NOT PLEASED WITH SPEECH FROM THRONE

Nationalists Expected More About Home Rule

Bill Not Before Easter? Suffragettes Disappointed and Miss Pankhurst Says There Will Be an Active Campaign Against Government

London, Feb. 15.—The king's speech proved disappointing both to supporters of home rule and to suffragettes. A Times telegram from Dublin this morning regarding the former, states that the scanty reference to home rule in the king's speech greatly disappointed the Irish Nationalists who hoped for a more fervent allusion to that pre-eminent measure of the session.

To Miss Christabel Pankhurst, the speech has been more than a disappointment. She says that the Union of Suffragettes will make an impressive demonstration at an early date, and that every opportunity will be taken of embarrassing the government and proving to them that women must have the vote. Miss Pankhurst said: "We had hoped for a distinct pronouncement in the king's speech. We always expect the best and are prepared for the worst. Now that they have given us this, we shall fight for a government measure until we win."

The Daily Mail understands that the suggestion for the visit of Secretary Haldane to Berlin was made in the first instance by the German Emperor, through Sir Herbert Bullen, director general of the Hamburg-American Steamship Company.

ALLIANS START SERVICE FROM PLYMOUTH HERE

London, Feb. 15.—The Allan line announces that it will inaugurate a steamship service between Plymouth and Canada within six weeks time. The first steamer to call is the Sicilian, on April 19. After that it will be a fortnightly service to Quebec and Montreal.

Sheppard Enlists Again New York, Feb. 15.—Melvin Sheppard, the runner who was recently discharged from the New York National Guard for failure to attend drill, is again a member of the militia, having re-enlisted in a Brooklyn regiment.

The commanding officer of Sheppard's old regiment gave his consent to the enlistment. As he is now reinstated in good military standing, Sheppard will be able to compete in the Olympic games.

SUN YAT SEN GIVES UP POST

New President of Chinese Republic is Yuan Shi Kai

Tribute Paid Former President as Successor — Revolutionary Troops Ignore Protest of Japan — Nanking as Capital

Nanking, Feb. 15.—Dr. Sun Yat Sen's resignation of the presidency of the Chinese republic has been accepted by the national assembly here, on condition that both he and the present cabinet hold office until the new president and cabinet take over the duties. The elections of ministers and of the president are to take place this afternoon. There was a touching scene in the assembly when Dr. Sun Yat Sen handed in his resignation.

The letter in which he offers to lay down the office of chief executive says: "Yuan Shi Kai has declared that he will adhere unconditionally to the national cause. He would surely prove a loyal and able president of the republic. This opposition to the former imperial premier has been strengthened by a report here that Yuan Shi Kai is engaged in a revolution for the benefit of the foreign legations in Peking, and that he has received some encouragement."

Yuan Shi Kai's refusal to come to Nanking has caused some reaction here. A section of the members of the senate declare that it will not elect Yuan Shi Kai as president of the republic. The recommendation is made that the senate should add to the corresponding "will be" clause the words "and on condition that the foreign legations in Peking are satisfied with the result."

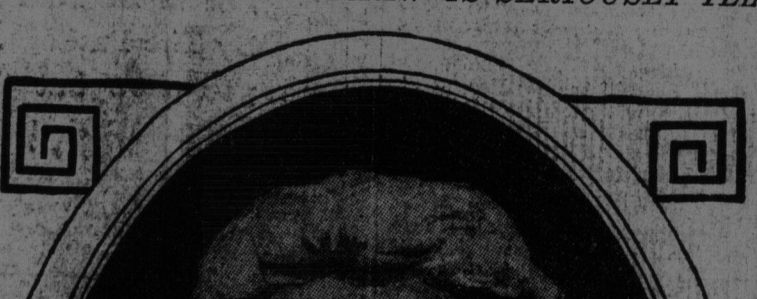
CONSPIRACY AGAINST VALET IS SUSPECTED

Boar Law, M.P., Makes Blunder

Opposition Leader Caught By Asquith on The Insurance Act. Unite Forces in Competition With C. P. R.

New York, Feb. 15.—A London cable to the New York Times says: "Former Asquith's statement in the House of Commons yesterday, regarding Lord Haldane's visit to Germany was received with universal cheering in this house, though Bonar Law later sought to draw a red herring across the track by criticizing it as a matter of diplomacy. The opposing leader, at a still later stage of the proceedings, delivered himself into the hands of the enemy by replying in the affirmative to the premier's question, 'Is the right honorable gentleman going to repeal the insurance act, when he comes into power?'"

"In principle the insurance act has always been ostensibly acceptable by the Unionists, and the ministerialists became widely excited over this admission of hostility, while Mr. Asquith exclaimed: 'Now we know that the first plank of the platform of the party upon which our new leader is the repeal of the insurance act; we are getting on.'" Bonar Law, realizing that he had overstepped the mark, when he remarked that if he were returned to power he would repeal the insurance act, has hastened to correct himself by means of a letter sent to the press, in which he asserts that his intentions were misunderstood. He rather faintly explains that what he meant to convey was that the Unionists, if they come into power would amend the act.

OPENING IN VAULTS NOT BIG ENOUGH TO ADMIT THE COFFINS

Distressing Scene at Double Funeral of Count and Countess in Russia. Moscow, Russia, Feb. 15.—An extraordinary scene was witnessed today during the funeral of Count and Countess Milutin. The count held the rank of field marshal and was chief aide-de-camp of the emperor. He was minister of war in the reign of Emperor Alexander II, and was the leading champion in the cause of the revolution.

FEAR ENGLISH GOAL STRIKE INEVITABLE

Glasgow, Feb. 15.—A reflex of the threatened national coal strike which will go into effect on Feb. 29, unless in the meantime the mine owners accept the principle of a minimum wage for all men and boys employed underground, is seen in the issue of news given by the blast furnace owners throughout Scotland to their workmen today. The contracts of the workmen are thus terminated on Feb. 29. The furnace owners are of the opinion that a national coal strike is inevitable. It will affect about 800,000 men.

ACTOR SHOT IN QUARREL

Max Abbot Was Burlesque Company Member — George Stone Arrested. Cincinnati, O., Feb. 15.—Max Abbot, of New York, a member of a burlesque company playing here was shot last night by George Stone, actor in a theatre and died today. Stone is a brother of Fred Stone of Montgomery & Stone. Stone is under arrest.

OTTAWA TO NEGOTIATE DIRECT WITH WEST INDIES ON TARIFF

London, Feb. 15.—The Birmingham Daily Post's London correspondent understands that the Canadian government has taken control of the negotiations with the West Indies for closer fiscal relations. The imperial government thinks negotiations will be facilitated if conducted direct between the respective parties.

BODIES OF 63 STORM VICTIMS ARE RECOVERED

Tegusigalva, Honduras, Feb. 15.—George F. Davis, United States consul at Tegusigalva, was drowned last night while bathing. He was making an attempt to swim to a bar in the mouth of the river, but was overborne by a storm in the lagoon district of western Honduras. The body was recovered.

MONEY IS TO FLOW IN
Million Outside Capital for Property Here, is Prediction - Courtenay Bay Sales

The general interest in real estate investments in this city is shown by the readiness with which the first Courtenay Bay lots which were put on the market yesterday are being taken up. In the past it has been said that local citizens were the hardest to convince of the future prospects of the city, but there are very few doubters left; and the willingness to put up their money is the best test of the faith of the local people.

The first subdivision to be offered here is the lot known as the "Pond," owned by the Montreal syndicate. An attractive looking map shows a well laid out section with streets six feet wide, and fifteen foot lanes at the rear of each street. It is the declared intention of the owners to open \$10,000 this spring in laying out the streets. They will also act as a development company and will erect buildings on the lots.

D. B. Donald, acting for local men who hold certain properties, left for Montreal last evening in response to a visit from a group of capitalists who are anxious to buy St. John property.

Men with money to invest in St. John have been found in Montreal, Toronto and Winnipeg. Some of the only money in the city is being put in touch with the turn of affairs are confident that a million dollars worth of money will be invested in St. John, and the vicinity within the next month or two.

Since the sale of lots opened yesterday afternoon, \$50,000 worth have been disposed of to local purchasers.

The January number of the Canadian Bulletin, "The Publications of the International Agricultural Institute," has just appeared. It contains a "Rural Land Credit in Argentina," a pretty complete account of agricultural conditions in that country. The average price of farm lands seventy-two cents an acre and the state farms land at public auction at eight cents an acre. There are three large official mortgage institutions in Argentina, which loans on mortgage are procurable. There are also a number of state institutions, most of which have headquarters in Europe.

Since the health of the whole population, especially of the children is concerned, the consumer is justified in wanting a guarantee of the quality of milk, or even the supervision of the industry by the state or the municipalities. MACEDONIA IS IN STATE OF ANARCHY

Similar Condition of Affairs Prevails in Northern Albania

PILLAGE AND MURDER RIFE

One of the Results of the War Between Italy and Turkey—Not Even Shadow of Local Self-Government Exists in European Turkey

(Times Special Correspondence.)

Constantinople, Feb. 1.—Never since the eve of the great war of 1877 has the outlook in the near east been more gloomy and disquieting than at the present moment. Four months ago the outbreak of war between Greece and Turkey led to a general apprehension of a cataclysm in the Balkans, but it was then pointed out that no immediate trouble need be anticipated on the part of Turkey's neighbors, the danger lying rather in the prospective aggravation of the internal situation in the empire itself.

Since that time the Balkan States have remained perfectly quiet. Greece and Bulgaria have pursued a resolutely pacific policy, while Rumania and Serbia have maintained the most cordial relations with the Porte. But internal anarchy has gone from bad to worse; while the political conflict rages at Constantinople, anarchy gains ground in the provinces, and the discontent and exasperation of the oppressed races threaten to culminate in rebellion.

"Macedonia," says a European resident in that country, "is today in a state of anarchy, and old inhabitants are unanimous in stating that the existing conditions are without parallel even in the worst days of the Hamidian regime. In the interior there is a total absence of security of life and property, and pillage and murder are rife, and the authorities appear unable to check the lawlessness which prevails on every side." A similar state of affairs exists in Northern Albania, and it is here, perhaps, that the first outbreak of trouble may be expected.

There is reason to believe that the critical character of the situation is perfectly understood by the great powers, who realize the importance of bringing the war to a close before the political situation is inaugurated by the "melting of the snows." The need for an early settlement is all the greater as Italy cannot be expected to carry on a costly war for an indefinite time within a confined area, and financial conditions also may prevent her from breaking the limits hitherto observed in order to deal a decisive blow at her adversary.

Whenever and wherever that blow will be struck the effect on the Balkan Peninsula will be immediate and far-reaching. From the Aegean to the Adriatic is ripe for rebellion, in order to avert the threatened catastrophe, which may entail incalculable consequences, the opinion is expressed that the powers should exert themselves to bring the present conflict to an end, however great may be the difficulties in the way of such an achievement.

There is still time for diplomacy to try its hand; two months may, perhaps, be available before the winter snows set in. The political conflict in Constantinople and the dissensions in the army do not in the meantime annul the civil war, and in the other, that the Albanians postpone their annual uprising beyond the usual date—the beginning of February.

The causes and progress of discontent in Macedonia and Albania are many. Relieved from the incubus of European control and having obtained the "free land" which Germany had so often demanded for Abdul Hamid, the soldiers and newly-fledged politicians who undertook to govern the empire discovered a new and more excellent way of putting an end to the secular conflict of races and creeds. The application of the policy of "Ottomanism" in the new province, was of necessity entrusted to the local officials who, freed from the plebeian surveillance of Himi Pasha, and his foreign assessors as well as from the espionage of Yildiz, proceeded to administer the prescribed remedy in their own way.

To the principal functionary the possession of authority implies the right to do as he pleases, and the liberty accorded by the constitution was interpreted as a confirmation and extension of that right. The experience of the last three years has shown that neither the government at Constantinople nor the committee at Salonika has exercised any effective control over the local officials, who for the most part have dealt with the subject populations according to their own sweet will. 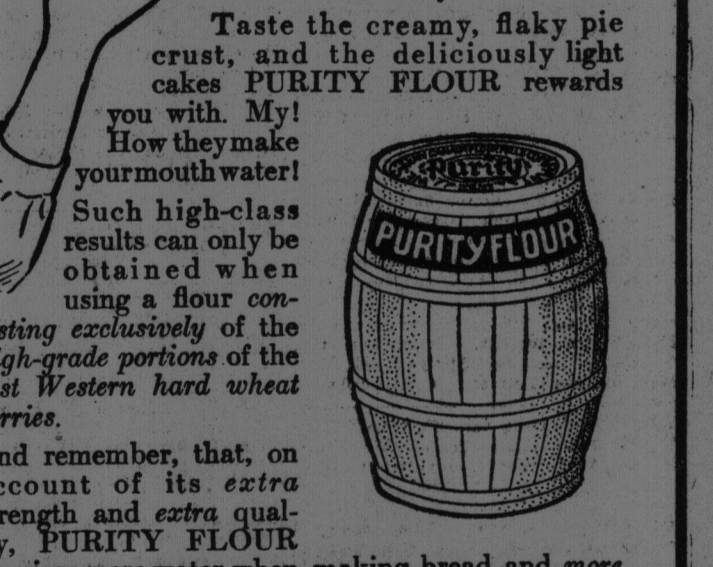

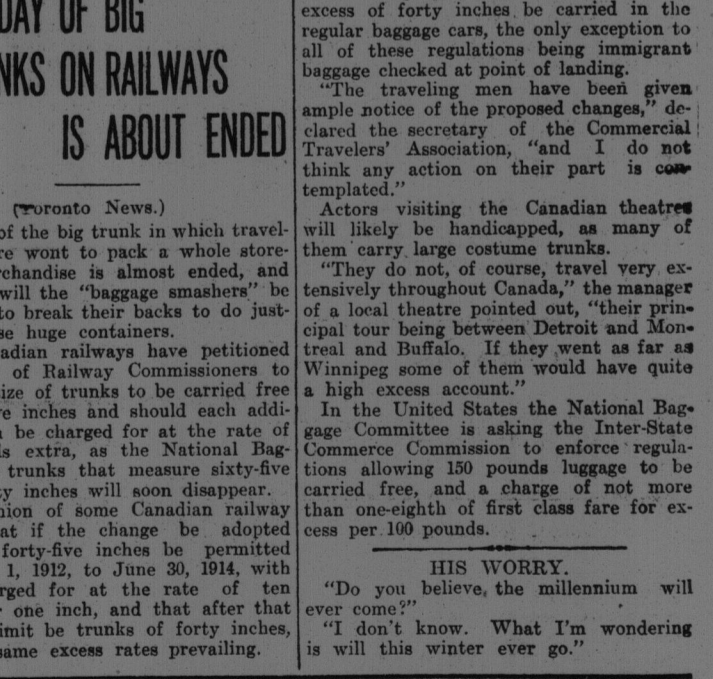

BRITISH PARLIAMENT

London, Feb. 14.—The opening day of the parliamentary session, which is to deal with Home Rule, Welsh disestablishment, and electoral reform, was marked by a statement by Premier Asquith that the visit of Viscount Halifax, secretary for war, to Berlin, was made at the invitation of Germany and that the conversations between the British war minister and the German authorities had reference to a desire on the part of both countries that the existing tension should be relieved.

It is evident that Andrew Bonar Law and Lord Lansdowne, leaders of the opposition respectively in the house of commons and the house of lords, had been informed of the course of the discussion, for although they spoke before the premier, Lord Lansdowne assured the government of support in any move to secure a better understanding with Germany.

The speeches on domestic affairs dealt only generally with the government's huge legislative programme. Bonar Law, in his fighting speech, promised to offer stubborn resistance to Home Rule and other measures.

Lord Lansdowne intimated that Home Rule will meet its fate in the house of lords. It will therefore have to be passed by the house of commons, as provided by the parliament bill.

Premier Asquith, who deferred to the overclouding of Anglo-German relations as "a most lamentable fact," took occasion to deny the story that the British fleet, last autumn was preparing for an aggressive attack on Germany.

LOOKS LIKE TROUBLE FOR GOVERNMENT

Nationalists Taking a Decided Stand on the School Question—Sir Wilfrid Had Best Legal Advice

Ottawa, Feb. 14.—The difficulties of the government with their Nationalist-Ontario supporters from Quebec, over the Manitoba school question, and the repeal of the naval law, reached an acute stage late tonight. The Quebec ministers were in caucus for two hours, every member being present, with not one in the commons chamber.

It is understood that they agreed practically to a man to insist on their demand for a clause in the provincial boundaries extension bill safeguarding the rights of the Roman Catholics minority to separate schools in the district to be added to Manitoba.

The government bill as now drafted does not provide for that, and an ultimatum was sent to Premier Borden declaring that the government could not count on the support of the Quebec members unless their demand was granted.

They further insisted on a "show down" on the naval question this session. The government has not agreed as yet to allow time for Mr. Sevier's resolution, which the order paper, urging the immediate repeal of the naval law, to come up for discussion. The caucus tonight decided that the cabinet go back to their constituents without stabilizing themselves unless they could show they had made honest attempts to carry out their election promises in regard to the navy.

It is stated that the discussion became decidedly warm, and at times acrimonious, and the appeals of the Quebec ministers present not to embarrass the government were not very sympathetically received.

Premier Borden and Hon. Robert Rogers were summoned to the caucus and asked for a clear statement as to what their Quebec supporters could expect.

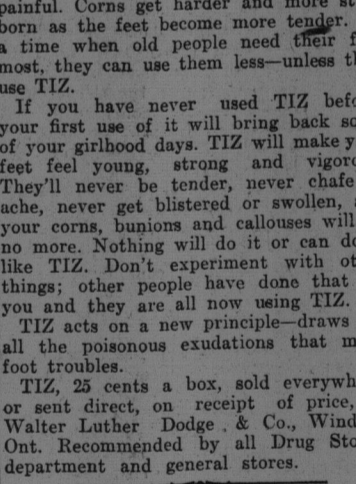
Mayor Prink in his optimistic address, reviewed the progress of the city as made in recent years and indicated the direction the forward movement will take in the coming period.

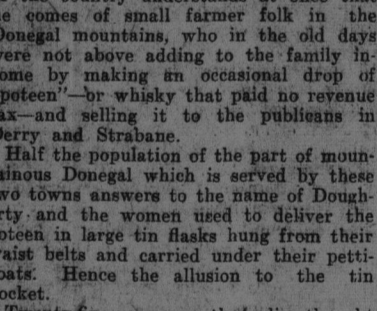

MORE DEMAND FOR THE NURSES

Annual Meeting of Victorian Order Hears of Increased Work and Falling off in Receipts from Patients

At the annual meeting of the Victorian Order of Nurses here this afternoon the following reports on the work were read: The board of management have pleasure in presenting the twelfth annual report of the St. John Branch of the Victorian Order of Nurses ending December 31, 1911. Practically during the whole of the last year there have been three nurses on the staff, previously to the permanent addition of Miss Substantia in July, services of outside nurses were frequently required. An increase of \$105.30 in the salary list reflects this.

The addition to our staff was necessitated through the board entering into a contract with the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. to attend their sick industrial policy holders. This contract has proved of great benefit to both parties the order having received in fees under this branch of the work the sum of \$300.00 besides bringing our nurses in touch with a larger number of the poorer classes.

We may mention that out of the forty-nine night visits seven entailed the presence of a nurse the whole night. In view of the above report, giving a comparison of the work performed by the nurses with that of 1910, no comment is called for. Fees received from patients showed a falling off of \$140.95 being \$416.35 against \$557.30 for the year 1910. Subscriptions of \$10 were also \$37 lower for the year.

In November last the board made an arrangement with their staff on the lines followed by other branches of the order whereby an allowance is granted them in lieu of the order providing them with uniforms, etc., and paying their laundry bills. In future these items will disappear from our balance sheets and a consequent increase in the salary list be shown.

A Word For the Nurses

The board wishes to express their appreciation of the work done by their nurses which has been well performed, in doing this they feel they are only expressing the general opinion of what they have accomplished. Their thanks are also tendered to the board of commission of St. John General Hospital who continue to provide comfortable quarters for the nurses, to the city council for their aid in obtaining various permits for their support and interest in the work of the order and to the medical men for their cooperation in the work of the association.
