate, including the heart-shaped, very dark bottle green, very lustrous, borne on stout elongated petioles.

When the blossoms appear one can see the little child, bright and beautiful, high above even the cat-tails and rushes, peering, curiously, aloft through the surrounding greenery.

There is no other aquatic in this country that is at all like the pickered weed, so that you must know it, once you see—ever see it. The great blue spike of it towers aloft a few feet high for weeks and weeks through the long hot summer, and is the very bluest thing you can imagine.

Of course, a good pickered weed plant will not be at all suitable for a small lily-pool. It needs rather a larger surroundings to set off its beauty, and it needs the companionship of tall rushes and some white and purple water lilies, a clump of two of blue star grass and perhaps a bush of saw weed or two.

At any rate, if you cannot accommodate a specimen in your small pool, keep a watch for the lovely thing all thru the summer. It is almost certain to be in company with the water lilies and the rushes. There are many places hereabouts where you can see where splendid tall towering specimens may be seen. Look for pickered weed.

WOULD CLOSE ALL BARS AT NOON ON SATURDAY

Synod Temperance and Moral Reform Committee Have Ambitious Program.

It is probable that the Toronto Synod, at its meeting, which opens on Tuesday, will appoint a deputation to act with other denominations, to apply to the Ontario Government for more activity in respect to religious training in the public schools. The committee on temperance and moral reform will report in favor of an appeal to the Anglican church members to take an active part in politics in the interests of good citizenship.

A proposal in favor of the closing of all bars at 7 p.m. on other work days and at noon on Saturdays will be moved by the Synod; also the closing of the bars on all holidays. The establishment of a labor bureau will be recommended; also the erection of a synod house on Adelaide street, connected by a cloister with the parish house.

PUPILS OUT FLYING.

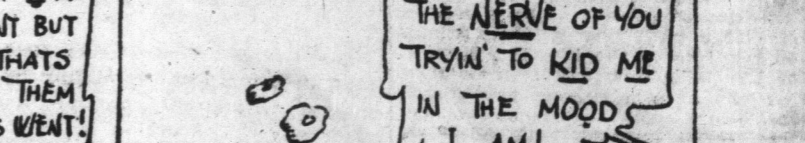

DEMANDED MONEY FROM CUNARD LINE

German Arrested at New York for Writing Blackmailing Letters.

NEW YORK, June 4.—Detectives stationed at a mail drop in the general postoffice here, today arrested Frederick A. Stillwagon, a resident of Long Island, and charged him with sending 14 threatening letters to the officials of the Cunard line, demanding sums from \$20,000 to \$25,000. Stillwagon was arrested after, according to the police, he had mailed another letter to the Cunard line. The police declare that the prisoner admitted mailing the letters.

In several of the letters, Stillwagon is alleged to have threatened with up vessels of the Cunard line unless his demands were complied with. Immediately after the destruction of the Lusitania, the police charge, the writer of a letter received at the Cunard office stated that one of his bombs placed in the ship before she sailed from New York was responsible for the disaster. The police had been hunting for the writer of the letters for a month and a half.

BUSINESS ON MEND THROUGHOUT CANADA

Trade Already Past Period of Greatest Depression Owing to War.

REVIVAL HAS BEGUN

If Harvest Equals Expectations, Autumn Business Will Be Satisfactory.

That trade in Canada has passed the period of greatest depression and already exhibits signs of a sound revival in many lines appears to be the opinion of the majority of representative business men throughout the Dominion who have contributed their views to a comprehensive survey of conditions which has just been completed by the C.N.R. Less than 10 per cent of those responding confessed to a gloomy outlook; more than 90 per cent., numbering more than 2000, report themselves as optimistic as far as the immediate future is concerned. Practically all are agreed that trade conditions will rapidly return to normal after the restoration of peace. A large number are convinced that if the harvest of 1915 up to expectation, domestic business will be satisfactory in all the provinces.

In the survey 11 classes of enterprises as defined by the Dominion census are reported upon. The provinces have furnished the latest information regarding the 1915 production of the agricultural, mining, fishing and lumbering industries. Country towns and villages as well as the large commercial and industrial centres have been covered and officials of the C.N.R. are inclined to accept the views reported as frank statements of present trade and its future prospects.

The reports indicate that business in the Dominion, as a whole, is from 15 to 20 per cent. below the normal of one year ago. Even two-thirds of the informants report a volume of trade as good, or better, than it was last autumn, while 12.93 per cent. state that they can compare present business and last autumn business because trade is always brisker with them at one season than during the other. Notably, the influence of excellent crop prospects. Business in Quebec is slow, but apparently improving, and in Ontario it is gradually returning to normal condition. Broadly considered, the reports show that business in the towns and villages located in well-settled, fertile agricultural districts is practically normal. Dealers in such centres are generally normal, and that activities have not been curtailed to any extent. The chief falling off has been in the large industrial centres. When reductions in staff were made by manufacturers and retailers were forced to curtail credits to customers thrown out of work, and in turn were forced to curtail credits to their own suppliers, the people generally continued to purchase necessary lines of goods, and to do so on a cash basis. The branches of trade as well as dealers discovered that goods not falling within that classification were in danger of being sold at a low price on their shelves; however, as Canadians arrived at a better understanding of actual conditions, a certain amount of confidence returned, and the sales were gradually extended to take in the usual lines of goods. The distribution of orders for war materials in the large cities, and trade credits relaxed to a proportionate extent. Collections, despite the altered conditions, appear to have continued fairly good in the large centres, and seem to be steady.

Importance of Agriculture.

The reports indicate a keener perception by all classes of the importance of the position which agriculture occupies in the business life of Canada. There is evidence of a disposition to turn attention to crops in 1915, and to qualify expressions of optimism regarding the future with the remark that "the crop is the determining factor." According to the special reports sent in by the various departments of agriculture, prospects of a good yield are largely increased. The acreage are bright throughout the Dominion. With the incentive of prevailing high prices, farmers have devoted more time and care to cultivation and generally appear to have used this year seed of higher germinating quality than ever before. It is safe to assume that if only an average crop per acre is harvested, the total output will be larger than any year since the growing of grain was com-

Decrease of British Columbia.

The acreage in British Columbia is said to have been more than doubled in the three prairie provinces. It averages 23 per cent.; no percentages are supplied by the department Ontario, but the acreage is reported to have been increased materially. A similar condition obtains in the maritime provinces. In Quebec the normal acreage is indicated.

Collapse in Building.

The collapse of the building trades is shown to have been the cause of a substantial reduction in the column of sales of Canadian lumber and other products. The reports there is abundant expression to the belief that the domestic market cannot permanently improve until construction becomes general again in the principal centres. The export trade, however, appears to be standing the strain splendidly and the chief worry seems to be in connection with the availability of ships to carry the forest products of the country. Conditions are much better in Quebec, and Ontario exports chiefly to the United States. There appears to be an excellent demand in Great Britain for Canadian deals, due in part to the closing of the Baltic ports, and the Canadian eastern provinces are expected to benefit accordingly. Where British Columbia exporters of lumber formerly depended to a certain extent upon the anti-trust market, they are now attempting to develop markets in the old country and in the West Indies and America.

Less Minerals Produced.

The probability is that the value of the mineral production in Canada this year will not be as great as it was in 1914, when it totaled \$128,475,493, a

Decrease of \$7,159,810, or 11.3 per cent. from that of 1914, the record year. The world-wide depression in trade during 1914 would probably have been the means of reducing the output of minerals in Canada even if war had not been declared. Hostilities have had the effect of stimulating the production and marketing in nickel, however, and it is expected that the mines of Sudbury district from which come the bulk of the world's supply, will show greater activity this year than for any other year in their history. They have also accelerated the production of lead. The production of coal appears to be proceeding almost as usual, altho the large companies report a shortage of

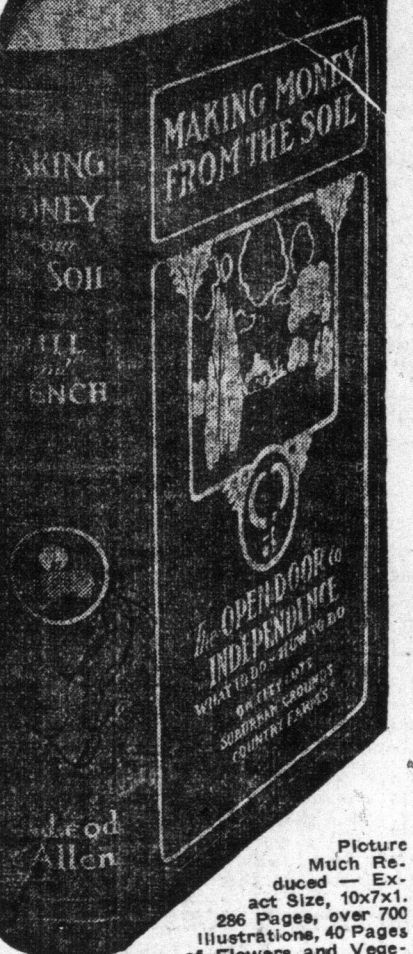
Ships to Carry the Products.

Even while operating under that handicap, shipments from Nova Scotia, the largest producer of coal of any of the provinces, to points on the St. Lawrence River, notably Montreal, show a considerable improvement in March over that month in 1914. A banking business possibly larger than in a similar period in any previous year is also reported from Halifax.

Party First

Leader Rowell in spite of the war is talking politics. Of that we do not complain, because there is no formal truce between the two political parties. Whether it is necessary at this time to open the campaign for a provincial election, which will scarcely occur before 1918, Mr. Rowell and his followers must decide for themselves.

Since Sir James Whitney came into power in 1905 the liquor traffic has been brought under control, curbed and regulated and to a large extent done away with altogether. His government cut off many licenses, reduced the hours of business, increased the number of prohibited days and compelled the man who received a tavern license to keep hotel.

Our good neighbor, The Globe, has been preaching prohibition for fifty years, and for fifty years has been a Liberal newspaper. But it is a Liberal newspaper first. It does not, therefore, rejoice in the great progress made by temperance reform in the past ten years because that progress dates from the accession of Sir James Whitney to power and recalls how little was done during the thirty-two years when The Globe was all powerful in the councils of the Ontario Government.

Mr. Rowell and The Globe say that the majority of the people of Ontario favor prohibition, but are unable to have their views crystallized into legislation because they are divided into party camps. To meet this situation they do not suggest that the temperance question be taken out of politics but that a number of Conservatives should join the Liberal party. They assume that the people are wholly helpless to deal with the social question of temperance unless politicians take the initiative. Yet they must know that one municipality after another banishes the bar by local option elections in which neither politicians nor politicians are involved. In many states in the union temperance legislation has been passed directly by the people thru the initiative and referendum without the aid or consent of the politicians.

But we do not find either Mr. Rowell or The Globe favoring "direct legislation." They want to hitch the wagon of the Liberal party to the star of temperance reform while reproaching Conservative temperance men with putting party before principle.

Among the fundamental questions which divide our people into two political parties the temperance question is not included. Many Conservatives are prohibitionists and many Liberals are not in accord with Mr. Rowell and his policy. We know by experience that the temperance cause gains nothing by contact with politics and politicians are not helped by injecting the temperance question. Speaking on this subject, while governor of New Jersey, Woodrow Wilson said:

I am in favor of local option. I am a firm believer in local self-government and believe that every self-governing community which

RUSSIANS TO AWAIT MUNITION SUPPLY

Will Assume Defensive in Galicia to Keep Germans There. SHIPMENTS ON WAY

Industries Single Handed Unable to Cope With Demand for War.

Special Cable to The Toronto World. PETROGRAD, June 5.—The loss of Galicia does not decide the fate of the Russian campaign, but it has emphasized the necessity of a greater supply of munitions and equipment, which the Russian industries are unable to furnish single-handed until the supplies can reach us. It will therefore be necessary for the Russians to assume the defensive in Galicia, fulfilling their duty toward their allies as in the past. They will do their utmost to hold and fix the enemy's forces on this front.

TURK TROOPS CALLED TO CONSTANTINOPLE

PETROGRAD, June 4.—Via London, 10:45 p.m.—Almost all of the Turkish heavy artillery at Erzerum and a considerable portion of the garrison at that point have been ordered to Constantinople according to the Bourse Gossip. The despatch states that the best Turkish troops along the front in the Caucasus have hurriedly transferred to Constantinople.

FIERCE FIGHTING IN ALPINE PASSES

Italians Repulsed All Austrian Attacks on Rocky Slopes.

BATTLED IN STORM

Torrential Rains Stopped Desperate Hand-to-Hand Combat.

Canadian Associated Press Cable. CHIASSO, June 4.—Fierce fighting was reported yesterday on the rocky slopes leading from Monte Nero, 7000 feet high, to Tolmino, and the all-Austrian attacks were repulsed, progress was necessarily slow. The most resolute attempt to stem the invading tide of the Italians were made at dawn in a terrific thunderstorm, frequent early summer occurrences in the Alps, which synchronized with the artillery duel. The lightning produced weird effects among the combatants fighting hand-to-hand on the rocks. Torrential rains later swept the mountain passes, and temporarily stopped the engagement.

TOOK ALL SUPPLIES FROM PEREMYSL

Russians Removed All Stores and Munitions From Fortress.

LONDON, June 5.—In a despatch from Petrograd The Morning Post's correspondent says: "The River San, except on its lower reaches, has been abandoned as well as Peremysl. The Russians removed all their stores and munitions from Peremysl, a process which occupied a couple of weeks, owing to the enormous quantities concentrated there by the Austrians. The process was completed Wednesday, and during the succeeding night the Russians quietly retired to prepared positions east of the fortress."

REPORTS FROM BRUGES SAYS FIGHTING HEAVY

Germans Are Losing Heavily Between Menin and Ypres.

AMSTERDAM, via London, June 5, 2:25 a.m.—The Telegram's Bruges, Belgium, correspondent reports that there has been heavy fighting on the road from Menin to Ypres with severe German losses. The allies, it is stated, recaptured all the hospitals at Courtrai, Roulers and Thourout are full of newly wounded men and long convoys of wounded are coming from the Yser lines to Bruges according to the correspondent.

ANCIENT TACTICS MOST SUCCESSFUL

Methods of Warfare More Than Two Thousand Years Old Employed With Success.

Among the weapons employed by the Romans and the Greeks at the taking of Syracuse were barrels or pots filled with burning substances hurled by catapults into the enemy's position; perfect bombs or pots of deadly gaseous fumes are popular with the Germans today, as proven in the advance in the north and north-east of Ypres, a method as dishonorable as it is ancient.

However, the Allies cheerfully retaliated with an old trick from that famous Prussian, Frederick the Great, viz., at Hill No. 60 British sappers tunneled beneath the German position, and at a timely moment the mines lifted the hilltop in a blazing crater while a veritable rain of downward deflected shrapnel left little work for the British infantry when it rushed and took the position.

All along the line sappers below ground are obliged to listen after each stroke of the pick for an answering pick-pick-pick of the enemy approaching under ground.

FIRE DESTROYS HOUSE ON CALEDONIA AVENUE

Fire completely destroyed the residence of Wm. Hulme, 391 Caledonia avenue, and the adjoining residence at 393, belonging to L. Patton, early yesterday morning. The fire brigade was quickly on the scene, but the houses were totally destroyed, the lack of water hampered the firemen. The outbreak is said to have been caused by the explosion of a coal oil lamp. Some furniture was saved, but the houses and the contents generally were totally destroyed, as well as a brooder and a number of young chickens in the rear of the premises. The damage is estimated at about \$4,000.

TO BUY WAR SUPPLIES FOR EARL KITCHENER

Sir Thomas Shaughnessy Said to Be Summoned to London for Appointment.

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 4.—Apparently authentic information gathered here was to the effect that Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, was summoned to London by Earl Kitchener to consider taking charge of the purchase and transportation of all war supplies from the United States and Canada. His headquarters, it was stated, would be in New York.

Officials here of the C.P.R. said tonight they had expected for some time that Sir Thomas would be asked to represent the British war office in America.

FOREIGN SITUATION NOT CONSIDERED

First Time for Weeks Market Was Governed by Domestic Developments. U.S. STEEL DECISION Regarded as Most Important in General Bearing on Big Businesses.

NEW YORK, June 4.—For the first time in many weeks trading in stocks today was governed almost entirely by domestic developments. The so-called German situation, Mexico and all other considerations lost their force or value, compared with the decision of the federal court absolving the U.S. Steel Corporation from all violations of the anti-trust law.

Steel was absorbed in enormous quantities during the first hour, transactions aggregating about 40 per cent of the 400,000 shares which then changed hands. The first offering consisted of 28,000 shares at 64 to 65, sales immediately after were at slight advance.

Profit-taking on a large scale followed the early rise, causing a substantial reduction in prices. The market then became dull, but continued to advance in the last hour, under the lead of Amalgamated Copper, General Electric and Westinghouse, which were then at highest quotations. Recurrent selling of the leaders caused an irregular close.

LONDON STOCK EXCHANGE. LONDON, June 4.—The feature of the stock market today was renewed interest in the American section, the marketings of these shares being the biggest since the resumption of the exchange, on the judgment against the government's dissolution suit. War loans were weaker, while copper, shares ruled higher. Oil stocks were dull.

MUNICIPAL BOND SALES. The municipal bond sales in Canada for May, as compiled by The Money Market, amounted to \$4,284,281, compared with \$8,859,714 for April.
