During the summer the most abundant rains refresh the ground. The tropical rains commence in June, and in the autumn equinox of September and finally terminate in the beginning of November...

English Engineers Prepare Estimates of the Cost of Delivery of 50,000 Horse-Power in Toronto.

Mr. Henry Symons, Q.C., has just returned from England, where he had estimates prepared for the construction of the proposed works of the Welland Power Co.

The estimate for the machinery to generate 100,000 horse-power at a voltage of 10,000 and delivery of 50,000 horse-power, or 250,000 for excavation and other work connected with the undertaking, \$1,520,000.

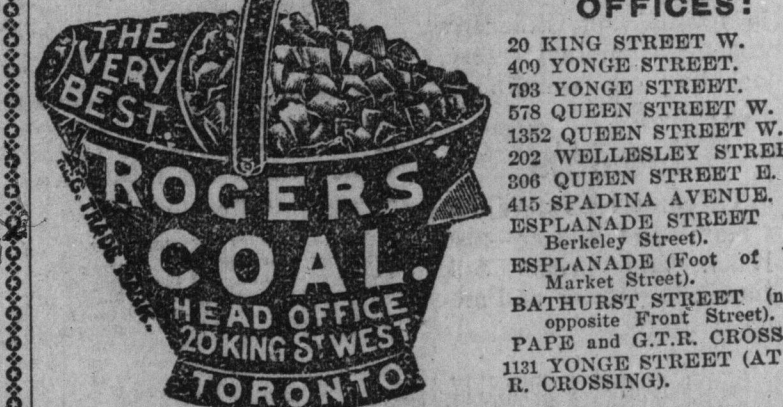
