As to the Coronation Contingent, applications continue to pour into the department, and the Minister of Militia is, no doubt, having an interesting time with those who would fain influence him politically in the selection of the officers.

SON CAUSED HER DEATH.

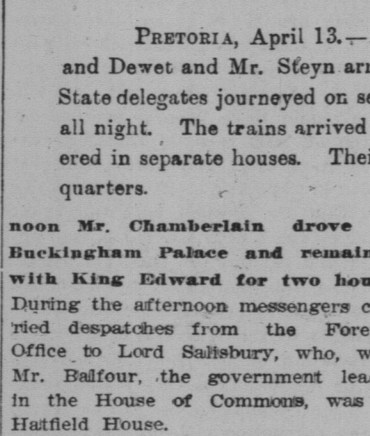

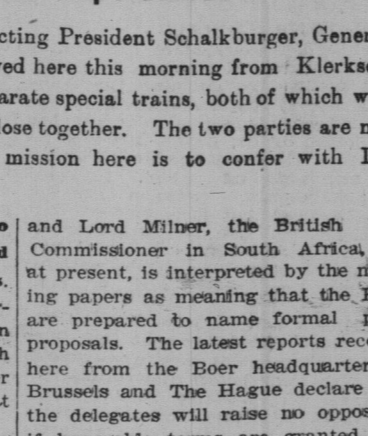

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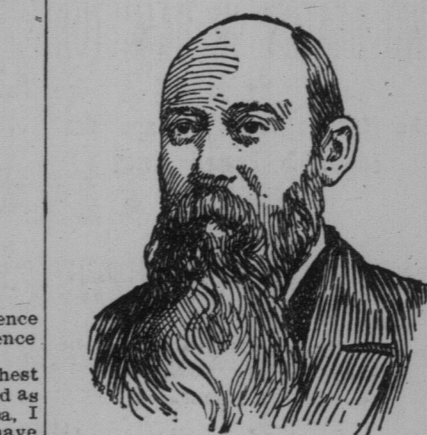

The amount of money paid by Canadians to the United States fire and life insurance companies is growing smaller from year to year, but it still amounts to much the larger sum. According to the last blue book Canadians paid during 1901 to United States companies for fire insurance cash premiums amounting to \$1,331,000 and for life insurance the sum of \$4,700,000, or a total of \$6,031,000.

During the year 1901 six United States insurance companies were given risks in Canada to the amount of \$107,000,000. Up to the present time, dating from 1860, the United States companies have received over \$18,000,000 in net cash premiums from the fire and life insurance in the United States in a period of somewhere about thirty years has been \$86,000,000.

On the 18th of March 240 ratepayers of the town of Oakville voted in favor of granting the Kitley Cigar Co. a bonus of \$1000 a year for ten years, and 27 against it, yet it failed 5 of carrying the said bylaw, which required two-thirds of all the ratepayers on the revised voters' list. Nine of the persons having died since the voters' list was prepared, a recount or scrutiny was held here on day before His Honor Judge Gorham for determining whether the nine deceased persons should be struck off the list. By having these struck off, there would be a majority for the bylaw. His Honor ruled that these persons having been deceased since the preparation of the voters' list should not be counted in with the total number. The bylaw therefore is carried.

CANADA AND UNITED STATES

Latter Enjoys More of Our Customs Than the Rest of the World Put Together.

DUTY ON COAL SHOULD BE TAKEN OFF

Then the Consul-General at Montreal Thinks the Yankee Would Gain More.

Washington, April 13.—The United States enjoys more of Canadian custom than any other country in the world. Attention is directed to this fact in that portion of "Commercial Relations of 1901" (now in press), which deals with United States trade with Canada, an extract of which was given out for publication by Mr. Egan, chief of the Bureau of American Commerce, to-day. It is pointed out, so closely allied are trade conditions in this country and Canada that prosperity or depression in the United States immediately finds re-echo in the train of our northern neighbor.
