Cape Elizabeth Lights; latitude $43^{\circ} 33m 50s N$; longitude $70^{\circ} 12m 9s W$; two white towers, 900 feet apart, and ranging $N E$ by E and $S W$ by W ; easterly light white, fixed; westerly light white, varied by flash once a minute, visible 18 miles. Also, a fog trumpet, giving two blasts of 5 seconds each with an interval of 8 seconds between them, then a pause of 42 seconds. Bearings—Boon Island Light bears $S W \frac{1}{4} S$, 30 miles; Thatcher's Island bears $S W \frac{3}{4} S$, 62 miles. These lights are a warning against dangerous shoals, of which Alden's Rock is mostly to be feared, bearing $S E$ by $E 2 \frac{1}{2} miles$, on which is 6 feet of water at low

Bearings—Boon Island light bears S W $\frac{3}{4}$ S, 62 miles; which Alden's Rock is 100 feet of water at low water; the others range from 14 to 18 feet at low water. To approach Portland at night, get Portland Head Light to bear N N W and run for it, leaving it a fair berth on the port hand, then run N by W 1 mile, then N $\frac{3}{4}$ W till Breakwater light bears N W by W $\frac{1}{4}$ W, then run N W 1 mile and anchor.

Automatic Buoy; a whistling buoy of the largest class is placed near Old Anthony Shoal, on which is 18 feet at low tide. In making this buoy in thick weather and wishing to enter Portland, pass $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile inside of it and run N by E $\frac{1}{2}$ E $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles, when Portland Head will bear about N N W, when proceed as before. This buoy is often heard 6 miles.

Wood Island Light; latitude $48^{\circ} 27m 23s N$; longitude $70^{\circ} 19m 45s W$; white tower; red flash light, visible 13 miles, flashing once a minute; near entrance to Saco River, and guide to Winter Harbor and Biddeford Pool, by leaving it on port hand. Also, a bell struck by machinery, two blows in rapid succession, followed by an interval of 25 seconds, then one blow. To enter the north-eastern channel in day time run in to north-eastward of the light until the church steeple in the Pool settlement bears S W by S $\frac{1}{2}$ S, and run for it, leaving Negro Island on the left and Stage Island on the right and anchor as soon as in past Negro Island. There is another channel to the westward of the light, but more dangerous.

Goat Island; latitude $43^{\circ} 21m 27s N$; longitude $70^{\circ} 25m 31s W$; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; (harbor of refuge) on the north side of entrance to Cape Porpoise harbor (near Kennebunk); leave on starboard hand going in.

Boon Island; latitude $43^{\circ} 7m 16s N$; longitude $70^{\circ} 28m 36s W$; grey granite tower, 133 feet above high water; fixed white light, visible 18 miles; off York. Bearings—Cape Elizabeth lights bear N E by N, 30 miles; Matinicus lights bear E by N, 80 miles; Cape Ann lights bear S by W $\frac{3}{4}$ W, 30 miles; Isle Shoals light bears S W $\frac{1}{4}$ S 12 miles.

Automatic Buoy; a whistling buoy is placed just off Boon Island ledge; it is painted red and black in horizontal stripes, with "B I L" painted in white on the middle black band. Is often heard 6 miles. It bears E by S $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Boon Island light. The ledge is awash at low water.

Cape Neddock Light; white tower; fixed red light, visible 15 miles. Also, a bell striking one blow every 30 seconds. Two dangerous ledges, York Ledge and the Triangle, lie S by W and S S W, respectively, from this light about 4 miles distant. York Ledge is marked with an Iron Spindle. The Triangle simply with a common can buoy.

Isle of Shoals; latitude $42^{\circ} 58m 0s N$; longitude $70^{\circ} 37m 25s W$; white tower; light, flashing, red and white, visible 15 miles, flashing every 20 secs; on White Island, the most south western of the Isle of Shoals cluster, off Portsmouth, N. H. Bearings—Boon Island light bears N E $\frac{1}{2}$ N, 12 miles; Whale's Back light bears N N W, 7 miles; Newburyport Bar bears S W by W $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles; Cape Ann lights bear S, 17 miles.

Whale's Back Light; latitude $43^{\circ} 3m 30s N$; longitude $70^{\circ} 41m 48s W$; old tower white, new tower natural granite color; fixed white light, varied by flashes, visible 13 miles; flashes once in $1\frac{1}{2}$ minutes. Fog trumpet giving blasts at intervals of 30 seconds. Also, a bell, struck by hand, both located in the old tower; all to be left on starboard hand going into Portsmouth.

Portsmouth Harbor Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 14 miles; on left side of inner entrance to Portsmouth harbor. To enter Portsmouth harbor get Portsmouth light to bear N $\frac{3}{4}$ W, and run for it until Whale's

Back light bears S E by E and you are abreast the southern end of W Island, then steer N $\frac{1}{2}$ E until past Fort Point, and Portsmouth lighthouse bears W by S $\frac{1}{2}$ S, then steer N W until the light bears S by E, and anchor, when Portsmouth light bears S by E, steer S W $\frac{3}{4}$ S, and anchor close shore in the cove to the westward of Fort Constitution in from $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 6 fathoms. Strangers in entering Portsmouth harbor should take a pilot if possible.

Newburyport Harbor Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 12 miles. Also, a beacon, range of light, 336 feet in front of main light; black and white tower; fixed white light, visible 8 miles. These lights, in range, guide across the bar, in best water; bar constantly changes; outer bar buoy is in range with inner bar buoy and both lights; the beacon is moved as the channel changes. This station is on the north end of Plum Island, and on the south side of entrance to the Merrimac River, Mass. (Strangers should not attempt to enter.)

Newburyport Upper Harbor; two lights (beacons); outer beacon, black tower, fixed red light, visible 10 miles; inner beacon, red tower, fixed green light, visible 12 miles; both on Bailey's wharf, and to be left on port side passing up to harbor.

Ipswich Lights; on Castle Neck, south side of entrance to Ipswich River, a main light, with a range light in front; main light fixed, white, varied flashes, visible 11 miles, flashing once in $1\frac{1}{2}$ minutes, shown from a white tower; range light, fixed, white, visible 8 miles, shown from a black tower. The lights are 625 feet apart, N E $\frac{1}{2}$ E and S W $\frac{1}{2}$ W; in range, they guide the entrance of channel across Ipswich Bar in the best water, which at present is but 6 feet at low water.

Annisquam Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 13 miles; a harbor of refuge for small vessels; on Wigwam Point, east side of entrance to Annisquam harbor; 6 feet of water on Squam Bar at low tide. To cross the bar, bring the light to bear south and run for it, leaving it on the port side, then run for the Lobster Rock Beacon, and leave it on the port side also.

Stratmouth Island; on south side of Sandy Bay, entrance to Rockport harbor; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; to be left on port hand in going to Rockport. Bad ledges lie off this light. Strangers should keep to the north shore of Sandy Bay best aboard on entering Rockport; shelter only for a few small vessels.

Cape Ann Lights; latitude $42^{\circ} 33' 15''$; longitude $70^{\circ} 34' 30''$ W; two grey granite towers, 165 feet above sea level; fixed white light, visible 12 miles; the lights are 900 feet apart, in range at S S W and N N E; located on Thatcher's Island off Cape Ann, and the northern limit of Massachusetts Bay; to be left on the starboard hand in going towards Boston. Bearings: Isle of Shoals bears N, 17 miles; Boon Island N N E, 30 miles; Gloucester Light S W by W $\frac{1}{4}$ W, 6 miles; Long Island Light S W by W, 24 miles; Cape Cod Highland Light S by E $\frac{3}{4}$ E, 43 miles; Londoner Ledge S E by E, 1 mile; Salvage Ledge N N E, 2 miles. Also, a 10 inch steam whistle, giving each minute a blast of 8 seconds and a blast of 4 seconds, with alternate intervals of 4 and 44 seconds.

Gloucester Light, on Eastern Point; on east side of entrance to Gloucester harbor; white tower; a revolving red light, showing once every 5 seconds, visible 9 miles. When coming from the Eastward, bound into Gloucester harbor, give the light a good berth to clear Eastern Point Ledge (spar buoy), then, when the light bears N E $\frac{3}{4}$ N, run N W $\frac{1}{2}$ N until the upper harbor light bears N E by N $\frac{1}{2}$ N, then run for it, and anchor $\frac{1}{2}$ mile S by W from

the southern end of Wight light. Also, a bell on Eastern Point, alternately giving a double and single blow, then an interval of 30 seconds, then a single blow followed by an interval of 30 seconds.

Gloucester Harbor Light, on Ten Pound Island, east side of entrance to harbor; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; to enter harbor, bring this light to bear N E by N $\frac{1}{2}$ N, and run for it until Eastern Point light, visible 12 miles; anchor in channel way or continue until Eastern Point light; black and white light bears S, then steer E N E until Ten Pound Island light bears N, in range, guide across anchor in S E harbor, in from 4 to 6 fathoms—hard mud; or, from this star buoy is in range, steer about N W by N between Ten Pound Island Ledge buoy and Ten Pound Island, (giving the point of the Island a good berth) until the light bears E, then steer N $\frac{1}{2}$ E until the light bears S by E, and anchor in western harbor.

Automatic Buoy; a whistling buoy is moored three fourths of a mile, S by E from Eastern Point Light, which is removed from May 15th to October 15th of each year.

Baker's Island Lights; latitude $42^{\circ} 32' 10''$ N; longitude $70^{\circ} 47' 10''$ W; range to Ipswich River white towers, ranging S E and N W; fixed white light, visible 15 miles; fixed, white, varied light on the north end of Baker's Island, south side of entrance to Salem harbor. In coming from the southward vessels bound to Salem harbor, the lowest light open to the east of the high light, and run for it; this light guides to the eastward of the South-east Breakers and Seal's Rock. Give Baker's Island a berth of not less than half a mile, leaving it on the port hand, then run for Hospital Point Light, bearing about W by N $\frac{1}{2}$ N, until Derby Wharf light is in range with Fort Pickering light, when Salem harbor will be in range, the W S W of you, and Beverly harbor W by N $\frac{1}{2}$ N. Also, on Baker's Island a bell which strikes two quick blows each half minute. For better information, a lens panel has been placed in "Hospital Point" Light, which makes a more brilliant light in the line of the ships' channel from Baker's Island than on either side, and serves to keep vessels from danger on either side.

Strangers should keep *Hospital Point*; grey tower; fixed white light, visible 13 miles; on Hospital Point, north side of entrance to Salem and Beverly harbor.

Fort Pickering Light; red tower; fixed white light, visible 10 miles; on Winter Island, north side of entrance to Salem harbor. On entering Salem harbor from near Hospital Point, get Derby Wharf light in range with Fort Pickering light to clear the Haste Shoal; good anchorage half a mile S W by limit of Massachusetts from this light, with Derby Wharf light bearing W by S.

Derby Wharf Light; on the end of Derby Wharf, Salem upper harbor; red tower; fixed red light, visible 9 miles.

Marblehead Light, on Marblehead Neck, south side of entrance to Marblehead harbor; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; good anchorage half a mile W by S from this light. To enter harbor, bring the light to bear N W, and run for it until within two miles of it, then bring it to bear W N W, and run for it, leaving Marblehead Rock (a high rocky islet with beacon at top) 150 yards on your port hand, and when it bears S W run N W $\frac{3}{4}$ N until the light bears S by W, then run S W $\frac{3}{4}$ W into the harbor, and anchor between the light and the town.

Egg Rock Light; white tower; fixed red light, visible 12 miles; guide to the upper harbor anchorage and to Broad Sound. Leave it $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles on the starboard side on entering Broad Sound.

Minot's Ledge Light; latitude $42^{\circ} 16m 9s N$; longitude $70^{\circ} 45m 34s W$; entrance to Boston Bay; granite tower, natural color, 100 feet high; white light, visible 17 miles. Davis' Ledge Buoy bears E by S; Boston bears N W $\frac{1}{2}$ W, 7 miles. This course must be kept good, northerly, to Bell Boat, off the north side of the Harding's Ledge (about $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles Minot's Ledge Light). A good mark to clear the Harding's Bell Boat, passing Minot's light, is to keep Long Island Head light (fixed white) open to the north of the Narrows light, which is a red light.

Boston Light; latitude $24^{\circ} 19m 39s N$; longitude $70^{\circ} 53m 25s W$; on L. Brewster Island, north side of entrance to main ship channel to Boston; white tower; white flash light, flashing once every half minute, visible 17 miles. Also, an air trumpet, giving blasts of 7 seconds, followed by interval of seconds. From Cape Cod highlands the course for Boston Light is N by W $\frac{1}{4}$ W, which well clears Minot's Ledge and the Hardings; then, well past Minot's, bring Boston light to bear W by N $\frac{1}{2}$ N and run for it until within $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile of it or until the Beacon light bears about W by N, then run W $\frac{1}{4}$ S until the Beacon light bears W N W, then run W by N leaving the Beacon light 100 yards on your starboard hand, then steer N W $\frac{1}{4}$ (keeping the middle of the channel) for the Narrows between Galloups and Lovell's Islands, then about N W $\frac{3}{4}$ N for the bell buoy off Nix's Mate, which leave on port hand, then run W by N $\frac{1}{4}$ N for Fort Independence, leaving the lower middle buoy, red can, No. 6, a good berth on your starboard, and State Ledge buoy, red, Nun, No. 8 close aboard on your starboard; then run about N W $\frac{1}{4}$ N for the upper middle buoy, black, Nun, No. 9, which, leaving on your port, then the course to Long Wharf or to good anchorage is about N W $\frac{1}{4}$ W. If making Boston ship channel from Cape Ann, get Thatcher's Island light to bear N N W from 2 to 3 miles, then steer S W $\frac{1}{4}$ W until Boston light bears W by N $\frac{1}{2}$ N. Then proceed as before given.

Narrows Light; brown house; fixed red light, on the right hand side of Narrows, in ship channel entrance to Boston harbor.

Long Island Light; on the N E end of Long Island and southern side of entrance to Boston inner harbor: white tower; fixed white light, visible 17 miles. In coming up ship channel, and after leaving Nix's Mate buoy on the port hand, and Long Island Light bears W by S $\frac{1}{2}$ S, run W by N $\frac{1}{4}$ N for the south end of the Castle until the Castle North Wharf bears N W by W $\frac{3}{4}$ W or abreast of the State Ledge Buoy (red, No. 8), then N W $\frac{1}{4}$ N to the Upper Middle Buoy (black, No. 9), which leave on port hand, then the course to Long Wharf is N W $\frac{1}{4}$ W. But if approaching Boston from Cape Ann, via Broad Sound, bring Long Island Light to bear S W by W, and run for it until Deer Island Point Beacon bears N W by N $\frac{1}{2}$ N, three-eighths of a mile distant, then W by N $\frac{1}{4}$ N up the harbor. Strangers should bear in mind that in the middle of Broad Sound there is but 8 feet of water at low tide; but by keeping on the southern side of the Sound, leaving the Graves Automatic Buoy half a mile on the port hand and the Devil's Limb Buoy (black can No. 1) half a mile on port hand, and running straight to Ram's Head buoy (black can No. 5) about W S W, passing Aldrich's Ledge buoy (black can No. 3 $\frac{1}{4}$ m on port), then leaving Ram's head buoy 50 yards distant on port, and run about W $\frac{1}{4}$ S to clear Deer Island Point Beacon, you can carry 12 feet safely. From the Beacon you will steer W $\frac{3}{4}$ N for lower middle buoy, then W by N $\frac{1}{4}$ N for State Ledge buoy, when proceed as before given.

Ecliptic—The plane of the Earth's orbit, so called because Eclipses can take place only when the Moon is on or near it.

Longitude—The distance of a Planet from the Sun as seen from the Earth.

Equinoctial—The circle in the heavens traced by the Earth's Equator.

Node—That part of the orbit of a heavenly body which intersects the Ecliptic.

If the body is passing from south to north, it is called the Ascending Node; if from north to south, Descending.

Opposition—A Planet with the Earth directly between it and the Sun is said to be in opposition to the Sun.

Penumbra—That portion of space around the shadow of the Earth passing through which the Moon diminishes in brightness, in consequence of a part only of the Sun's rays reaching her surface.

Perigee—That part of the Moon's Orbit nearest to the Earth.

Perihelion—That part of a Planet's Orbit nearest to the Sun.

Quadrature—Two heavenly bodies are said to be in Quadrature when they are distant from each other by one-fourth of the Zodiac, or three signs apart.

The Sun's Declination and fast or slow of clock are given for apparent noon,

or time of passing the Meridian of St. John.

The Moon's Southing is given in Astronomical time for the Meridian passage

at St. John; and her Declination, when on the Meridian.

The Rising of the Moon is given from Full Moon to New Moon; and the

Setting, from New Moon to Full Moon.

The Tides in the Calendar are the Morning and Afternoon Tides at St. John and Charlottetown. In the Tide Table (page 36) will be found Constants

for finding the time of High Water at each of the places given in the Table.

In editions of this Almanac prior to 1885 the Tides were only given approximately, but ever since they have been corrected for the varying distance

of the Moon from the Earth, and also her angular distance from the Sun. They can now be depended upon as accurate to at least the same degree as the

Admiralty Tide Tables.

It will sometimes be found that when a Constant is added to the time of

High Water at the Port of reference the sum exceeds 12 hours; in this case

subtract 12 hours from the sum and the remainder will be the time of High

Water at the required Port on the succeeding afternoon or morning, according

to the Tide at Port of reference was a Morning or Afternoon Tide.

FORECASTING THE WEATHER.

Men have, from a very early period, studied the weather, on account of the great influence on their pursuits, in order if possible to predict its nature and prevent those losses to the Farmer and the Sailor which result from violent storms.

The earlier students based their predictions on the phases of the moon, and an examination of the Greenwich observations for more than half a century has shown that this theory is entirely unfounded. Weather prophets, Moore, Zadkiel and Vennor claim in their Almanacs to be able to forecast the weather day by day for a whole year; but meteorological science in the British Isles, and the Signal Service of the United States, with the Weather Bureau of the Dominion, does not claim to forecast, with any certainty, the weather for more than three or four days at the most.

If an observer could obtain, at regular and repeated intervals, readings of the Barometer at stations distributed over a large area, he would be enabled to trace the march of the storm, for it has been found that the wind always blows towards the place of the lowest barometer reading; and so, by means of the telegraph, he may warn those places the storm is approaching. Still, mistakes are often made, and the forecasts are not always infallible, so that much remains to be done before meteorology can be ranked among the exact sciences.

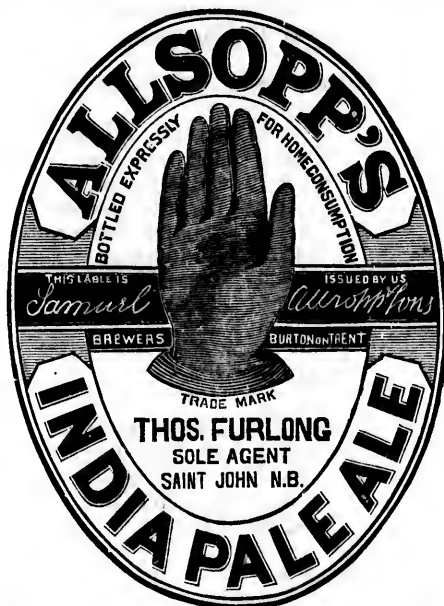

County Courts.

The Courts were established by 30th Victoria, cap. 10, passed June 17, 1867. The Act authorizes the appointment of one County Court Judge for the counties of Charlotte, Carleton, Victoria and Madawaska; one County Court Judge for the Counties of York, Sunbury and Queens; one County Court Judge for the Counties of Westmorland and Kent; one County Court Judge for the Counties of Northumberland, Gloucester and Restigouche; one County Court Judge for the County of the City and County of St John; and one County Court Judge for the Counties of Kings and Albert; provided always that said Court for the City and County of St John shall not have or exercise any jurisdiction in any cause in which the City Court of St John, or the City of Portland have jurisdiction.

The Act also authorizes the appointment of a Clerk for each Court, who shall be an Attorney. The sittings of the respective Courts shall be held at or near the County Court House in the shire town.

The County Courts have not cognizances of any action—

1st. When the title to land is brought in question; or

2nd. In which the validity of any devise, bequest, or limitation is disputed, except as hereinafter mentioned; or

Subject to the above, the County Courts have jurisdiction, and may hold plea in all personal actions of debt, covenant and assumpsit, when the debt, or damages do not exceed the sum of four hundred dollars; and in all actions of tort, when the damages claimed do not exceed two hundred dollars; and in actions on bonds given to a Sheriff or otherwise in any case in a County Court, whatever may be the penalty or amounts sought to be recovered.

Albert County—On the third Tuesday in June, and on the second Tuesday in November.

Westmorland County—On the first Tuesday in June, and the second Tuesday in September and December, and on the first Tuesday in March; the September Term only for return of executions.

Kent County—On the third Tuesday in January, on the last Tuesday in April, and on the first Tuesday in July and fourth Tuesday in October.

Northumberland County—On the fourth Tuesday in January, the first Tuesday in April, the fourth Tuesday in July, and the third Tuesday in October.

Weights and Measures Inspection.

The Weights and Measures Act provides that two gallons shall be a peck and eight gallons a bushel, and that after January 1st, 1886, in contracts for the sale and delivery of any of the under-mentioned articles the bushel shall be determined by weight, unless conveniences for weighing are not available, or unless a bushel by measure is specially agreed on in writing, the weight equivalent to a bushel being as follows: Wheat, 60 pounds; Indian corn, 56 pounds; rye, 56 pounds; peas, beans and clover seed, 60 pounds; barley, timothy seed and buckwheat, 48 pounds; malt, 36 pounds; oats, 34 pounds; flaxseed, 50 pounds; hempseed, 44 pounds; blue grass seed, 14 pounds; castor beans, 40 pounds; potatoes, turnips, carrots, parsnips, beets and onions, 60 pounds; bituminous coal, 70 pounds. Power is also given to the Governor-in-Council to specify the weight of other articles equivalent to a bushel. Violations of the foregoing provisions subject the offender to a penalty of \$5 for the first offence and of \$50 for each subsequent offence.

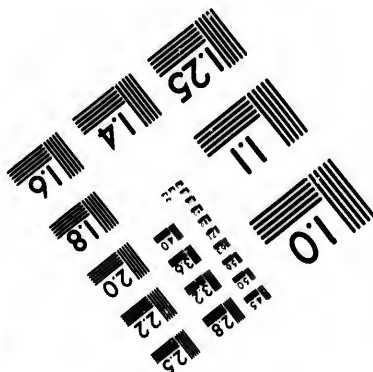
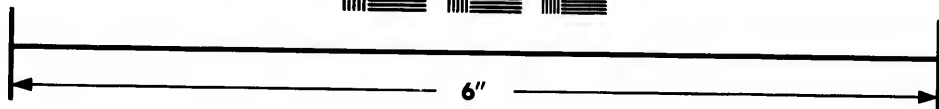
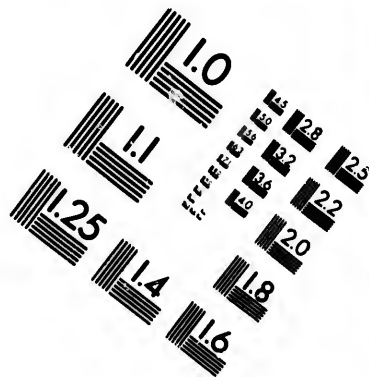

HACKNEY CARRIAGES—Rates of Fare.

The prices or rates of fare to be taken and recovered by and paid to the owner, driver, or other person having charge of any licensed Hackney Carriage shall be as follows; that is to say: for conveying one passenger from any public stand to any other part of the City, or from any one part of the City to any other part thereof, the sum of thirty cents, and for every additional passenger of the same household, each twenty cents; other passengers, not of the same household, each thirty cents. When detained at any place by any passenger, there shall be an additional fare of fifty cents every half hour detention. When agreement for hire is made by the hour, the fare shall be the sum of one dollar for each hour, and in that proportion for each division by the quarter of the hour. In case any driver shall be required to cross the ferry of the harbor to or from Carleton, he shall, in addition to the above fare, receive twenty cents additional rate for one passenger, or more than one of the same household; but if not of the same household, then twenty cents such additional fare for each passenger; and also in addition to the fare, he shall receive the ferriage charges for himself, his carriage and horses, both going

and returning. Every owner, driver or person having charge of any Hackney Carriage shall, when requested so to do, carry with each passenger one trunk and also an additional valise, carpet-bag, portmanteau, bundle, basket, or other article used in travelling, without charge or compensation therefor; and for every additional trunk or other article more than hereinbefore provided, he shall be entitled to demand and receive the sum of five cents.

Cartage Districts.

First District—To comprise all that part of the City lying between and within the North side of Union street, the East side of Prince William street, and the South side of Duke Street.

Second District—To comprise all that part of the City outside of the First District, which lies between and within the East side of Mill Street, at the City line, North side of Pond Street, East side of Peel Street, North side of Carleton Street, East side of Coburg and Charlotte Streets, and South side of Queen Street.

Third District—To comprise all that part of the City outside of the Second District that lies between the City line on the North, the East side of Dorchester Street, North side of Hazen Street, East side of Garden Street, Northerly side of Paddock Street, Easterly side of Waterloo Street, East side of Sydney Street, and South side of Saint James Street.

Fourth District—To comprise all that part of the City outside of the Third District that lies between and within the City line on the North, to the Westward of a line at right angles to the said City line, and which strikes the intersection of the Easterly line of Coburg with the Northerly line of Hazen Street, the Easterly side of Coburg Street, Northerly line of Cliff Street, Westerly side of Waterloo Street, Northerly side of Richmond Street, Easterly side of Brussels Street, Easterly side of Carmarthen Street, and Southerly side of Main St.

Fifth District—To comprise all that part of the City outside of the Fourth District that lies between and within the City line on the North, the Southerly line of the General Public Hospital Grounds, the Northerly side of Jordan's Alley (so called), lying between Waterloo and Brussels Sts., Easterly side of Brussels Street, Northerly side of Clarence Street, Easterly side of St. Patrick Street, Easterly side of Wentworth Street, and Southerly side of Main Street.

Sixth District—To comprise all that part of the City outside of the Fifth District which lies between and within the Northerly side of Clarence Street, Easterly side of Saint David Street, East side of Pitt Street, and South side of Main Street.

Seventh District—To comprise all that part of the City lying to the South of the South side of Main Street, and to the East of the East side of Pitt and Saint David Streets, and to the South of the North side of Clarence Street.

Eighth District—To comprise all that part of the City lying to the Northward of the North side of Clarence Street, to the Eastward of the East side of Brussels, and Northward of the Northerly side of the said Jordan's Alley, and Northward of the Southerly line and bound of the General Public Hospital Grounds.

Office of Pilot Commissioners, District of St. John, N. B., April 9, 1883.

By-Laws to amend the Pilotage By-Laws of 1875 and the By-Laws amending the same.

Rates of Pilotage for all Sailing Vessels from 125 tons and upwards entering and leaving the Port of Saint John, N. B.

Inwards—First district, from Partridge Island to Musquash Head, bearing n w, per foot draft of water, \$1.

Second district, from Musquash Head to Point Lepreaux, n w, per foot draft of water, \$1.25.

Third district, from Point Lepreaux to North Head Grand Manan, n w, or North Channel, s e, per foot draft of water, \$1.50.

Fourth district, from North Head of Grand Manan or North Channel, as aforesaid, to Machias Seal Island south, or Briar's Island, south-east, per foot draft of water, \$1.75.

Fifth district shall be from the outside limit of the fourth district to a bound ranging from Mount Desert and Cape Sable Seal Island, bearing n w and s e, being the outside limits of the Pilotage District, per foot draft of water, \$2.25.

Outwards—From the harbor of the Port of Saint John, N. B., to outside of Partridge Island, per foot draft of water, \$1.25.

Down the Bay of Fundy, when required, shall be \$2 per foot draft of water, over and above the \$1.25 Harbor Pilotage outward.

Transporting—If any Pilot shall be employed in the removal of any ship or vessel within the port or harbor of Saint John from any mooring ground to any wharf, or from wharf to any mooring ground, or from one wharf to another wharf, and such pilot shall see said vessel properly secured and

moored, he shall be entitled to demand and receive for such services, as follows: Provided always, that if on the arrival of any ship or vessel into the harbor of Saint John, circumstances prevent such ship or vessel from being placed on the mooring ground, or at the berth intended by the master, owner, or consignee of such ship or vessel, it shall be the duty of the pilot piloting such ship or vessel inwards, to pilot the same when being removed to such mooring ground or berth, if such removal take place within twenty-four hours after the arrival of such ship or vessel as aforesaid, without any extra charge for the same: For vessels not over 100 tons, \$1.50; over 100 and not exceeding 200 tons, \$2; over 200 tons and not exceeding 300 tons, \$3; over 300 tons and not exceeding 400 tons, \$4. And 25 cents additional for every 50 tons such vessel may measure over 400 tons.

All steamers, not otherwise exempted by the Pilotage Acts, shall pay the following rates of pilotage for entering and leaving the port of Saint John, N B.

Inward—First district, from Partridge Island to Musquash Head, bearing n w, per foot draft of water, \$1.40.

Second district, from Musquash Head to Point Lepreaux, per foot draft of water, \$1.80.

Third district, from Point Lepreaux to North Head of Grand Manan, n w, or North Channel, s e, per foot draft of water, \$2.20.

Fourth District, from North Head of Grand Manan or North Channel, as aforesaid, to Machias Seal Island, south, or Briar Island, south-east, per foot draft of water, \$2.50.

Fifth district shall be from the outside limit of the fourth district to a bound ranging with Mount Desert to Cape Sable Seal Island, bearing n w and s e, being the outside limits of the Pilotage District, per foot draft of water, \$3.10.

Outwards—From the harbor of the port of Saint John, N B, to the outside of Partridge Island, per foot draft of water, \$1.75.

Down the Bay of Fundy, when required, shall be \$2.75 per foot draft of water, over and above the \$1.60 harbor pilotage outward.

Transporting—If any Pilot shall be employed in the removal of any Steamer within the port or harbor of Saint John from any mooring ground to any wharf, or from any wharf to any mooring ground, or from one wharf to another wharf, and such pilot shall see the said steamer properly secured or moored, he shall be entitled to demand and receive for such services, as follows: Provided always, that if on the arrival of any steamer into the harbor of Saint John, circumstances prevent such steamer from being placed on the mooring ground or at the berth intended by the master, owner, or consignee of such steamer, it shall be the duty of the pilot piloting such steamer inwards to pilot the same when being removed to such mooring ground or berth, if such removal takes place within twenty-four hours after the arrival of such steamer as aforesaid, without extra charge for the same: For all steamers not over 100 tons, \$2; over 100 tons and not exceeding 200 tons, \$2.50; over 200 tons and not exceeding 300 tons, \$3.75; over 300 tons and not exceeding 400 tons, \$5. And 30 cents additional for every 50 tons such steamer shall measure over 400 tons.

It being understood if a steamer drop two anchors in the harbor on arrival, she is considered moored, and any removal is a transportation.

The Ball will be hoisted half its elevation each day (Sunday excepted) at fifteen minutes before one o'clock. At one minute before one o'clock it will be hoisted its full length; and at one o'clock, mean time, the Ball will be dropped. A Chronometer keeping correct Greenwich time should then show 5h 24m 15s, and the difference between this and the time shown by a Chronometer, is its true error on Greenwich time at the moment. As the above hour of one o'clock when the Ball drops, represents 5h 24m 15s at Greenwich, the error of a Chronometer may be ascertained, no matter where the ship is lying. Masters of vessels arriving at Saint John should compare their Chronometers by the Time Ball, as it will enable them to get the sea rate, which frequently varies from harbor rates. Latitude 45° 16' 42" North. Longitude in Time 4h 24m 15s West of Greenwich.

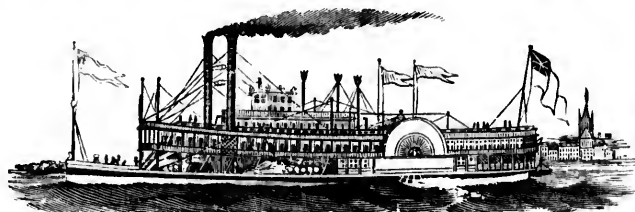

FARMING INTELLIGENCE.

Turkey Fattening.

A nice, plump turkey. Well, we all have a weakness that way, and most of us are looking forward to Christmas holidays, when we hope to help dissect a nicely-browned turkey, and discuss its merits along with the many other good things provided at that time. Turkeys are undoubtedly profitable to raise when they have been reared on proper principles, which means plenty of food, care and exercise. There is a great difference of opinion in regard to fattening turkeys, but experience has shown breeders that the best way to get the greatest number of pounds of flesh is to feed the birds all they will eat, right from the time they hatch out till they are ready for the market. While they are running at large is the time to develop them. They undoubtedly get much food in the field, the shattered grain, the "hoppers," worms, etc., but then they must be supplemented by daily or twice daily feeds of grain at the barn. Turkeys cannot bear confinement, either in flocks or singly, and should never be confined longer than a week or ten days before killing. An ordinary rail pen is one of the best for the purpose, for they like to be on the ground. At this time, feed principally on cooked or soft food and plenty of milk, if you have it to spare, giving occasionally hard grain to keep the flesh solid and firm.—*Poultry Monthly*.

The eggs of the Asiatic breeds, and indeed all the dark colored eggs, are preferred by cooks and confectioners, and also by those who use them boiled, to the white-shelled ones. The latter, excepting those of the game fowls, are deficient in flavor. The dark colored eggs, as a rule, are larger and heavier than the others.

Planting Wheat.

A Frenchman experimented on the depth for planting wheat. He made thirteen beds and planted 150 grains in each, at depths beginning at seven inches, decreasing to the surface. In the seven-inch bed five grains out of 150 germinated. They gave fifty-three heads, with 682 grains. This return kept on increasing for each bed as it decreased in depth at which the seeds were planted. At three and three quarter inches deep, ninety-three seeds sprouted, and 902 heads, yielding 18,534 grains. At one and three-quarter inches, sprouted 142 seeds, three were 1,560 heads, containing 35,816 grains. At one and one-half inches deep, sixty-four grains sprouted, growing 529 heads and 15,587 grains. On the surface, only twenty grains germinated, yielding 1,600 grains. The greatest return in grains and straw was attained by the one and three-quarter inch bed. The sower should, therefore, endeavor to cover the seed not more than two nor less than one inch.

Suitable Fences.

The old saying that "a stitch in time saves nine," finds an appropriate application in many directions of labor. There is nothing of more importance to a farmer than his fences, and he should have an eye to their security, especially when they are likely to endanger crops. Proper repairs should be made in the Spring, and if these are neglected, trouble is likely to follow: this was

illustrated only a little time since in the case of a neighbor whose corn field received a visitation from his stock, because of a neglect to make the necessary repairs. After the horse was stolen, the lock was put upon the barn. How much better it would have been to have made the repair at the proper time.

Potato Varieties.

The New York Agricultural Experiment Station made a very fine instructive exhibit at the last State Fair, of a large number of plates of potatoes, each plate being the entire product of a single hill. The collection was studied with much interest by the many thousand of visitors present, and convinced many who had seen little of the work of the Station that the institution is one that is well worthy of the people's support. This year a still larger display was made at the State Fair of Albany, over nine hundred varieties or sorts of vegetable growth being shown in the collection. The Director stated in his entry papers that the exhibition was not intended to surpass others in any respect save in the ability to instruct and to furnish reliable information by the showing of typical specimens grown under ordinary conditions of good culture, so that visitors might have an opportunity for making comparisons and drawing conclusions that might be of service. Readers will doubtless be surprised to learn that an exhibit could be made of 120 varieties of beans, 51 varieties of cabbages, 50 varieties of wheat, 40 varieties of muskmelon, 57 of onions, and 67 of tomatoes. The potatoes, as last year, were shown as the product of a single eye, grown as near as might be under equivalent conditions, and numbered 122 varieties,—among them, samples of the Will Potatoe of the Western mountains. An exhibit was also made of Insecticides and apparatus for their application, as well as other miscellaneous objects of interest to visitors. Such displays are of incalculable value to the public as "object lessons," and there can be no jealousies or other unpleasant feelings created by such non-competitive exhibits.—*Herald*.

Harvesting Potatoes.

Do not leave potatoes in the ground long after they are ready to harvest. It is cold work handling potatoes after the ground begins to freeze at night. The cold and the dirt often make the hands crack and become very sore. Besides, late digging gives the weeds and grass a chance to grow, and makes the work of digging still harder. Some think the late fall rains injure the quality of the tubers for eating. However this may be, there is nothing gained by leaving sound potatoes long in the ground after they are ripe and ready to dig. When the crop is rotting, however, it is well to leave them undug till the disease is far enough advanced, so that the unsound can be separated from the sound ones without difficulty. Dig in fair weather, so that the tubers will come out clean. Potatoes dug when the ground is muddy never look well in the bin, nor are they as saleable in the market. If the white grub is very abundant in the soil, it may be necessary to dig to save the crop, even before the vines are dead.

As the potato crop is harvested, care should be exercised in the selection of that portion that is to be held for market. Select the very best looking; under ordinary circumstances we should say that the best products of the farm were none too good for the use of the family, but in the case of potatoes there are those that are not considered marketable that are equally as good for family

use. Do not sort too close; a few small ones will spoil the looks of a large quantity. Having large, smooth, nice looking potatoes, there is little trouble in finding a sale, even with a full market.

Shall we Prune in Autumn?

To the above question we say, decidedly, yes, provided the question applies to newly-planted trees,—those set last spring or within a few years. The sooner such trees have their final shape given to them, the better. This should have been done when they were planted; but, between the hurry of spring work and the timidity of the inexperienced, who are afraid to cut, trees are quite too often set out just as they come from the nursery. Such trees must sooner or later be put into their final shape for bearing, and the sooner this is done the better. Some books on fruit culture, the French especially, give diagrams to show how the tree should be shaded. These are well enough as suggestions, but as no trees grow precisely alike, the only guides in such matters are a general idea of the laws which regulate growth, and common sense in their application. Working to pattern cannot be followed. If one has a young orchard, the first point to be considered is the height to which he will make the heads of his trees. In localities where the summer is long and hot, it is claimed that low heads shade the trunk, and thus are a benefit. Others wish to have the heads high enough to allow of the passage of teams beneath them, if need be. While there is no objection to cultivating crops in a young orchard, and, indeed, it is better to do this than to neglect the soil entirely, the practice is becoming more general of seeding the bearing orchard in clover and using it as a pasture for swine, to the mutual benefit of pigs and trees. The height of the heads being decided upon, all branches that start below this should be removed. The next point should be to secure an open and well-balanced head, with the main branches evenly disposed. Beyond this, all branches that crowd or cross one another, all "water shoots," vigorous growth, that sometimes start up in the growing season, should be cut away. The season's growth being completed, the removal of branches at this time will cause no check; and as the branches to be cut are small, no large wounds will be exposed. Hence, we say, by all means do pruning in autumn, while the weather is mild and other farm work is not pressing.—*Am. Agriculturist*.

Fall Ploughing.

Cultivated fields that have become foul by the growth of weeds or grass, and especially by the former, should receive attention by the thorough use of the plough, whereby they are turned under, and by decomposition serve to enrich the soil rather than be left to draw from its fertility. There are some seasons, of which this is one, in which it appears as though the warfare against weeds was ceaseless, and when the enemy seems to gain ground. Then is the time when the plough should be brought into exercise and kept employed as long as may be necessary to effect their subjugation. The destruction of millions of seeds, and a few minutes labor at the right times, means a saving of many hours of hard toil in the future.

Potatoes not wanted before spring may go into pits, where they will keep with less shrinkage than in the cellar. In burying, the only secrets are dry ground and plenty of cover.

New vs. Old Seed.

A writer in the *London Guardian*, referring to the well-known fact that new seeds usually germinate more quickly than old ones, says that many old ones will germinate well with heat that would perish in cold ground—a fact which should be borne in mind by those who are testing seeds in warm rooms. Among those which may be kept two seasons are named onions, salsify, and some others, while lettuce and tomatoes will continue good three seasons; cabbage, turnips, four years, and cucumbers and beets for five or six years. It must, however, be borne in mind that such rules as these are more or less arbitrary, as much depends on the condition of the seeds and the temperature and dampness of the place where they are kept, and on the condition of the soil which receives them, favorable influences sometimes more than doubling their keeping and favoring or preventing germination altogether. Another good authority says: "Many vegetable seeds, properly kept, are good to a 'green old age.' For instance, beet, celery and pumpkins at ten years, turnip four, lettuce three, cauliflower two, beans four and over, cabbage four, peas four, etc. Still, new seeds are best if fresh. Especially it is preferable to get them direct from reliable seedsmen each year than to trust to those sold on commission at the village store. Before planting any seed, whether home grown or from any other source, test each variety before intrusting them to the soil."

Feeding Jersey Cattle.

The manner of feeding, in order to produce rich and sweet milk, is a thing that to the ordinary agriculturist would appear at first sight easy of solution, but it is not so. It should be remembered that the animal whose capabilities are for milking becomes lean on the same quantity of food that will make the feeding cattle fat. The consequence of this is, that the milking cow is more affected by the changes of temperature than the fat one. Jerseys should always have a dry, clean shed; should always be protected from cold winds, and not be allowed to drink cold water if the best results are desired, though the St. Lambert herd had cold water and cold winds, but were housed every night from September to June; during the months of June, July, August and September they were housed on wet nights or days; and though the Jersey is hardy, as our experience has most undoubtedly proved, there is a great difference between obliging an animal to endure hardship unnecessarily and taking care to keep it in a good, healthy, and vigorous condition to endure hardship, should circumstances make it necessary; and as more food is required where animals are not properly housed and taken care of, it may be truly said in effect that warmth is food. And in the spring the cold nights are hurtful to the Jerseys and all high-blooded animals, as it must be confessed that the extremes for which breeding for points has been pushed have been rather conducive to an increased delicacy of constitution and physical sensitiveness, though we maintain and can prove that the Jersey is much less susceptible to this failing than are other famous breeds which have, without doubt, decreased in value on this account.

The Jerseys should be curried daily with a curry card, especially during winter. A few minutes devoted to each animal every day are profitably spent in currying it, and the benefits are soon apparent. The first requisite in feeding is, of course, abundance of food; there should be no stinting. We fed usually cut hay and large quantities of straw, which they carefully picked

over. In the early part of the winter we fed meal and chaff, but little corn meal; but later, about the end of December or beginning of January, we fed cut mangels. These are not good for Jerseys when first gathered, and we took care always to throw out all roots that showed any symptoms of decay or rotteness, as any impurity or imperfection in the food is sure to affect the milk and butter injuriously. We fed about a bucketful daily of cut mangolds to each cow, half a bucketful to those that were young, or not, for any reason or other, giving a yield of milk. It is a good plan to mix meal or shorts with the cut roots when feeding, as it corrects the loosening effects of the mangolds.

We do not believe at all in carrots or turnips for Jerseys, or in fact for any milk or butter cattle. We know that many are opposed to mangels as a food for the dairy cow, but it is only necessary to use a little care and judgment in their use. They should not be fed till January, should not be fed in too large quantities, and should have a small quantity of meal mixed with them, and then mangolds are right royal food for Jerseys, and we strongly advise their use in preference to other roots.—*H. Bradford Stephens.*

How the Danes improve their Dairy Herds.

The Danes have long been noted for the superiority of their butter. The dairy farmers have a thoroughly practical and scientific knowledge of their operations, and are also experts in the art of breeding and management. They therefore take the lead in the world's markets, and our farmers and dairymen could not act more wisely than to take a few occasional hints from their systems.

We make the following extract from Mr. Alexander Mariboe's lecture on "The Danish Dairy":—

"In selecting cows for dairy purposes, it is not so much a matter of importance to fix on any particular breed as to be careful that the individual animals chosen are in a vigorous, sound, and thriving condition. There is often the greatest difference in the yield of milk given by different cows of the same breed. Although subjected to the same treatment and diet, some of the animals will yield as much as 600 gallons per annum, while others will not give more than 300 gallons. A dairy farmer should therefore understand, first of all, how to choose animals best suited for his purposes, and this done, the rest remains in his own hands.

"The exact result of each cow's yield is easily ascertained by "trial-milking," on a certain day once a week the whole year round, and every dairy farm in Denmark is provided with a book in which not only the yield is marked down, but each cow is allotted a separate column, and its age, breed and pedigree entered, and the daily yield from the whole of the stock is also marked down, but by itself in a separate book.

"Now, let it be remembered, the actual quantity of milk yielded by a cow is no absolute criterion of its value as a butter yielder. The experiment of churning each cow's milk in a separate churn has shown that cows which give a small yield in quantity of milk often produces a larger proportion of butter than the copious milkers."

It is a mistake to give salt to stock at irregular intervals. Eating too much is injurious, and unless cows have a regular supply the milk will be very difficult to make it into good butter.

His idea of a Dairy Cow.

The other day we asked a well known butter dairyman to define his idea of a true butter cow. His answer is a good one, and is as follows:—

"I cannot give you all the considerations that belong to a 'true butter cow,' but there is one chief consideration that I will speak of that always marks such a cow: she will turn her food into butter and not into flesh. I have had good fair cows, and generally they were of Short Horn mixture, that were so imbued with the flesh-forming instinct that when I undertook to crowd them a little, they commenced to grow fat, which shewed that in their make up and heredity, they could not convert all their food into butter, as did Princess 2nd for instance. I do not want such cows; I make the most money from a cow in proportion as I can get the most butter from her. Butter is worth more than beef, and I want a breed of cows that can work up all they get into the best paying product."

Concerning Fertilizers.

Prof. Caldwell, of Cornell University, some time since made a suggestive address on Fertilizers before the Massachusetts Horticultural Society at Boston. In conclusion, he summarized his doctrine on the subject as follows:

1. That if enough of the needed elements of food of the gardener's or horticulturist's cannot be obtained in stable manure or other animal waste, it can be procured in the trade in unlimited quantity, and in every degree of availability depending on certain grades of solubility and in the greatest variety of mixtures, to suit any whim or fancy of crop or crop growers.

2. That profitable crop-growing can be carried on for at least many years with these commercial fertilizers alone.

3. That the most evident distinction between stable manure and commercial fertilizers, and the distinction upon which we should therefore base an explanation of the greatest reliability of the former, is its large proportion of vegetable matter, or humus-forming material, of which commercial fertilizers contain practically none.

4. That soils contain in a difficultly soluble condition, and therefore not easily fed upon by the crop, all the needed elements of plant food.

5. That humus, by the decay it suffers in the soil, furnishes carbonic acid and other solvent agents, and this carbonic acid appears to play an important part in the nourishment of crops, bringing this native insoluble stock of plant food within their easy reach.

6. That even if we add water soluble plant food to the soil, it becomes largely insoluble before the crop can feed upon it or needs it; therefore soluble plant food added in the soil in commercial fertilizers also needs the help of the humus finally for its solution.

7. That plant food, in most animal and vegetable residues used as manures, cost much less than in commercial manure.

8. That in spite of disadvantages that under some conditions attend the use of commercial fertilizers, they are nevertheless a very important and necessary help in crop-growing.

9. That in using these fertilizers the wisest course appears to be to make one's own mixture of the raw material, as well for securing a better manure as for economy in the first cost.

Raising Strawberries.

From the great number of Strawberries now in cultivation, it is impossible to say if any two or three, or of any half-dozen or dozen, "these are the best, and should have the preference of all others." The value of many varieties depends upon the locality where they are raised—soil, climate, and the particular market where they are disposed of determining, in some measure, their worth. Many of the varieties of the highest qualities, and which are most estimable for the garden where they are to pass directly to the table, have peculiarities which unfit them for profitable cultivation for shipping to distant markets. And, on the other hand, some of the most profitable varieties for large growers, who send them to a distance, are so inferior in quality that they would be refused at the table of a connoisseur, such as every amateur grower of this most delicious fruit should be. To some extent, every strawberry grower must test varieties for himself, but the fruits now in cultivation are all so good, and the information in regard to them so full, that there is little danger in obtaining any that is really worthless. Those who watch with anxiety the advent of every new sort of strawberry that is sent out in these days when they come almost by dozens every season, with the hope of finding one that will be near their standard of perfection, whatever that may be, are in danger of losing sight of the fact that the quality of a strawberry depends largely upon the manner in which it has been raised. The best cultivation gives the highest quality of fruit. A deep, rich soil, clean culture, an abundant supply of water during the filling of the berry, are necessary to produce the best fruit.—*Vick's Magazine*.

Bermuda Grass.

An exchange has the following item relative to this excellent grass:—

Once sodd, the work is done for one hundred years. The grazing and hay continues to improve as the sod thickens and the land becomes richer, which it will do every year. 'Tis better to have some bottoms and some uplands, especially if you have a creek bottom which you are afraid to cultivate, hence cannot utilize on account of the danger of overflows washing away the newly-plowed soil. By having bottomlands and uplands you have grazing through wet and dry seasons. Such a piece of land is worth more in Bermuda in grass than if planted in corn. The sod being very tough it is never so wet that you cannot turn stock on it. Hence you save a great deal by grazing your plow stock on wet days. Horses, cows, sheep and hogs are equally fond of it, and it is sufficiently strong to fatten them when not at work. It puts forth as easily as any grass in the spring. You can graze it till winter, or until your harvest fields are open, then take your stock off and mow it for hay in the fall, for winter feed. Or, if the lands are rich, it will grow up until fall, after the frost, and cattle and other stock will subsist on it (the dry grass) all the winter and spring, after your other crop pastures are eaten out.

It is a mistake to feed a horse heavily when he is fatigued. Most people think that no matter how tired a horse happens to be, he may be fed a liberal ration of grain, so long as he is not too warm. This is a very grave error, and results in the almost total destruction of many valuable horses every year. A tired horse is no more fit to digest a heavy feed of grain than a warm one.

The Vegetable Cellar.

In a short time now the vegetables will be taken to the cellar. Usually this place of storage is under the house, and it is, therefore, of the utmost necessity, if we regard our health, to attend to the ventilation of the cellar. If there is no ventilation, the gasses from decaying vegetables will permeate the whole house and endanger health and life. Without ventilation, too, the chances of decay are very much greater. Here, not only health, but economy, demands attention to this matter. Then the rat holes should be stopped up. Under no circumstances permit these vermin to have a free run among the fruit and vegetables. We know how difficult a problem it is sometimes to rid a premises of rats unless we resort to poisoning, which is not always agreeable. But there is no excuse for leaving holes open. Plaster them up. Use mortar in which is mixed pounded glass, then if they do get in they must come in some other way than through the old holes. We recently saw it stated that if chloride of lime was dissolved in water—making it very strong—and the liquid was poured into rat holes, it would drive the rats off the premises. We do not know how true this may be, but the remedy is cheap and is not difficult of application, and if it works it will prove a great blessing. Try it. But do not let the rats have the run of the cellar without a fight for it, at least.

Churning Experiments.

A series of experiments made at Houghton Farm by Major H. E. Aloord has led to the conclusion that in churning the whole milk there is no certainty of getting all the obtainable butter at the first churning, or even at a second churning. It has been a custom at this farm to treat the milk of every cow separately, getting the ratio of her milk and butter products on the one day, several times in the year, and keeping a daily record of her milk product. For this purpose it was sometimes usual to churn the whole milk, but sometimes only the cream. First it was noticed that the results were better when the cream was separated and churned. Next it was found that the aggregate butter product from churning the milk of one day from twenty cows, being twenty separate churnings within ten or twelve days, was not so great as when the milk of the twenty for a day was mixed and its cream churned.—*Irish Farm.*

Poor Butter.

The chief cause of poor butter is poor cream. This may arise from several causes, small in themselves, but yet sufficient to start the work of putrefaction.

Let it be remembered that rancidity is putrefaction, and putrefaction is the beginning of decay or the preliminary stages. This may not be a wholesome or appetizing remark, but it is true, nevertheless. Knowing the fact, it is well to consider carefully the conditions of the milk and cream and avoid as much as possible neglect, or condition which will affect the sweetness and soundness of either. No general rule will answer the purpose, as the milk differs from time to time, and the varying in temperature and other surroundings are constant. The cream should be raised as quickly as possible, and hence the animal heat must be driven off speedily and the milk cooled, which hardens the upward flow of the cream. As soon as the cream is up it should be separated from the milk, as the milk will undergo chemical changes sooner than the cream, and the atoms of putrefaction will taint the cream and carry on

the process in the cream. Cream needs to "ripen," as it is termed, that is, it is found to make better-flavored butter by a sufficient exposure to the air. The air must be pure. The length of exposure depends upon the temperature, shorter in summer and longer in winter, but never long enough to "whey" the cream. By this term it is understood to be a condition when the milk in the cream is so far separated from the cream as to appear like whey.

Cream in this form will not make sound butter. Salt is used to prevent putrefaction, and hence in hot weather it is best to work and salt butter as soon as the salt has time to dissolve. Buttermilk left in the butter will putrefy and taint the butter. It can be worked out easier than washed out. The working is done best when the butter is in grains or small lumps like peas.

The barrel churns puts it in this form, and hence we prefer them. They simplify the process of butter making and working. Experience is the best teacher, and the best aids of the dairymen are methods and "pains taking."

Draft Horses.

No one visiting the New England Fair in Bangor, interested in horses, failed to notice the great interest in draft horses, and their growing popularity. It was one of the good signs of the times to see the attention manifested by visitors in the noble representatives of draft horses, both from our own State and the Provinces. In conversation with their owners we found that there is a growing demand for their services, and the breeding of high grades is coming to be quite a business. With no wish to ignore or belittle the choice trotting stock spread all over our State, we feel that more attention must be given to the breeding of draft horses, and the demand of our home markets met by home production.

Gradually we are drifting away from the oxen, and the fast-walking, strongly built, compact bodied, draft horse is to fill the bill. To secure these, we must breed from the best stock-horses of the larger breeds, and these we have had the opportunity to examine during the past few weeks. The Clydesdales or English Shire horses have great size, well arched ribs, short backs, powerful limbs; the shoulders are massive and well thrown back, the neck short and well arched, knees broad and flat, feet wide at heel, deep and firm. Their faces indicated great intelligence, the nostrils and mouth large and well-formed. The only difference the novice will see in the two breeds is that of color, the Clydesdale being gray, and the English Shire horse a rich bay or brown. In all essentials they are alike. They are usually about 16½ to 17 hands high, and at maturity weigh from 1800 to 2000 lbs. each. They are clean in limb, stylish, light of foot and very strong.

The French Percheron differs from the others, in that their legs are clear of long hair, and they are more active in their motions. As a class they are docile and gentle, willing servants, ready to do their master's service. All through our State stallions of one of these breeds are being kept for service, and only good can come from the mingling of their blood with that of our brood mares. The one important feature in selecting a brood mare to breed to one of these heavy horses is that she be a fast walker. This is of the highest importance, for with size and strength, the fast walker adds value which otherwise would be impossible. The service of these horses should be in still greater demand another year, and our exhibitions filled with representatives from all parts of our State.—*Maine Farmer.*

Value of Clover.

SOME heavy soils, long cultivated without seeding, become too lumpy for free growth of clover, still containing enough plant food if it can only be got at. Thorough cultivation, so as to get clover to grow, will often do wonders on this class of soils. Thousands of acres of clay lands are in this condition. There is always hope for a heavy soil that has once been fertile. If cropped too heavily, nature interposes her veto against entire exhaustion by refusing to grow a crop. The land is then turned out to rest, which means to grow up with bushes or weeds until a new supply of vegetable mould is formed at the surface. This is a slow process, unworthy of a civilized and progressive agriculture. With a renovating crop like clover, such land may be brought into profitable farming condition within a very few years, and once made fertile, it will not be difficult to keep it so. The trouble is in the beginning of making fertility, as it is in making money. He who has, receiveth abundantly, and from him who hath not is taken what he seemeth to have.

Fall ploughing is one of the best means for restoring heavy clay soils on which clover will not grow. In our northern winters frost does much to make plant food in the soil available. It is all the better to have some crops growing to take fertility as it is developed, and for this purpose winter rye is almost without a rival. It does not make a nitrogenous manure as clover will, for it grows on land as yet to produce clover. But if any ammonia is developed in the soil, rye will retain it as effectually as anything else. For winter protection to the soil rye should be sown as early as possible, and at least two bushels to the acre. What is wanted is some green herbage to turn under in the spring to induce fermentation in the soil. As the rye will not tiller much, nor grow very large in poor soil, we get more green manure to plough under by seeding pretty thickly.

In the spring, plough again and sow with oats or barley. If the latter, it may be sown thinly and a little clover seed added. We may expect at least a partial catch of clover after this preparation, and the barley crop will probably pay the cost of cultivation and harvesting for that season. But if the soil is still too poor to grow clover, oats may be sown and the crop ploughed under just before coming into head. The ground with this preparation will undoubtedly be rich enough to bring a paying crop of wheat, provided the seed bed can be compacted sufficiently before seeding time. If wheat is then sown in the fall the land may, by this time, be seeded with clover with pretty safe expectation of a good catch and a vigorous growth forward.—*Am. Cultivator*.
