Washington Not Pleased With British Order

Talk of Protests When Cases Arise— **New York Herald Says Any Protests** From States Will Not be "High Explosive"

Washington, March 16—Administration officials were giving careful study today to the provisions of Great Britain's order in council aimed at the stoppage of all commerce by sea to and from Germany, which they regard as unprecedented and as having a far reaching effect on American commerce, particularly on shipments of cotton and importations of dye stuffs from Germ-

What perhaps displeased officials most was prohibition on American commerce consigned to neutral countries, and suspected of enemy destination. It forms the principal basis upon which the United States government will insist

strong protest.

Official hope for an early improvement of conneutral nations was destroyed by receipt of the British order together with information that Great Britain had declined to accede to the American govern-







HOUSE BUILDING CITIES

(Halifax Echo) (Halitax Echo)

The Kansas Home Building bill has been reported favorably in the state legislature by the house committee on cities of the first class. The bill provides for the cities issuing bonds for home building or to assist in building homes for the worthy residents of the

homes for the worthy residents of the city.


Any person who is the head of a family and has been a resident of the city two years, who does not drink and appears to be industrious and honest, can avail himself of the bond privilege. Not more than \$2,000 may be issued for any one resident.

When a person makes an application for one of the bonds the city commission or the council appoints a board to appraise the property the man wishes to buy or the lots on which he desires to build. If the board considers the property worth more than the amount of the proposed loan and reports favorably the council or commission may then order the issuance of the bonds and the money paid over to the home builder, the city taking a deed of trust on the property. The bonds are to run for twenty years. Not more than five per cent. interest can be charged, and the bonds must be sold at the same figures that other municipal bonds of the same city are sold and bear the same rate of interest. The bonds are really city bonds as much as any other and the city has a mortgage on the property, but pledges the city's credit against the bonds and the interest.

Before a city can go into the home bonding business the proposal must be submitted to a vote of the citizens.


