# CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Toronto District W. C. T. U., has held during the year 14 Executive and 9 Monthly Devotional meetings; also 6 meetings with Advisory board (this Board is composed of the Executive and ten Honorary Members chosen annually.)

198 letters and 592 post cards were sent out by Recording Secretary during the year. Corresponding Secretary sending 200 invitations and letters.

December 17th, a public meeting was held in Shaftesbury Hall, against running Street Cars on Sunday. On January 2nd, 1892, a meeting was held in same place praying for God's blessing to rest on the Electors and to put it in their hearts to vote against street cars running on the Lord's Day. A majority of 4,647 voted against the change.

March 11th, 150 Public School Teachers were entertained at Head-quarters.

A memorial was sent to the Legislature re-Franchise. 3 letters to our representatives in Parliament and to each member a copy of Amendment to Factory Act.

A memorial re-Narcotics signed by District President and officers, forwarded to Joseph Tait, M.P.P., for presentation to the Honorable the Attorney General, which will become law with the objectionable clause respecting imprisonment of minors convicted, struck out.

A memorial sent to Ministerial Association re-Sunday School work.

A petition circulated against the circulation of obscene literature.

In July a very successful Garden Party was held at the grounds of Mrs. R. McDonell, which realized a nice sum for Headquarters.

The different Temperance organizations presented their greeting to Methodist Conference, among them a deputation from the W. C. T. U., and the indefatiguable Secretary (Mrs. Forster), in a brief but very eloquent address, overflowing with Christian kindliness and good will, presented the greetings of the Union, to which the General Superintendent of the Methodist Church, (Bishop Carman) most happily replied.

October 31st, was observed as a day of prayer, each Union took charge for half an hour.

usiters have been written and one hundred notices sent to members. The reports of Superintendents show that good faithful work has been done in most departments. Great attention has been paid to the distribution of literature, the sum of \$23.00 having been spent for this purpose. We have circulated about 23,450 leaflets and papers at the stations, fire-halls, boats, and jail, and parcels containg 326 papers have been sent to the lumber camp. The sum of \$12.15 was subscribed by members and friends of our Union to help maintain a missionary in the camp.

An illustrated temperance lecture under our auspices was given by Dr. Cadieux, which was well attended and very instructive.

We took charge of a Sunday Afternoon meeting in connection with the "Canadian Temperance League," at which addresses were delivered by Mesdames Finch, Cowan, and Jarman.

Two interesting Gospel meetings were held in June at our Headquarters, one was addressed by Conductor Snider and the others by several friends interested in our work.

Regular weekly meetings have been held in the jail; a large number of the female prisoners attending, and showing deep interest.

# FRANCHISE, LEGISLATION AND PETITIONS.

The committee of Franchise, Legislation and Petitions of Toronto District, met at the Headquarters on the 17th November, 1891, with Mrs. McDonell in the chair. Mrs. O'Conner was appointed permanent secretary A sub-committee, consisting of Mrs. (Dr.) Chamberlain, Miss Carlisle and Mesdames Forrest, Harrington and Brick, were appointed to act in the interim of the regular meetings, to be held monthly, four forming a quorom. On the 10th December, arrangements were made to hold a public meeting in the Parlor of Shaftesbury Hall for the purpose of forming plans for opposing the Sunday street car service. The officers of the Local Unions were desired to make arrangements with the ministers of the churches in the city to announce on the succeeding Sunday the object of the meeting and to invite their members to attend Thursday, 24th of December, at 3 o'clock. The meeting was well attended, Mrs. Cowan ably conducted the proceedings, and committees were formed for a general canvas of the women ratepayers against the Sunday cars, and canvassing for Women Trustees planned out. The result of the united efforts of our women has never been excelled in any city in our Dominion. On the 4th January, 1892, three ladies were elected as Public School Trustees, namely, Mrs. McDonell, headed the pole in No. 6 District; Dr. Stowe Gullen and Mrs. Harrison respectfully of No. 3 and 4 Districts. The Sunday cars received an overwhelming majority against their usage on the Sabbath. Owing to the indefatigable efforts of the President, another lady was placed on the Collegiate Institute Board, to the three already there, and thus the position of women in official capacity is greatly strengthened in our city to day.

The Minister of Education was interviewed on the desirability of having married women's names (ratepayers in there own right) placed on the voters list, as trouble had arisen in some cases where the Ladies were refused the ballot, he promised to look into the matter before the next issue of the lists were printed.

Several deputations, headed by the President, were actively engaged on different occasions in interviewing members of the Legislature on matters relating to the interests of women.

Finding our City Council had refused to carry out our desire to add pages to the voters lists for women voters, Hon. G. W. Ross promised the deputation that he would have the matter made compulsory by law as far as cities were concerned.

Many of the prominent members of the House were also approached by our committee urging the support of Mr. Balfour's Bill to admit women to the profession of law. The petition was carried on amendment, by permitting women to be solicitors and not barristers.

Therefore it needs but little philosophy to see, that, as a circle of women's sympathy extends itself, beyond the family to her neighborhood, her country and the world; it will soon dawn upon her mind that the law of force is not the christian rule. The aim of this department is to mould public opinion up to a higher standard, to lead all to believe that arbitration and reconciliation are better for a nation than war and conquest. Communications were sent to prominent men and women, asking their co-operation. Members of different societies were approached and requested to bring the subject before their assemblies, already many have sent out ringing resolutions favoring arbitration. Very many members of labour organizations profess themselves in favour of Boards of Arbitration, which shall be appointed by Government, for the settlements of all desputes between capital and labour.

On the 23rd of January, 1892, Professor Ashley of Toronto University, the distinguished Professor of Political Econemy, delivered one of the best Lectures of the year dealing with the question of Industrial Peace. The Pan-Presbyterian Council, with thoughtful consideration, discussed this very important question, stating that in semi-barbaric ages force embodied the principle that by might not right weaker nations were brought into subjection, and might, ruled the world, but they claim that to-day, those who would preach the Gospel of the Prince of Peace must take higher ground, and as far as possible reverse the order of things by preaching "peace on earth good will to men."

These are straws which show the trend of public thought and we are glad to note that the current is in the right direction.

# CONSTITUTION OF THE TORONTO DISTRICT W. C. T. U.

## PLEDGE.

I hereby promise, God helping me, to abstain from all distilled, fermented and malt liquor, including wine, beer and cider, as a beverage, and to employ all proper means to discourage the use of and traffic in the same.

## ARTICLE I.

Name—This organization shall be known as the Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Toronto District.

# ARTICLE II.

Object—The object shall be to strengthen the local Unions, and assist them in carrying out the plans of the Provincial Union, and to arouse the women of the District to organized effort for the banishment of the liquor traffic.

Officers—The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, Treasurer and Auditor. These officers, except the Auditor, together with the President of local Unions (who shall also be ex officio Vice-Presidents) and Superintendents of Departments, shall constitute an Executive Committee, with full power to provide for the interests of the work. These officers, with the exception of local Presidents and Superintendents of Departments, shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, and in the following manner: Tellers having been appointed by the President, an informal ballot shall be cast for each officer separately, and the members of the Convention shall then proceed to vote by ballot for the two candidates having the highest votes cast.

Superintendents of Departments—Superintendents shall be nominated by the Executive Committee, and elected by the Annual Meeting. Their election shall be by acclamation, unless otherwise ordered.

## ARTICLE III.

Sub-Committee—The President, Vice-President, Recording and Corresponding Secretaries and Treasurer shall form a Sub-Committee of the Executive board for the speedy transaction of business, with power to fill vacancies which may occur during the year; three of whom shall form a quorum. This Committee shall meet at such time and place as the President shall direct.

# ARTICLE IV.

Annual Meeting—The Annual Meeting shall be composed of the Executive Board, and one deligate for every five paying members of each

# ARTICLE V.

Committee of Arrangements—The President and the Corresponding Secretary of District shall be a Committee of arrangement, selecting topics for discusion, and devising means to make the meetings interesting and profitable.

# ARTICLE VI.

Affiliation—Each local Union shall contribute to the funds of the District Union at the rate of five cents per paying member yearly, thus becoming auxiliary to the District Union.

# BY-LAWS.

1. The duties of the president shall be to preside at all meetings, have supervision of work in the city, organize new Unions, and issue calls for meetings, and, at the written request of eight members, call special meetings.

2. Vice-President shall assist in managing the work of the Union, and shall preside in the absence of the President.

3. Local Presidents shall assist in managing the work of the Union, and aim to create and stimulate interest in the same; assist in organization, and preside in the absence of the President and Vice-President of the District.

4. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Union, notify Local Unions of new branches of work; secure reports of Corresponding Secretaries of Local Unions, from which she shall formulate a report for the Annual Meeting; assist the President in preparing programme, etc., for the same; and send Annual Report of the District Union to the Provincial Corresponding Secretary.

5. The Recording Secretary shall attend all meetings of the Union and of the Executive Committee, and keep a correct record of their proceedings; and send to each member of the Executive Committee notice of such meetings. She shall apprise all members of committees of their appointment and duties; notify the public of its meetings; and fyle and sign all orders at the request of the President.

6. The Treasurer shall pay bills, on order of the President and Recording Secretary; keep an exact book account, and present a monthly report of the same. She shall endeavor to secure contributions for District work; collect unpaid affiliation District fees, and forward to the Provincial Treasurer the affiliation fee received from Local Unions.

- 7. Superintendents of Departments shall advise and encourage each local Superintendent in the prosecution of her branch of work, subject to the approval of the Executive; secure reports of same, and embody each separately in their representative reports to the Provincial Convention, giving each Union credit by name.
- 8. All members of Local Unions in the city of Toronto, affiliated with the District Union by the payment of five cents per member, shall be members of this Union, and have votes at the Annual Meeting. Every third monthly meeting is called "The Quarterly," and every member of the W. C. T. U. is privileged to attend.
- 9. Funds for carrying on the District work may be raised by any means determined on by the Executive.
- 10. These By-Laws may be amended at any Annual Meeting, by a two-thirds vote of the members present, notice having been given at the previous Executive meeting.
