HOW IT STRIKES OUR UNCLE SAM
Thinks Canada Must Have More Protection for Her Woolen Industry.
WASHINGTON, May 23.—(Comm.) James H. Worman reports to the Department of Commerce and Labor, from Three Rivers (P. Q.), that the woolen manufacturers of Ontario and Quebec are facing a acute crisis because of their inability to compete with British imports. It is claimed that unless relief in the way of increased protection is granted within a month every loom in the Province of Ontario will be idle. The increase asked is 4 per cent, the present duty being thirty per cent.
The assignment is announced of the Cronkright Brothers, of Toronto, Ontario. The liabilities are said to be heavy, and it is understood that the unsecured creditors will realize but little. The National Woolen Mills at Brantford, Ontario, are in liquidation. The Canadian Woolen Mills are also liquidating. The Maple Leaf Woolen Mills at Markham, Ontario, have been closed down and the mills are advertised for sale.
United States Agent Shotta, of South Ste. Marie, Ontario, in a report, quotes from The Canadian Manufacturer of Feb. 3, on the effects of preferential tariffs in Canada, as follows: "The only important effect of the preference has developed in favor of British manufacturers has been to overload Canada with British textiles and to make the once fairly prosperous Canadian textile industry almost a thing of the past."
The new capital is now being invested in producing textile goods in Canada.

THE SAINT JOHN RIVER QUESTION
Washington, May 24.—The Canadian members of the international deep waterway commission are insisting that the St. John river navigation question be considered by the joint commission. They are under written instructions from their government to treat this subject in connection with the larger problem of navigation and submergence of riparian lands through the construction of dams.
When Charles O'Brien, secretary brought this matter to the attention of Secretary Taff, the latter telegraphed Senator Hale for his advice, as he did several weeks ago when the suggestion was first made.
The senator's reply was received this afternoon and emphatically rebuked the repetition of his first message, namely, that the St. John river question should not be included in the commission's work but should be allowed to await the creation of a special commission at the next session of congress.
Attorney-General Moody has rendered an opinion to the effect that the terms of that section of the river act which provided for the creation of a special commission was created did not appear to include the St. John river project.

ANOTHER BANK FAILS
Canton, O., May 24.—The Canton State Bank with individual deposits of more than \$600,000, closed its doors today. The directors state that the bank will not be able to resume business. The failure was brought about by heavy loans to W. L. Davis, vice-president of the bank, by the cashier, Corwin B. Bachtel, without the consent of the other directors of the bank. According to a statement made by counsel for the directors, more than \$400,000 has been given to Davis for which no adequate security has been furnished to the bank. Davis has decided to the bank property valued at \$200,000. The city of Canton has \$76,000 on deposit in the bank. The Canton Y. M. C. A. and many school teachers have made deposits in the bank.
