CLUE TO A TREASURE.

Irish Stone Unearthed In Donegal Arouses Great Interest.

A discovery which he believes is of great archaeological interest has been made by Prof. Edward Spencer Dodgson, M.A., of Jesus College, Oxford, who, in company with Prof. Sanku Lichner, a servant from Tokyo, is at present studying Gaelic at the Gortork College, West Donegal.

He has found a peculiarly-shaped stone, which apparently has been lying unnoticed at Killilt, Falcarragh, West Donegal, for several hundred years. One face of the stone is covered with Ogham-like characters, and there are indications suggesting that the stone provides a clue to the whereabouts of an extensive treasure, belonging to an ancient Irish chieftain and believed to be hidden in its immediate neighborhood.

Ogham is a peculiar alphabet of straight lines, used by the ancient British and Irish. Only a fractional part of the inscription has as yet been interpreted and no further light on the message can be had pending the arrival of Ogham scholars, who are on the way to the scene of the discovery.

Prof. Dodgson was returning from an excursion to Tory Island, and had reached the neighborhood of Killilt when his attention was attracted to a stone over a yard in length which lay partially exposed in a field less than 100 yards away from the east side of the local Protestant church. Some parts of the stone's surface very resembled the body of a big petri-fied fish. The Ogham-like markings revealed themselves on the reverse side.

The professor called the attention of the owner of the field (Mr. Brady) to the position of the stone and its peculiarities, and Mr. Brady's interest never allowed the markings before. With the permission of Mr. Brady the stone was removed to Gortork College, where it attracts the attention of many teachers and the students there. Some of the markings on the stone have been deciphered, one group being interpreted as signifying 'son of' or 'son of'.

There is an old tradition in Killilt that the treasure of an ancient Irish chieftain is hidden there, and some rare gold ornaments were found during the digging of a local mound sixty years ago.

The "Northern Whig," Belfast, suggests that the discovery of the stone is the result of a practical joke on the part of the students at the Gaelic College, who may have thought it excellent fun to provide a new version of the famous incident in "Pickwick Papers."



Baptists in session.

Asks that liquor be unmarketable if parcel post is established in Canada.
At Amherst, yesterday, the Baptist Convention considered the liquor question. The income was \$3,348. Aid was given to eighteen ministers and thirty-eight widows. The capital of the fund is \$40,000. The income of the relief and aid fund is \$2,231. Twenty-eight beneficiaries are listed in this fund. Its capital is \$4,700.

Rev. J. G. Brown, D. D., Secretary of the Canadian Baptist Mission Board, stated that the missionaries in India have found the Canadian Baptist Mission Conference in India. It reports a bountiful harvest there being 115 baptisms. The summary of the needs to overcome this work follows:

- 8 bungalows for families, \$28,000
- 12 ladies' bungalows, \$4,000
- High school at Vizagapatam, 16,000
- Hostels and dormitories, 5,000
- Annual expenses, 35 families, 42,000
- 70 single ladies, 12,000
- Travelling on furlough, 12,000
- Repairs and taxes, 4,000
- High educational work, 25,000
- Indian male workers, 20,000
- Bible workers, 20,000

Total, \$350,000.
Deficit for Indian receipts, 100,000
Balance to be supplied from abroad, 250,000
