## DAVE RUSSELL TOED FARRAR REFERRING TO GOLDFRUIT

Wherein is Conveyed an Introduction to Jack Rockefeller and Other N.Y. Capitalists.

Montreal, Jan. 22.—(Special)—The well-known Edward Farrar, who has been hoisted with his own petard and the equally well-known Dave Russell has helped the petard. The other day Farrar asked thru a Montreal friend an interview with the famous promoter, and after some hesitation Russell granted the request but knowing that Farrar is the confidential agent of his bitter enemies at Ottawa, the promoter said to himself, "Dave, be on your guard." His first thought was that Farrar had been sent as an emissary from the Hon. Mr. Emmerson, minister of railways, yet he listened in order to see what Brother Farrar would have to say. It is related that "Red" looked round to see that all the doors were closed, and then trusted that there was a chance to build the Grand Trunk Pacific, and that he would like to know some of Mr. Russell's millionaire New York friends. Mr. Russell soon took leave of his master and wrote him the following letter later on.

Montreal, Jan. 19, 1906.

Dear Sir.—With reference to the appointment you asked me for, thru Geo. H. Ham, and which I made and kept with you at my office, the very convenient to myself on Saturday evening last, I have been thinking over the advisability of my complying with your wishes and of introducing you to the proper capitalists in New York who could handle the proposition you were kind enough to lay before me at our interview, and which was certainly too stupendous for my limited capacity.

However, I never have had the pleasure of coming in close contact with you, on account of George being a friend of mine, and I have not been asked for a letter to Rockefeller and Harriman, and herewith enclose same, which I trust will have the desired effect, whatever that may be.

"I am sending you by Dominion Express prepaid a small parcel, found in my office immediately after you left, alongside the chair on which you sat, and I think it was intended for you. I would advise you to take your friend Henry to New York along with you, as he would be able to explain the intricacies of the line to Rockefeller and Harriman. But, in my judgment, it would be very unwise to hand out to these gentlemen the 'Grand Trunk' story, which you gave me, as I know Rockefeller has already had it, and has told me that he had given up chasing it."

"I would therefore suggest that you carry this brick on them, as I am told they are 'easy'."

"You will notice that in addressing Rockefeller I have called him 'Jack.' But that is merely because he always calls me 'Dave.'"

"David Russell."

## Fault Finding Begins Bad Temper is Shown Commission Inquires

French and German Delegates to Moroccan Conference Spend Day in Bickering, and Prospects of Agreement are Fading.

Algiers, Jan. 22.—The plenipotentiaries were entertained at today's sitting of the Moroccan conference by an almost continuous skirmish between M. Revoil, head of the French delegation, and Count Von Tattenbach, the second of the German delegates. While the amenities were carefully observed, the other delegates were conscious that today was the beginning of fresh controversies between France and Germany, which are likely to be long and bitter.

The styles of fence displayed by the two plenipotentiaries, M. Revoil was keen, analytical of mind, skilful in diplomatic phrasing and with a grace of expression and a winning personality. Count Von Tattenbach, on the other hand, was a stolid, soldierly manner, trusting to the solidity of his ideas and to his facts.

The delegates are not in sympathy, and draw apart outside the council room. Both are of high ambition, and it will be difficult for either to yield to the other.

## French Fight at Tonquin Chinese Lose 300 Killed

Invasion by Oriental Soldiers Resisted in a Desperate Three-Hours' Battle.

Marseilles, Jan. 22.—The Chinese mail which arrived here today brought an account of the invasion of Tonquin, French Indo-China by Chinese regulars who encountered a French force numbering 400 men, of whom 150 were Europeans.

A three-hour battle ensued resulting in the defeat of the Chinese, who lost 300 killed and 300 wounded. The French lost 100 men of the foreign legion, and 20 Annamites killed.

## Priest Charged with Theft Kept Money for Vestments

Polish Congregation in Winnipeg Has Pastor in Court on Serious Charge.

Winnipeg, Jan. 22.—(Special)—Father William Blazowski, pastor of St. Martin Polish Catholic Church, has been accused by members of his congregation of stealing \$450, which was entrusted to him by trustees to be expended in purchasing church vestments.

The case came before the police magistrate today, when Father Blazowski pleaded to be tried by a jury.

A special collection was made for the purpose of purchasing the vestments, and money was turned over to the priest. He ordered vestments from a New York firm, but they have been unable to make collection, while Father Blazowski will give no satisfaction to his congregation.

## WOMAN TAKES POISON Separated From Husband and Victim of Gloom.

Mrs. George Foote, whose husband lives at 48 Madras-place, committed suicide at a lodging house, 62 Beech street, at an early hour this morning by taking carbolic acid.

The woman had been separated from her husband for some years. She took her last meal at a restaurant on Monday, and two weeks ago in the lodging house, where she ended her life.



## POWER FOR TEMISKAMING INDUSTRIES WANT SOME, TOO

Government Receives Much Encouragement in Proposal to Introduce Electricity.

The electrification of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railroad is well thought of around the parliament buildings, and the proposal of the commission at present is to develop power to propel the system for about 123 miles. The expense bothers thoughtful ones, but there is another proposition to provide power to various industries along the line, and advances have already been made by some concerns with a view of having access to the railway company's energy. In view of this is the suggestion that sufficient power be provided at once to run the road, and that the plant should be of sufficient magnitude to provide for probable extensions, and in the meantime industries at Cobalt and other places could be accommodated, and thus an outside revenue would be forthcoming on the capital invested. The power will be obtained from the Montreal River, which is on the line of railway not far from Cobalt, and a sufficient number of industries are said to have signified their desire to purchase it to warrant serious consideration of the proposal to provide it in plenty.

## SOAKED IN OIL; FIRES HERSELF.

Awful Method Adopted by Sorrowing Woman to End Life.

Ithaca, N.Y., Jan. 22.—Despondent over the recent death of her mother, Miss Katie Van Valkenburg, aged 25, of Van Etten, burned herself to death, and set fire to herself with a match.

## DONALD McMASTER DEFEATED LABOR VOTE AGAINST HIM

Former Montreal K.C. Defeated by 2006, to Evident Disappointment of Lady Politicians.

## CHAMBERLAIN ADMITS SURPRISE

Realizes Now That a Political Revolution is in Progress—Only Two of Yesterday's Returns Are In.

London Jan. 22.—Donald McMaster, K.C., lately of Montreal, has fallen in his effort to wrest the Leigh division of Lancaster from the Liberal column and was defeated today by J. P. Brunner, the Liberal candidate, by 2006, the vote being 7175 to 5169. The constituency has been Liberal for over 50 years by majorities ranging in the neighborhood of a thousand. At last election the majority was reduced to 120. The riding includes large mining interests and the labor vote is considerable.

Appealing for the labor vote the Liberal candidate pointed out in a recent speech that Mr. McMaster had spoken against labor candidates in other ridings while he himself had shown friendship for labor by loaning his motor car to three labor candidates, and each of them won.

But the campaign has not been entirely in vain for the Conservative candidate, as a report from yesterday after his meetings several ladies insisted on kissing Mr. McMaster.

While I never have had received tonight out of 22 pollings to-day. Sir J. F. Leese retains the Accrington division, and a report from the Liberal by 2307 over a Unionist and Independent Socialist. The Gorton division of Lancashire was won by the Liberal, John Hodge, defeating Sir W. Rye, Conservative, by 4225. The seat was won for the Conservatives by Ernest Hatch, whose majority was 203, in 1904, but Mr. Hatch went over to the Liberals last year and did not seek re-election.

Will Know To-Day.  
Austen Chamberlain's fate will be announced tomorrow, but certainty arises from the fact that 9000 new voters have been added to the list since the last contest in 1902.

In the short race for the biggest majority Romford bids fair to be second. Sir Ernest Barker, Conservative, with 10,705, in the City of London riding at the top, but Romford today displaced him.

A BIG WEIGHT OF COONS.  
A FEW COUNTY MAN WHOSE FEINDS OF COONS INCREASED TWENTY-FIVE FOLD.

W. J. Thompson, of Logan Township, Perth Co., gave a coon story to the World's Editor of the World. 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STRENGTH OF LABOR PARTY

Present Object is to Restore the Old Position of Trades Unionism.

London, Jan. 20.—(N. Y. Sun Cable.)—The position of the Labor party in the country and in the next house of commons is the outstanding feature of this election. It marks an epoch in the parliamentary history of Great Britain. Fifty thousand Labor-Socialist votes were given in 1885 without returning any members. This figure will probably have risen by the end of the present election to half a million votes, which will return from 40 to 50 members more or less independent of government whips.

The Laborites are even stronger in the country than is indicated by their election success. Wherever Labor and Liberal candidates have been running together for double-membered constituencies, the former, in all but a few instances, have come out on top, the poll in some cases leaving the Liberal candidate far behind, and in others the Laborites evidently bringing him in on his own back. In one big north country constituency the Laborites put up before the election only three days before the election, and carried him in easily against the Liberal. Had they fully realized their own strength, there would have been many more Labor members in the new house.

The Laborites doubtless reaped the benefit of the trade unionism which has been established themselves, the protectionists in fact, are beginning to assert that, by means of future Laborites, they will gain their point against the free traders.

Working for Unionism. At present the Laborites are working chiefly in the cause of trade unionism. Their aim is the restoration of the position of trade unionism before the 1874 Railway Act, which made a union liable to be sued. When they have established themselves, the protectionists in fact, are beginning to assert that, by means of future Laborites, they will gain their point against the free traders.

There is no question but that the use of motor cars has greatly increased the number of voters. This rapid and easy method of getting to the voting station has had considerable effect on elections, where the very anxious about voting. IN THE NETS OF 'CON' MEN

JUST PRIOR TO HIS DEATH

Another Odd Circumstance is Added to the Edwards Mystery.

New York, Jan. 22.—The surprising discovery has been made that for several months prior to his mysterious death, Charles A. Edwards had been associated in business with James Henry Langley, alias "Doc" Langley, one of the most notorious confidence men in the country. Langley is an convict and has been arrested many times on charges of grand larceny and obtaining money by false pretenses. Under the name of "Langley," he has been charged with a number of crimes. He is now in an alliance with a band of criminals who have offices scattered throughout Greater New York, with branches in other cities.

Langley is a white-haired man of 64 years, well educated and a convincing talker. He comes from the city of Haven family, and in his early years attended Yale, also he was not graduated. Mr. Edwards came in him as a most agreeable companion. He was introduced to several of Langley's friends in the confidence business, and it is believed they were planning to do him a considerable sum of money at the time he came to his death by violence.

COL. PUGMIRE'S APPOINTMENT

Pugmire, for he is to travel to his regular assignment of penitentiaries throughout the country, he will be required to visit and supervise the metropolises at Dawson City, Vancouver, B.C., Toronto, Halifax, St. John, N.B., and St. John's, Newfoundland.
