





-Many More to Come.

New York, March 19—Proceedings were listed a few days ago in the United States District Court by Colonel William Hayward, United States District Attorney, for the purpose of closing the padlock for one year, three of the best known and most prominent cabarets and restaurants in the heart of the city. These are Shanley's Restaurant, Forty-third street and Broadway; the Little Club, 216 West Forty-fourth street, and the Knickerbocker Grill, Forty-second street and Broadway, which is in the old Knickerbocker Hotel Building. Repeated vialotions of the Volstead act are ascribed as the reason the Government seeks to close the places, and follows similar action taken several months ago in padlocking for twelve months the cabaret formerly famous as Reinsenweber's, Fifty-eighth street and Eighth avenue.

The actions started yesterday are only three of twenty-five similar suits which will involve prominent Broadway places. The other actions are to be started within a few days. Palmer Canfield, head of the legal division of the local prohibition office, sided Sanford H. Cohen, Assistant United States Attorney, in the preparation of the cases, Recently Mr. Canfield said that there would be several hundred injunction proceedings to close places that are alleged to have continued to violate the Volstead act.

In the case of the Little Club the defendants are the Chateau Thierry Hotel & Restaurant Co., Inc., Benjamin Cohen, Henry J. The Astors are the owners of record of the premises, the Shuberts are lessees, Cohen is President of the restaurant company, and Valloft is manager.



In a radio headset each receiver should be carefully matched in tone.

So both will emit vibrations of the same nature. The receivers must be "soundmates" if the message is to be clearly understood. This is especially important for distance reception. Matched tone headsets have been found to increase greatly the range of radio receiving sets, as they produce exactly the same tone at each ear. The human ear is more sensitive to vibration of sympathetic nature.

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
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
