## ATHLETICS GET THEIR MONEY

Sum of \$2,026.74 Paid to Every Player--Combs Improves His Form--Real Elephant for Work

Philadelphia, Oct. 24.—The share of the world's baseball pie was opened at 8 o'clock Wednesday afternoon and every member of the champion Athletics was handed out his slice. The 22 players who were declared eligible for the world's series were given \$2,026.74 each.

The luckiest man in the bunch was shortstop Derrick, who did not report until the latter part of August, but he was counted in for a full share, the same as the others.

While at the park the players cleaned out their lockers and took away their bats and uniforms, and from now until spring Shibe park will be deserted, except for the ground keepers, watchmen and manager Mack and his secretary, Joe Ohl, who have a large amount of correspondence to get rid of.

Several presents were made by the players, including one to Louis Van Zest, the little mascot. Jack Barry's work in the world's series has so stirred up the fans of his home town, Meriden, Conn., that they will give him a banquet tomorrow night.

### Combs Buys Farm.

Some of the players have decided what to do with their money. Combs the pitcher who won three times, will spend his share of the proceeds improving his farm in Maine. Eddie Plank will also invest his money in his farm near Gettysburg, where he will spend the winter. Eddie Collins will spend part of his money for a marriage license to wed Miss Mabel H. Doane of Clifton Heights on Nov. 1. Ira Thomas' share will go into 'real estate in this city. Thomas is an operator of shrewdness and judgment, while 'Topsy' Hartzel is the head of the sporting goods department of one of the largest stores in the city. Jack Lapp will study electricity during the winter.

### A Real Elephant.

## SEES ACADIA AS MARITIME CHAMPIONS

Wolfville Correspondent Picks Garnet and Blue to Win King-Richardson Trophy and Give Dalhousie Hard Battle

(From Our Own Correspondent.) Wolfville, Oct. 27.—Can the Acadia College football team retain the intercollegiate championships of the Maritime Provinces? It would be unwise to answer "yes," without carefully studying the matter. Acadia has a strong team this year. So far, she has only played one game, and on that occasion, when the Wanderers of Halifax were defeated 8-0, she manifested very forcibly that it will take a mighty fast aggregation to beat our local fifteen.

The half line is, perhaps, the fastest in the Maritime Provinces. Porter, Kaiser and Andrews of last year's team, with Richmond and MacDonald, certainly make a rattling good bunch of half backs, who can run with the best of them.

Richmond is none other than the famous Gordon Richmond, champion five mile runner of Cape Breton. He plays great football for Glace Bay during the season of 1908-9, and is making a good showing at Acadia. MacDonald, of Fredericton, was the star of the Horton Collegiate Academy team last year, and this fall he is even playing better than when he wore the "H." "Mac" is one of the fastest sprinters in Eastern Canada.

The quarters are Wolbar, Patillo, and Goss, who are all showing good form. Spencer, Fitch, Robinson, Spurr, Brooks and Pines are the forwards. They're a light bunch, but they're as hard as nails.

Reld has been playing a great game at full back, and is undoubtedly one of the best men in the game today. Captain Robinson has his nose out practicing every day. "Bar" is wasting no time; he's determined to put up a terrific struggle for the coveted championship.

The President As Coach. Dr. Cutten, President of Acadia, who was, in his college days at Yale, one of the greatest football players in America, is very enthusiastic over the college's team, and has been out coaching the squad on a number of occasions.

Acadia will play U. N. B. Mount Allison, Dalhousie and probably some other teams this fall. Her best players will stand an awful lot of beating, and the team that defeats the Wolfville boys will have to go some.

The chances of Acadia retaining the intercollegiate championship are good. They are also exceedingly promising for winning the Maritime title. Acadia has to play the garnet and blue in Wolfville this fall, and it is almost impossible to defeat Acadia "in her own backyard."

The first game of the intercollegiate series will be between U. N. B. and Acadia at Fredericton on Nov. 4th. On Nov. 12th what is expected to be the game of the season will take place in Wolfville, when fifteen of Mount Allison's stalwart sons line up before the intercollegiate champions.

Pitiable tales have been coming from Mount A., to the effect that her best players are crippled and unable to play. Don't think that the Sackville boys will invade Wolfville with a crippled team; they will send their very best men and it will be no joke team, either.

## ZBYSCO AFTER GOTCH AGAIN

Believed That Pole Will Refuse to Accept His Defeat as Final and Will Demand Another Match.

Buffalo, Oct. 24.—Those followers of sport, and of wrestling in particular, who have been favorably disposed towards the belief that Zbyso, the great Polish wrestler, would accept his defeat at the hands of Frank Gotch last spring in Chicago, as final, and that he would at once retire permanently to his native land, completely crushed, or that, if he returned to America it would be in a very humble frame of mind, are apt to be keenly disappointed, when they find that the burly foreigner is not only still aiming at the world's title, but that he is willing to gamble pretty high that he can take down the laurels.

According to information given last evening Zbyso is willing to bet \$10,000, even up, that he can beat Gotch, catch-as-catch-can, an offer which can scarcely be ignored if the American is to remain active on the canvas.

After Gotch Again. Zbyso is due to arrive in this country the first of next month, and, according to advices, the foreigner is more than anxious for another chance at Gotch, and the world's title. The men met last spring in Chicago, Gotch winning after a most sensational battle. Thousands of Zbyso's followers and countrymen were loud in their denunciation of the treatment accorded their champion, but all Zbyso asked was another chance from Gotch.

The latter has promised him this, but the time that the match must be for a substantial side bet. With this end in view, Zbyso has forwarded from his home to Krakau, Austria, \$1,000 to his American representative, J. H. Herman of Buffalo, N. Y., with instructions to arrange a match for \$10,000 a side, contest to be to a finish, and to be held either in public or private, as Gotch may elect. Herman has deposited the money with the sporting editor of the Buffalo Times, and that man has been given carte blanche to arrange the battle.

## NOTICE OF APPEAL IN CRIPPEN CASE.
