PLAIN TALK TO THE GERMANS AT SPA CONFERENCE

Lloyd George Was Spokesman for the Allies
Warning of Intentions if Will of Conquerors is Not Obeyed—Discussion of Matter of War Criminals is Better.

(Associated Press.) Spa, Belgium, July 10.—At the signing of the protocol for speedy disarmament by the Germans yesterday, Premier Lloyd George as spokesman for the Allies, told the Germans: "We do not ask your agreement to the penalties we reserve the right to take in case of non-execution of your engagements. We simply warn you of our intentions. It is notification we have given you, purely and simply, of the measures you may expect if you do not disarm under the conditions specified. To these conditions we ask your acceptance, so as to adopt them with common accord. To sum up, the penalties are for the Allies alone, while we are making disarmament a two-sided matter." He added: "The Allied committee will furnish all the evidence in its possession and I hope the Leipzig court will do its duty."

It is now generally accepted that the conference will proceed rapidly with the other business on its programme. The conference proceeded with a discussion of war criminals, while secretaries drafted the disarmament protocol for signature.

GREEKS SAID TO HAVE OCCUPIED CITY OF BRUSSA

Turks Begin to Realize Seriousness of Situation
Some Fear Greece May Get Constantinople as Further Reward for Military Services to the Allies.

Athens, July 10.—Brussa, an important Asia Minor city, fifty-seven miles southwest of Constantinople, has been occupied by Greek forces, according to reports reaching this city. Mudania, Asia Minor, July 10.—(By the Associated Press.)—Although the Greek army was reported near Brussa, advisers received indicated that up to Wednesday the Greeks had not entered the city. Constantinople, July 10.—(By the Associated Press.)—Turks are beginning fully to realize the critical situation created by the triumphant Greek advance into Anatolia, and what they regard as a complete rupture of peace negotiations. There is much speculation among the Turks as to how the entente powers will react with them after the Greeks dominate the Baghdad railway, which now seems inevitable to the people here, although those in the interior of the country still hope that Mustafa Kemal may check the Greek advance. It is feared generally among the better educated Turks that the Greeks will give the mosque of St. Sophia for ever to Constantinople as a further reward for their military successes.

LIEUTENANT IN NEW CONFESSION

Police Say He Now Declares He Framed Up Robbery, Killed Wife and a Man.

Chicago, July 10.—Lieutenant Cartwelder, in a new confession which the state's attorney gave out last night, admitted that he shot and killed his wife to get rid of her and get possession of her money. He admitted, officers said, that he planned a "framed-up" robbery with the man he killed, on the same occasion in the doorway of his home. He was also quoted as saying that he had "fired of married life and decided to return to the easy life of the army."

MURDER PLOT CASE DISMISSED

Matter of Rich Washington Man and Others Accused by His Divorced Wife.

Washington, July 10.—Charges that Chester A. Snow, seventy-six years old, millionaire patent attorney, and two other persons conspired to bring about the death of Mrs. Adella Hubbard Snow, divorced wife of the patent attorney, were dismissed yesterday by Judge Harrison. Evidence presented was adjudged by the court to be insufficient to warrant holding for a higher court, the three defendants, who in addition to Snow were Mrs. Ena P. Acker, wife of another patent attorney and Hugh London, a chauffeur. Government officials would not say whether new warrants would be sworn out against any of the defendants. It was said that the case could still be brought before the grand jury regardless of Judge Harrison's action.

SON OF C. P. R. OFFICIAL SERIOUSLY WOUNDED

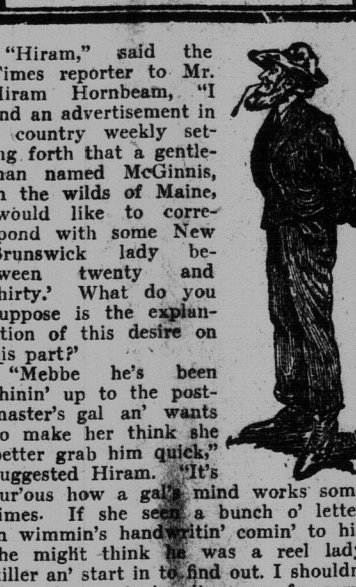

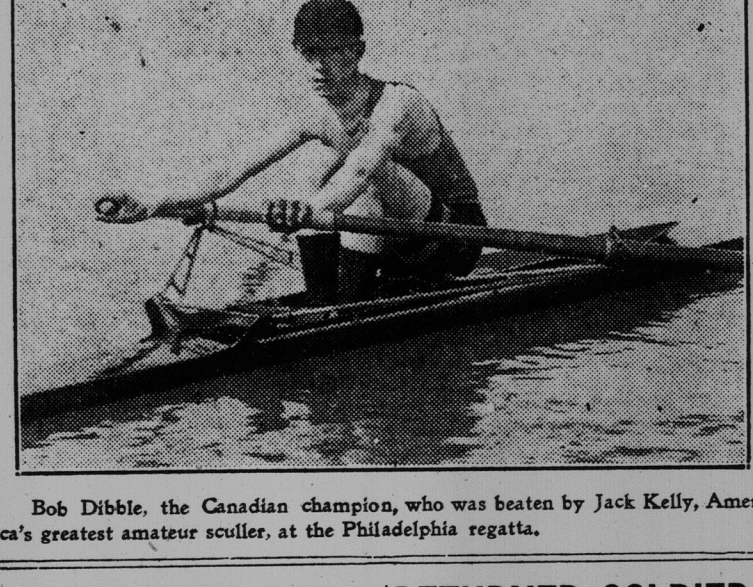
Johnny Durran, Toronto, winner of the Association singles at the Philadelphia regatta, has stamped himself as the future American champion.

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ALLEGED TROUBLE IN RANKS OF IRISH CONSTABULARY

Report in Irish Bulletin—Sinn Fein Courts Superseding Crown Tribunals in Power.

Dublin, July 10.—In a Sinn Fein publication "The Irish Bulletin" issued last night, is a story of alleged insubordination among the Irish constabulary and the reported impending impetration of English police, their advent to be accompanied by martial law and other extreme measures. According to the statements, confirmation of which cannot be obtained, the Royal Irish Constabulary at Listowel, county Kerry, were ordered on June 17 to hand over the barracks to the soldiers. The constabulary refused to do so and the barracks were taken over by the soldiers. The story is printed with hints at a few days ago, but when inquiry was made at Dublin Castle the authorities there said they knew nothing of it. Guns and troops are going north from Dublin, but nothing unusual is happening here.

NEW INVASION OF PERSIA BY THE BOLSHEVIKI

LONDON, July 10.—A new Bolsheviki invasion of Persia is reported in a despatch to the Daily Mail from T. Baranoff, who is quoted as saying that "Bolsheviki warships had arrived at Meshed-I-Ser (on the Caspian Sea, eleven miles northwest of Barfush) and landed troops."

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HAY CROP AT LEAST A THIRD UNDER LAST YEAR

Report for the Week on Agricultural Conditions in New Brunswick.

The weekly report of agricultural conditions in New Brunswick, as reported by district representatives of the Department of Agriculture, Fredericton, is as follows: "The grain crop is reported to be making an excellent growth in all parts of the province. Recent rains have done much to keep this crop growing well. With a few good showers about the time the grain crop is heading out this year will give a crop above the average. On the other hand, the hay crop is light in some districts. It is reported to be only one-half a crop. Summing up the reports from all parts, it would appear that the crop will be at least one-third less than last year. Pastures have not been so good as they usually do, but have improved with the rains. As a result of the poor growth of pasture land, some reports indicate a falling off in milk production as compared with last year. The reports on the potato crop vary in the different localities. In the northern and eastern counties the crop is doing well. In the main potato growing central counties reports are far from encouraging, the crop in many places being in evidence. It would seem that the yield in these counties will be greatly lessened as a result. The 'cut-worm' is reported bad in the eastern counties, it being particularly destructive to all garden crops."

REJOICING BY DANISH PEOPLE

King Signs Treaty for Restoration of Schleswig—Celebrate Also in London.

Copenhagen, July 10.—The signing by King Christian yesterday of the treaty effecting the reunion of Schleswig with Denmark, was made the occasion of a holiday. Guns were fired at Danish ports, church bells pealed throughout the land, and salutes were fired by all Danish vessels in the harbor and the populace everywhere manifested their joy over the event. A message of felicitation has been received from the Norwegian premier, Prince Margaret, of Denmark, the Danish minister and many other Danish notables attended.

FOUR CANADIANS ARE ARRESTED AS WHISKEY RUNNERS

U. S. Prohibition Agents at Lewiston, N. Y., Hold Up Two Autos.

Niagara Falls, Ont., July 10.—(Canadian Press.)—United States prohibition agents yesterday arrested four Canadians at Lewiston, N. Y., on a charge of smuggling whiskey. Sirriani, Frank Carrolo and Dominic Leo Choro are said to have been caught on two autos in each of which were 500 quarts of Canadian whiskey.

SOLD MORE SUGAR AND MADE MORE PROFIT THAN EVER

Ottawa, July 10.—That he had sold more sugar during the last year had made a bigger profit on this commodity than ever before, and that he was entirely satisfied with the prospective regulations of the Board of Commerce with regard to the sale of sugar, which he thought were quite fair, was the outspoken and most unexpected statement made by President B. G. Crabtree, president of the Retail Grocers' Association, at a conference between the newly constituted Board of Commerce and a delegation representative of the various retail trades yesterday afternoon. Mr. Crabtree's remarks were in direct opposition to those of other members of the association.

ARREST IN SUGAR STEALING CASE IN FREDERICTON

Fredricton, N. B., July 10.—An arrest was made on Friday in connection with the theft of a considerable quantity of sugar in sacks from the warehouse of A. F. Randolph & Son some days ago. The sugar has been recovered and is in the hands of the authorities. The prisoner has been remanded until Tuesday. The sugar which was worth upwards of \$100 was taken from the warehouse by means of a light carriage. The vehicles was traced for a considerable distance by its tracks.

ALARM OVER THE GOAL SITUATION

Letter to U. S. Interstate Commerce Commission About Central Canada's Supply.

Washington, July 10.—Alarm over the present coal situation in the United States because of its possible effect on Canada was expressed in a letter sent to the United States Interstate Commerce Commission yesterday by M. M. Mahoney, secretary of the Canadian war mission. Declaring that central Canada normally is dependent on the United States for 17,000,000 tons of coal annually, Mr. Mahoney wrote: "Our government officials are beginning to fear that we may not get sufficient coal to tide over the winter. Reduced shipments to Canada this year, the letter added, seem to indicate that American producers have neglected the long established Canadian market to take advantage of the European demand."

TELEGRAMS TO NEW PREMIER AT RATE OF ONE A MINUTE

Deluge of Letters Follows—Names of Some Who Have Sent Congratulations.

(Special to Times.) Ottawa, July 10.—Among prominent Liberals and agrarians who have sent messages of congratulations to the new premier may be noted Hon. Charles Murphy, ex-secretary of state, Duncan Ross, M. P., Hon. Manning Doherty, minister of agriculture in the Drury cabinet, Hon. R. H. Grant, Ontario minister of education, W. A. Buchanan, Liberal unionist member for Lethbridge, and Hon. J. H. Macdonald, minister of justice in the present cabinet. Sir Adam Beck has also sent a congratulatory telegram. It is thought that Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King and Hon. T. A. Cresser are waiting until the new premier is actually sworn in before sending congratulations. On Thursday and Friday telegrams came at the rate of one a minute, including cables from Northcliffe and Sir George Perley. They are beginning to ease off now, but the deluge of letters is beginning to come in. It is keeping a small staff very busy looking after them.

UNIFORM APPLE BARRELS BROUGHT ROOSEVELT FAME

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., July 10.—Franklin D. Roosevelt, Democratic candidate for the vice-presidency, first sprang into political prominence in 1910, when he was elected state senator for New York. One of the stories still told of his first campaign is that he carried the farmer vote by running on a platform which advocated uniform apple barrels. He is a distant relative of Colonel Theodore Roosevelt on his father's side, and married Anna Eleanor Roosevelt, niece of the late Colonel Roosevelt.

NO TERMS FOR VILLA

Mexico City, July 10.—The government has decided to reject the peace proposal of Francisco Villa, so General Serrano, under secretary of war and marines, told the Associated Press today. Only unconditional surrender, he declared, would be accepted.

RETURNED SOLDIER KILLED IN BRAWL

Shot at Sellwood, Near Sudbury, and Died in Few Minutes—Three Companions Arrested.

Sudbury, July 10.—H. Ladurante, a returned soldier, was shot and killed in a brawl at Sellwood, near here, Arthur Vyze, Octave Duguy and Xavier Garnaux have been arrested in connection with the crime and are being held at Sudbury on nominal charges of infractions of the O. P. A. It is alleged that the three men were under the influence of liquor in a Chinese restaurant at Sellwood. It is supposed that in some manner Ladurante became involved in a mixup with them. A revolver shot rang out and he fell to the floor. He died in a few minutes. Ladurante was twenty-six years of age. Vyze and Duguy are charged with being found in an intoxicated condition while Garnaux will appear on a charge of drinking liquor in a private place. The three men appeared in police court here, handcuffed together and under a strong guard. They were remanded for a week.

CRUSHED TO DEATH UNDER LOAD OF HAY

Fourteen-year-old Chatham, Ont., Boy Victim of Tragedy.

Chatham, Ont., July 10.—Harold Mann, the fourteen-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. William Mann, Colbourne street, died of internal injuries from a fall from a wagon loaded with hay. The young boy was employed temporarily on the farm of Mr. Hugh of the Young Union Township, earning enough money to spend a holiday. He and Mr. Pugh were drawing in a load of hay from the field when Mann, who was near the front of the load, fell to the ground, landing under the horses' feet. The wagon passed over his body, causing internal injuries from which he died before a doctor could be summoned. Mr. Pugh was riding at the rear of the load and did not know of the accident until he saw the boy's body lying in the wagon tracks. The body was brought to John's morgue. Coroner Dr. R. V. Bray considered an inquest unnecessary. Death was caused by internal hemorrhages. He was a number of brothers and sisters. The boy is survived by his parents and a number of brothers and sisters.

COLLIERIES AT WATERFORD WERE IDLE YESTERDAY

Sedney, N. S., July 10.—Two collieries at Waterford were idle yesterday when the men held a mass meeting of protest owing to the refusal of the superintendent to meet them and discuss certain grievances. A strong delegation was sent to Glace Bay to confer with H. J. McCann, president of the Dominion Coal Company. It is thought that a three-cornered compromise will be effected. A local committee may possibly accompany the executive of the United Mine Workers in interviews on such matters with the head officials of the Dominion Coal Company.

GENERAL GWATKIN TO THE AIR FORCE

Ottawa, July 10.—(Canadian Press.)—Major General Sir Wiloughby Gwatkin, K. C. M. G., for some time chief of the general staff at militia headquarters has been transferred to the air force where he will be inspector general of the air force with the rank of air vice-marshal.

CUSTOMS AIR HARBOR AT VIRDEN, MANITOBA

Ottawa, July 10.—(Canadian Press.)—One of the first notices of permission to establish a public customs air harbor appears in this week's issue of the Canada Gazette, and covers land at Virden, Manitoba. The size of the air harbor is 800 yards in circular diameter.

POLES GIVING WAY AGAIN TO THE BOLSHEVIKI

Withdraw from Brest-Litovsk, Vilna and Pivsk
Panic at Vilna is Reported—Wrangel Lands Troops on North Shore of Sea of Azov—The Reds in Persia.

Paris, July 10.—Polish forces are withdrawing from Brest-Litovsk, Vilna and Pivsk, as the result of the great Russian Bolsheviki offensive, according to a telegram received by the newspaper "L'Information" this morning. Evacuation of Brest-Litovsk, Vilna and Pivsk would seem to indicate a general withdrawal of the Polish line to the frontier of that new republic. Latest despatches from Warsaw have shown the Poles to be struggling against the Russian Soviet armies a considerable distance east of Brest-Litovsk, although Pivsk would seem to be threatened by the advance of General Budenny, farther south. Brest-Litovsk is approximately 120 miles east of Warsaw, and is a strongly fortified town. It is located on the navigable river Bug and is an important railway junction. Pivsk is located on the Pripiet river about ninety-five miles east of Brest-Litovsk. Vilna is the principal city of Lithuania and is about 225 miles northeast of Warsaw. Constantinople, July 10.—The troops of General Wrangel, anti-Bolsheviki commander, have landed at Berdiansk, on the north shore of the Sea of Azov. Paris, July 10.—In addition to reported landing of the Bolsheviki at several Persian ports on the Caspian Sea, they are reported also to have occupied the road running between Teheran and Tauras. Berlin, July 10.—A despatch to the "Vossische Zeitung" from Tilsit says that after severe fighting the Bolsheviki have broken through the Polish northern front and crossed the Beresina river at three points. The despatch adds that panic has broken out in Vilna, from which the Polish occupation authorities have fled.

SCOTS WIN THE ELCHO SHIELD

Good Match for Noted Trophy at Bilsley—Some Canadian Winners.

(Canadian Associated Press.) Bilsley Camp, England, July 10.—The Elcho shield match contested by England, Scotland and Ireland, furnished one of the best contests for this trophy of recent years yesterday, England, which had such noted shots on the team as Major Pinesy, Doctor Kelly, Colonel Hopton and C. Mack, led by three points in the first stages. Half way through the match Scotland led by three points. The final result was: Scotland 1,582 England 1,629 Ireland 1,479 The highest score was made by Lieut. A. E. Martin, nephew of Captain F. R. Martin of Calgary, who scored 207 for Scotland. His father, on the same team, scored 199. The highest score for England was 201, by Mack of North London. Additional Canadian winners in the Sweetstakees were Private Geo. Weir of Toronto, Captain F. R. Martin of Calgary, Lieut. J. O. Nix of Winnipeg, Captain C. R. Crowe of Guelph, Sgt. James Bos of Montreal, Lt. Col. and Sgt.-Major F. Goodhouse of Ottawa. The Hopton Cup match five aggregate winner was Captain J. E. Mar.

LLOYD GEORGE NOT LIKELY TO CROSS OCEAN THIS YEAR

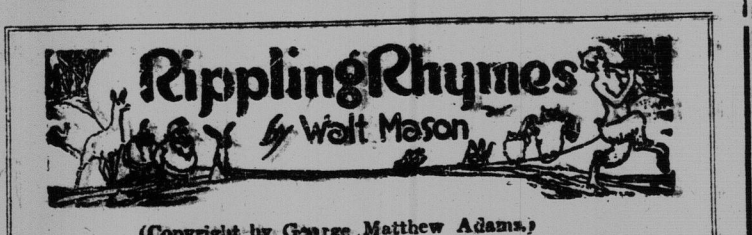

INCREASED RATES FOR TELEPHONE COMPANY

Utilities Board Gives Permission—The New Schedule for Different Services—Authority Granted to Issue Additional Stock to Extent of \$175,000—Some of the Details.

A considerable increase in telephone rates throughout the province is allowed under an order issued yesterday afternoon by the New Brunswick Board of Commissioners of Public Utility. The board, which has spent six months or more in investigating the telephone situation made necessary by the application of the New Brunswick Telephone Company, Limited, for permission to increase rates and reclassify exchanges, reserves jurisdiction to repeal the order within fifteen months, on application of interested parties. Existing contracts are to be in operation for a reasonable time and any new contracts shall be entered into for a month at the new rates, until such time as the equipment is able to give the proposed new service.

The board authorizes the company to issue additional capital stock totalling \$175,000. The amount has already been spent in extending lines and in increasing the efficiency of the plant, said Howard P. Robinson, the managing director of the company. Mr. Robinson said that the company had received the necessary approval from the board of directors before yesterday, new banking arrangements had to be made to finance its operations at the new rates, until the present capitalization is \$2,000,000.

The new schedule of rates provides as follows: For private telephones, one party line, \$36; two party line, \$42; four party line, \$50. The old rates were \$30, \$36 and \$20 respectively. For business lines, party telephones are cut out. There is a flat rate of \$96 for service not to exceed twenty-five calls a day; when twenty-five calls are exceeded on a ten days record a measured service will have to be taken. The measured service rates are: \$36 a year for the first 720 calls, or for 60 calls a month. There is an additional charge provided of three cents a call for the next 100 a month, two and a half cents a call for the next 140 calls a month and two cents a call for all calls above 300 a month. The old business rates were: \$46 for one party, \$40 for a two party telephone and \$36 for a four party line. Before the new order goes into effect on July 31 there is a condition that the company must canvass subscribers and thoroughly explain the alternative services. A mass of expert evidence and statistics was furnished to the commission by its consulting engineer and expert accountant, Samuel H. Mildram, of Boston, and he has been in the city for the greater part of the time since last winter. Upon giving a new acquaintance one's address, it is customary to say "At number — street is your home (or office)," the implication being that the new friend is to consider one's home his own. Persons introduced to each other, when their respective names are pro-

nounced, say: "Your servant, sir," or "Juan Garcia, for the purpose of serving you, sir."

When taking leave of each other, formal acquaintances who wish to continue relations with each other say: "I remain at (or I offer myself to) your service."

Observance of these forms, which a Mexican rarely disregards, is a valuable aid to a stranger who wishes to establish profitable commercial or pleasant social relations in Mexico.

P. R. FOR MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS

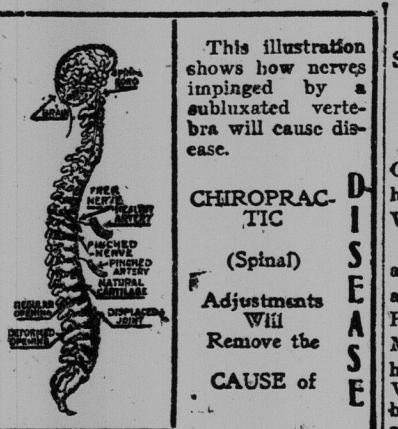

In Scotland proportional representation is already at work, with the best results, in the election of school boards—Scotland sticks to her specially elected school boards—and in Ireland it is now the law for all local elections and was carried through with brilliant success at the recent urban elections. It is proposed for parliamentary elections in Ireland by the new home rule bill. If local bodies in England had power to adopt it some of the more progressive, such as Leeds or Bradford or Manchester, would be sure to give it a trial, and once tried it would soon spread. The method of triennial elections is in itself a great improvement on the troublesome and inconsistent annual elections. The whole council would be returned together; the larger issues of policy could be raised in a way not now possible, and at the same time, as all parties would be represented according to their voting strength, there could be no very sudden or complete turnover in the representation, and the more experienced and better-known councillors would be practically certain of election. THE SAD, SAD STORY OF A TRUSTFUL MAN

Who Thought the South End Wanted a Real Playground for Its Young People.

The Fredericton meeting will therefore have the horses from both the maritime and Maine and Aroostook circuits. The programme includes: Free-for-all pacing; 2:14, 2:16, 2:18, 2:20 and 2:27 trotting and pacing; free-for-all, 2:19, 2:22 and 2:27 trotting. For the fall meeting here September 21st, 22nd, 23rd and 24th the same programme is being offered with a 2:22 trot and pace added.

There are eighty-six nominations for six early closing stakes for the fall season, including the Potvin stable of Montreal. Seventy-four horses are entered for the seven events on the programme for the Woodstock Driving Club's races next Monday and Tuesday, including most of the big stables of both the M. & M. and the Aroostook stables.

Darkness and Water Famine at Glace Bay Threaten

Sydney, N. S., July 10.—A serious situation has again arisen at Glace Bay. Once more the town is threatened with darkness and a water famine. The employees at the electric light plant and at the pumping station have protested against the action of the town council, who refused to ratify an appointment made by Superintendent Fritzel, of an engineer at the pumping station. Instead a new man was appointed and now the talk of the central union is that they will refuse to work with the new appointee.

Dutch Immigrant in Toronto
All Garbed Out in Native
Costume.

(Toronto Globe.)
Among a party of Belgian and Hol-
land immigrants which arrived at the
Union station last night from the S. S.
Minnesota, was a Hollander who at-
tracted no little attention. He was dressed

in the national costume of Dutch
Flanders—wooden shoes with silver
buckles, short black coat, bloomers which
for their size made one think that the
high cost of material has, as yet not
reached the land of the dykes, and in-
stead of a white collar the Dutchman
wore a black velvet one covered with a
string of gold beads. He was going out
to take up land in the Peace River district.

Speaks Good English.
The Dutchman, wearing an antiquated
costume, spoke English fluently, and told
the Globe that he had some experience
in farming, he having taken a course at
the Agricultural College at Wageningen,
Holland.

"Your shoes must be quite a bit
cheaper than leather ones," asked the
Globe. "They are," replied the Dutch-
man, smilingly. "When I buy a new
pair I just remove the silver buckles,
and they cost me around sixty-five cents
in your money."
"You mean the beads around my col-
lar," said the Dutchman, when told by
the Globe that only women wore such
ornaments in this country. "They are
an heirloom. My father wore them be-
fore me and his father before him; they
are over 300 years old, and represent a
little fortune in these days."

Asked about the ex-Kaiser, who con-
tinues to be a guest of the Dutch peo-
ple at Doorn, the Dutchman, whose
name is "Ferdinand," said: "He was not
welcome from the start; we don't pay
any attention to him. I heard more
about him while coming through Eng-
land than I did for two years in my own
country."

Many Immigrants.
For several weeks the influx of immi-
grants from the Netherlands and Bel-
gium has been increasing, but last week
established a record for immigration
from those countries, when no less than
forty-nine Belgian families passed
through the Union station on their way
to the west. Sometimes families of two
or three generations come out all at once.
Their point of destination is, for the
greater part, the Belgian and Dutch col-
onies, Brussels and Holland, Manitoba.
Immigration officials stated last night
that the exodus from the European Low-
lands is likely to continue.

**CHINA GOING
BACKWARDS
FINANCIALLY**

Deficit of \$10,000,000 Monthly
— Further Loans Only on
Condition That Country
Balances Budget.

Peking, May 22.—(Associated Press
Correspondence)—The Chinese govern-
ment is running behind financially \$10,-
000,000 to \$12,000,000 monthly, accord-
ing to a statement made by an attaché
of the cabinet in conversation with
newspaper correspondents. The admin-
istrative debt of the nation totals \$270,-
000,000, of which \$180,000,000 repre-
sents loans by Chinese banks.

The monthly budget aggregates \$18,-
000,000 with only \$6,000,000 to \$8,000,000
available from ordinary sources of
revenue. Of this monthly expenditure
more than 70 per cent goes for military
upkeep. To meet the monthly deficit

drastic retrenchment is said to be con-
templated.
Cognizance was taken of this state of
affairs by Thomas Lamont, New York
financier, on his visit here when he in-
formed the Chinese authorities that loans
to China could be undertaken, among
other considerations, only after China
demonstrated her ability to "balance"
her budget for administrative and mili-
tary expenditures.

the wilful murder of her aunt, Sarah

DOOM OF THE HORSE.
Rapid and Ruthless Extinction By Motor
Traffic.

(Walter Winans in London Sketch.)
A melancholy thought during the Im-
ternational Horse Show at Olympia is
the passing of the horse from every-day
use. I feel sure that in ten years the
utility horse will be as extinct as the
dodo.

That will be brought about by motor
cars and tarred roads.
The newest thing in motor cars, the
big char-a-banc, fills up every scrap of
the road, and the horse is driven to the
pavement.

Tarred roads ruin horses, and owing
to their slipperiness we cannot drive up-
on them except at the risk of our lives.
I myself will not drive on the road.

It is constantly said that millions of
pounds are going to be spent on "im-
proving" roads. What is meant is "ruin-
ing" roads.

All the money is being spent for the
benefit of motorists. Horse breeding is
being ruined and will become one of the
lost industries of England.

What might be done is to leave a strip
of the road fit for horse driving.

Not only the carriage horse, but also
the hunter, is doomed. We shall not be
able to hunt because of the tarred roads,
barbed wire and chicken farms.

The only horses left will be the thor-
oughbred racing horse and the "trotter."
The trotter may be considered the
more useful, because it can carry a man's
weight, whereas the thoroughbred racing
horse can carry only a boy's weight.

Lord Forster Should Prove A Very Popular Governor

Will Represent King in Australia—The Soviet Visit to London—The Season—Topics of Week in Empire Metropolis

(From our own correspondents.) London, June 17—Lord Forster, I imagine, will make a very popular Governor in Australia. When he received his peerage and went to the House of Lords, it was generally assumed that he is still a comparatively young man, though troubled and bereaved that he suffered during the war turned his hair prematurely grey. As a Unionist whip in the House of Commons, he was one of the most popular and well known figures at St. Stephen's. In the meanwhile there are threats in the French papers, which are being repeated by Frenchmen in London, that legal steps will be taken to establish a priority claim on any gold which Krasin brings out of Russia for the purpose of creating business credits. I hear from people who ought to know that the government have consulted the law officers on this subject, and that the opinion has been expressed that if the Bolshevik government is recognized as being the de facto government in Russia they can do what they like with their gold, whether it is really the result of confiscation or not. All these allied meetings and discussions are complicated by the second fall of Signor Nitti.

No More Banquets. One of the many signs of simplicity and economy occurred on the King's birthday. If this had been celebrated in a pre-war manner, we should have had a ceremonial banquet by each of the chief ministers, followed by one of those great receptions at the foreign office or the India office which, in their elaborated form, were the special pride of Lord Murray of Elibank when he was government whip, giving him, as they did, the opportunity of showing hospitality on a large scale in every circumstance of splendor to the supporters of the Liberal party. Rival receptions were suspended during the war, and it has very sensibly been allowed to remain in abeyance. It is disorganizedly terrible work of the office in which it was held, as for days afterwards the bare traces of the vanished banquet. It necessitated an army of detectives, put ministers to considerable personal expense, and how ever much one might openly pretend to enjoy it, it was a secret horror to everybody concerned. Except in the case of Lord Carson, personal ministerial hospitality of an official kind has practically disappeared, and everything is now done impersonally by the office workers.

The London Season. The London season is showing distinct signs of fatigue already. There are more poorly attended than ever, and restaurateurs are half empty, and the horse shows are exciting only a languid interest. The owners of the big stables are seriously displeased at the fall in custom, and all kinds of advertising devices, including artificial lowering of prices, are being adopted to stimulate the public. The real reason is, I fancy, that we are now at the period when the

income tax collectors definitely insist on their demands being paid, and that people are really writing up to the fact that things are shockingly expensive and that a great deal of unnecessary money is being spent. You can notice the difference in the number of taxis you see about the streets.

As for the restaurants, the situation is really extraordinary. There are about a dozen places, near the Strand, which you can have your lunch any day in the midst of celebrities. I was lunching there the other day, and in the corner where I sat there were George Robey, Winston Churchill and Miss Delysia, all looking at each other, and all thinking how nice it was to see each other there.

ANTI-GLARE LAW.
(Toronto Globe.)
The long-looked-for legislation, requiring every motor vehicle to have its headlights equipped with anti-glare lenses or devices approved by the Ontario Highways Department, and that they be correctly adjusted so as to eliminate glare, is to come into effect on the 19th of this month.
But if a test and approval are to be made by the Highways Department of all the different non-glaring devices which are submitted, as requested in announcements appearing this week, the law cannot be enforced for some time after that date. Consequently the glaring headlight peril will continue until the Government has approved of certain types of lenses that motorists are obliged to use.
