FIFTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

THE MANAGERS OF

THE ORPHANS' HOME AND FEMALE AID SOCIETY.

In presenting their Fifteenth Annual Report to the members of this Association, the Managers feel deeply sensible that their Report must differ materially from those which have preceded it. Former Reports spoke only of mercies vouchsafed and blessings received. This must tell of bitter chastisement, of grievous sickness, and fearful mortality.

During the preceding fourteen years of its existence, the "Home" had lost only eight of its precious charges. In the month of January last, it pleased Almighty God to take to Himself eighteen of these poor little orphans. The Managers can only bow with submission to God's all-wise decree. The management was the same as in previous years; the same faithful Matron had charge of the Institution; the same skilful and unwearied Physician watched most assiduously over the health of the orphans. But, whilst in former years the Institution was very remarkably free from mortality, this year it has been most severely visited. Thus God has been pleased to deal with this Institution, as he often does with private families in a most mysterious way. Early in January whooping cough, measles, and dysentery attacked the children, and at one time no less than fiftythree were ill from one or other of these diseases, and several of them had the two former combined. The Matron, Mrs. Holmes, was most assidous in her attention to the little sufferers, waiting on them night and day, and doing all in her power to administer to their wants, to save their lives, and console them at the hour of death. The first Directress being ill, and unable to visit the "Home" during the greater part of the time while the illness prevailed, the second Directress left her own family, and with all the tenderness of a fond mother, went from room to room, and from bed to bed, and did all that kindness, devotion and experience could do to save these little ones; but, alas, in vain. A few of the other Managers devoted themselves to the same work and labour of love; as did also the teacher, Miss Scott, who was unwearied in her attention ; whilst the Misses Brown and Miss Bovell, ladies not connected with the Institution, kindly spent days at the "Home" nursing these helpless children.

The Managers cannot speak in sufficiently strong terms of the kindness devotion, and unwearied attention of the Medical attendant, Dr. Ogden who devoted most of his valuable time to these orphan children, often to the prejudice of his private practice. Hour after hour did he spend at the "Home" during the day; and when he could not be present himself, left his medical students to supply his place, and see that his medicines were properly administered; and all this without fee or reward. A consultation of several of the leading practitioners in the city having been held at Dr. Ogden's request, and the drainage of the "Home" having been pronounced by them bad, it was considered advisable to remove the surviving children to another building, whilst the "Home" should be drained anew and undergo a thorough repair. The large and commodious house belonging to Col. Dunn, near the garrison, having been kindly offered by his agent free of rent, the generous offer was readily accepted, and the children removed there on the 5th February. From the time of their removal, they began, with God's blessing, to recover ; and are now, without exception, as strong and healthy as ever.

The late Matron, Mrs. Holmes, feeling the care of so many children too much for her, at her time of life, tendered her resignation in the month of December last, and left the Institution in the month of February, after twelve and a-half years of most faithful service. The present Matron, Mrs. Large, was unanimously selected by the Managers from a large number of applicants, and entered upon her onerous and responsible duties on the removal of the children to the Dunn House. Whilst the children were absent from "the Home," new drains were made under the house, and the outside drain to the creek was lowered so as to render the drainage perfect. Many important changes and improvements were effected, under the direction and personal superintendence of Dr. Ogden, which entailed an expenditure of \$875 72c. This is a heavy item in the year's expenses, but it could not be avoided ; and the Managers firmly believe that there is no public institution in the city better drained, better ventilated, and more thoroughly adapted for the purpose, to which it is devoted than the "Home" is at the present time.

There are now in the "Home" 50 children—30 boys and 20 girls making 44 less than at this time last year. 24 have been admitted during the year, 17 have been apprenticed, and 5 adopted; three boys ran away, and one girl was enticed away by her sister, after being in the "Home" only three days; 18 have been taken by parents, whilst 20 have been removed by the hand of death.

The Managers have much pleasure in referring to the Treasurer's accounts for the year, showing that the total receipts from all sources for the benefit of the "Home" were \$4,981 06c. : this, with a balance of \$298 88c. from the preceding year, made the income of the year \$5,279 94c. Against this

the expenditure has amounted to \$3,978 72c., thus leaving a balance on hand of \$1,301 22c.; of this, \$800 is placed in the Bank of British North America, on interest, waiting for investment.

Included in the income of the last year is the sum of \$800, received from the executors of the late Hon. James Gordon, of this city, whose generous bequest of that amount made in his will was noticed in last year's report; and the sum of \$400 paid by the Trustees of the late Mrs. Williams, of Tecumseth, from monies left by that lady for charitable purposes.

It is pleasing to find the practice of giving to such institutions as this taking deep root in the community, and to see persons blessed with means remembering in their will the widow and the orphan.

Again, the Managers have the pleasing duty of tendering to their kind friends, the Orangemen of this part of Canada, their grateful thanks for their very generous donations to the "Home" during the last year, amounting in all to upwards of \$1,400. Of this amount \$500 was received through those steadfast friends of the "Home" Messrs. Fleming, Irwin, &c., &c., as proceeds of the Annual Pic-Nic in the Crystal Palace grounds on the Queen's birthday. The Managers have also to thank the same kind friends for potatoes and flour, sent through D'Arcy Boulton, Esq., of Barrie, and for 12 cords of excellent wood, generously placed on the railway cars at the Lefroy Station by the Orangemen in that neighbourhood, and brought to the city at half fare by the Railway Company, and placed free of charge by the carters in the yard.

The Managers beg to state that the "Home" is open to the inspection of the public at all times, and it would afford them great pleasure if benevolent persons would visit it frequently, and candidly state in the Visitors' book any faults they may see, or fancy they see in the management of the Institution, in order that such faults, if found to exist, may be corrected under the direction of the Managers.

In concluding this report, the Managers desire, in view of the heavy chastisements received during last January, to say with Job, "Shall we receive good at the hands of the Lord, and shall we not receive evil;" thence to learn lessons of diligence and faithfulness in the discharge of their important duties; and to commend the cause of the Institution, and all the inmates of the "Home" to the care of that gracious God, who has promised to watch over His destitute children, and never afflict any but for their good.
