

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS.

To the Governors, Subscribers and Friends of the Mackay Institution for Protestant Deaf-mutes.

The Report of the Managers for the year 1884-85 is now respectfully presented as follows viz:—

It was considered advisable this year to dispense with the Public Annual General Meeting, in view of the recommendation of the Health Board, that public meetings should not be held unless matters of necessity required it. Although every preventive measure has been taken to preserve the health of the pupils yet the serious consequences which would follow from the entrance of any disease of an epidemic nature into such an Institution, called for the greatest caution on the part of the Managers and decided them to omit the attendance of the pupils.

Both reasons therefore induced the Managers to have their Annual Meeting as quiet as possible. The Managers regret the need of this course inasmuch as these Annual Meetings have always been pleasant and instructive and affording to subscribers an opportunity of ascertaining the amount of good that is being done by this Institution.

To Drs. Howard and Buller for gratuitous services rendered in the fall of 1884 the Managers beg to return their thanks.

During the past year the nucleus of a Library has been formed, and while some donations of books have been received, the Managers would like to call the attention of friends to this matter. Donations of suitable books will be thankfully received.

The following resolution of the Managers passed at their usual Monthly Meeting in March 1885 fully expresses their feeling of loss in the death of their senior Vice-President, Mr. T. Cramp.

Resolved that the Managers of the Mackay Institution for Protestant Deaf-Mutes in this Province desire to place on record their sense of the severe loss which they and the Institution itself have sustained through the recent decease of Mr. Thomas Cramp. Mr. Cramp was deeply interested in the scheme from the very outset when the original home was provided for the inmates, and before the munificence of the late Mr. Joseph Mackay had procured for them their present abode.

Mr. Cramp's sympathy for the good work extends over a period of fifteen years. How earnestly and practically he took part in various efforts for the welfare of the community is too well known to need even a passing allusion. But inasmuch as the Mackay Institution owes a special debt of gratitude to him, the Managers desire to express this in a most emphatic way, and resolve likewise that a copy of the resolution be forwarded to Mrs. Cramp, testifying their gratitude to her deceased husband and their sympathy with herself and her family in their present heavy affliction.

Dr. Chas. E. Cameron kindly consented to act as Assistant Honorary Physician, and on the retirement of Dr. Molson, who for several years has given his services to the Institution with great satisfaction to all, Dr. Cameron was requested to act as Honorary Physician and has kindly assented to the request of the Managers.

The examination of the pupils took place in June, the examiner being the Rev. Canon Norman assisted by the Rev'ds. Messrs. Wells and Barnes, and the report by Canon Norman appears further on.

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Several alterations have been made in the Teachers' staff for the year 1885—86 which will be more fully explained in the Superintendent's report.

The Buildings and out-houses have received careful attention, during the year and considerable improvements have been made. The buildings and grounds are in a very satisfactory condition, and are well adapted for conserving the health of the pupils and for affording them facilities of recreation.

The Superintendent has devoted great attention to carrying out the objects of the Institution, and in connection with a Committee of Ladies. has materially increased the comfort of the pupils and the efficiency of the administration. The other officers of the Institution have also exhibited zeal and energy in their special departments, which deserve your thanks.

### THE FIFTEENTH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

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The Annual Meeting of the Mackay Institution for Protestant Deaf-Mutes, was held this day in the Board Room of the Molsons Bank, at half past 3 o'clock p.m., when there were present a number of ladies and gentlemen.

The Rev. Canon Norman, read the Report of the Managers, of the Superintendent and of the Examination of the pupils at close of the session.

The Chairman called upon the Secretary-Treasurer to read the Financial Statement of the year 1884-85.

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### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT.

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To the Board of Managers of the Mackay Institution:

In submitting the 15th Annual Report of the internal management of the Institution, I have most gratefully to record our exemption from illness during the past year, and as a proof of this immunity shall call your attention to the fact that our esteemed physicians, Drs. Molson and Cameron, paid us but one visit respectively from September, 1884 to June, 1885. When you consider the amount of contagious fevers, diphtheria, etc. prevalent in the city during the past winter and spring, you will acknowledge that we have abundant cause for gratitude. Our freedom from illness speaks well for the vigilant care bestowed upon the pupils. Great attention is given to their personal cleanliness, to good diet and ventilation of rooms. They have also the advantage of abundant outdoor exercise, and this contributes in no small degree towards their high standard of health.

At Christmas you provided the pupils with toboggans and snow-shovels. A snow-shoe club was also formed by Miss Terrill and Mr. Ashcroft and some of the parents supplied their children with blanket suits, which were made by the girls in the sewing room. Long tramps into the country were taken almost every day in company with a teacher. During the Christmas holidays the pupils got up a pantomine, to which they invited their friends from the city, and at intervals throughout the winter the pupils were entertained by Mr. George R. Prowse with a stereopticon exhibition, Mr. J. T. Donald, B.A. with an interesting lecture on chemistry and Mr. Lilly, of Mount Royal Vale, with a magic lantern display. Miss Mina Macdonald, of Toronto, sent a Christmas gift for each pupil, and expressed her intention of doing so each year.

In January we were the recipients of a valuable set of books from Mr. and Mrs. F. Wolferstan Thomas, which served as a nucleus for a library, a desideratum long felt by both teachers and pupils. Other friends followed their example, and we were soon in possession of over 200 volumes. A list of the donors will be found under the head of acknowledgements. No repairs or alterations were made during the summer holidays, except a change in the situation of the windmill. It is now raised to a greater height in order that it may work more easily and catch every passing breeze. The number of pupils in attendance during the year was 23 boys and 20 girls. Two of this number finished their course at the close of the session, viz; Emma VanVliet and Charles Meech. The latter is now employed in the Department of the Interior of the Government at Ottawa with a good salary.

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No applications for the admittance of Blind pupils have been received. A valuable set of books in raised type, writing slates, &c were sent us by Dr. Anagnos, Superintendent of the Perkins Institution for the Blind, in South Boston, he merits our grateful acknowledgements. On the 18th of June last the Annual Mid-summer Examinations took place in the Institution hall. A large number of visitors were present. The Gazette of the 16th contains the following:—

"The annual examinations and closing exercises of the Mackay Institution for Protestant Deaf-Mutes and the Blind were held in the hall of the Institution on Friday morning last. Busses conveyed many vistors from the city, and after a pleasant drive along the Cote St. Antoine road, the institution was reached before 10 o'clock thus giving all who wished to do so ample time to inspect the building. Many availed themselves of this opportunity, and the common verdict of all was that everything was in excellent order from the well kept grounds surrounding the building to the comfortably furnished interior. housekeeper, Mrs. Clarke, kindly conducted visitors through the institution, and she must have been much gratified to hear the well deserved praise from all concerning the neatness and comfort everywhere apparent. At 10 o'clock the examinations which were conducted by the Rev. Dr. Norman and assisted by the Rev. Messrs. Wells, Day, and Barnes, commenced.

The Rev. Dr. Norman, before beginning, in a few remarks referred to the difficulties connected with deaf-mute teaching, and the errors which they were so accustomed to make, and asked the audience to bear in mind the great disadvantages deaf-mutes were under as compared with speaking children, when passing judgment on the work performed by the children. The first division of the Infant class was called upon, and the two little girls. Effie Henderson and Rosie Silverman, both of whom are under six years of age, surprised and delighted the audience by the legible manner in which they wrote on the board the letters of the alphabet and the names of articles. They were followed by the Second division of this class, which showed a further advancement in being able to write the qualities of things, and to construct simple sentences. This class he been taught by Miss Jessie Macfarlane during the session, and reflects much credit upon her abilities as a teacher.

The Second class was then examined in language, arithmetic and Scripture, and gave evidence of the careful and painstaking training it had received at the hands of the teacher, Miss Edith Terrill. The pupils of the two divisions of the third class, taught by Mr. John Ashcroft, showed that they also had received a thorough training in the various branches taught, which, in addition to language, Scripture and arithmetic, consisted of geography, history, and French. Alexander and Albert Stewart, who comprised the blind class were next brought forward and answered readily all the questions put to them in English history. They also received instruction in reading, writing, Scripture, geography, grammar and arithmetic, and would, had time permitted, have shown just as great a degree of proficiency in any or all of these subjects as they had done in history. The writing of the eldest boy, which was on exhibition was remarkably legible. Mr. Ashcroft was their teacher in all subjects except reading and writing, which latter were taught by Miss

The fourth or highest class then attested by the carefully drawn maps, the excellently written compositions, the solving of practical problems in arith-

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metic, the parsing and analysing of sentences and the answering of questions in history, that it had benefited much by the careful training received from the teacher, Miss H. E. McGann. The method of teaching articulation was indicated by Miss McGann; a class of new beginners, repeating distinctly any of the sounds, represented on the board by mysterious looking symbols, but which were well understood by the children. A more advanced class, consisting of Etta Wiggett and Willie Spiers showed how nicely they could be taught to speak and the pupils of a still further advanced class not only spoke but read the lips of the teacher so perfectly that they were able to perform anything they were asked to do. The articulation classes have been taught by Miss McGann and Miss Terrill. Bell's system of visible speech was the one used This brought to a close the very interesting examinations, which had been interspersed with sign recitations. Rev. Dr. Norman then briefly addressed the audience thanking them for their presence, feeling sure that they would acknowledge, after what they had seen, that the institution was doing a good work, and was well deserving of all the support and sympathy that could be accorded it. He also referred to the loss the institution would sustain in the departure of Miss Terrill whose thorough knowledge of deaf-mutes and capabilities as a teacher made her services of the greatest value. Prizes were then distributed to the pupils fortunate enough to have taken a high standing in the written examinations, and short addresses delivered by the other clergymen present, after which Rev. Dr. Norman gave some parting advice to the pupils, which was interpreted to them by the Superintendent, Miss McGann, and the exercises were brought to a close. Articles of clothing, fancy work, printing and drawing, the work of the pupils, were on exhibition. The reception room was converted for the time being into an art gallery, and the pictures exhibited, consisting of pencil and crayon sketches, water colors, and an oil painting, showed considerable talent. Mr. Charles Meech had charge of the drawing class. Mr McClelland's pupils did well in printing, as was shown by the specimens of their work on view. Mrs. Collins.

and Miss Oates had charge of the sewing and fancy work departments respectively. Specimens of pupils' carpentry work were also exhibited in various parts of the building. Visitors are always cordially welcomed to the Institution and a single visit is all that is necessary to awaken one's sympathies to the good work accomplished. Below is given a list of the successful competitors for prizes:—

Class III.—Charles Wickens, first in language, Scripture and arithmetic; James L. Walker, prize for improvement; George J. Watt, first in Scripture, geography and Canadian history; Norman Wilson, first in arithmetic and Scripture; Charles Hopkins, first in language; Edith Stanley, first in writing and application to studies; Annie Nichol, first in sewing; Esther Wilkey, first in printing; Willie Spiers, prize in articulation.

Blind Class—Alexander Stewart, first in reading, writing, history, geography and arithmetic; Albert Stewart, first in history and recitation.

Class II.—William Garland. prize for industry; Eugene Libbey, first in carpentry; Fred. Williams, prize for application; Rush Aldrich, first in language; Etta Wiggett, first in arithmetic, articulation and sewing; Willie Roman, prize for proficiency and good conduct; Walter Astle, prize for good conduct.

Class I.—Eva Jamieson, first in language; Rosie Silverman, prize for application and personal neatness; Effie Henderson, first in general proficiency. Three prize books were awarded by Miss Jennie Palmer. Two special prizes in sewing and domestic economy were awarded by Mrs. F. Wolferstan Thomas.

The Rev. Dr. Norman comes in contact with the pupils weekly during the year, thus becoming intimate with their peculiarities and attainments; this knowledge enables him to conduct their examinations more efficiently than any persons outside of the Institution would be capable of doing. The results as set forth in his report are such as to convince you that the teachers have worked assiduously and faithfully. In the instruction of the classes our energies are bent towards imparting a thorough knowledge of the English language and although signs are used in the religious exercises and in a limited degree in the class rooms, our aim is to suppress them out of school, and encourage oral conversation and conversation by means of the manual alphabet, thus our pupils acquire a greater command of language and use fewer muteisms. I

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regret to record Miss Terrill's resignation as teacher at the close of the school year. Her experience in teaching the deaf and dumb and her interest in them rendered her peculiarly adapted to the work. Miss E. Hepburn, a Normal School graduate, was elected to fill the vacancy, and entered on her duties last September. Instruction in Articulation is given daily. Some of the little ones express themselves quite distinctly, and in voices as sweet as if they had never been deprived of hearing. The Venerable Archdeacon Farrar of Westminster, England, who visited our school early in September expressed himself much pleased at the degree of proficiency attained in speech by some of the pupils who were born deaf. The Class in drawing has been during the past session in charge of Mr. Charles Meech, a pupil in the advanced class of the Institution. The work done by the pupils is creditable to themselves and their teacher.

continues to be taught to all the girls. They make their own dresses and keep in repair the table and bed linen, and take turns in attending to household matters. Knitting and fancy work were introduced last term when the blind learned to knit.

### THE RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION

has been conducted as heretofore. The Rev. Dr. Norman attends weekly and gives instruction in the Bible, and on Sunday afternoons, a Professor or student of the Presbyterian Theological College officiates, the

Superintendent interpreting by means of the signs. We are deeply indebted to these gentlemen for their kind assistance and interest in our work.

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The pupils' Annual Picnic took place on St. Helen's Island, and afforded unbounded pleasure to all. A notice of the day's amusement appeared in the Witness from which we cull the following:—

"The annual picnic of the pupils of the Mackay Institution for deaf-mutes was held on St. Helen's Island on Tuesday, at which there were from forty to fifty of the pupils present, and a number of their relatives and friends, both boys and girls, numbering probably some twenty-five more, &c., &c.

There were races of various kinds competed for, with a heart and good grace by both boys and girls of the pupils, which would do credit to any similar number of children enjoying the senses of speech, hearing and sight, of which great blessings these pupils are deprived. All present, pupils and visitors, were provided with abundance of eatables and cooling drinks, and suitable prizes in the way of earrings, brooches, scarf-pins, rings, fishing-tackle, &c., and a number of boxes of confectionery were awarded to the successful competitors amongst the girls and boys in the various games. The day was a pleasant one and all enjoyed it very much, &c., &c."

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### EXAMINERS' REPORT.

With the kind assistance of the Rev. G. H. Wells of the American Presbyterian Church, and the Rev. W. S. Barnes of the Church of the Messiah, I superintended the Examination of the Mackay Institution for Deaf-mutes on the morning of June 12th. There was a large audience present, and much interest was manifested in the proceedings. I am glad to say, that the examination fully came up in results to those held in former years. The writing was, as it always has been, excellent, and the spelling almost uniformly perfectly correct. The pupils of the Institute sometimes, in the excitement of an examination, misplace letters, but scarcely ever introduce wrong or omit right cnes. The answering in Geography was also especially satisfactory, and the Scripture History and Arithmetic very creditable. I noticed with pleasure that a decided advance was apparent in one important point. There was more evidence of independent thought and reasoning power than I had ever observed before. The answering was less mechanical, and there was greater diversity of expression. This is surely a proof of mental progress. The drawing was very good, and does full credit to the youthful instructor, Mr. Charles G. Meech. The Articulation classes were, as usual, the most attractive feature of the examination. Miss Jessie Macfarlane, Miss Nellie Jones, and little Miss Etta Wiggett were remarkable in their power of lip-reading and articulation. The last named pupil speaks almost as naturally and easily as most children blest with the powers of hearing and

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speech. Norman Wilson also did very creditably. Frank Wiggett, one of the most advanced of the members of this class, and one of the most generally intelligent of the pupils, was unfortunately absent, owing to delicate health. He was much missed by all. Two of the most interesting pupils of the infant class are Effie Henderson and Rosie Silverman. The latter has only been a few months in the Institution, but already writes well, and in grammar knows nouns and adjectives, also in arithmetic simple numbers. The 2nd class contains pupils of all ages and was examined in Bible History, Arithmetic (simple addition) and Grammar. In these subjects they did very satisfactorily. The 3rd class, 1st division, has in its ranks some very bright pupils. These were examined in English, geography, arithmetic and the Ten Commandments, in which they acquitted themselves well. Much amusement was caused by their accounts of their enjoyment of the good things at their picnic. The 2nd division of the 3rd class gave some very creditable answering in more advanced Arithmetic, and also in Canadian History. The 4th, the highest class, did very good Arithmetic, Geography, maps, etc. and English composition. The Examination, it may be said, was a perfectly fair and impartial one, conducted almost entirely by visitors present, one or two of whom, not being fully acquainted with the limited reasoning powers of deaf-mutes, when young, gave some rather puzzling questions. We also had the national anthem and "twinkle, twinkle little star" given in sign language, a very graceful and suggestive performance, though sad, owing to its soundless character. I must not pass by the two poor blind boys, Alexander and Albert Stewart. They gave us recitations, and their knowledge of English History was remarkably clear and accurate. I can only

emphasize our satisfaction at the happy, healthy look of the pupils, and the sound character of the education imparted. The teachers are all efficient, and it is much to be regretted that the Institute is about to lose the valuable services of Miss Edith Terrill. All parents, who have deaf-mute children, should avail themselves of the opportunities offered at the Mackay Institute. I may here remark, that the printing is well taught, under the direction of Mr. McClelland. The work done would do credit to any establishment. The boys are also taught carpentering, in which they are making good progress, and the girls all kinds of needle and fancy work. Specimens of these were exhibited.

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### BY-LAWS

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OF THE

### PROTESTANT INSTITUTION

FOR

### DEAF-MUTES AND THE BLIND.

I. For the supervision of the affairs of the Corporation, there shall be a Board of Governors, which shall be composed of not more than twenty five Life Governors, being those persons of either sex who shall have subscribed the sum of five hundred dollars or upwards to the Institution, and who shall not be in arrear on any call made on such subscription, and of the Governors exoffice as call for by the amendment to the charter consequent upon the donation of Joseph Mackay, Esq., and of a like number of Elective Governors of either sex, to be chosen and elected at the Annual General meeting of the Corporation, for one year only, from those who shall have subscribed in one sum, not less than one hundred dollars to the Institution, or who shall subscribe a sum of not less than twenty five dollars as an annual subscription for not less than five years; provided always, that no person shall be a Governor who shall not be of the L'rotestant faith; and that if there be more than twenty five persons qualified to be Life Governors of the Corporation, the twenty five persons who being otherwise qualified have priority in the order of their subscription, shall be such Life-Governors.

II. The immediate management and conduct of the Institution shall be vested in a Board of Managers, of not less than twelve in number, who shall act for three years, one third retiring annually, as fixed by By-Law

No. 10, and such Board shall cause minutes of their proceedings and acts to be duly kept, and shall from time to time, report the same to the Board of Governors, as may be provided by any by-law, rule or regulation to that effect, and the Board of Managers may be in whole or in part of either sex, and shall be elected at a meeting of the Board of Governors to be held on the first Saturday of November of each year. The Board of Governors shall also then elect a President, three Vice-Presidents, three Lady Directresses, Secretary-Treasurer and Physician, who shall be members of the Board of Managers and be elected annually.

III. The Annual General Meeting of the Corporation for the election of Governors and the transaction of business shall be held on the last Saturday in October of each year, at which meeting the scale of voting shall be as follows:—For annual subscribers of not less than five dellars, and all persons paying for the maintenance or education of any inmate of any asylum, one vote; for contributors of larger sums, one vote in addition for each five dellars subscribed. But no subscriber or contributor shall have more than twenty votes.

IV. At all meetings of the Corporation, or the Board of Governors or Board of Managers, the voting shall be open unless a ballot is demanded by a subscriber then present.

V. The Board of Managers shall meet on the first Tuesday of each month, at which meetings as well as at those of the Board of Governors, three shall constitute a quorum. They shall have full control over the collection, investment and expenditure of all monies belonging to the Corporation, with the exception of the purchase, mortgage or sale of real estate, any of which will require the concurrence of a majority of the Board of Governors at a meeting called for the purpose, by written notice to its members, of the time, place and object of the meeting, a week before the date thereof.

It shall be the duty of the Board of Managers to audit, inspect and approve all accounts, and to order or refuse payment of the same; to engage and discharge all servants of the Corporation and to fix their wages.

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They shall have the general charge and care of the property of the Corporation, and they shall have power, and it shall be their duty to carry out and maintain those objects for which the Corporation has been established, and to oversee and control—subject to the By-Laws—everything connected with the management thereof.

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The Board of Managers shall submit to the Board of Governors at the annual meeting of the Corporation, a general report of their operations and a full statement of the accounts for the year ending the 30th June last past, and these accounts and statements shall be audited before each annual meeting by an accountant who shall be appointed for that purpose annually by the Board of Managers.

VI. All warrants for payment shall be signed by the President, or in his absence by the Vice-President and by the Secretary-Treasurer.

VII. It shall be the duty of the Sec-Treasurer to keep regular minutes of the proceedings at all meetings of the Board of Managers as well as of the Sub-committees, and to lay the Minute Book containing the same before the Board of Governors at each of their meetings. He shall also give written notice to each member of the Board of Managers of all meetings. All accounts of expenditure shall pass through his hands, and shall be laid by him once a month before the Board of Managers for their examination and approval, preparatory to their being discharged; he shall also sign all warrants for the payment of such accounts, and he shall keep a correct account in the books of the Corporation of all receipts and expenditures and produce the bank-book of the Institution for the inspection of the Managers.

VIII. All and every the funds and property of the Corporation shall be appropriated and applied solely for the purposes of the Corporation, and the payment of all such outlays and expenditures as may legitimately be incurred in connection therewith, and for carrying into effect the objects contemplated by the Act of Incorporation, subject, however, to the special provisions contained in that Act; provided always that any surplus amount shall be from time to time invested in public

esecurities, or in the security of mortgages within the city of Montreal, or in the bonds of public institutions or such other securities as a resolution of the Managers may direct and no other, and the said Corporation shall have power to mortgage on its immovable property, for any part of the purchase money thereof, or for the purpose only of obtaining funds for the erection and maintenance of the building or buildings necessary for the Institution.

IX. The Board of Managers shall at their monthly meetings appoint two members as a Visiting Committee, whose duty it shall be to visit the Institution and supervise its management during the ensuing month.

X. The one-third of the managers who shall retire annually subject to re-election shall be the first names on the roll of the managers for the past year.

XI. Any vacancy caused by the death, resignation or permanent disability of any Elective Governor, shall be filled by the election, by the remaining Governors, of a duly qualified person to supply his place. Any vacancy in the Board of Managers occurring by the death, resignation or permanent disability of any member thereof shall be filled by the election, by the Board of Managers, of a qualified member to supply such vacancy, and the termof office of such person so elected shall be the same as that of the person whom he replaced.

XII. Any of these By-Laws may be altered, repealed or suspended by consent of two-thirds of the members present at the annual meeting, or at a meeting of the Board of Governors specially convened for that purpose, provided that such alteration, repeal or suspension shall have been specified in the notice summoning the meeting. A month's notice shall be given of such a meeting, and it shall be convened on the written request of ten subscribers.

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The Mackay Institution for Protestant Deafmutes and the Blind is a BOARDING SCHOOL for the Education and moral and industrial training of Protestant Deaf-mutes and the Blind. It is not an asylum.

- I. Every child admitted shall be deaf and dumb or blind; shall not be deficient in intellect; not subject to fits; not labouring under any infectious disorder; shall have been vaccinated, or have had the small-pox, and must be of good moral character.
- II. The fees to be charged to paying pupils will be learned on application to the Secretary or Superintendent. These fees are to be paid quarterly in advance. In poor or special cases the managers, on presentation of the facts, may reduce their regular rates for tuition and board, and are prepared to receive destitute pupils free on a recommendation to that effect from reliable parties.
- III. Pupils will be admitted into the Institution between the ages of five and eighteen; special cases being older will be taken into consideration.
- IV. The duties of the school will commence on the Second Wednesday in September annually.
- V. The annual vacation will commence on the Third Wednesday in June, when all the pupils are expected to go home for the holidays.
- VI. The pupils are allowed two weeks' vacation at Christmas but are specially requested to return promptly.
- VII. The following questions must be answered and attested by the Minister of the Church to which the child or its parents belong, and by a Medical Practitioner:—
  - 1. What is the name of the child?
  - 2. When and where was the child born?
  - 3. What are the names and occupation of its parents?
  - 4. Of what nationality are they?
  - 5. State their full address and nearest Post-office.
- 6. Was the child born deaf or blind, or at what age and by what disease did it become so?
  - 7. Is the deafness or blindness whole or partial?
- 8. Has the child ever been afficted with fits, or any other nervous affection?

- 9. Has the child had the small-pox or been vaccinated?
- 10. Has it had the measles or scarlet fever?
- II. Is the child generally healthy?
- 12. Can the child dress and wait on itself, and are its personal habits cleanly?
  - 13. Does the child make intelligible signs and give proofs of memory?
  - 14. How many brothers and sisters are there in the family?
  - 15. Are there any other members of the family deaf and dumb or blind?
  - 16. Were the parents of the child in any way related?
  - 17. What are the parents able to pay per year for board and tuition?

## CLOTHING OF PUPILS.

FOR A BOY.—Two suits complete; four shirts; four handkerchiefs; four neckerchiefs; four pairs of knitted worsted stockings; two pairs of good boots or shoes; overshoes; two hats or caps; a warm overcoat; two pairs of woollen gloves; a pair of slippers; fine and coarse comb and hair-brush in a

One of the suits must be plain and strong for every day wear, and the other should be of dark cloth.

FOR A GIRL.—Four chemises; four pairs of stockings; two flannel petticoats; two dark skirts; two pairs of corsets; two dark stuff frocks; eight pinafores or aprons; twelve handkerchiefs; a pair of slippers; two pairs of boots or shoes; overshoes; a warm cloak or shawl; two bonnets or hats; two pairs of gloves; fine and coarse comb and hair-brush in a bag; also a tooth-brush.

It is expected that all children shall have their clothing of good quality and in good condition, and that deficiencies shall be supplied every midsummer. All the clothes shall be marked with the FULL NAME of the

### FREE PUPILS

All candidates for free admission must be the children of poor Protestant parents in the Province of Quebec, and their application shall be considered

Children elected for free admission shall receive their board and education gratuitously—the only expenses to the parents being that of clothing.

An engagement must be entered into by two responsible housekeepers to provide such children with proper clothing, and in case of sickness, death or any other cause which may be found to render children ineligible, to remove them from the Institution upon receiving due notice.

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Persons knowing of any uneducated Protestant Blind in the Province, will confer a favor on them by communicating with the Secretary or the Superintendent.

Any letter intended for this Institution should always have the name "Mackay" on the address, in order to distinguish it from the two Roman Catholic schools for deaf-mutes in Montreal.

### RULES AND REGULATIONS.

The male and female pupils while in the Institution are to be kept separate, and to remain in their respective departments, meeting together only in the school-room for instruction and worship, and in the dining-room for meals, and then they are to be in charge of a teacher, or of such other persons as the Managers may approve.

II.

The girls, when out of school hours, to be charge of the Housekeeper or an assistant-teacher, and when out of doors to be in charge of some responsible person appointed by the Superintendent. Non paying pupils to be made useful about the Institution out of school hours.

III.

The boys out of school hours, and in the workshops, to be in charge of a teacher or the supervisor.

The boys and girls under 12 years of age, to retire at 8 p.m., punctually, and all the rest of the pupils at 9 p.m.

The pupils are not to leave the Institution without the permission of the Superintendent.

VI.

None of the pupils are to leave, or be kept from their regular studies, without the permission of their teachers. Hours for study to be fixed by Managers. The pupils are to be present from 9 to 12 and 1.30 to 3 p.m.

No person, not connected with the Institution, is allowed to stay or take any meal, or sleep in it without the special permission of the Superintendent. Parents of pupils cannot be accommodated with a night's lodging.

VIII.

Sunday School to be held in the morning, and service in the afternoon at 3 p.m., at which deaf-mutes from the city may attend, but the non-pupils are not to be allowed to go through the building without the permission of the Superintendent.

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### IX.

The Caretaker is to see that the lights are extinguished at 10 p.m., and the premises properly secured. He is also forbidden to keep more than 20 (twenty) gallons of coal oil in the building, and he must use the greatest care with the lamps. He is also to take entire charge of the furnaces and to see that water tanks are kept well filled. The lighting of the range, removal of ashes, and the cleaning of the water closets, are to be the Caretaker's duties. To see that two pails of water are kept standing in each bath-room for use in case of fire, and perform all other duties assigned him by the Superintendent.

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The pupils are not to have access to their bed-rooms from the morning until the time for retiring, unless with permission.

#### XI.

The children are to proceed to and from their meals in line.

#### XII.

At the end of each table, nominated by the Superintendent, some one should be placed to superintend the pupils at their meals.

### XIII.

The bed rooms of the girls are to be visited by the Superintendent, and those of the boys by the supervisor before 10 o'clock every night, to see that the lights are extinguished, and all things in order


#### XIV.

It is imperative for each pupil of suitable age to devote the allotted time to whichever of the three trades, taught in the Institution, he exhibits the most talent for.

#### XV.

Each parent or guardian should deposit with the Superintendent a sum of not less than five dollars, to defray incidental expenses, repairs of boots, etc., any part of which remaining unexpended at the close of the session will be returned.
