CANADIAN MINISTERS TO EUROPE LIKELY

PARIS SUGGESTS EXTENSION OF STATE SERVICES

Much Depends, However, on Growth of Overseas Trade

BIG EXPENSE

Remarks of Australian Commissioner in U. S. Rouse Much Comment

British United Press.

LONDON, Dec. 4.—That Canada will appoint a Minister to Paris and other European capitals, is suggested as a possibility by the Paris correspondent of the Daily Mail in the event that Mr. Massey's experiment at Washington should prove satisfactory.

Nothing is known here in official quarters, but it is believed the British Government would be in favor of any extension of Canadian diplomatic activities in Europe on the same basis as the Irish Free State, which has worked out well.

ENORMOUS EXPENSE

Doubt is expressed, however, if Canada is prepared to stand the enormous expense unless the trade relations would be sufficient to justify the expenditure.

Hon. Mr. Massey, when he was here, emphasized the expense of the extension of Canadian diplomatic activities in Europe on the same basis as the Irish Free State, which has worked out well.

COMMENT ROUSED.

The widest interest and speculation had been aroused here by the report from New York, quoting Sir Hugh Denison, the Australian trade commissioner in Washington, as saying that Australia will build a tariff wall like that of the United States and promising to let the American inside to receive some of the reciprocal privileges. Members of the Australian delegation who are still here have promptly replied to the effect that Denison must be misquoted, since it has been stated on innumerable occasions that the Commonwealth's policy is one of Imperial preference and there has been no suggestion that she should restrict one iota in that respect.

WANTS EVACUATION FROM RHINELAND

Withdrawal of Troops Would Improve Relations, Says Chamberlain

PARIS, Dec. 4.—Complicated circles here express the belief that an advance was made toward a solution of the German disarmament problem at yesterday's meeting of Sir Austen Chamberlain and Aristide Briand. Although this problem is not on the agenda of the league of nations, it is expected that the controlling body to be substituted for the inter-allied military commission in Berlin will be dealt with by the league council, and it is likely the commission will be able to hand over its functions to it in April of next year.

LOSS IS ONLY \$100

Robbery of Swift Co., Montreal, First Reported \$25,000

MONTREAL, Dec. 4.—Previous figures which placed the loss of the Swift Canadian Company at \$25,000 when burglars broke into their office on Craig street east this morning, were found to be greatly exaggerated, an investigation by the local manager of the company, later established that the robbers succeeded in getting away with only \$100 in stamps, which was in one of the two safes in the office. The attempt of the thieves to break open the safe where the \$25,000 was deposited failed.

GUESTS BURNED IN ESCAPE FROM HOTEL FIRE

3,000 Bags Christmas Mail From Old Country For Canada Landed At Halifax Today

Another 1,000 Sacks to be Brought in Tomorrow by Cunard Liner Antonia, Additional Expected Next Week

HALIFAX, N. S., Dec. 4.—Over 4,000 bags of Christmas mail from Great Britain for Canada will be landed here today and tomorrow by two trans-Atlantic steamers, the Anchor-Donaldson liner Letitia, from Glasgow and Belfast, and which made port last night at ten o'clock, bringing three thousand bags, and the Cunard liner Antonia, due tomorrow from Southampton, has 1,085 bags.

Additional Christmas mail from the old country is coming over next week by two liners. The Andania left Southampton yesterday afternoon and the Aurama leaves Liverpool today, both coming to Halifax.

SHERBROOKE WOMAN FATALLY BURNED

Mrs. Leroux's Dress Catches Fire While Hanging Clothes in Kitchen

Sherbrooke, Que., Dec. 4.—Mrs. Honor Leroux, thirty-two years old, of Southam, died this morning in the St. Vincent De Paul hospital at about five o'clock, as the result of burns received when her dress came in contact with the flames from the cook stove in the kitchen of her home.

MOTHER OF SIX CHILDREN

According to witnesses of the accident, the unfortunate woman, who is the mother of six children, the oldest being 12 years, was hanging up some clothes behind the stove in the kitchen to dry. In some unaccountable manner the apron which she was wearing, caught fire, and the flames quickly enveloped her. The frenzied woman, not knowing what to do, ran out of the house and the wind which was blowing fanned the flames as she tried in vain to extinguish them. Becoming exhausted, she at last fell to the ground and the flames, no longer fanned, died down, not before however, the victim was badly burned.

Soviet Press Warns Of Polish Attack

MOSCOW, Dec. 4.—The Soviet press warns editors of an anti-Russian attack by Poland possibly by next spring for Premier Pilsudski is said to be preparing. The Pravda organ of the Soviet government, charges Poland is negotiating for the consent of Germany and other western powers to a conquest of Lithuania and Memel, a seaport on the Baltic, after which the Danzig corridor would be abandoned.

Daquam Hostel and 8 Dwellings Razed Last Night

Travelers Forced Out in Night Attire—Large Stock of Goods Destroyed

QUEBEC, Que., Dec. 4.—A hotel, which was filled with travellers at the time, and eight houses, were destroyed last night in a conflagration which threatened to wipe out the village of Daquam, Montmagny county. The fire broke out in the hotel, whose guests had to make a rapid exit in their night attire, and quickly spread to the neighboring houses.

Among the dwellings destroyed were those of M. Gosselin, telegraph operator; Leon Gauthier, merchant, who lost his store and a large stock of goods; J. Lachance and others. Some of the guests in the hotel suffered burns in making their escape.

BUY FINN LUMBER

British Importers Take Quarter Million Standards

HELSINGFORS, Finland, Dec. 4.—There has been a large sale of Finnish sawn timber for shipment next year, and prices are reaching record figures. A half million standards (900,000,000 board feet), representing half of next year's estimated production, has been sold, half of this going to England. The current year's sales total 1,000,000 standards, (2,078,000,000 board feet) of which 400,000 (910,800,000 board feet) was bought by Great Britain. This is a new record.

The river opened April 30th last giving a season of navigation about as long as ordinary.

High Time to Get Over Swell-Headed Ideas of Greatness, He Says

BALTIMORE, Md., Dec. 4.—The United States is becoming the world's greatest menace to peace and human progress, Dr. John H. Latane, Johns Hopkins University professor and noted historian charged in an address on the League of Nations here yesterday.

"It is more than high time," he said, "that the intelligent people in the country should get over the idea that the United States is the greatest and best nation on earth. "No country has such a record of imperialism as ours since 1900; no country has added a fraction of the population or territory that we have done, or occupied by force by so many countries."

SOME INTERESTS NOW URGE WAR, IS HIS CHARGE

Liberal Leader Condemns Any Provocation by Britain

FOREIGN STRIKE

Last-Minute Efforts to Avoid Boycott in Hankow Fail, Says Report

Canadian Press. BRADFORD, Eng., Dec. 4.—China is but struggling for the fundamental right of every free and self-supporting nation, former Premier Lloyd George declared in addressing a Liberal meeting here today.

"There are some people anxious for war in the far east," he said. "It is interesting to find the usual preliminaries to war in the Tory press-tales of outrages, suggestions of worse to come, and panicky stories naturally calculated to make people anxious."

"The record of western civilization in China is indeed black. We forced opium upon China against the will of its greatest moral teachers. It is not surprising that China has rebelled against the indignity, humiliation, and injustice inflicted upon her by the western powers."

Great pressure, he said, was being brought to bear upon the British government to do something impulsive and provocative in the Far East and it was essential that public opinion should be aroused.

"I record my warning," he declared.

AT HANKOW

HANKOW, Dec. 4.—Last minute efforts to prevent a general anti-foreign strike here, which originally was planned to begin today, were made last night, but in the absence of conclusive results, foreign concessions are strengthening their barricades because of continued threatening demonstrations of their nationals with extra States gunboats and one British destroyer lying in the harbor and have reinforced their nationals with extra landing parties. A French destroyer is expected momentarily.

The city is under the uncertain rule of recently-formed labor unions whose pickets have practically dominated the situation for a week. The helplessness of the Cantonese officials, was illustrated by the imprisonment of his commissioner of foreign affairs in his own office for several hours by thousands of striking workers. They were employees of a British cigarette company, who demanded that he fulfill a promise to arrange for a favorable settlement of their strike. He was released only after a payment of \$3,000 was made.

Lake Shipping Hard Hit By Blizzards

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Dec. 4.—Several lake vessels were aground and in a precarious position today in the treacherous "Snag" district, the gateway between Lakes Huron and Superior. Nearly 100 others are ice-locked around Neebish Island, awaiting a rise in temperature and a melting of the formations, which imprison them. Shipping over the entire district has come to a standstill.

RESIGN FROM CLUB

Amundsen and Ellsworth Object to Lecturer's Statements

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—Rodd Amundsen, Norwegian explorer and Lincoln Ellsworth, who accompanied him in his flight over the North Pole, have resigned from honorary membership in the Aero Club of Norway. Their grounds are that Umberto Nobile, also a member of the Polar expedition, has been lecturing in the United States, with the approval of the Aero Club, and has been making "gross mis-statements, thereby ridiculing the name of Norway."

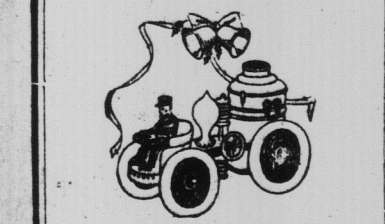

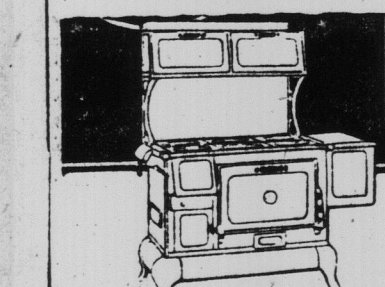

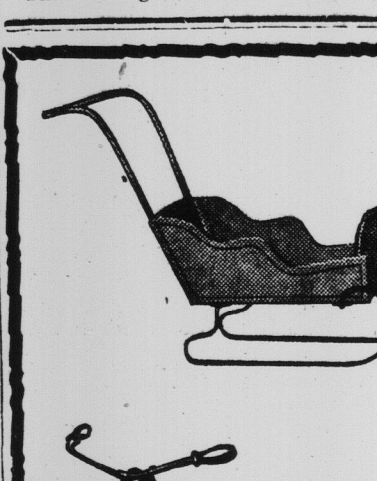

COURT CASE IS LIKELY OVER CHAPLIN BREAK

Family Skeletons Rattled as Counter-Statements Made

Canadian Press Despatch. LOS ANGELES, Dec. 4.—Overtures for a truce between Charles Chaplin and his estranged wife, having failed, they settled down today for a final fight in court, after an exchange of statements which brought some of the family skeletons of the luxurious closets of the film comedian's Beverly Hills mansion.

Chaplin late last night, issued a statement in which he denied Mrs. Chaplin's charges of cruelty. He declared he had opened his eyes and not intellectual, and of his calling her Mrs. Chaplin. He also charged that she had abused the privilege of limited credit he had granted her in the shops and cafes of Los Angeles.

CALED HER "YELLOW" Shortly after this statement was issued, Mrs. Chaplin countered with one in which she accused the film comedian of avoiding her because she was "not intellectual" and of her calling family "yellow" and her friends "woman."

She also maintained she had made many of her own clothes after marriage. "Money doesn't always bring happiness," she said. "The fact that he has given me money and arranged credit at the stores, was merely his method of attempting to console me for his frequent absence from me, and the babies. Nor does his furnishing me with money and credit, mean that he was a good husband or a good father."

The latest break followed a conference between the two, Mrs. Chaplin and Mr. Chaplin, at which an effort was made to learn what kind of a property settlement would be necessary to keep the case out of court. No announcement was made, but the no agreement was reached. George Beebe, representing Mrs. Chaplin, has been talking about sums in excess of \$100,000.

ONLY WANTS SEPARATION Mrs. Chaplin left the Beverly Hills home of the moving picture star Tuesday and announced she would never return. This followed an early morning party at the home which ended when Chaplin ordered his wife to return the guests out of the house.

McMurray of Wichita Kansas father of Mrs. Chaplin to help her in her marital troubles, was refused by the daughter last night. McMurray had accused his divorced wife, Mrs. Chaplin's mother, of extravagance.

Roy A. Willett, secretary of the Civic Power Commission, when asked about this matter said Mr. Taylor had been billed for one hour on the actual cost of moving this pole. 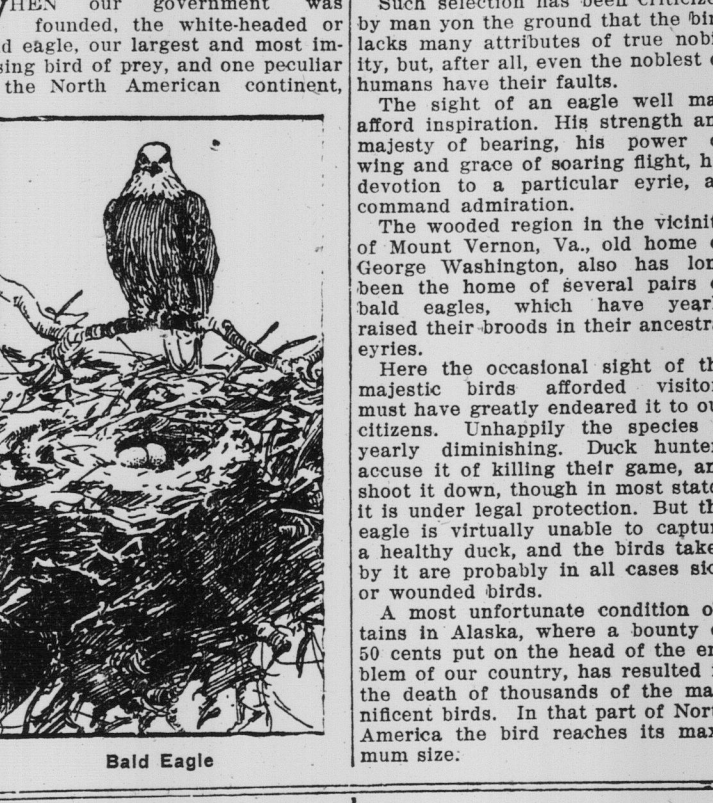

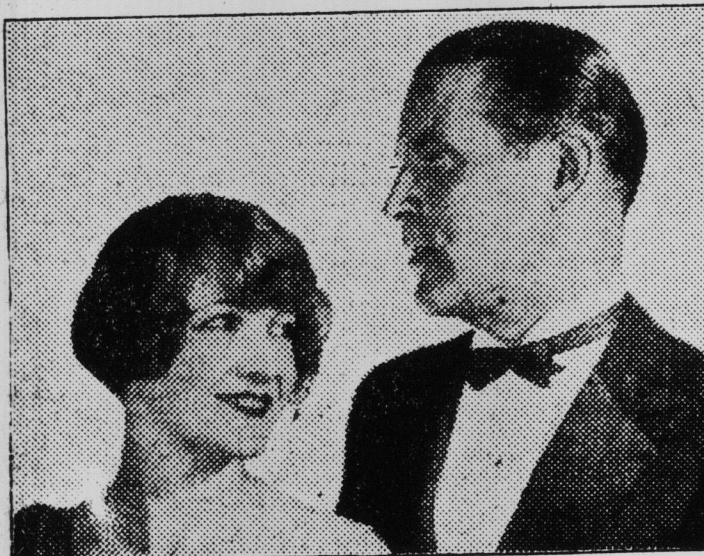

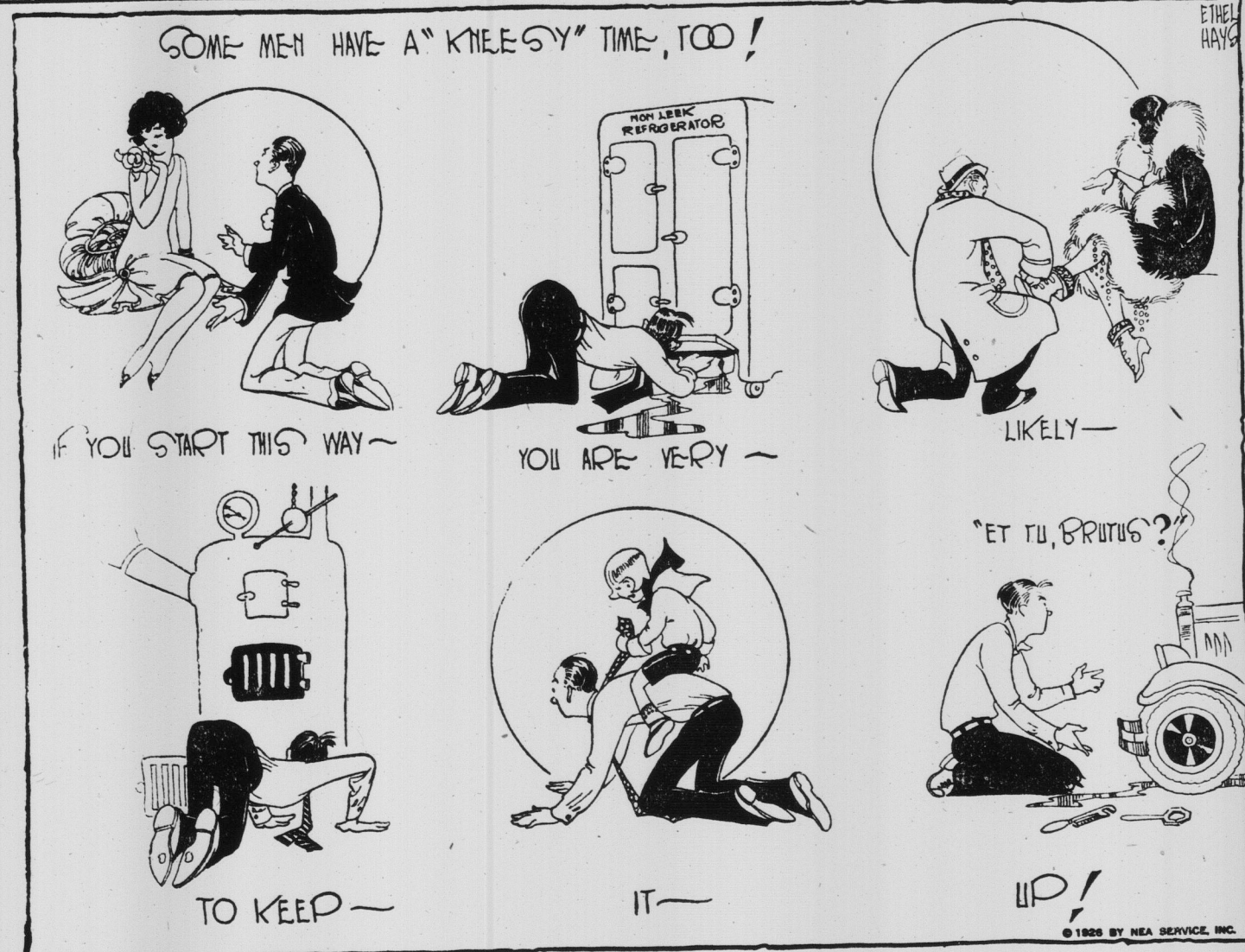

A rainy day meant a holiday, for the rains were few and expensive. All the actors who had homes rented to studios for location. Everyone who received \$25 immediately bought an automobile. The great day was when you were in stock at \$40 a week. You never had to grow real whiskers or hair for a part. Wigs and false whiskers were good enough. A picture would be made, released and forgotten before you could grow a beard. You received \$5 a day if you played hero and \$3 if you were cast as heavy. Forists were admitted to Universal City for twenty-five cents where they could wander at random, see the stars and watch pictures being made. Any location from darkest Africa to Switzerland's lofty peaks were photographed in Griffith Park. The Hollywood police force spent their leisure time playing "spolten" in pictures, and many a swimmer became a fine actor in a day.

## See-Sawing On Broadway

IT is a strange scene in a strange place. Rows on rows of men and women stand at the daily toll of feeding babies and a thousand voices of "Mama's" squeak and gibber in the air. But the food they use is cotton and the babies they are feeding are rosy-faced dolls. With the holidays near, these are busy days for the thousands of helpers of Santa Claus. Artists are employed in the work, too, painting in the eyebrows and eyelashes and properly slackening each doll's cheek. MORE than three-quarters of the doll factories in the United States, I am told, are here. Thousands of New Yorkers labor at this task of making Margie's mummies. Huge machines with special molds turn out the unbreakable heads, which are made in two sections. Each machine is capable of making a half-dozen doll heads in one operation. The heads are sanded and smoothed on buffing wheels. Then they are ready for their bath. A dip into the slating material makes the doll's head as smooth as the skin of a baby and imparts the ruddy glow of health. Holes are drilled for the eyes, the rosy cheeks sprayed on. THE head, its facial makeup complete, is taken to a circular saw. The top is cut off and the doll's eyes are inserted. Then the head is ready for its wig, sometimes real hair, sometimes silk. DOLLS used to be rather stiff persons. Their diet then was sawdust, but that is changed now. American dolls have soft, cuddly bodies, plumply filled with cotton. ## MENUS For the Family

Rice cooked with raisins or dates makes a nice breakfast food, taking the place of other cereals. Or it may be used as a dessert at lunch or dinner and served with either cream and sugar or hard sauce. For dessert it is nice to cook the rice in milk instead of water.

Boiled Rice with Raisins or Dates  
Fried or Broiled Ham

**TODAY'S RECIPE**  
Boiled Rice—Rice may be boiled an hour or so in the double boiler or twenty minutes in swiftly boiling water in an aluminum saucepan, occasionally giving it a shake to see that it does not stick. Strain with a spoon. More apt to break the grains. The raisins or dates may be ready and folded in at the last minute or boiled with the rice, as you prefer.  
**Christmas Plum Pudding**  
One cup suet, two and two-thirds cups stale bread crumbs, one cup grated raw carrot, four eggs, one and one-third cups brown sugar, one lemon, one-half cup currants, one-quarter cup sliced citron, one-eighth cup flour, one and one-half teaspoons salt, one teaspoon cinnamon, one-half teaspoon grated nutmeg, one-quarter teaspoon cloves.  
Put the suet through a meat chopper or chop it fine in a bowl. Work the suet into the bread crumbs and the carrot.  
Now add the egg yolks. Then the sugar. Next put in the lemon juice and rind. The fruit has been blended with the flour. This goes in next. Put the spices and salt in with the flour. It helps to carry them in a smooth mixture, and one less apt to get a lump of cloves when eating the pudding.  
Lastly, the stiffly beaten egg whites and folded in. Use a moist of the shape which pleases you. Butter it and put the batter in. Cover tightly and steam for three and one-half hours. This may be kept in the mold and reheated on the day it is served.

## Alcohol and Longevity

**By DR. MORRIS FISHBEIN**  
UNFORTUNATELY, when alcohol becomes the topic for consideration, even the most scientifically-minded person is likely to be influenced by his prejudices. Statistics have been manipulated by the proponents of both totalism and the unlimited use of alcoholic beverages to prove either that drinking is beneficial or harmful. In a recent study, Prof. Raymond Pearl, director of the Institute of Biological Research of Johns Hopkins University, presents a survey of part of the population of Baltimore with relation to its drinking habits and its longevity. CLASSIFIED DRINKERS Drinkers were classified into groups according to the amount of liquor generally taken. Moderate drinking of alcoholic beverages did not shorten life, according to the report. On the contrary, moderate, steady drinkers exhibited somewhat lowered rates of mortality and greater expectancy of life than abstainers. Persons who were heavy drinkers of alcoholic beverages exhibited considerably increased rates of mortality and diminished longevity as compared with abstainers or moderate drinkers. This conclusion agrees with the opinions of physicians generally, and particularly with the experiences of insurance companies, which will not accept for insurance persons who have been or who are heavy drinkers. The data of insurance companies, however, represent the answers to questions by men anxious to get insurance, and who know they will not get it if the evidence of heavy drinking is against them. DRINKERS VS. ABSTAINERS If moderate drinkers and heavy drinkers are pooled together and compared with abstainers, the drinkers as a class have higher rates of mortality and lower expectancy of life than abstainers as a class. Studies made upon animals lead to the view that alcohol has a specific selective action on the germ cells, killing off the weak and defective, and leaving the strong and sound to survive and perpetuate the race. It is not certain, however, that these experiments have any practical human significance. Prof. Pearl is convinced that alcohol, when abused, leads directly to more or less disastrous consequences, and that some human beings are so constituted that they will abuse it with regularity.

FRANCE'S RISE CAUSES UNREST

Fifteen Limoge Shoe Factories to Shut Down in France

PARIS, Dec. 4.—France, which faced an economic crisis last July because of the fall of the franc, now is facing another crisis because of its phenomenal rise within the past few months.

Unemployment and serious business depressions have come with the rise of the French exchange which hit 26.82 to the dollar today, double its value in mid-July when it was quoted in New York at less than two cents. It was 31.10 a month ago and 38.52 two months ago.

Textile mills are idle in the north, 15 Limoges shoe factories are preparing to shut down, while automobile, machinery and clothing manufacturers are reducing forces. About 200,000 men will be out of work soon.

Leon Jouhaux, general secretary of the French Federation of Labor, told the Socialist and Radical Socialist parties today.

SETS RECORD FOR BUDGET ADOPTION

Poincare's Appropriations, Totalling 4,000,000,000 Francs, Approved

PARIS, Dec. 4.—Premier Poincare has accomplished his self-imposed task of having France's largest budget passed by parliament in the shortest time in history.

The Premier three weeks ago set December 3 as the date for the adoption of the appropriations totalling 4,000,000,000 francs, and he was only 3 hours behind schedule, when the chamber at three o'clock this morning, by

a show of hands, voted the appropriations as a whole. The haste of the premier in driving through the budget was due to the fact that he desired that the income side might be approved and the budget become law on New Year's Day.

The premier's rosy budget anticipations are not shared by all, however, this is notably true in business and financial circles. The continued rise in the exchange rate on the franc yesterday was attributed to the success with which M. Poincare's budget proposals were going through the chamber of deputies.

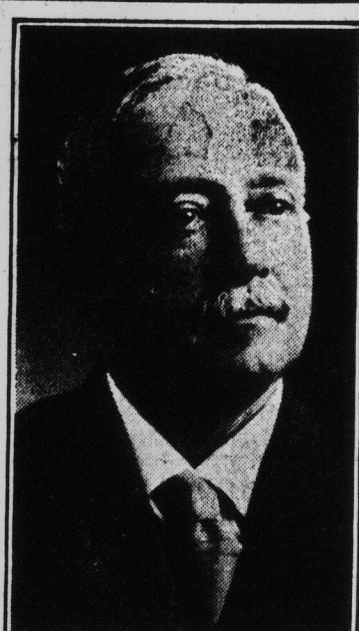

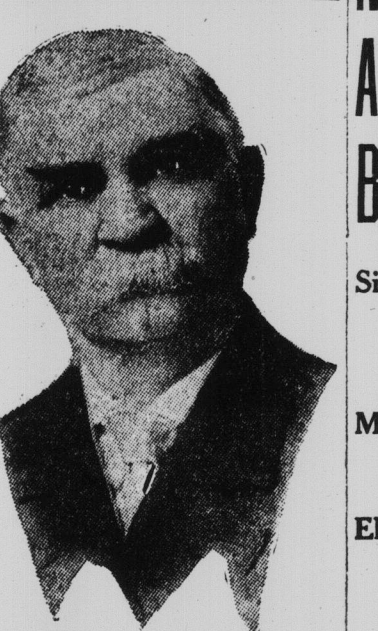

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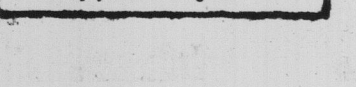

### MRS. HALL AND BROTHERS ARE "NOT GUILTY"

#### Jury in Hall-Mills Case Deliberates About 5 Hours

SOMERVILLE, N. J., Dec. 3.—As calmly as she had sat through 24 days of trial, Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall tonight heard a Somerset County jury say that she and her brothers, Henry and Willie Stevens, were not guilty of the murder of Mrs. Eleanor R. Mills.

Five hours and twenty minutes after they left the courtroom the jurymen returned with the verdict of acquittal. The names of the defendants were called one by one, Mrs. Hall's being the last.

#### CROWD GIVEN WARNING.

Before the jury entered, Justice Parker issued a sharp warning to the crowd not to make a demonstration of either approval or disapproval. His injunction was followed to the letter but there was some cheering in the stands outside the room almost the minute the first "not guilty" was uttered.

A newspaper reporter tried to get through the doors ordered closed by the court, and was dragged by three bailiffs before the bench for a rebuff.

Few people here tonight believed that any of the defendants would be tried on the second indictment or that Henry de La Bruyere Carpenter, their cousin, would ever go to trial.

#### Rubber Plan Is Hit In Ceylon Council

COLOMBO, Ceylon, Dec. 3.—Opposition to Great Britain's restriction of the rubber output in her rubber producing areas under the Stevenson plan has developed in the Ceylon legislative council, which has under debate a motion expressing dissatisfaction.

### Heavy Christmas Mails For Overseas Destinations Puts Post Office On Mettle

HEAVY Christmas mails for Europe and other overseas destinations have already put the local post office staff on its mettle to cope with the rush of business. The rush will grow steadily greater until after the holiday season. Postmaster Alexander Thomson said last night that the first of the extra help for the Christmas season would be taken on about the middle of the month and the first group would be placed at the station to help handle the large consignments arriving and going out. Help for the sorters and workers in the office would next be added and later additional letter carriers would be put on. He expects to have from 20 to 25 additional men on the staff for the big rush.

He recommended mailing of parcels for England about the middle of next week to catch the boat sailing on Dec. 14. During that time letters for England might be sent on the next boat. Any later mailing would hold up delivery and the mail would not reach its destination until after Christmas. For mail going across Canada to the Pacific coast at least one week should be allowed.

### RAIL OFFICES AT NEWCASTLE BURN

#### C. N. R. Sustains Heavy Financial Loss—Freight Shed and Office Goes

NEWCASTLE, Dec. 3.—A heavy financial loss to the C. N. R. was sustained when the northwestern end of the freight shed at Newcastle, containing freight, etc., was destroyed by fire which was discovered about 6 o'clock this evening. The freight shed is a one-story building about 250 feet in length. Originally the shed was about 100 feet long but a few years ago the building was lengthened. It was at this junction of the buildings that the fire was stopped. The office of the freight department was destroyed and as far as is known none of the records were saved.

All the freight in the new portion of the building was saved. It was salvaged under the direction of C. N. R. Inspectors Dunphy, Ryan and Steeves, who are in Newcastle on business in connection with the C. N. R. When the firemen responded to the alarm the northern portion of the building was a seething mass of fire which it was impossible to extinguish.

### N. B. POTATO SHIPMENTS UP 40 PER CENT

#### Upriver Growers More Optimistic Now Than Before, is Report

NOT for many years have the potato producers in the north-western part of the province been so optimistic as at present, according to A. D. McCain, of Florenceville, one of the big potato shippers in the up-river district, in a long conversation with a newspaper representative yesterday. McCain said that the crop was better than last year, and that the price was more than made up for by the fact that large lots had been sent forward this fall to Upper Canada.

At the present time an average of one steamer a week for Cuba and points south is leaving Saint John, each vessel taking from 10,000 to 12,000 barrels, or about 35,000 bushels. In addition, the consignments to New England and Upper Canadian markets continue. Summing up the whole situation, McCain said that it was very satisfactory and that following up his year's successful season, there was a feeling of security among the farmers and shippers which has not been experienced for some time.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—The 32nd Old Glory sale of light harness horses, conducted annually by the Fasig-Tipton Company, found approximately 400 horses changing hands for a total of \$834,225.

The auction closed yesterday. While fewer horses were sold for a slightly smaller total than in 1925, the average per head was higher this year than last. The high light of the sale came in the auction of Adam, two-year-old trotting champion of the season, which brought \$17,000 on the block Wednesday.

Bidding yesterday was light as odd lots closed out the sale. Fourteen head from the Sugarbush Farms brought a total of \$14,670. Signal Flash, by Morgan Asworthy out of Moravia, brought \$7,100 from Sep Fain, of Indianapolis, in the largest sale of the day. The colt was consigned by Homer C. Kullman, of Madison, N. J.

During the auction 80 horses of the Walnut Hill Farms, Dorchester, Ky., were sold at an average somewhat below \$2,000.

FRANCIS REACH NEW HIGH.  
NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—French francs reached a new high level for the year in the foreign exchange market today at 201 cents, reflecting the improvement in general financial and industrial conditions in France. The low quotation this year was 193.4 on July 20.

### CHRISTMAS SEALS ALL DISTRIBUTED

Last Lot of 3,500 Envelopes Mailed; Returns Start to Come in

The last of the 3,500 envelopes with the Patriotic Christmas seals, which the local committee has been sending out to prospective purchasers, were mailed last evening. The first installment went out in Tuesday's mails and already returns have been coming in very satisfactorily. The Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis must find purchasers for all the stamps that have been sent out in order to finance its work and will also arrange for a public sale of the stamps in order to give every citizen a chance to contribute and so give assistance in controlling tuberculosis.

With the stamps that have been sent out an attractive little card which gives the following statistical statement concerning the work of the tuberculosis free dispensary in Saint John in the present year:

33,000 visits, 5,098; physicians' clinic, 105; examinations, 809; patients examined, 817; patients X-rayed, 159; patients fluoroscoped, 209; sputum examined, 50; patients receiving milk, 27; contact cases examined, 109; new patients, 222; patients re-admitted, 85; patients discharged, 415; and patients on list end of year, 327.

The figures readily suggest what is the fact that the work of the society has been splendidly effective in reducing tuberculosis in Saint John. It is hoped that public support will be adequate in order that the work may go forward unhampered.

### EXPLAINS SYSTEM

A member of the committee in charge of the seals last night explained the system of keeping check on the returns from the envelopes sent out. Each return envelope has a number stamped on the back and there is a separate card filed for each envelope. When the return envelope is received back by the committee it is checked off on the separate card. If the envelope is not received a follow-up card will be sent to remind the person, who has received the seals, that they are still in his or her possession and have not been paid for.

### Brazil Paper To Be Put on Gold Basis

Canadian Press Despatch, RIO JANEIRO, Brazil, Dec. 3.—Brazil's paper money will be placed on a convertible gold basis, against deposits to be held in the Bank of Brazil and its London and New York agents, under the monetary stabilization bill sent to the Chamber of Deputies by the new administration under President Washington Luis.

The paper money now in circulation, totaling 2,500,000 cents (nominally \$1,250,000), will be stabilized at the rate of two-tenths of a milligram of gold for one paper milreis (nominally 32.5 cents, now about 12 1/2 cents) this rate to be held steady by a measure authorizing the government to buy and sell foreign exchange.

The ad valorem customs duties thereby affected will be re-calculated to maintain the present cost.

### IS EXECUTED.

OSSINGING, N. Y., Dec. 3.—Unsuccessful in pleas for executive clemency, John J. Brennan, Brooklyn policeman, was executed in the Sing Sing electric chair, shortly after 11 o'clock last night, for killing Samuel Kranioff in the Clymer street police station last January. Brennan shot Kranioff in front of the lieutenant's desk at the police station, where Kranioff had gone to make a complaint that the patrolman mistreated him.

# Canada's Immigration Problem

## THE MARITIME PROBLEM—RAILWAYS AND POPULATION—SALVAGING BRITISH AGRICULTURE

By C. W. Peterson

It was clearly brought out at the last Dominion Board of Trade Convention at Winnipeg, that Canada's key problem centres around the population question. Whatever difficulties confront us are directly traceable to an inadequate agricultural producing and consuming population compared with our industrial, business and governmental machine. We suffer from a lack of economic balance—the almost universal complaint. In Canada's case, however, we have the power and opportunity to apply corrective measures, which the other nations have not. They find themselves in a cul-de-sac from which they are unable to emerge.

It has always been a popular superstition in Canada that the immigration question is a purely western one. Nothing could be further from the truth. The highly developed province of Prince Edward Island is probably not specially interested. The same may also apply to the self-contained Province of Quebec, whose vitric, agricultural population is multiplying at a rapid rate, furnishing ample recruits for the development of the vast hinterland and of the very finest pioneer type, used to hard work and following a standard of living in line with the requirements of this arduous task. Ontario faces a particularly difficult and pressing colonization problem in her northern areas, which so far has never been seriously attacked. At the convention above referred to there was a large delegation from the Maritime Provinces which told in eloquent terms the calamitous story of adversity that has befallen them since the Dominion since Confederation. The drain of population to the United States was referred to. The stagnation of industry, owing to Ontario and Quebec competition, was acknowledged. But there was a deplorable absence of constructive, remedial suggestion. The development of maritime ports and the like would apparently have little or no effect on removing the fundamental causes of distress, nor is it clear how secession, openly suggested by many influential men, could materially alter the present unfortunate predicament.

**DECADES OF FARMING**  
The real reason for the prostration of the Maritime Provinces lies in the decadent agriculture. The reduction in crop area between 1901 and 1925 of nearly half a million acres tells an eloquent story, amply explained by a loss of 50,000 in rural population. No other part of Canada can produce so locking a record, and there is not the least reason for any further explanation of the existing situation. If the Maritime Provinces could have

so we cannot profitably scrap any considerable part of it.  
**RESULTS OF RATE CONTROL.**  
Canada now enjoys the lowest freight rates in the world's transportation history. Europeans look upon this creditable achievement with envy and admiration. But our geographical handicaps render such a high standard of efficiency absolutely imperative. The Canadian public is in intimate business partnership with all its railway systems, whether corporately or publicly owned. The impartial hand of rigid public control rests upon them all, equally and effectively. But this safeguard against excessive rates naturally creates certain unavoidable responsibilities. In point of fact, Canada must either provide a sufficient volume of traffic to yield her railways a satisfactory net return on capital invested, or submit to increased rates. That seems to be the inevitable choice and logical consequence of rate control.

**TRANSPORTATION.**  
No country in the world depends so abjectly and completely upon the highest degree of efficiency in transportation as Canada does. Our great exporting area, contributing the bulk of the railway tonnage, lies far inland and present transport facilities are woefully inadequate. This enormous expansion effort, having now almost completely exhausted the possibilities in the way of operating economies, further relief must come through a vigorous and successful national immigration policy.

**HERCULEAN TASK.**  
If, for the time being, we are prepared to accept the crude theory that Canada must somewhere near double her population in order to reach an economic position where her citizens may be usefully employed and derive the greatest possible reward for their labor, we have before us a definite goal towards which to strive. The United States contained Canada's present population in 1820 and reached 25 millions by 1840, largely by natural increase. There is, however, no longer any such tendency to rapid natural increase in Canada today or, for that matter, in any other country of advanced civilization. To bring Canada up to the point of a reasonably brief statesmanship of the highest order. In summing up the problem before us, we find that it has taken us 80 years of natural increase and an immigration effort involving a total population expenditure of \$90,000,000, in addition to the much larger amount our railways and other agencies have contributed, to add 5,992,000 to our population. In this connection it is interesting to note that our annual immigration has been in 1925 well over 100,000. In the light of past experience, and the fact that we can no longer offer the strong appeal of the free homesteads and in face of a constantly falling birth rate, it should be fairly obvious to most anyone that the task of adding a possible 8,000,000 people to our present population may well be regarded as one of herculean proportions. It should be abundantly clear that past methods will not secure

such a result within generations. The question for the people of Canada to decide is, whether they are prepared to wait for an unlimited period before the country is put on an even keel economically. If they are not, they should, with unmistakable emphasis, indicate their wishes in the matter.

**UNPROMISING OUTLOOK.**  
Largely for political reasons the governments of Canada, past and present, have officially adopted an immigration policy solely designed to promoting immigration from the United Kingdom. It must, however, be regretfully conceded, with little success, which causes no surprise whatever to those who possess even a superficial knowledge of conditions there. It is obvious that the effect on migration of the various schemes of social insurance in Great Britain is bound to be disastrous. The security against the fear of unemployment, incapacity due to sickness and death of the provider, etc., afforded by this legislation at once removes any impetus to break away from the home land and face the unknown overseas, where none of these consoling guarantees are present. The psychological effect of this on the laboring classes is clearly recognized in the United Kingdom.

In addition to this we find in Great Britain a very important body of opinion determined to resist the present immigration policy with far-reaching consequences to our immigration prospects there. Lloyd George has recently stated his political future upon a scheme to expropriate and subsidize the great estates and enormously extend the small farm holdings throughout England and Scotland. We will, therefore, in all probability, soon be confronted with a domestic contingent of emigrants in Great Britain with far-reaching consequences to our immigration prospects there. **EXPERT OPINIONS.**  
Where are we to get people for Canada's vacant spaces in the immediate future? Dr. Black, the director of colonization for the National Railways, recently summed the situation up as follows:  
"We can't get Germans by any enterprise. The German farmer is enjoying unprecedented prosperity. The Scandinavian and Dutch people, who are so anxious to have, are not easily induced to leave home. In some of these countries it is a punishable crime to make a public speech urging a man to leave his fatherland for citizenship under another flag. In Holland all applicants for emigration must pass before an old army officer whose word in this respect is law. France and Belgium have colonies of their own to accommodate their surplus of population. Indeed, France is today drawing immigrants from other European countries to replace war wastage. That leaves Central Europe as the only recruiting ground."  
Colonel Dennis, chief commissioner of colonization for the Canadian Pacific, is equally emphatic in his statements regarding the difficulties in the way of considerable Northern and Western European immigration. He also looks to Central and Eastern Europe, where the great human reservoir of the white race is at present located. He sees no hope for

any satisfactory movement of suitable people from any other quarter. These are the considered views of the two men best qualified to give an intelligent opinion on the subject in Canada. So we must conclude that the days of easy accomplishment in the field of immigration are over. The economic situation in Europe is such that people with capital are no longer available for settlement on our lands in any large numbers. The social revolution in the old European civilizations—for it has been nothing less—has made the lot of the "under dog" vastly better than it ever was in so far as elimination of the fear of the consequences of sickness and unemployment is concerned. Steamship fares have been trebled. Canada must wake up to the uncomfortable fact that to obtain results anywhere near approaching those of former days—and even those must be considered absolutely inadequate in view of our present urgent requirements—it will be necessary to pursue policies vastly different from those of the past and present.

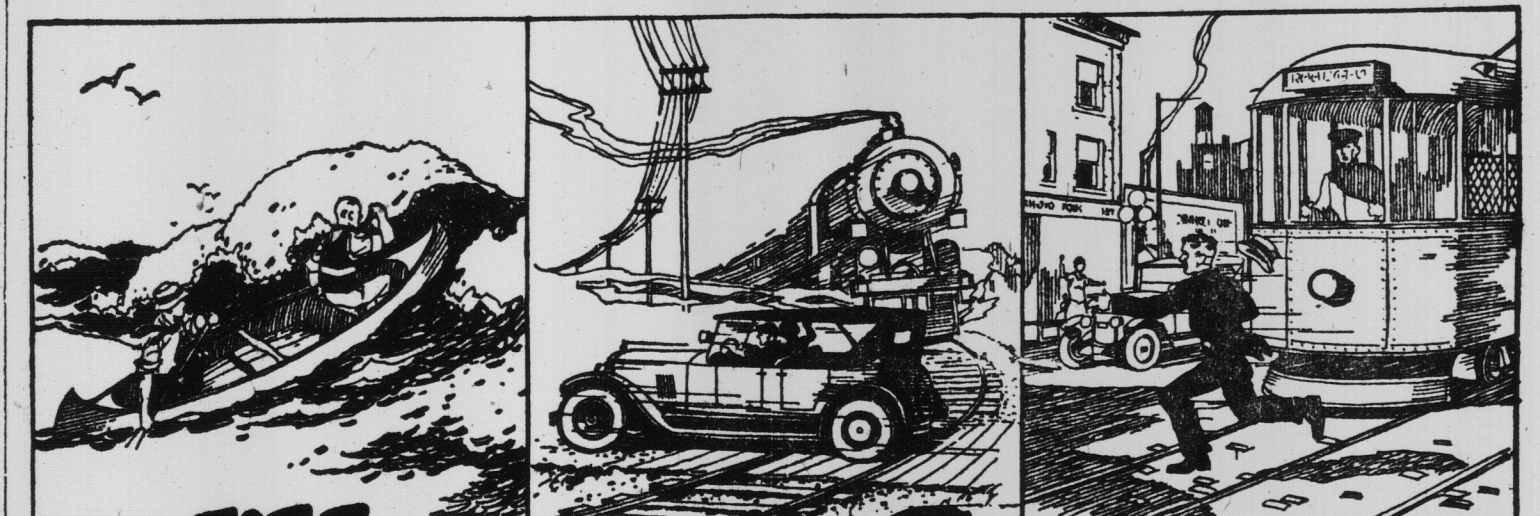
Our doors should, of course, remain wide open to every normal Britisher who wishes to make his home in Canada. We should also welcome acceptable and desirable immigrants from Northern Europe and other preferred countries. But those who are actively engaged in immigration work will tell us, without the slightest hesitation, that when all the available people from these countries have reached our shores, the total will only represent a fraction of Canada's obvious and pressing agricultural requirements. From whence are we to obtain the balance of agricultural settlers we need? This pertinent question has not apparently interested our Department of Immigration.

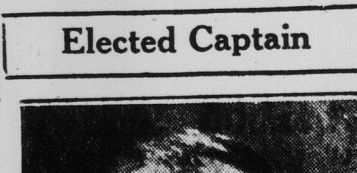

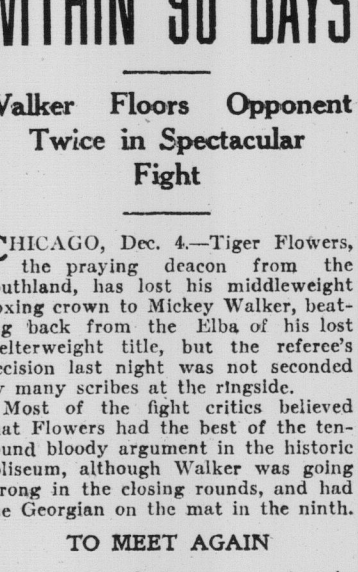

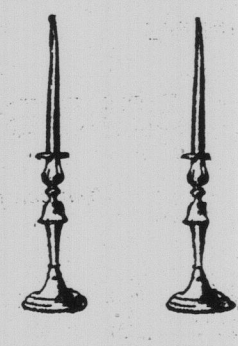
