Government to Redeem Pre-Election Promises to Improve the Highways of Canada.

Ottawa, Jan. 21.—Several of the most important questions which will be dealt with this session are on the tapis for this week, although they will not likely all be reached as they will all demand debates of considerable length.

Another important measure is the good roads act of which Hon. Frank Cochrane has given notice. It is a bill to carry out the pre-election promises of the government for co-operation between the provinces and the Dominion in improving the highways of Canada.

Another important question which may be reached this week is the resolution of J. E. Armstrong, East Lambton, asking for the appointment of a royal commission to investigate the practicability of Canada establishing a system of national telegraph and telephones along the lines of Great Britain.

FISHING SCHOONERS OUT OF GRIP OF THE ICE.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 20.—All the American fishing schooners with one exception, which were imprisoned in the ice for several days off the coast of Newfoundland are now safely sailing the Gulf of St. Lawrence, homebound to Gloucester, Mass., according to a despatch to the revenue cutter service.

ARGENTINE AND COLOMBIA JOIN PEACE MOVEMENT.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 20.—World peace was strengthened by the signing in Washington today of a general arbitration treaty in Washington between the Argentine republic and the United States of Colombia. The treaty which is almost exactly like those negotiated by the United States with Great Britain and France, was signed by Romulo S. Najarra for Argentina and Gen. Pedro Nel Ospina for Colombia, ministers from those countries to the United States.

THE LADY LAURIER TOWED TO HALIFAX.

YUAN READY FOR SPEEDY DEPARTURE

Premier of China Preparing to Leave Peking at the First Sign of Any Pressing Danger.

YUAN SAID TO BE LOSING HIS GRIP.

Peking, Jan. 21.—A special train has been held in readiness since Friday to take Yuan Shi Kai to Tien Tsin. It was evidently the Premier's plan to transfer the provisional capital to that city where the danger from Manchus was slight.

Yuan Shi Kai's position is considered by his friends as considerably shaken. The young bloods are urging the appointment of T'ieh Liang who, in addition to his experience on the war board, was Tartar general at Nanking, to take command of the northern army.

Shanghai, Jan. 21.—The exciting news of war and rebellion has caused destitution which now prevails in China. It is a side issue, but one which may have a vital effect on the settlement of the revolution.

Hodeida, Arabia, Jan. 20.—The Italian gunboat Volturro today held up powers, the government having 37 battalions, more than Germany. In armored cruisers Germany has 14 and the United States 12. The combined tonnage of battleships and cruisers shows the United States has 1,787,623 tons and Germany 763,241.

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Blames Russia and Great Britain for Present Condition of Chaos There.

Russian Troops Advancing Southward May Menace Britain on Indian Frontier.

American Removed from Important Post in Persia Grants Interview in Vienna.

Vienna, Jan. 20.—The net result of the British and Russian action in Persia renders a nation which was making progress toward peace and order and was building up its finances for the establishment of a constitutional government a land of chaos and anarchy without prestige among its own people, and in addition, has meant the sacrifice of hundreds of innocent lives.

The Russian and British legations are the real governing forces in Persia. They are acting through a directory of seven Persians in order to avoid international responsibility, but morally they are responsible for the destruction of Persian nationality, when it gave promise of establishing a stable constitutional government.

SHOOTING THE MOST POPULAR METHOD OF SELF DESTRUCTION

Washington, D. C., Jan. 20.—Fewer people committed suicide during 1910 than in 1909, according to the latest statistics on the subject announced today by Dr. Cressy L. Wilbur, chief statistician for vital statistics of the United States Census Bureau.

TWO FRENCH CANADIAN ALDERMEN WANT JOB AS MAYOR OF MONTREAL

Montreal, Jan. 20.—Nominations for the offices of mayor and aldermen took place today. Only two candidates are in the field for mayor and both are French Canadian aldermen, L. A. Lavallee and George Marcell. Eight aldermen were elected by acclamation.

YEAR BOOK CREDITS U. S. WITH STRONGER NAVY THAN GERMANY

Washington, D. C., Jan. 20.—The naval year book, issued today under the auspices of the Senate committee on foreign relations, gave the United States second place among the naval powers, the government having 37 battleships, more than Germany.

THE GERMAN GOVERNMENT FAIRLY SAFE

Berlin, Jan. 20.—Seventy-eight ballots in the Reichstag elections were held today. The returns indicate that the socialists are not gaining as expected. The socialists participated in 46 ballots, of which they carried only eight.

SOCIALIST GAINS ARE LESS THAN EXPECTED.

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Result in Reichstag Elections Indicate that Combined Opposition Parties will Not Suffice to Overthrow it.

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The radicals put up a stout defense and elected 17 members, winning eight districts chiefly from the conservatives and losing only one. The various conservative groups elected 21 in the ballots, the clericals seven, the national liberals 21, socialist 8, radicals 17, and irregulars 4.

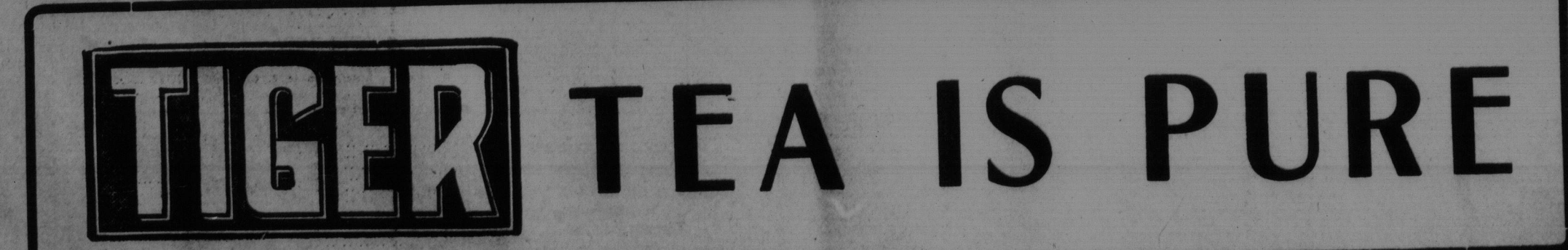

F. B. McCURDY'S WEEKLY STOCK LETTER

The market during the past week has been both active and broad with quotations however showing little change except in some specialties.

This stock which for some time past has been one of the most active issues on the local market, had a remarkably sudden reaction on Monday when the directors announced that only the regular dividend at the rate of 2 per cent. for the quarter had been declared.

The meeting of the shareholders of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company to authorize an issue of preferred stock to provide for further extension and the present financial needs was held early in the week.

AN ACTIVE TIME IN THE STOCK MARKET

New York, Jan. 20.—For a holiday and taking the recent dullness into account today's brief session was rather noteworthy for its activity and strength.

Certain phases of the situation, however, are obviously of a manipulative character, particularly the movement in the coal issues.

The bank statement furnished something of a surprise in that actual loans exceeded over \$28,000,000. The actual cash gain, however, was almost \$17,000,000, with an increase in reserves of over \$7,000,000.

This stock has also been in the limelight during the week, owing to the troubles the steel trust is having pending the election on Tuesday when the citizens will decide whether they will settle their differences with the company or continue to struggle.

The cement issues have again been active and strong especially during the last few days.

A surprising feature of the local market is the weakness of the various textile stocks in spite of the fact that raw cotton is lower than for some years past.

The tram situation has entered a new phase in the announcement by President Robert that the Montreal Tramway Company, the Canadian Light and Power Company, and the Sagway Electric Company will be amalgamated in a new company.
