Commissioner Frink Wants Depot Word First From C. N. R.
FRENCH NOT TO RUHR FOR YEAR

SAYS DEFINITE STATEMENT ON STATION NEEDED
Public Works Commissioner Would Like to Hear of Money Appropriated.
COST DIVISION
Says Difficulties Would Be Quite Easily Smoothed Away.

Commissioner Frink this morning expressed the opinion that it was for the Canadian National Railways management to say whether they intended to build a new depot at St. John and if it was announced that the money had been appropriated for this purpose the points at issue between the railway and the city in regard to apportionment of cost would soon be smoothed away. But until the railway had given some evidence of a bonafide intention to erect a station, he said, the council was justified in the stand it had taken.

"If Sir Henry Thornton or any of his authorized agents," said Commissioner Frink, "will say he is willing to support an estimate for the construction of a railway depot and its accessories at St. John and attempt to make provision for it at the next session of Parliament, all the difficulties about the overhead bridge and the apportionment of the cost will fade away like snow before the summer sun, but until he makes such a statement the railway cannot expect much consideration in this matter."

Says Injections of Pure Cow's Milk Will Arrest Failure of Eyesight

THE CITY AND C. N. R.

THE LAST TRIBUTES.

The impression Hon. Frank B. Carvell made upon Canada by his strong personality and eminent service is revealed in the eulogies that have been pronounced, and in the number of those who journey far to pay their last tributes to his mortal remains. To Mrs. Carvell all hearts go out in sympathy in this hour, for theirs was a singularly happy relationship through life, though they were called to mourn together the loss of those most dear to their hearts.

A HEARTY WELCOME.

St. John gave a cordial welcome yesterday to the latest representative of the British navy to visit the port. The Lieutenant-Governor's dinner last evening was a most agreeable greeting to dependence everywhere else. The right phrase will be found or a passable one will grow familiar, but the main point will be to fashion sound working relations between the various states.

CANADA'S ATTITUDE APPROVED.

The statement issued by the Prime Minister of Canada last week makes it clear that the proposed conference between representatives of the British Government and those of the Dominion overseas is intended to be preliminary to a later and more extended conference. Hon. Mackenzie King explains that the communication sent out by the British Government suggested a conference to make a preliminary examination of problems arising in connection with questions of foreign policy, and make a report as a basis for further discussions.

"Fighting Frank"--By "The Gallery Man"

Carvell was frequently spoken of as "Fighting Frank". The adjective was well earned: for if ever there was a dour political fighter, it was Frank B. Carvell. He was a strong man on the platform, but his strength did not lie in his eloquence. There was but little magnetism in any of Carvell's speeches, but there was an abundance of forceful facts--and he drove them one after another just as a carpenter would drive spikes, and always added a final swing of the sledge-clinch such as "I never saw a more determined speaker and nothing disturbed him, interruptions from the audience never bothered Carvell. His knowledge of every subject was so broad and accurate, that he was ever able to make a quick reply. Not such a reply, however, as many platform speakers would say, turning the question into a boomerang or a joke, but simply a hard-hitting answer to a question. There never were any frills or variations in Carvell's political speeches; he always stuck to his text, and dealt with his opponent bare-fisted. He knew how to give knocks and was always willing to take them. He was a great political fighter, but never a politician. He did not know how to go around a corner, he liked to meet his foe face to face and give and take until one or the other went down on the floor of Parliament, and for a time loomed in the public eye. The campaign between McAllister and Carvell was exciting and the popular Susses physician promised to do a rough job of the fight of his life. Then it was that McAllister's campaign committee proposed a joint debate between Frank Carvell and George Susses. The idea took like wildfire. I think, judging from the telegrams I received from both these party leaders, that one was as eager as the other. The rink was chosen for the evening arena, and I need not tell the story again for it has been published so many times. Carvell opened the ball, and then he spoke to the effect that the two men and their power of repression stood out in bold relief. Neither one of them knew how to keep their tempers at. There were sometimes, most critical moments. Fowler, speaking first, naturally had the first opportunity to lose himself, and he did so. He spoke in a high, shrill tone, and his questions who got, to speak vulgarly, Mr. Fowler's goat. Carvell was so cold as an ice-berg when he spoke as he stood before that big crowd, his countenance pale, almost like a marble, and then he spoke to the effect that he would drive his arguments home. He caught his audience and they listened without applauding much, the speaker in the debate on the night of the 10th. But before he sat down he put certain questions to his opponents, calculated to take his mind off the stage, and he asked the speaker when Fowler began his reply to a charge made by Carvell, the latter stepped forward with an official report of an insurance investigation and invited the audience to read that report. Thousands of electors yelled "read that!" Still Fowler refused, and the great meeting broke up in a disorderly fashion. Carvell, however, if Fowler had had at that moment the savvy of Dr. Pagsley had and accepted Carvell's official report with a smile, and he would have been a different man to that meeting, and he would have had a different impression throughout the constituency before election day. But we all know how to do things

after they happen. Fowler made a mistake, he knew it and his friends knew it, whether the result of the voting was due in any great measure to the imperturbability and facts driven home by Carvell or not. "Fighting Frank" won considerable additional reputation by his joint meeting with George Fowler. I was present at another open-air joint meeting at Moncton in the by-election campaign, when Dr. E. A. Smith opposed the return of Hon. P. G. Mahoney, who had been chosen Minister of Public Works in the George Clarke government. The campaign called out many speakers on both sides of politics. There was unusual interest in it for the people. Hon. John Morrissey, who died a few days ago, had resigned the Public Works portfolio at the request of his leader. In his reply to Premier Clarke, he had made many statements concerning the new fire station and the fitting out of the new fire station which created a strong impression on the people. The by-election was brought on somewhat hurriedly and there was a disposition among some of the Liberals to allow Mahoney to be returned by acclamation, inasmuch as a general election could not be delayed very long. Better counsel, however, prevailed. Dr. Smith was nominated and the fight was on. Mahoney and his colleagues had been returned four years before by a majority between five and six hundred and it was only the hope of an aroused public opinion finding expression that made Dr. Smith have any chance at all. 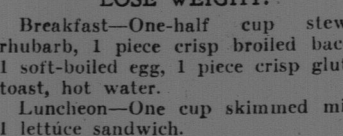

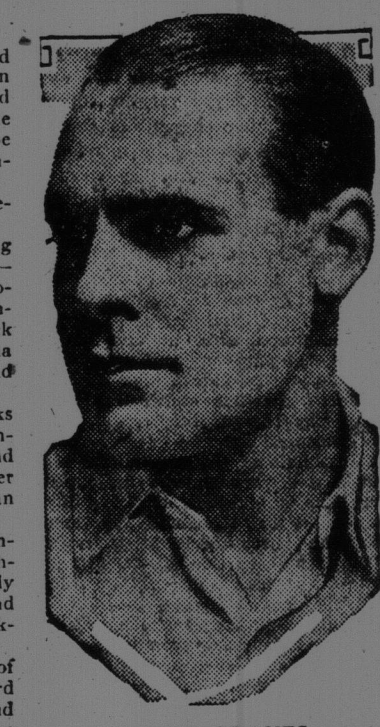
Comedy Turns Tables as Dramatic Stars Drift Into Slapstick Field

Hollywood, Calif., Aug. 12.—It used to be that when the comedy division of the motion picture world developed an actor or actress to a certain state of perfection, he or she would be drafted by one of the dramatic companies.

No more. That is, not without retaliation. True, there are still those leaving comedy work for other employment—most recent example being Miss Dorothy Devore, now Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer star, but also there is Mack Sennett invading the serious drama and emerging with Ralph Graves and Miss Madeline Hurlock as prizes.

Graves was one of the leading sheiks of serious drama when Sennett converted him to the lighter side, and Miss Hurlock was well known for her roles in plays of more intensity than the film will do on the Sennett lot.

Nor does it end here, directors, camera men, scenario writers and technical men, formerly flowing in a steady stream from light to heavy, now find themselves doing so not without backward.

The reason lies in the advance of comedy from more or less haphazard impromptu to a definitely planned and executed continuity, with impromptu interjected at the comedian's hazard.
